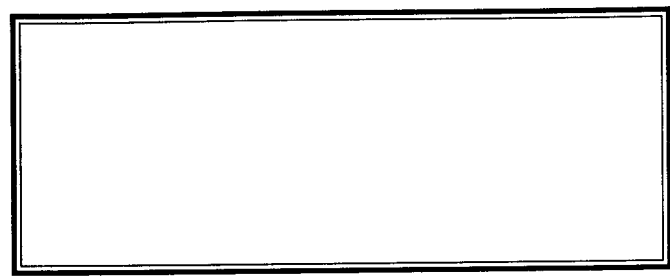

Proceeds from the bonds will be used to provide grants to New Jersey's public and private colleges and universities to construct and equip higher education buildings to increase academic capacity. Bond proceeds will be allocated as follows: \$300 million for public research universities; \$247.5 million for State colleges and other State universities; \$150 million for county colleges; and \$52.5 million for private institutions with an endowment of \$1 billion or less. Public and private colleges and universities which receive grants will be required to provide funds to support 25% of a project.

Press the button ☐ to the right of the candidate of your choice; a green "X" will appear next to your selection.

To change a selection, press the button ☐ again. The green "X" will disappear and you may make a new selection.

3

If you wish to cast a WRITE-IN vote (you may not write-in any name that is printed on the ballot for the same office), go to the WRITE-IN column and press the button ☐ next to WRITE-IN across from the office you wish to write-in. A blinking green "X" will appear. Using the alphabetical keyboard below, enter the name of the person of your choice, one letter at a time. To make a space between first and middle name or initial and last name use the arrow pointing to the right on the keyboard. To make a correction, use the arrow pointing to the left. The name you ENTER will appear in the display to the left of the keyboard. When you have entered the whole name, proof it, then press the enter button on the keyboard. Your choice is recorded and removed from the display. Do not press the cast vote button until all other choices are complete. (Each write-in is a separate entry.)
WARNING! An improperly cast write-in vote will be void. Be sure that your write-in vote is cast in the WRITE-IN column on the same line as the office for which you are casting the write-in vote.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING CONTRIBUTIONS TO BE TAKEN FROM JUSTICES' AND JUDGES' SALARIES FOR THEIR EMPLOYEE BENEFITS	
Do you approve an amendment to the New Jersey Constitution, as agreed to by the Legislature, to allow contributions set by law to be taken from the salaries of Supreme Court Justices and Superior Court Judges for their employee benefits?	
INTERPRETIVE STATEMENT	
This amendment clarifies the Legislature's authority to pass laws requiring contributions be taken from the salaries of Supreme Court Justices and Superior Court Judges for their employee benefits. These benefits include their pension and health care coverage. The amendment responds to a question raised in a 2011 lawsuit filed by a judge after the Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law PL.2011, c.78. That law increased the contributions taken from current and future justices' and judges' salaries for their benefits, starting in October 2011. The lawsuit, which was appealed to the New Jersey Supreme Court, argued against taking the higher contributions from currently appointed justices and judges, citing language in the Constitution that their salaries cannot be re-duced during their appointed terms. The amendment clarifies that such contributions, set by law, may be taken from justices' and judges' salaries during their terms. It would also allow for the higher contributions set by PL.2011, c.78 to be deducted from current and future justices' and judges' salaries.

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LOCAL QUESTION NO. 1	
PROPOSITION	
The Township of Rockaway, County of Morris is undertaking a public safety project at Peterson Field on Fleetwood Drive in Rockaway, which includes the construction of a 214-space parking lot. As part of the public safety project, should the Township of Rockaway construct two new recreation fields as an expansion of Peterson Field at a cost of approximately \$2,087,100.00, which is an annual cost impact of approximately \$4.50 per \$100,000.00 assessment?	
EXPLANATORY STATEMENT	
The Township of Rockaway is constructing a parking lot at Peterson Field on Fleetwood Drive as a public safety project. The parking lot is anticipated to create approximately 214 off-street parking spaces. If ap-proved, the public safety project would be expanded to include the construction of two new recreation fields as an expansion of Peterson Field. One field would be a lighted, turf field surrounded by a walking path. The other field would be a non-lighted, grass field. The fields would accommodate softball, baseball, soccer, lacrosse, football, and Township sponsored public recreation. The construction of the two new recreation fields will cost approximately \$2,087,100.00, which is in addition to the cost of the construction of the public safety project.
