

Brick Town, New Jersey
April 28, 1981

Following a Student Hearing at 7:00 p.m., the Brick Township Board of Education held a Special Public Meeting at 8:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of adopting the revised Current Expense Budget for the 1981-82 school year.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Bertrand, Mr. Bittmann, Mr. Donofrio, Mrs. Fox, and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on April 22, 1981: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Motion was made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mr. Donofrio that the Board of Education adopt the revised Current Expense Budget for the 1981-82 school year as follows:

Current Expense \$25,420,361.00

and that revisions be reflected as reductions in the following accounts: 220 - \$35,000; 230A - 43,000.; 240 - 50,000.; 810B - \$75,000.; and 820B - 47,000.

After discussion of this proposed motion, motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Bertrand and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the motion be amended to delete the account deductions and that the entire amount of \$250,000. be authorized to be deducted from the 820B Account (Employee Insurance).

Motion was then made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously by roll call vote to delete the first motion with the exception of that part of said motion which spelled out the amount of Current Expense \$25,420,361.00.

Motion was made by Mr. Bertrand, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education appropriate \$100,000. from Current Expense Surplus to the 1981-82 school year budget as revenue for the Current Expense operation.

Motion was made by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Bell and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education approve that the amount to be raised by taxation for Current Expense for the 1981-82 school year is \$15,205,445.00.

Motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried to adjourn the Special Meeting at 8:12 p.m. and go into the Work Session scheduled.

Mr. Stutts again announced the requirements of the Sunshine Law and our compliance with same by making the proper notifications of same, as previously listed, on April 16, 1981.

A discussion of a proposed review of policy books was held. It was directed that policy books be made available to the two new board members. A question of sending a copy to the B.T.E.A. as a courtesy for their review and suggestions in an advisory capacity was made by Mr. Hancock. However, after considerable viewpoints were voiced it was agreed that no copy be sent to the B.T.E.A. in its present state.

Employment of three Maintenance Department personnel was discussed as to need, etc. A question of using Vocational School students was looked into and agreement was made that such employment is not in accordance with the Wage and Hour Industry rules for employment of students in particular possibly hazardous jobs.

A question of T.W.U. possible problem was also made and explained that the three people proposed for employment would be new employees and that there is no existing Civil Service list for this category. Mr. Stutts further advised that a posting would be made throughout the district for said positions in case qualified people already employed by us would be interested in these jobs. All board members agreed to the employment of these maintenance people and that same would be submitted for board approval at which time definite names are available.

Award of State contracts to Hammett for general teaching supplies and to Lemar Paper Company for paper supplies for the 1981-82 school year was discussed. Mr. Stutts explained the discounts offered over and above the State contract amounts and all board members agreed that these particual contracts can be awarded under their state contracts.

Mrs. Fox referred to her Committee Report on Pupil Placement for the 1981-82 school year. One of the recommendations included was to close Laurelton School as of June, 1981; that grade organization will continue K-5, 6-8, 9-12; that sixth grades in both Lake Riviera Middle and Veterans Middle Schools will be on splits attending afternoon sessions; that seventh grades in both schools will attend morning session; eighth grades will be on full session; and that Laurelton students will attend Drum Point School.

Mrs. Fox explained the savings by closing Laurelton, including utilities, and costly repairs needed. Mrs. Fox said her Committee comprised of Mr. Mayer, Mr. Eid, Mr. Crescenzo, Mr. Lynch, Mrs. Clements, Mrs. Jane Clark, and Mrs. Ingoglia were in unanimous agreement to the recommendations made in this presented report.

Mr. Hancock announced at this time that the Board of Education will hold a Special Public Meeting at 8:00 p.m. on May 5, 1981 in Veterans Memorial Middle School to formally approve a plan, whether the one presented by Mrs. Fox, or one presented by a person attending which will solve the problems of the district.

