Bittenbinder Two discussion items on a Teaching Personnel sheet were reviewed. There had been a discussion of starting Mr. Bittenbinder's Assignment at Memorial High School on August 1, 1981. However, after reviewing the need for same, a consensus vote resulted as follows with a decision to begin his employment effective September 1, 1981. (Consensus for August 1st; Mr. Williams - September; Mr. Donofrio - September; Mr. Bell - September; Mr. Bertrand - August; and Mr. Hancock - August. This did not pass.

Huss After reviewing information submitted with regard to Mr. George Huss and the completion of the 1980-81 School Audit, all agreed that Mr. Huss be called and advised that he is to come in and complete said Audit, as part of his 1980-81 contract.

An item on the agenda to discuss rights of board members to various and sundry board documents and records was discussed at length. Mr. Williams spoke of a board member's access to information in possession of the administration. He also said

board members have the right to know what the board president is getting from the board attorney in the way of correspondence and other informational material.

7/23/81

After review of this matter and questions posed to our attorney, regarding filling Mr. Williams' requests for information, and his belief that he is entitled to information concerning his responsibilities as a board member, Mr. Anton agreed that he is entitled to same providing it is not of a frivolous nature, and that it will be helpful to the case.

Mr. Bertrand made a motion that the entire Memorial High School matter be turned over to our attorney and left completely in the hands of said attorney and experts as selected by the Board of Education and others as appropriate. Mr. Hancock seconded this and a consensus vote was taken as follows: Mr. Bell-no; Mr. Bertrand-yes; Mr. Donofrio-no; Mr. Williams-no; and Mr. Hancock-yes. Mr. Bertrand's suggestion did not carry.

At 9:05 p.m. this meeting was opened for public discussion. Mr. Crescenzo was present and questioned a school administrator's salary.

At 9:07 p.m. Mrs. Damadio read a resolution to go into executive session for the reason of discussing a matter under Buildings and Grounds and litigation relating to same. Mr. Bell made a motion to approve said resolution, Mr. Donofrio seconded same, and it carried unanimously.

At 9:20 p.m. Mr. Wolk of Birdsall Corporation and Mr. James Birdsall were present. Both Mr. Wolk and Mr. Birdsall joined in a discussion of areas they believe need testing. Mr. Wolk is an engineer with Birdsall Corp. and noted that his particular area is in structural engineering. He reviewed what he had viewed to date with regard to possible discrepancies in the construction of Memorial High School. He said he would pull together a list of recommended basic tests, but also advised that he could run into other items we cannot see at this time, like underground lines. Dr. Aragona asked that Mr. Wolk advise by letter of what he is recommending to do and probable costs, along with whatever informational material he may require from us.

It was suggested that he take pictures from an airplane in order that if this testing becomes part of our suit said pictures would be valuable in explaining to a court where certain areas of the Memorial High School are located. It was agreed that test borings done on Memorial High School land by Karch (raw boring logs) might be advantageous for Mr. Wolk to have; also that he be able to review reports submitted by DiStasio and Van Buren.

The bill submitted by the company who performed the infra-red testing on Memorial High School was referred to as it is still unpaid. If Mr. Wolk reviews said report and agrees with its findings (that tests were taken at proper times) he is to advise us in order that payment can be processed as soon as possible.

Mr. Williams and Mr. Bertrand are to meet with Mr. Barry Wolk in this regard and call Mr. Wolf as to whether said bill is to be paid.

Discussion continued with Mr. Wolk as to suggested testings and the board members concurred with some, and agreed that they did not think others necessary at this time for the reason that some of this testing has already been completed. The discussion continued with possible costs for certain testings, and explanation of how many areas in a given category would have to be explored to come up with a reasonable answer of any deficiency.

Mr. Wolk is to set up a meeting with Mr. Anton and see what testing should be done, and then proceed with testing as outlined this evening. All were in agreement that Mr. Wolk meet with Mr. Anton and Mr. DiStasio and ascertain what has been done in these testing areas.

At 11:35 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session Meeting on Tuesday, August 4, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building for the purpose of discussing presentation by Mrs. Judith Fox, Chairperson of the Buildings Additions Committee.

Work

Present were: Mr. Bell, Mr. Bertrand, Mr. Bittmann (7:40 p.m.)
Mr. Donofrio, Mrs. Fox, and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Mr. Stutts, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Mayer and Mr. Murphy.

