The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session Meeting on Tuesday, September 20, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of receiving and discussing Committee reports.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Bell, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Tremper, and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Sendzik.

Sunshine
Law

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on September 15, 1983: Board of Education Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Committee
Reports

Mr. Bell, Finance and Budgeting Committee, noted that some budget work will be ready by the week of September 26-30, said work coming from the Administrators. Dr. Aragona noted that the budget information which will be available at that time is for the accounts that the Principals are responsible for submitting. Mr. Roblenski suggested that one night might be set aside to listen to the Principals regarding their needs, or possibly items that they can live without. It was also noted that a five year budget projection is being worked upon.

Mr. Bell stressed the importance of board members attending Workshops and the many informative sessions held at same.

Maintenance
& Grounds

Mr. Williams, Buildings and Grounds Committee, spoke on the many projects done by our Maintenance Department and Grounds Department, over their regular programs, during the Spring and Summer of 1983. A prepared report covering the varied major areas worked upon was distributed by Mr. Williams.

The publicized asbestos in the auditorium of Brick Township High School and the recent testing done as a result of the media report was discussed and direction given that the newspapers should be told of the results of this testing in order that they can correct the impressions given the taxpayers of Brick Township.

Mr. Bell noted he would like to discuss informational material on Image Maker. However, this subject was not discussed at this time.

Mr. Tremper referred to the field works being done throughout the district with the cooperation of the Township and asked the Board Attorney to put something in writing with regard to the legalities of the proposal.

Curr.Comm.

Mrs. DeConde next spoke of her Curriculum Committee and noted that

letters are being sent to teachers as well as parents asking them to participate in their program. They expect to review the Gifted and Talented Program as it now stands, looking at all phases of this program, with parents, administrators, etc.

At this time Dr. Aragona mentioned a complaint about the use of a room in the basement of Osbornville School. He told the board members how the complaint came to the attention of board members, and how the room has been upgraded with extra carpeting, etc. (It was also noted that because of a State mandated pre-school program for handicapped children a room was used up making the use of this basement room necessary for a Kindergarten.)

Classroom
Osbornville School

Mr. Williams asked what is being proposed for the non-gifted and talented students. At this time Dr. Aragona noted so many things he would like to bring back in the school system such as the Science Fair, algebra on all levels, more languages such as Russian and Chinese, a homework policy, and discussion of a longer school day of grades K to 8.

Mr. Roblenski asked direction of the board members as to what the Citizens Advisory Committee is to be charged with at this time. He also noted that he would like to see pay telephones installed near the playing fields on the Veterans Memorial complex for the convenience of players. It was agreed that Mr. Stutts would check this out with the telephone company and that there should be no board expense involved.

Mrs. Benton noted that one of the charges they would like to delve into is new housing starts in Brick Township, which would or could be an indication of whether we can expect to go back on split sessions again.

Dr. Aragona read a list of topics which had been submitted to him including comparative study of cost per pupil versus other districts, survey of programs in other school districts compared to ours, school needs and costs of other districts compared to ours, and development of recommendations as to how we can improve in development areas, study of Brick's population to determine influx and outflow of students.

Mrs. DeConde noted that her first charge for the Citizens and Advisory Committee would be with the number of housing starts, and Mr. Williams added that sidewalks on Lanes Mill Road (and sidewalks throughout the Township) should be included in the charges to this Committee.

It was agreed by board members that the discussed charges be assigned to the Citizens Advisory Committee, namely, housing starts within the Township, and sidewalks.

Mr. Tremper, Transportation Committee, first noted that there had been a BTEA Negotiation meeting on September 13th and that another has been scheduled for October 13, 1983. He noted that the staff at our bus garage is an excellent one, good people. Mr. Roblenski suggested that we should ask for legislation as to when we must outlaw a bus. Mr. Tremper stated that he had been present during some of the state inspection of buses and that our staff keeps them in excellent condition.

Mrs. Benton read excerpts from a report from New Jersey School Boards Legislative Chairperson, in which Governor Kean's blueprint for education was quoted. Among the statements made by Governor Kean was one with reference to raising salaries and standards for teachers. He stated that when the certification standards are in place, his proposal is that the State would guarantee a starting annual salary of \$18,500. Mrs. Benton read further from this report and requested that copies of same be sent to all board members.

Budget

Mr. Stutts referred to the preparation of the budget for 1984-85 and new programs suggested by Dr. Aragona and badly needed in the district, and noted that the board members are going to have to make an assessment of priorities. He noted that to effect a no-tax increase budget many necessary things have been cut out of the budget in recent years and that the board members should take into consideration that these projects are going to have to be taken care of and not continually cut out.

Adjourn

At 9:35 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Williams and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

The Brick Township Board of Education held their Pre-Agenda Meeting on Tuesday, October 4, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of discussing items submitted to them for review.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Bittmann, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Tremper and Mr. Williams (7:40 p.m.)

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

Sunshine
Law

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on September 29, 1983: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Dr. Aragona began the pre-agenda meeting by referring to the item under Buildings and Grounds to review Mr. Anton's letter opinion with regard to entering into a joint agreement with the Municipality for recreational facilities. It was a lengthy letter and Mr. Sendzik summarized it for the board members.

The next category covered was Curriculum and Instruction at which time Dr. Aragona explained an item accepting a long list of funds for projects under P.L. 94-482.

He also discussed a request from Veterans Memorial Middle School to start a computer program at that school. After the board members reviewed this request, all were in agreement to go ahead with same at a possible cost of \$25,000.

