Motion was then made by Mr. Hancock, seconded by Mr. Donofrio that the original question be called. Roll call vote was taken with the following results (to call the question only): Mr. Donofrio-yes; Mrs. Frake-abstain; Mr. Hancock-yes; Mr. Schue-no; and Mrs. Fox-yes;

Motion was now made by Mr. Hancock, seconded by Mr. Donofrio that the Board of Education approve that the P.T.A. Lunch Committee as presently operating and alluded to by Mrs. Clemens be sanctioned and authorized by this Board of Education to continue. A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Donofrio-yes; Mrs. Frake-no; Mr. Hancock-yes; Mr. Schue-no; and Mrs. Fox-yes.

There were many interested people in the audience with items for discussion including Mrs. Ingolgio, Mrs. Doyle, Mrs. Sheehna, Mr. Bittman, Mr. Zolowitz, and Mrs. Janes Clerk.

The board members were asked to make their "wrap-up" remarks by Mrs. Fox at 9:45 p.m.

Mr. Wolf mentioned the Jaycee awards to three of our staff, Marge Madieros, Karen Dowiat and Robert Auriemma.

Mrs. Fox read a letter from Senator Russo with regard to the non-possibility of extension of grant in case the referendum is defeated on March 14th.

At 10:07 Mrs. Fox adjourned this meeting by reading a Resolution to go into executive session to discuss a matter involving possible litigation. Mr. Schue made a motion, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and unanimously approved to agree to said resolution.

A draft letter prepared by Mr. Anton in reply to a letter from Vaughn Organization was reviewed and agreed to by board members. The confidentiality of this matter at this time was stressed by Mrs. Fox, due to the possibility of legal action.

It was agreed to meet with Mr. Birdsall on March 26th to review his report.

Mr. Wolf noted that the only price he was able to get for the infra-red check was \$5200.

Mr. Anton spoke of his employment and noted that he is not a part-time employee; that his staff is available at all times. It was noted that the accessibility to our attorney should not be abused and guidelines should be set up.

At 11:30 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Schue, seconded by Mrs. Frake and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

There were ten polling places in the School District. The polls were declared open at 2:00 p.m. and closed at 9:00 p.m.

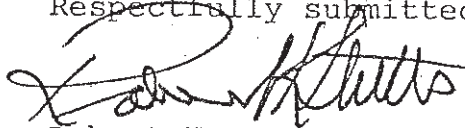

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Public Hearing on the Proposed 1981-82 School Budget at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Present were: Mrs. Fox, Mr. Bell (7:32 p.m.) Mr. Donofrio, Mr. Hancock, Mr. Schue and Mrs. Fox.

Also present: Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Sendzik.

Mrs. Fox announced that the Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be posted by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on March 9, 1981.

Mrs. Fox made opening statements with regard to the preparation of this Budget and the amounts in various accounts. She assigned accounts to various board members for presentation.

Mr. Bell presented Accounts 100, 200, 300 and 400, Mr. Donofrio presented Accounts 500, 600 and 700, Mr. Hancock, Accounts 800 and 900, and Mr. Schue Accounts Nos. 1000, 1100, 1200 and 1300.

Mr. Stutts explained which amounts would be placed on the ballot for the Annual School Election if the existing budget was approved. He explained that Debt Service is not placed on ballot because the amounts were approved by taxpayers at the time of passing of the various referendum for schools.

Mr. Wolf explained his need for an additional five Special Education teachers and approximated a cost of \$55,000. for same.

Questions were then asked by members of the audience with regard to specific line items in the budget. Each question was given consideration and answered by either a board member or an administrator.

Transfer of funds from the Capital Outlay surplus into Current Expense was one of the many suggestions offered to aid in reducing the tax rate. Consensus votes were taken on the many suggestions offered for attempting to lower the tax rate. Mr. Schue suggested contact be made with the Commissioner of Education to see if the grant could be mandated to be used for necessary additions to our schools with the 1.1 million in surplus.