A consensus vote was taken as to agreement with the plan submitted by Mrs. Fox and all were in agreement with same. They all did qualify that the plan is workable but that they were still anti-split session; that they were accepting same as the best plan to be used at this time.

An item on the Work Session agenda relating to employment of Security Guards was held for the time being.

Two items with regard to testing at Memorial High School were tabled for discussion at Committee Meetings which Mr. Williams will set up.

Closing statements were made by board members after which Mr. Hancock advised the members of the audience that a new format will be tried at board meetings. The agenda for the Public Meeting will be available at approximately 7:15 p.m. for review by the public. This will give people time to go over same and mark where they might have a question.

When the business meeting is opened, it is anticipated that categories will be recommended for approval by section, not individually, as in the past. It is his hope that this will expedite moving the meeting and leaving needed time for discussion of other matters. However, if someone has a question on a particular item, they can request discussion of same.

At 9:20 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Bell and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

Motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education approve split sessions across the district for grades 6 and 7 for the 1981-82 school year. Grades 7 will attend the A.M. session and grade 6 will attend the P.M. session.

Motion was made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mr. Bell and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education approve the closing of the Laurelton School, effective at the close of the 1980-81 school year.

Following this motion a lengthy discussion was held with regard to possible action on determination of sending districts. There were many views expressed by both the public and board members. A recommendation by an audience member not to approve changing the alignment of district was considered and a motion made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mrs. Fox that the matter be sent back for further Committee review and no action taken tonight. A roll call vote was as follows: Mr. Bell-no; Mr. Bertrand-no; Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mr. Donofrio-no; Mrs. Fox-yes; and Mr. Williams-no.

Motion was then made by Mrs. Fox, and seconded by Mr. Donofrio that the Board of Education adopt the proposal as submitted by the Board's Committee. A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Bell-no; Mr. Bertrand-no; Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mr. Donofrio-no; Mrs. Fox-yes; and Mr. Williams-no.

Motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Bertrand that the Board of Education approve moving Laurelton School students to Midstreams School, and that the Administration review the proposal with relevance to keeping the High Schools in balance with no boundary line changes for the high schools. Mr. Hancock clarified to the audience that the intent of this motion is to approve that

the High Schools boundary lines remain as they are, and that appropriate movement of the elementary students take place, in accordance with this plan. A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Bell-yes; Mr. Bertrand-yes; Mr. Bittmann-no; Mr. Donofrio-yes; Mrs. Fox-no; Mr. Williams-yes.

Mr. Stutts read a resolution at 10:50 p.m. to go into executive session for the reason of discussing a personnel matter. Mr. Bell made a motion which was seconded by Mr. Bertrand and carried to approve said resolution.

Mr. Hancock discussed a T.W.U. Grievance Meeting held on May 4th and recommendations on each particular item. The members were in agreement that these determinations can be handled as recommended.

It was also agreed that a letter to the P.T.A. organizations could be sent with regard to use of Roller Forum.

All personnel items, both Professional and Non-Professional, were approved for inclusion on the Action Agenda for May 13, 1981.

At 11:30 p.m. this closed session was adjourned by motion of Mr. Bell, second of Mr. Bertrand and unanimous agreement. The work session was reopened and selection of site for High School graduation was discussed. The Garden Art Center was considered if Keller Field was not ready in time (it is being resodded). Mr. Stutts advised the board members that sod bids are being received shortly and award will be made at a Special Meeting on Monday, May 18, 1981. It is hoped that it will "take" and that the field will be usable for High School graduation.

The recommendation to purchase caps and gowns for middle schools promotionals was discussed and the conclusion was that approval not be given for purchase of same for 8th grade promotional ceremonies.

It was agreed that the board members will meet at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 13, 1981 before the Public Meeting to complete discussion of agenda items not reached this evening, including approval of the school calendar.

At 12:05 a.m. motion was made by Mrs. Fox, seconded by Mr. Williams and carried unanimously that this meeting be adjourned.
