COUNCILMAN UMANSKY stated 'maybe we will not be spending money', that this was a matter of representing the people of Carteret. COUNCILMAN TOTTH said that his motion was to spend money. COUNCILMAN SITARZ stated that Mr. Dolan called a suit four (4) years ago and it was alright. MR. DOLAN said there was no veto involved.

February 12, 1979

On February 6, 1979, the Governing Body authorized this office to file, with the New Jersey Green Acres Agency, a "Program Participation Interest Form", indicating to the State that the Borough desires to participate in the new Green Acres Bond approval by referendum in the November 1978 elections. The "Interest Form" requests five (5) years advanced planning concerning acquisition for recreation purposes, and five (5) years advanced planning for recreation development and construction.

This office is unaware of any plans for such future recreation acquisition. Therefore, we request input relative to any future recreational land acquisition.

The primary purpose for Borough participation in Green Acres future funding is to complete the two Green Acres projects to which the Borough is already committed. Specifically, the Borough has already filed a Green Acres development application for improvements to Carteret Lake and Carteret Park.

Secondly, the Borough successfully secured a \$190,000+ Green Acres Acquisition Grant for Civic Center Park at Noe Street. The actual negotiation and purchase of the parcels must be completed by October 1, 1979. It is logical and reasonable to plan for the development of this parcel for 1980.

This office requests input from the Governing Body, Planning Board, Recreation Commission, Community Development Agency, etc., or any other recreational development projects desired during the third (1981), fourth (1982) or fifth (1983) year of this five year Green Acres program.

This office shall await information from you.

In my opinion, if this special election is called, it will be an illegal special election. I assume that you have legal counseling, and I suggest that if your lawyer differs, he set forth his understanding of that statute. In the event a special election is held, only members of the same party as John Tomczuk can run in that special election.

As to the question of instituting legal action regarding the filling of the vacancy, I will withhold action until the next regular meeting.

PARKS AND RECREATION: Councilman Wilson reported PROGRESS in his department and stated that he would like to call attention to an article that appeared in The Atom Tabloid last week entitled "Full-Time First Aid" which criticized the First Aid Squad. He said that, in his opinion, the First Aid Squad and Fire Department are the finest. You can have confidence that they will come out when called and are a fine, dedicated group. He stated that the article said that the squad did not administer any aid, but, he said, they must have given aid as they couldn't just stand there. He said that criticism was also directed at the elected officials who, the article said, condones limited first aid service and that the squad was not qualified. Councilman Wilson stated that the First Aid Squad should be highly praised; that they are qualified and highly dedicated and noted that the article gave them a 'black eye'. The MAYOR agreed with Councilman Wilson.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Upon MMS&C, by Councilmen Toth and Sitar, John Sudia was designated to act as negotiator in reference to the acquisition of land for the Civic Center Park Project. Upon individual roll call vote, Councilmen Sitar, Sitarz, Toth, Umansky and Wilson voted in the affirmative. One seat vacant.

Upon MMS&C, by Councilmen Toth and Sitar the Borough Attorney was authorized and directed to take the necessary steps to disband the Carteret Redevelopment Agency. Upon individual roll call vote, Councilmen Sitar, Sitarz, Toth, Umansky and Wilson voted in the affirmative. One seat vacant.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: Councilman Umansky brought attention to the pictures hung on the wall in the Council Chambers, of all the past Mayors. He said that the only one missing was Edward J. Dolan because he did not submit his as yet. He stated that this was a long time coming and that the man who handled the project did an excellent job. Councilman Umansky also commended Kingsley Fisher, Scout State Representative on the excellent job he is doing with the Scouts and achieving the highest award a civilian can get--- the Silver Beaver Award. He suggested that the Mayor issue him a Meritorious Award Certificate. Councilman Umansky stated that he could continue to discuss the veto; feels that the public has not been served and that the issue will have to be settled in court one way or the other.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL: Upon MMS&C, by Councilmen Umansky and Toth, and unanimous affirmative vote of the full membership present, the Clerk was authorized and directed to advertise for Lime and Liquid Chlorine bids.

All other Standing Committee Chairmen reported PROGRESS in their respective departments.

PUBLIC DISCUSSION

CHARLES BONCELET said that there was some business transpired about the Redevelopment Agency which he did not understand. COUNCILMAN TOTTH explained that the agency is being phased out. Mr. Boncelet stated that this was the best peice of news he heard in years and that this should have been ^{done} years ago. He stated that he has heard nothing on the budget as yet, and that we have lots of problems here. He stated that in no way could the Republicans seat a Republican to fill the vacancy. He pointed out that the people elected the Mayor and asked the Council to cooperate with him for the good of the Borough. COUNCILMAN WILSON stated that the Council has cooperated with the Mayor in all phases, but political. MR. BONCELET stated that the nature of the position should be accepted and instead of bickering, they should support the Mayor.

PETER SICA stated that he, too, was glad that Urban Renewal was being phased out; that he has been asking for this for four (4) years, but instead, we kept on paying and keeping political democratic appointments on the payroll. He stated that we have a pressing problem in reference to LNG again; that he was contacted by Mr. Sudia to look into it. He said that he knows how this side, (pointing to the three Republican Councilmen) feels, but he did not know about the other side (pointing to the two Democratic Councilmen). He stated that it took a petition with over a thousand names for the Democrats to do something about it. COUNCILMAN TOTTH disagreed, stating that this was not so. MR. SICA stated that it would cost money to run a special election, but he felt the people should have a choice of whom they want. He also stated that Mayor Tomczuk could have resigned as Councilman and have someone else run for the office. He said that he takes great offense in Mr. Boncelet's remark that the Mayor was not receiving cooperation. He said there is a spirit of cooperation here, if only the Democrats would cooperate with the Republicans. He stated that Charles Boncelet was proven to be a 'spoiler' and continued to be a 'spoiler'; that the people voted the Democrats out for the last 8 years, but they got elected only because of people like Mr. Boncelet. He stated that Mr. Boncelet was the first one to jump up when recess was called to coach the Democrats. He stated he will, at his own expense, personally, see to it that each citizen is given a report of what happened here.

RICHARD PACKARD stated that flagrant neoptism is not in the best interest of the Borough. He stated that he too read the article in reference to the First Aid Squad and suggested that Council publicly recognize their dedication and service to the Borough.

STEPHEN KRISSAK stated that two weeks ago he questioned the ruling of the Judge in the Format case and that he could be wrong in his ruling, but to date, he has heard nothing. He wanted to know how the Council felt about it, whether they approved of Format or not.

COUNCILMAN UMANSKY stated that 'talking about flagrant nepotism--- the Mayor appointed his daughter as his Aide and if that was not flagrant nepotism, nothing was. MR. PACKARD stated that the Aide serves no one but the Mayor, while other appointments serve all the people of the Borough.

KATHY FRANK asked what happened to the snow removal; that she lives on Fitch Street and her area has not been properly cleaned and is a hazard to the children going to school.

There being no further business from the Council or public present, the meeting was adjourned upon MSM&C, by Councilmen Umansky and Totth.

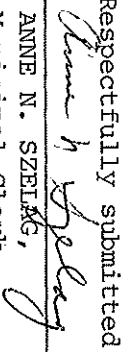
