NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN V. TOMCZUK, Mayor of the Borough of Carteret, by the authority vested in me, do hereby proclaim October 21, through 27, 1979, NATIONAL BUSINESS WOMEN'S WEEK sponsored by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., and urge all citizens in Carteret, all civic and fraternal groups, all educational associations, all news media and other community organizations to join in this salute to working women by encouraging and promoting the celebration of the achievements of all business and professional women as they contribute daily to our economic, civic and cultural purposes.

COUNCILMAN UMANSKY asked if any more names could be added. The MAYOR felt that the list was sufficient, pointing out that it worked out fine the last time. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY asked him to consider Tony Semenza's name, since he was very knowledgeable in this matter. The MAYOR said that he had no objections to him being a consultant. COUNCILMAN SITARZ stated that he was glad that the Mayor appointed the Fire Committee and suggested that John Majur be named to the committee as an oncoming Volunteer Chief. He also stated that he felt very strongly that Tony Semenza should be part of the committee as he has a degree in Fire Science.

REPORTS
OF COMMITTEES

PUBLIC SAFETY: Councilman Sitarz reported that the last of the Police Department will be moving in by October 25th. He also said that two (2) men will be taking an 8 hour course on the 23rd of October to learn the operation of the computer and on the 22nd of October Mobile will instruct the dispatcher on the workings of the console. COUNCILMAN SITARZ said he was disturbed at the reports of vandalism at Sullivan Field. On his ^{Fire}Report, COUNCILMAN SITARZ said that Engine #6 had its motor rebuilt and will be back tomorrow. He stated that there has been conflicting stories that the fire house will be ready anywhere from November to January and would like a report from Mr. O'Neill in reference to the anticipated completion date. MAYOR TOMCZUK reported that he talked to Mr. Suddia in reference to the paneling of the new Fire House and Mr. Suddia

told him that money is available and all that is needed is the consent of the Council.

COUNCILMAN SITARZ made a motion consenting to the paneling in the Fire House, motion seconded by Councilman Umansky. Upon individual roll call vote, the full membership present, voted in the affirmative.

PUBLIC WORKS: Councilman Umansky reported that he discussed his need for sand, salt and rock salt with the Council at the Agenda Meeting and would purchase the sand from Carteret Lumber, the salt from Schaeffer in Elizabeth and rock salt from Trap Rock. The MAYOR asked him if he received three quotes and COUNCILMAN UMANSKY replied that he received quotes for sand and rock salt and was buying from the lowest bidder, but, Schaeffer is the sole supplier, in the area, for salt. He announced that, if the residents would bag their weeds, the Borough would pick them up and asked that the residents remove their boats off the streets now, so there will be no problem with snow removal when the first snow falls. He reported that the work on the bulldozer was finished and with the aid of Vanguard and Koch, it was back at the dump.

COUNCILMAN UMANSKY stated that he checked the file in reference to the sidewalk bill questioned by Mr. Mistretta at the last Council Meeting and found that the amount paid to the contractor was correct; that the quantity should be 276.5 square yards and the error was in mathematics. He read the following letter received from Mr. Kerr, dated October 3, 1979:

"Re: Sidewalk Replacement at Municipal Building"

"The voucher submitted by Triangle Concrete Corporation dated 9/11/79 for the above captioned work was in error in that the quantity of 2,488.5 S.Y. was actually square feet. It should be 276.5 square yards. The total amount of \$5,723.55 is correct."

COUNCILMAN UMANSKY stated that if he had the bill prior to the meeting, he could have pointed this out.

COUNCILMAN UMANSKY complained that the Roosevelt Avenue Sewer Program which Mr. Carr is in charge of, is going from ridiculous to super ridiculous. He said he received a call from Carr last week and he told him that he was dissatisfied with the grading and holes in the road; that the man created a tremendous mess..... he rolled the asphalt without a roller because his equipment was broken. He said that the people are ready to lynch him because he is Streets & Roads Commissioner. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY said that the contractor did come back, but, even today, we are still having accidents; that it was a very bad program and that Carr and the contractor are doing a lousy job.

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PARKS & RECREATION: Councilman Wilson appealed to the parents to see that their children don't vandalize public property. He stated that the damage done to property amounts to thousands of dollars and it is impossible for the Police to have constant surveillance at the park; that it was the parents obligation to see that their children don't do this.

COUNCILMAN WILSON stated that he has received complaints from residents of Jackson Avenue about the high weeds on property that belongs to the Railroad and borders their fences. He stated that this was a hazard and asked the Borough Attorney to write a letter to the Railroad and request that they keep the weeds cut from the residents backyards.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION: Councilman Toth stated that he understands that the Plant Manager from Mobil, who was present at the Police Building Dedication, mentioned that he, (Councilman Toth) was the one who initiated the proceedings for the Police Building, yet, Councilman Umansky called him a liar when he stated that fact at the last Council Meeting. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY stated that he pursued this a little further and found that he did initiate it, but, it was dropped almost in its originality and then picked up by Dr. Fenick, but, the most important thing is that we have a beautiful headquarters. COUNCILMAN TOTTH stated that he never called Councilman Umansky or anyone else a liar and felt he deserved an apology.