Mrs. Damadio read the Open Public Meetings Law and noted it was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on July 31, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Bell opened this meeting and turned same over to Mrs. Fox, Chairperson of the Additions Committee. Mrs. Fox presented a plan worked on by the Additions Committee to attempt to eliminate split sessions and other undesirable school building problems. She also mentioned that an architect would have to be employed to draw up schematics for implementation of any addition program. The Committee addressed itself to our problem in the middle division where shortage of space exists.

Mr. Mayer presented a report of educational specifications for Middle and Elementary school building additions. The report listed all areas of proposed addition to Lake Riviera Middle School, Veterans Memorial Middle School, Drum Point Elementary School, Lanes Mill Elementary School, Midstreams Elementary School, Emma Havens Young School, and Veterans Memorial Elementary School.

Mr. Mayer continued in his presentation and talked of requirements to be met in accordance with the New Jersey State Department of Education. The district educational plan has four parts: 1. status report on how each school in the district is meeting the T & E requirements. 2. Plan for the district and each school in the district for its improvement goals for this year. 3. Addresses what the State Department calls minor needs. 4. Addresses most serious needs as to substandard classrooms and Special Education classrooms. The question is how we are to resolve our facility shortages.

Mr. Daniel Newman, a member of the Additions Committee, spoke at great length as to the needs of the district and the formalities that must be followed to comply with the directives of our County Superintendent of Schools. He explained the many avenues explored by the Additions Committee and stated the need for this Board of Education to adopt a philosophy of a building program and to hire an architect, for said program.

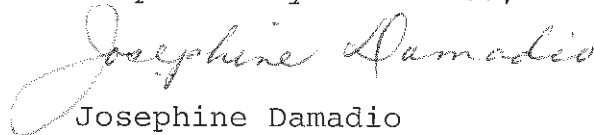
All board members in turn asked questions about the proposed additions to school buildings. All were answered to the satisfaction of all.

A consensus vote was taken as to placing these items on the agenda on Thursday, August 6, 1981 and all present were in agreement.

Employment of an architect to prepare schematics was discussed and it was agreed that the two architects presently being used would be considered. They are to be contacted and asked to be present at a 7:00 p.m. Work Session on Thursday, to discuss fees. (Please note that this Work Session was not scheduled after consultation with our attorney because there was not sufficient time to properly notify the media with 48-hour notice in compliance with the Sunshine Law.)

At 9:30 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried to adjourn this meeting.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Special Public Meeting on Thursday, August 6, 1981 at 8:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of appointing an architect and approving the submittal of Educational Plan to the State Department of Education.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Bertrand, Mr. Bittmann (8:15 p.m.), Mrs. Fox, Mr. Williams (8:02 p.m.) and Mr. Donofrio.

Also present: Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Mayer, Mr. Anton, Mr. Sendzik, Mr. Gatarz and Mr. Cramer.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on August 4, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

At 8:03 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing the employment of an architect. Mr. Donofrio made a motion to approve this resolution, Mrs. Fox seconded it and it carried unanimously.

At the closed session, both architects were present to discuss their submitted proposals. Many questions were asked of each one (separately) as to their fees whether the complete recommendation of the Additions Committee were to be figured, or only stated phases, doing those additions considered priority first. Mr. Wolf asked the board members, after the architects left the room, for clarification as to whether it is the board's intent to hire an architect and tell him to do part of the schematic work and take that work down to Trenton, or do all the schematic work and then ask Trenton what we can do.

Mrs. Fox stated we must approve an educational plan. It is our responsibility to the monitoring report. When we go to Trenton, it is a different story. She said it is recommended that said architect go to Trenton with schematics of just the two middle schools.

After further review of the two proposals submitted by the two architects, it was unanimously agreed by consensus vote to take the firm of Cramer and Collins who submitted the lowest proposal.

At 9:20 p.m. the public meeting was resumed and Mr. Stutts again read the Sunshine Law. Mr. Bell made a motion, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried to reopen this public meeting.

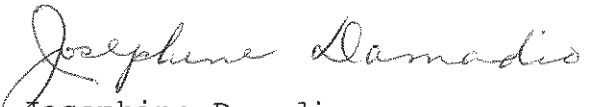
- EP-1 T & E School/District Program Improvement Status Review

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time and place thereof posted as follows on August 28, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Hancock began the discussion of the pre-agenda items presented for review.

