PROPOSED HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION POLICY

The Board of Education acknowledges its responsibility to adopt policies and procedures for high school graduation as mandated by law. In keeping with this obligation, the Board sets forth the following as its policy and procedures for high school graduation with a State endorsed diploma commencing with the fall 1981 entering ninth grade class. These requirements shall also apply to special education students unless they are exempted in their individualized educational programs.

The basic graduation requirements program addresses the following areas:

A. BASIC SKILLS

In order to graduate, the student must successfully pass State minimum basic skills examinations in reading, writing, and computational skills.

B. CURRICULUM

To qualify for a State endorsed diploma, the student shall complete a program of study which includes the following:

1. One credit year of communication for each year of enrollment, up to four credit years, including English I and II and a combination of any other courses listed under the High School English program of study that equals two credit years;
2. Two credit years of computation;
3. Three credit years of social studies, including one credit year of World History and two credit years of United States History (NJSA 18A:35-1 et. seq.);
4. One credit year of natural or physical science;
5. One credit year of physical education,

health, and safety for each year of enrollment (NJSA 18A:35-7);

6. One credit year of fine, practical, and/or performing arts;
7. One-half credit year or equivalent in career exploration or development.

To receive credit for any course, a student must demonstrate mastery of required proficiencies.

C. ATTENDANCE

The Board of Education has an obligation to require that the students of this district be present in school in order that they may be taught. The process of education requires regular continuity of instruction, classroom participation, learning experiences, and study. The regular contact of students with one another in the classroom and their participation in a well-planned instructional activity under the tutelage of a competent teacher are vital to this purpose. The Board, therefore, cannot condone, excuse, or encourage any absence by students except for just cause. To receive diploma credits for courses taken, the student must fulfill attendance requirements described in the district student attendance policy.

D. CREDIT HOURS

A minimum of 115 credit hours is required for graduation.

Copies of requirements for graduation shall be provided each year to entering ninth grade students so that they and their parents become aware of the requirements for obtaining a State endorsed diploma. Proficiency requirements for successful completion of any course required for graduation will be distributed to students at the beginning of each course.

Provisions for assessment, evaluation, and remediation will be provided as required by law.

PROPOSED HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REGULATIONS

A. BASIC SKILLS

1. Prior to graduation from high school, all students, except special education students exempted in their I.E.P., must demonstrate a minimum level of competency in reading, writing, and computation.
2. The Board shall administer State examinations in these skills in the ninth grade.
3. Passing these examinations is a prerequisite to graduation with a State endorsed diploma. Students who fail one or more of the tests in the ninth grade shall have the succeeding high school years to demonstrate attainment of minimum competency in these skills.
4. All students shall be assessed upon entrance into the school system and annually, thereafter, to identify students not meeting State minimum proficiency levels. Students not meeting these standards shall be provided a comprehensive individual assessment. Remediation shall be provided in those skill areas where minimum proficiency is not achieved until all identified deficiencies have been remediated. Assessment shall include but not be limited to teacher observation, parental or guardian interview, formal and informal evaluation techniques, cumulative student records, student performance data collected through local testing programs which meet criteria, State testing results, and visual, auditory and/or medical examination.
5. Those students progressing inadequately at the sixth grade assessment shall be enrolled in an Individual Student Improvement Plan (ISIP).
6. The ISIP is a written instructional plan and contains the following components:
 - a. An analysis of the student's basic skills performance.
 - b. A statement identifying exit criteria which the student must obtain to demonstrate proficiency.