MAYOR TOMCZUK stated that it is a fact that it was initiated by Councilman Toth, who was then Mayor, and that we now have a new Police Building and completing a new Fire Building.

All other Standing Committee Chairmen reported PROGRESS in their respective departments.

COUNCILMAN SITARZ noted that there was a derailment on Lafayette Street about 1 a.m.; that the train left the track and there was no light flashing signal. He said that a truck almost ran into the train because of this. He said there was not much the police could do, because you can't ticket them. He asked the Borough Attorney to look into the matter to have the track repaired or a flagman posted.

PUBLIC DISCUSSION

PETER SICA asked what the bid for Data Processing Services was for and the Mayor replied "Payroll". Mr. Sica stated that we spent \$34,000.00 for a computer last year, and part of the selling point was that we would do our own payrolls and asked why we are spending money for data services.

The MAYOR replied that the matter and the bid received will be studied. MR. SICA pointed out that there are four (4) people working there and asked that the Mayor check the Tax Office.

MR. SICA said that he agreed with Councilmen Sitarz and Umansky that Semenza should be part of the Fire Committee named tonight. He also asked the Mayor to check as to what Borough Equipment was doing at Mr. Gombos's house.

MR. SICA said that he read with interest tonight's article about the sanitary landfill. He said that our problem was caused by the mistake of allowing out of town garbage to come into our dumps. He noted that Mr. Carr accompanied the Mayor to Trenton on the dump matter and asked if Mr. Carr would get paid for this. The MAYOR replied "No". MR. SICA warned the Mayor about making Mr. Carr a consultant in this matter, noting that he got the same extension without Mr. Carr when he was Councilman. He also asked what Mr. Sudia was doing at the meeting and the Mayor replied that the Community Development may be our source of money for the landfill.

MR. SICA stated that he does understand that Toth initiated the new Police Facility, but, he was insulted at the dedication which he said was a democratic affair. He asked what right did anyone have to invite Venezia to the head table. The MAYOR said that he was not there. MR. SICA stated that it was announced that he couldn't make it. The MAYOR said that he mentioned no politics at the dedication. MR. SICA replied he didn't mean him, he meant Sudia. He said that the affair was a disgrace; that Sudia uses everything as a political arm and he firmly believes that it is illegal for him to be the Democratic Chairman and he will take it to Court and have him removed.

MR. SICA stated that he did sign the bill for the sidewalks when he was a Councilman, but he wants it remembered that he was the first one that questioned the bill and before anyone quotes his name in the newspaper, they should call him first.

LOUIS MANGIERI: Before Mr. Mangieri started to speak, the MAYOR apologized that he was unable to attend the Italian American affair. MR. MANGIERI said that it was a shame that Councilman Sitar was the only one that showed up. MR. MANGIERI asked that the Borough Attorney also contact Continental Can about the weeds behind his house at the same time that he contacts the railroad about the weeds at Jackson Avenue.

STEPHEN KRISSAK asked why a senior citizen was not appointed to the Housing Authority. The MAYOR replied that Mr. Skiba is a senior citizen. MR. KRISSAK said that Mr. Skiba never did anything for the senior citizens and was not a member.

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RAYMOND MISTRETTA said that he was glad that Councilman Umansky informed him that the sidewalk bill was improperly prepared, but, he still did not address the main question, which was the high charge by the engineer. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY said that he would discuss the matter with him after the meeting; that he thinks Mr. Mistretta is being strictly political; that he has given him legitimate answers and would be glad to discuss the matter further after the meeting. MR. MISTRETTA asked why the Borough Engineer was hired for the sidewalk job when no other contractor has to hire an engineer. The BOROUGH ATTORNEY replied that this matter is covered by statute; that a municipality has to abide by certain laws that an individual does not. That specifications are necessary and standard fees for an engineer are set. MR. MISTRETTA stated that he pointed out to the Council that when the bill appears to be inflated, the contract does not have to be awarded. BOROUGH ATTORNEY SELESKY replied that the Borough has to conform to state regulations which does not necessarily have to be the cheapest way....that the state is more concerned about corruption and has laid out certain rules. MR. MISTRETTA asked if the bill appears to be inflated....can't it be rejected by Council. MR. SELESKY replied that this happened a year ago and he was not here, but, usually, the engineer will give Council the anticipated price range of the job; reviews the bids, then makes his recommendation to the Council and Council has to rely on the expertise of the Engineer. MR. MISTRETTA stated that the Council elected should know what is going on because they are spending taxpayers money. He pointed out that his first bill was knocked down. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY told him that he read him the letter from the engineer, that the bills were in order; pointed out that the engineer recommended Triangle for the job as low bidder and because he was satisfied with his prior job, and if Mr. Mistretta has the knowledge that he claims he has, he would know that everything was in order, but, he wants to make a political spectacle of a bill that is in order. MR. MISTRETTA said that at the last meeting he stated that he had five (5) years experience of serving as a witness in these matters and told the Council, at that time, that the bill was too high and so was the engineer's bill; COUNCILMAN UMANSKY said he would research it, yet, he didn't check the price and square yards. COUNCILMAN UMANSKY pointed out that when the Borough buys tires, Council depends on Zullo's recommendation and this is the same case with the engineer.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business from the Council or public present, the meeting was adjourned upon WMS&C, by Councilmen Sitarz and Umansky.