It was noted under Building and Grounds that the voucher for the infra-red testing had been paid, as per previous direction of the board and agreement by Birdsall Corporation that said was to be paid.

Mr. Hancock brought the matter of non-payment of bills from suppliers for the Memorial High School project up to be discussed. It was agreed that many of these bills should be paid and that Mr. Bertrand and Mr. Stutts should meet and submit a list for approval on September 9th of those vouchers which should be honored immediately.

An item with regard to recommended transfer of funds was discussed. Among the items to be paid for with these funds were band instruments (Memorial High School), 16 simulators (8 for Memorial High School), labor for moving and installing said consoles, new flags for Memorial, software for simulators, and additional band uniforms for Memorial. It was agreed that these monies not be transferred at this time, that the items be taken care of out of existing budget accounts, and the deficits taken care of at a later date.

Mr. Hancock requested that an item under Policy be held until it was further reviewed. All board members agreed to holding said item.

A request from Mr. Henry, Ocean County Vocational School, to house Vocational School students at our Brick Township High School on a temporary basis was discussed. The Superintendent was directed to advise them that it was be all right, and of a maintenance fee that would be charged for Custodial services.

Mr. Hancock announced that the Board will meet in private session with the B.T.A.S.A. on Thursday, September 17, 1981 at 8:00 p.m. in the Administration Building as per request from BTASA for said meeting.

At 8:20 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into executive session for the reason of discussing personnel items and a pupil personnel item. Motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mrs. Fox and carried to approve said resolution.

The items under Teaching Personnel were presented and discussed. Questions were asked on those board members needed clarification of. Mr. Bertrand asked for details on the Adult School per hour rate, and Mr. Hancock requested that Mr. Gawlik be asked to prepare a comprehensive report which should show the costs for each course.

It was noted that additional teaching personnel must be employed to open school and it was agreed that these names may be added to the Action Agenda on September 9th.

A recommendation was made that a recently demoted Administrator be paid at the salary he was receiving at the close of the last school year. He would remain at this salary level until the guide on which he presently should be reaches the salary that he was getting, or he goes back to his previous Administrative level. All were in agreement that a motion to this effect be included on the September 9, 1981 agenda; however, a signed letter from the B.T.A.S.A. would be requested stating that this is a one-time action, a special situation.

A Grievance which had been filed was briefly referred to and it was agreed that this is not an Affirmative Action matter, and that the matter should be referred to the negotiating committee of the B.T.E.A.

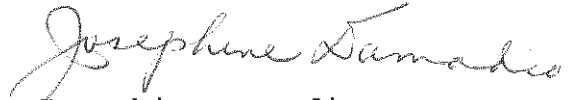

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session Meeting at 7:00 p.m. before the Regular Meeting at 7:55 p.m. on Wednesday, September 9, 1981 in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue.

Present were: Mr. Bell (7:09 p.m.), Mr. Bertrand, Mr. Bittmann, Mrs. Fox, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Hancock.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf (8:15 p.m.), Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton, Mr. Sendzik, Mr. Mayer 8:00 p.m., and Mr. Mr. Murphy 8:00 p.m.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law Sunshine Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on September 3, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Mr. Stutts then read a resolution to go into private session as follows: WHEREAS, C. 231, P.L. 1975, also known as the Sunshine Law, authorizes a public body to meet in executive or private session under certain limited circumstances; and

WHEREAS, said law requires the Board to adopt a resolution at a public meeting before it can meet in such an executive or private session:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED By the Brick Township Board of Education 1. that it does hereby determine that it is necessary to meet in executive session this date to discuss matter involving Brick Township Memorial High School and litigation pending, and 2. that the matter discussed will be made public if and when confidentiality is no longer required and action pursuant to said discussion shall take place only at a public meeting.

Mrs. Fox made a motion to approve said resolution, it was seconded by Mr. Bittmann and agreed to by all.

Mr. Hancock opened this meeting stating that it was hoped that we could determine just where we are going as far as Memorial High School (constructionwise) is concerned. A resolution prepared by our Board Attorney was distributed for review by board members. Although the resolution was not discussed verbally, it dealt with services of the Building and Grounds Committee, and delegation of Memorial High School matters to the Board Attorney.