- c. A listing of the specific skill deficiencies upon which remedial and support staff will be focused.
 - d. A description of the instructional program to be provided. The description shall include the type of instruction; the recommended instructional techniques, materials, and resources needed for remediation; the frequency, duration, and location of instruction; and the name(s) of the individual(s) who will implement the ISIP.
 - e. A description of evaluation procedures which will be used to measure the student's progress toward meeting exit criteria. These procedures are to include methods, schedule, and responsibilities for evaluation. Evaluation results must be recorded.
 - f. Identification of staff member(s) who has been designated as responsible for the development, implementation, and evaluation of the ISIP.
7. The ISIP shall continue throughout the secondary grades until all identified deficiencies are remediated and exit criteria met. The ISIP shall be evaluated at least once each year.
 8. A copy of the ISIP shall be provided the parent/guardian of each child enrolled in the program.
 9. In instances of student transfers, assessment records shall be forwarded to the new school or district in which the student is enrolled.
 10. A Twelfth Grade Special Review Assessment shall be provided for those twelfth grade students who have met other graduation requirements (attendance, curriculum, credits, etc.) but reportedly fail the State examinations because they do not do well on formal written tests.

The review panel shall comprise at least three teaching staff members who are not currently instructing the student. Reviews should be conducted by January.

The panel shall make a recommendation as to whether the student has demonstrated knowledge of basic skills after reviewing the following and other pertinent evidence:

- a. Performance on State tests (including all re-tests);
- b. Performance on locally selected examinations;
- c. Performance in course work;
- d. Formal interview with the student;
- e. Formal interview with the parents;
- f. Formal interview with the teaching staff;
- g. Examination of the student's transcripts noting the student's strengths in other related areas;
- h. Guidance counselor/psychologist review as appropriate;
- i. Visual, auditory, and/or medical data as appropriate;
- j. Examination of credit and curriculum performance; and
- k. Examination of student proficiencies in other areas.

The recommendation of the review panel must be endorsed by the building principal, the district superintendent, and the county superintendent before the Board may award a State endorsed diploma.

- 11. Any out-of-school youth, age 18 or over, who has otherwise met all State and local graduation requirements but has failed to pass the State basic skills test(s), may return to take the necessary test(s). Upon certification of passing the test(s), a State endorsed diploma will be granted by the high school of record.

B. CURRICULUM

1. To qualify for a State endorsed diploma the student must successfully complete a program of studies that shall include but not be limited to the following:
 - a. One credit year of communication for each year of enrollment, up to four credit years;
 - b. Two credit years of computation;
 - c. Three credit years of social studies, including one credit year of World History and two credit years of United States history;
 - d. One credit year of natural or physical science;
 - e. One credit year of physical education, health, and safety for each year of enrollment;
 - f. One credit year of fine, practical, and/or performing arts; and
 - g. One-half credit year or equivalent of career exploration or development.
2. Students must demonstrate mastery of course proficiencies in order to obtain diploma credits. Copies of course proficiency requirements shall be provided students at the beginning of each course.

C. ATTENDANCE

The superintendent will promulgate regulations to ensure that Board student attendance policy is carried out.

D. CREDIT HOURS

1. A minimum of 115 credits is required in grades 9-12 for graduation.
2. Credits required for high school promotion are as follows:

To be a sophomore	-	30 credits
To be a junior	-	60 credits
To be a senior	-	90 credits

A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Bell-yes; Mr. Bertrand-abstain; Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mr. Donofrio-yes; Mrs. Fox-yes; Mr. Williams-yes; and Mr. Hancock-no. The motion was defeated being motions of this type require unanimous approval of the entire board.

At 9:20 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mrs. Fox and carried unanimously that the meeting be opened for public session.

Mrs. Schue discussed the Music Room at Lake Riviera Middle School, its sound levels and its need for sound proofing; also need for proper ventilation. Mr. Stutts was directed to look into the matter and get quotations for alleviating some of the problems.

Mrs. Benton asked what the status of the Additions Program is at this time. A discussion followed as to steps taken by the architect and direction was given that a meeting be set with Mr. Cramer to discuss and go over whatever plans he had prepared. This meeting was set for 8:00 p.m. on October 19, 1981 and school Principals and members of the Additions Committee were to be invited (this meeting was later cancelled due to previously scheduled events that board members were to attend).

Mrs. Frake questioned what type of testing was referred to in the resolution regarding Mr. Anton and authority given to him to do whatever testing he deemed necessary.