A compromise plan to soften the impact of the tax increase by cutting \$380,069. from the Capital Outlay was agreed to resulting in a .25¢ tax increase overall.

Board members were unable to agree on how to spend the 1.1 million, and it was agreed that this decision did not have to be made this evening.

Mr. Bell suggested application of approximately \$800,000. of the surplus to the current expense budget in order to lower the anticipated increase in school taxes. Mr. Hancock felt the monies in surplus should be used for construction needed.

As each proposal was presented, consensus votes were taken and none had the majority needed to pass.

As previously noted, a suggestion to reserve the \$1,100,000. in surplus and to eliminate the Capital Outlay portion of the proposed budget entirely (\$380,069.) was agreed to by a consensus vote of 3-2 (Mr. Hancock and Mrs. Fox voting -no-).

A consensus vote was taken on the recommendation to add five additional Special Education teachers to the 1981-82 School Budget with a 3-2 vote approving same (Mr. Donofrio and Mr. Hancock - no.)

Motion was made by Mr. Schue, seconded by Mr. Bell that the Board of Education adopt the proposed 1981-82 school budget as follows:

Mr. Stutts began the agenda item discussion by presentation of an item under Building and Grounds. This was in reference to the resurfacing of the Brick Township High School track. Discussion followed with regard to an estimated maximum cost of architectural services and also in regard to needed boiler work.

The item with regard to needed soundproofing of music rooms at Memorial High was discussed and direction was given that the Architect for that school be contacted to determine why these two rooms were not scheduled for proper soundproofing at the time the specifications were prepared.

Items under Curriculum and Instruction were presented by Dr. Aragona and agreement reached as to including on the Action Agenda. The discussion item with regard to a positive date goal for making a decision on student deployment was gone into in depth and by consensus vote it was agreed to hold off until after the Reorganization Meeting scheduled for April 14, 1981.

Approval was agreed to with Mr. LaGratta's request to participate in a Wildwood Band Festival in May.

Items under Finance and Business were presented by Mr. Stutts. Mr. Stutts requested consideration of payment of a due bill from Harred Systems for equipment installed and operating in Memorial High School. Mr. Stutts gave the board members a summary of details regarding the need to pay this bill and he was directed to include same on the list of bills to be approved on April 8, 1981.

Mr. Brouillette's request to borrow \$400. as a loan to begin operation of the Student Store at Memorial High School was unanimously agreed to.

Bids received for Gas Burner replacements were explained by Mr. Stutts and reasons given for their rejection.

Appropriation of \$150,000. from Capital Surplus to upgrade substandard classrooms was agreed to and direction was given to include this motion on the Action Agenda.

Mr. Schue's suggestion to write to the Commissioner of Education in an effort to have him mandate that the Board of Education build a school thus saving the grant was again discussed.

Items under Auxiliary were discussed as the public agenda items were presented. The dates for Summer School and Camp Beadleston were agreed to and will be included on the Action Agenda for formal approval.

Request was made that the polling places for the Annual School Election on April 7, 1981 be published before Election in order to familiarize the voters with the recent changes in voting districts.

A Committee Meeting with the PTA/Lunch Committee was set for Thursday, April 2, 1981. It was stated that Mr. Kull was expected to be present along with some Administration and Committee members of the Board. Mr. Anton explained that his previous opinion on the legality of suspending policy was void; however, he stated that his legal advice was correct within the confines of the information available at the time his opinion was requested.

It was agreed that after this April 2nd meeting with the Lunch Committee that a discussion would be held at the next Work Session to resolve the questions involved.

A resolution was read by Mrs. Fox to go into executive session to discussion Personnel items on the Agenda. Mr. Bell made a motion which was seconded by Mr. Schue and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

A letter from a student requesting financial assistance to participate in "America's Youth in Concert", a program sponsored by the Universal Academy for Music was reviewed and agreement reached that a donation of \$500. would be made.

Dr. Aragona presented items under Profession Personnel section answering questions from board members where necessary. The Board was in unanimous agreement that requests for a third leave of absence be denied.