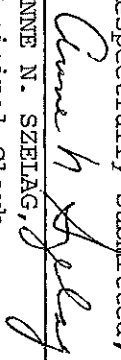

This letter will confirm the meeting of the Division of Environmental Quality, the Borough of Carteret, and representatives from the Middlesex County (Arace Brothers) Landfill which was held in Trenton on October 15, 1979.

On December 20, 1978, the Borough of Carteret was issued a Departmental Order requiring submission of a revised engineering design or, in the alternative, terminate landfill operations by May 7, 1979. During this time period, the Solid Waste Administration was approached by the Borough of Carteret and the Middlesex Landfill Corporation site to accommodate both parties. Until a decision is made on this proposal, the Division of Environmental Quality is granting you an extension for your continued operation until November 30, 1979 providing that the following course of action is pursued by the Borough:

1. A consultant is immediately retained by the Borough to evaluate a course of action that the Borough shall pursue.
2. The consultant is to develop cost of services for a transfer station or continuation of the present sanitary landfill to be submitted for a November meeting of the Borough Council.
3. The Borough Council is to authorize the course of action that the consultant is to pursue at that November meeting.
4. The consultant is to complete and present his final recommendations for the February meeting of the Borough Council.

J. as to the feasibility of Arace Bros. constructing a transfer station on the landfill site in Carteret. Based on the figures submitted of the quantity of refuse collected and deposited in the landfill by the Borough of Carteret and Arace Bros., a transfer station of the size to handle 175 tons minimum to a 250 ton maximum per day is what is projected.

The cost of constructing an operation of this type of facility will be approximately \$536,000.00. The cost of operating this type of facility would be \$1.25 per cubic yard plus the present rate of landfill costs at 75¢ per cubic yard so that the total cost at today's prices would be \$2.00 per cubic yard.

I would like to reemphasize that these are today's prices, and the cost of the landfill is a most important economic factor to be considered. The costs of landfill is changing everyday. WHEREAS, Federal Revenue Sharing in the past has been one of the most important programs because it assists communities to lower taxes and can be used for salaries for Police, Public Works and other municipal services; and

WHEREAS, Revenue Sharing is one of the few Federal Programs that allows Home Rule decision to local Governing Bodies on the use of these funds; the local officials being the closest to their needs for such funds; and

WHEREAS, Federal Revenue Sharing in New Jersey has become so vitally important, a discontinuation of the funds by September 30, 1980, in addition to the 5% Cap Law limitations, will create desperate financial inabilities for communities, compounded by inflationary rises in costs of insurance, utilities, municipal pensions, road material, fuel etc.; and

WHEREAS, Federal Revenue Sharing will not be acted upon until August of 1980 and there are strong indications that Revenue Sharing will be phased out for the year 1981 because it is the least popular Federal Program. This paradox is reflected in the attacks on Revenue Sharing during the Congress consideration of the first concurrent budget resolution, in spite of the extensive support given the program by the Country's Mayors, Governors, State Legislators and County Officials; and

WHEREAS, a discontinuation of these Federal Funds will result in a total loss of \$301,800.00 to the Borough of Carteret which will result in not only a burden to the taxpayer but also a loss of funding for local salaries and wages for municipal employees and services etc.; and

WHEREAS, we are greatly concerned over the reluctance and opposition by many members of Congress to continue the program; the main reason for such opposition being their lack of control over the actual spending of the funds. This kind of thinking is an example of the hypocritical thinking of many Federal Officials. They tend to agree that Home Rule is the best approach but are not willing to give the local officials the benefit of the local control which is always the best approach; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to every Mayor in Middlesex County, in the State of New Jersey, to collectively move in strength to press for a continuation of Federal Revenue Sharing because of the hardships we face without it, by flooding our demands upon President Carter and Members of Congress for a continuation of the program and amendments be acted upon.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to President Jimmy Carter, Governor Brendan T. Byrne and all Members of Congress and New Jersey Legislators representing the Borough of Carteret, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey.