Vandalism at Midstreams School was discussed at length. Many thoughts were expressed as to how to attempt to combat the devastation brought on that school.

Mrs. Benton proposed that audience copies be prepared for pre-agenda meetings in order that they could follow; however, after discussion, this was not agreed to.

The Brick Township Board of Education held their Pre-Agenda Meeting on Monday, November 9, 1981 at 7:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson for the purpose of reviewing items presented for discussion for the Action Agenda for November 10, 1981.

Pre-
Agenda

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Bittmann (7:10 p.m.) Mrs. Fox, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Bertrand.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton, Mr. Sendzik, Mr. Mayer, and Mr. Cramer.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on November 4, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Cramer, Architect, was present at 7:00 p.m. to discuss schematic plans he had prepared with regard to the proposed additions to schools. Mrs. Fox thanked the members of her Additions Committee for their time and efforts in this regard. She stated she felt that the Middle schools should be priority at this time.

Mr. Cramer showed his proposed plans to board members and answered numerous questions. During this period it was agreed that a motion would be prepared to approve freezing surplus in order to allocate same to the Additions Program. Mr. Cramer noted that the plans are in a preliminary stage. They will be modified after getting input from school Principals, Mr. Zack, etc.

The items on the agenda were presented for discussion. The item referring to updating our Master Plan was agreed to pending getting other prices before tomorrow night.

Some items on Teaching Personnel area were referred to and it was agreed that the employment of a teacher for the Gifted and Talented Program would be approved. It was also agreed to add staff to the area of Speech. The item to discuss attendance of Principals at conventions was referred to by Dr. Aragona who asked for board direction. Mr. Hancock stated that he will prepare an outline of policy in this regard and at a meeting in the near future this matter will be discussed.

Mr. Mayer was present to discuss Policy for High School Graduation Requirement, and Family Life Education Program Policy. The second policy will be included as part of our district's health program.

The ice hockey decision was discussed and it was agreed an appeal will be prepared by Mr. Anton to be forwarded to the Commissioner of Education.

A suggestion to rotate board meetings to the various schools in the district was discussed, and it was agreed that it was tried before and just not feasible.

Vandalism in the schools is a great concern, it was agreed, during a discussion of another item, and all concurred that we should develop a policy to make parents financially responsible.

The appointment of a Board-Administrative Liaison Committee was agreed to and discussed as to its intent and function.

Spectator buses for away athletic contests at a cost of \$1.50 per student were agreed to, with full bus and one chaperone.

A trip request from Mr. Brouillette was discussed and approved.

Mr. Hancock spoke of changes in Budget procedures to go into effect. He proposed appointing a Budget Review Committee. Direction was given to include an item on the Action Agenda to cover this at which time names will be added.

At 9:35 p.m. Mr. Stutts read the resolution to go into executive session for the purpose of discussing matters of anticipated litigation, and personnel matters.

The subject of deficiencies at Memorial High School were referred to by presentation of a memo from Mr. Donofrio, and by documentation of items by Mr. Williams. It was agreed that Mr. Anton is handling all matters pertaining to Memorial High School and is consulting with a Mr. Richard Barker of W.H.I. It was also directed that Mr. Brouillette be instructed to send copies of his memos directly to Mr. Barker in order to expedite matters.

Reference was made to a letter from Mr. Bertrand regard bills from Vaughn Partnership.

Items under Personnel not previously covered were reviewed at this time. One referring to reimbursing a parent for a tutoring session was discussed at length. Another item with regard to the Appointing Authority for Civil Service was deleted from Action Agenda items by a 4-2 consensus vote.

It was directed that Mr. Bertrand and Mr. Bittmann meet with Mr. Stutts to come up with a solution to his need for assistance in his area of Business Administrator.

Dr. Aragona discussed two pupil personnel matters, and got Board direction.

Mr. Bertrand discussed a Special Education transportation problem (unmarked vehicles), and Mr. Stutts was directed to handle same.

Motion was made by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Bittmann and carried unanimously at 11:10 p.m. to adjourn.