Mr. Wolf gave reports on the Laurelton School Campus Project, School Within-A-School, and Pre-School Program for the Handicapped. His reports were informative as to the number of students in the programs, the types of children attending specific programs, etc. These have only been in operation since school opened in September, so he could not give an opinion on how successful these will be in the long run. His reports showed how much is being done to help the various types of handicapped children within the district, and Mr. Roblenski asked that he again give these reports at the public meeting on October 12th in order that the public may see how much is really being done in these areas.

Dr. Aragona asked and received permission to change In-Service days from Wednesdays to Thursdays because of conflicting transportation schedules.

Mr. Stutts took the Finance and Business area at which time a board member questioned a recent memorandum about purchase of a product and possible conflict of interest by a board member. It was noted

that the product had been returned and that the U.P.S. charge to return same was \$11.46. Mr. Stutts was instructed to request the reimbursement of this expenditure.

Finance and Business

The next items regarding request from Garden State Philharmonic Symphony Society and the purchase of a Tape-Tel Electronics five channel announce-only automatic unit for simultaneous announcing were agreed to. The item to discuss the Custodian of School Monies Reports was also handled by Mr. Stutts, who explained that the State has run out of forms and that as soon as they are printed a supply will be sent to the Custodian of School Monies.

He also listed three categories of bids to be received and included with the Action Agenda on October 12, 1983.

Personnel

Dr. Aragona next presented items under Teaching Personnel and asked that questions be asked on any motions board members wished future explanation of. Two items were removed for a later board meeting, and one was held for closed session.

Mr. Stutts presented the items under Non-Teaching Personnel and received approval to add a request for a leave of absence for a Custodian for personal reasons, and he also noted that he would be adding additional items to this section employing a Groundsperson and several Custodians.

Policy

Two items under Policy dealing with Student Driving and Assault of a School Employee by Students were reviewed and Mr. Joseph Mayer was present for input.

Auxiliary

One item under Auxiliary to discuss the Citizens Advisory Committee and its charges was presented by Mr. Bittmann. He stated that his Committee feels that the two charges given to them are not of a significant substance, one was to research the charge of sidewalks throughout the district, and the other one dealt with the housing outlook in the Township and its possible impact on student enrollment. He noted that his Committee would like to address the screens on the second floor of Emma Havens Young School, putting call boxes near schools, unfinished schools (landscaping, etc.), early out, and academic standing.

A lengthy discussion followed and a board member requested that this Committee write down what methods and procedures they expect to follow. Mr. Anton read the specific Board of Education policy for the Citizens Advisory Committee and its function.

At 9:30 p.m. a five minute recess was called before continuing this discussion. When the meeting resumed, after Mr. Anton's explanation of the policy, a board member suggested the Committee list in a general way what they are interested in doing and how they will go about it. Mrs. DeConde noted how important the charge of researching the housing outlook is to future planning. However, this Committee feels this charge is not for them. It was then asked if they will list, in priority order, what they would like to do, and after same is submitted to the Board, the Board will choose two or three of them.

Dr. Aragona asked if the Committee could write a paragraph or so on each thing they would like to become involved in and how they would like to do it.

It was agreed that this Committee should give a generalization of what they expect to do and how they expect to attack the projects, in a capsule version. Mr. Williams asked that Mr. Stutts send each board member a copy of the specific policy which deals only with the creation of a Citizens Advisory Committee.

The next item on the agenda was to discuss a proposal from Image Makers. The board members agreed it is a good proposal but did ask Mr. Stutts to solicit two or three more proposals for comparative purposes. Mr. Roblenski asked that when all information is available that a meeting night be set for discussion of same and ascertain if we can afford this program and how when we might want it to begin. He said this could be included on a Committee Reports meeting. Image Makers

An item relating to an student eligibility appeal was held for closed session.

At 10:20 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing items under staff personnel and student personnel. Motion was made by Mr. Tremper, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to approve this resolution. Closed Session

A request from an employee to have the Board of Education purchase prior years of service on his half was reviewed by the board members who unanimously agreed that this is not financially feasible. Personnel

The next item dealt with a eligibility appeal for a High School student so that she can participate on the Cheerleading squad. Mr. Brooks' memorandum was referred to and board members agreed that the circumstances warranted that this student be exempted from Policy #490. Student Eligibility

The next item discussed was one already reviewed under Finance and Business referring to a possible board member conflict of interest. Because of the Sunshine Law and its rules, Mr. Anton recommended that this discussion be continued in open session. A consensus vote was taken as to whether the board members were in agreement to going back into open session and all board members voted -yes-. Conflict of Interest

Mr. Stutts explained the circumstances of this purchase, and some members felt that the refund of the U.P.S. expenditure should close this matter. However, one member felt that a letter of censure should go out from the Board. At first Mr. Stutts was directed to write same, however, this direction was changed and Mr. Anton was told to send it from his office.

Motion was made that Mr. Anton prepare a letter to go to Mr. Bell advising him that the Board of Education feels his actions were improper and that they will expect no repetition in the future, and that this letter is to include the reimbursement request of the U.P.S. expenditure. A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mrs. Benton-yes; Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mrs. DeConde-yes; Mr. Tremper-yes; Mr. Williams-no; and Mr. Roblenski-no. Mr. Williams explained his no meant that he did not wish to add additional pressure on the board member at this time, that it did not mean he was not in agreement with the stand taken on this particular issue by other board members.

Adjourn

At 11:05 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Bittmann and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.
