Missed Calls

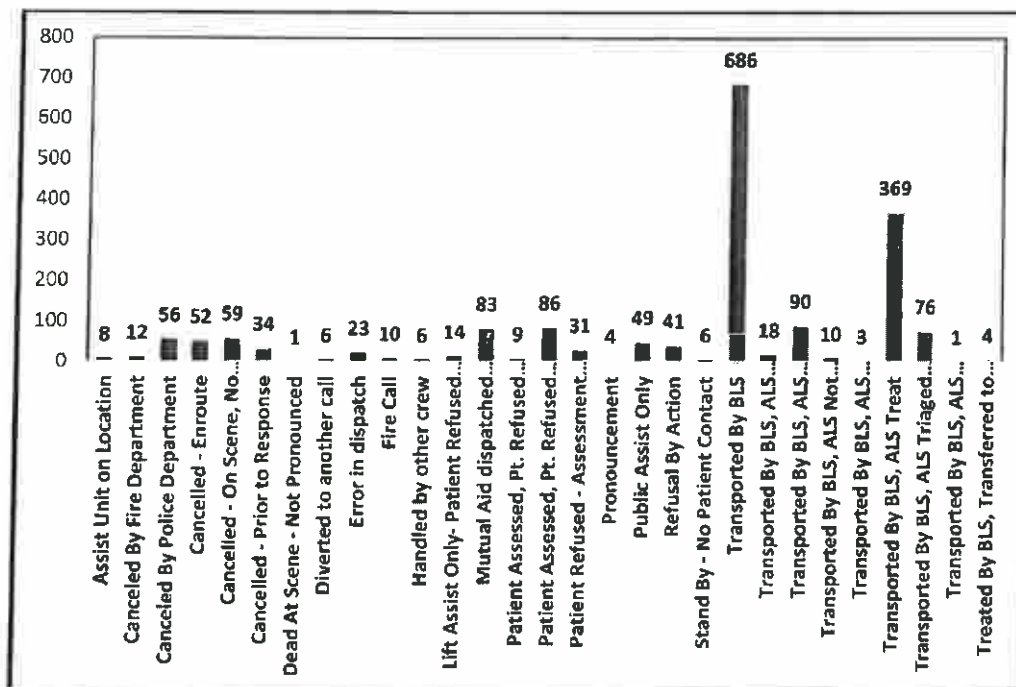


Mutual Aid - Provided and Received

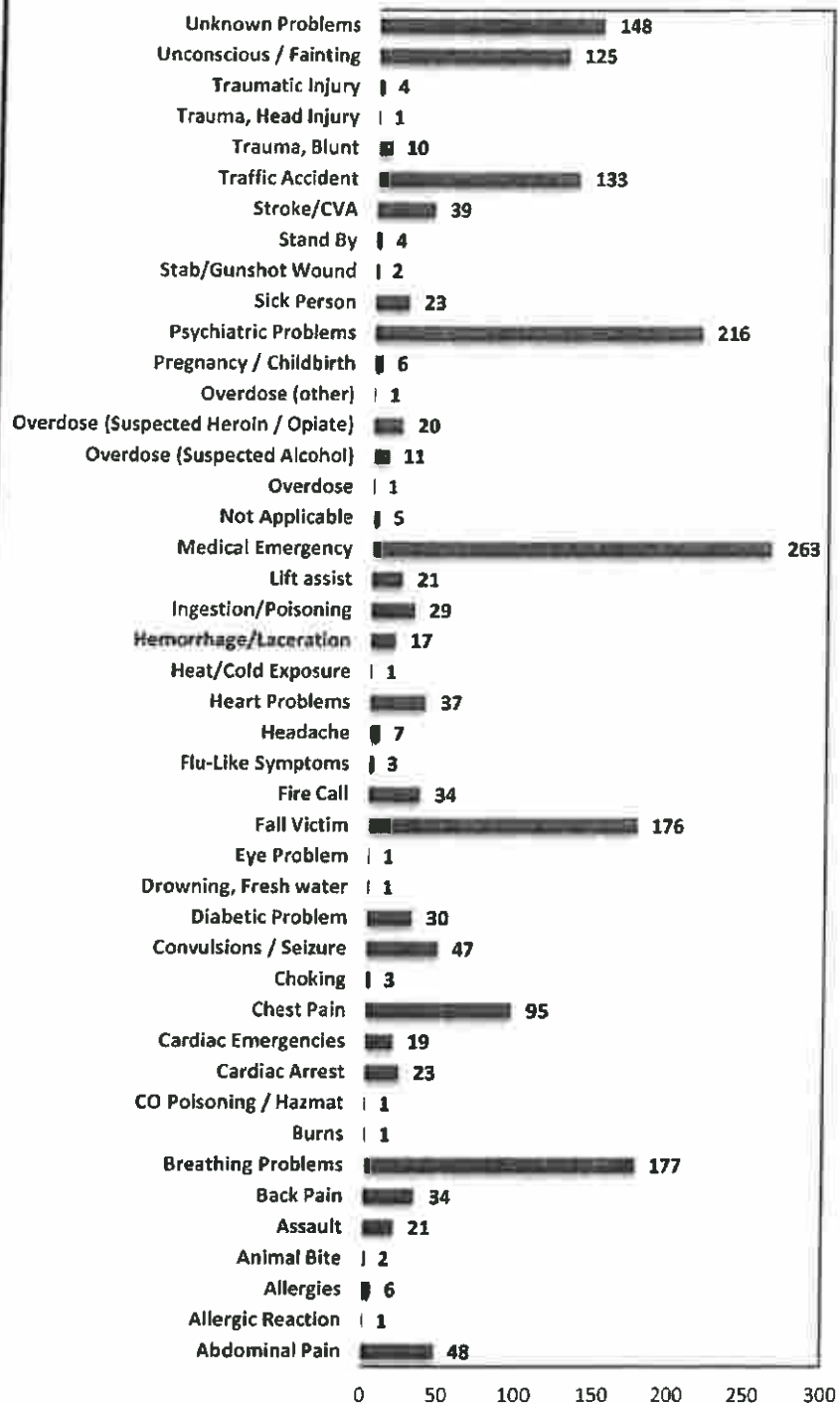

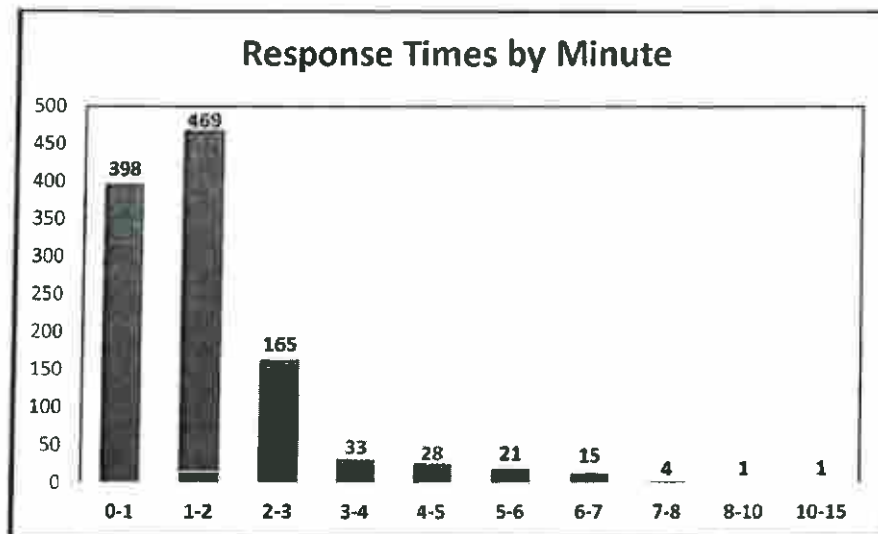

Squad Accomplishments

Lumberton Emergency Squad (LES) has had another busy year in continuing remarkable progress and ensuring the residents receive prompt and exceptional clinical care. Our call volume has increased 81 calls from last year.

Thankfully, we have concluded the year with an increase in active volunteers, totaling 36. We still continue to have excellent relationships with mutual aid departments.

LES continues to have success and improvement. With our extremely dedicated volunteers, we have been able to create a combined crew of both career and volunteer personnel during the day and night. We have built strong relationships between our career and volunteer members. This provides us with the opportunity, which we have done on multiple occasions, to staff second and third rigs. LES has been the regional cover when there is a major incident in surrounding towns.

Last year, Lumberton volunteers were on duty 8,366.75 hours. This year due to the increase in membership, Lumberton volunteers were on duty 11,547 hours. Our response time has gone from an average 2.24 minutes in 2017 to 2.10 minutes in 2018 due to in house duty crews 24/7. LES has a dedicated group of volunteers that are willing to give up their free time and stay in the station ready to respond and ensure the safety of the residents and visitors of Lumberton.

We are still working on building our marine program in conjunction with the Lumberton Fire Department.

LES still continues a stringent field training program. The purpose of this program is to ensure all EMT's are trained at the same level and have the necessary skills needed to be proficient. This program also aids in making sure that all EMT's are aware of policy and procedure of daily operations. EMT's in 2018 on average stay for 1 to 2 years until they move on to be DR's, PA's, Medics, Nurses and other noble professions. Because of those facts we recognize we will be a revolving door, due to work and school schedules. We have been lucky enough to have a core group continue to be dedicated to LES.

We continue to be a part of the county active shooter team. We have trained frequently, following the Burlington County Prosecutors guidelines. We continue to train with the Lumberton Police Department to prepare our members, practice working as a team and treating patients in a timely manner, in the event we have this type of incident. The fire company has attended drills learning their role at the collection point to help safely carry patients to the triage area. LES equipment needed for the team was purchased by the county.
