ASSAULT OF A SCHOOL EMPLOYEE BY STUDENTS

It is the intention of the Board to protect its employees from verbal and physical abuse by students. Students who commit such misconduct shall be disciplined in accordance with established procedures.

PROPOSED REGULATIONS

No. 5131.8R ASSAULT OF A SCHOOL EMPLOYEE BY STUDENTS

1. The following acts shall constitute an assault by a student.
Bodily injury to a school employee:
 - (a) attempts to cause purposely, knowingly, or recklessly bodily injury to a school employee; or
 - (b) negligently causes bodily injury to a school employee with a deadly weapon; or
 - (c) attempts by physical menace to put a school employee in fear of imminent bodily injury; or
 - (d) attempts to cause serious bodily injury to a school employee, or causes such injury purposely or knowingly or under circumstances manifesting extreme indifference to the value of human life recklessly causes such injury; or
 - (e) attempts to cause or purposely or knowingly causes bodily injury to a school employee with a deadly weapon; or
 - (f) recklessly causes bodily injury to a school employee with a deadly weapon; or
 - (g) knowingly points a firearm, as defined in N.J.S.2c:39-17 at or in the direction of a school employee, whether or not the actor believes it to be loaded.

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matter on said date, November 1, 1983, at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented thereto; and

WHEREAS, said student R.V. was represented by counsel, George Skokos, Esquire, 301 First Avenue, Asbury Park, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, student R.V. was fully advised of his rights and fully advised of the applicable procedural due process afforded to him; and

WHEREAS, said student R.V. and said student's mother and George Skokos, Esquire, appeared for and on behalf of said student and were given a full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question; and

WHEREAS, student R.V. through counsel stipulated as to procedural due process; and

WHEREAS, the student R.V. entered a plea of guilty as to the distribution allegation of the charge; and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the aforesaid hearing: Robert Roblenski, President, Robert Bittmann, Vice President, Carol Benton, Board Member, William Bell, Board Member, Arthur Williams, Board Member, Harold Tremper, Board Member, Joan DeConde, Board Member, and Dr. Louis Aragona, Superintendent of Schools and by statute ex officio Board Member and Robert Stutts, Business Administrator, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education:

a) Gave careful consideration to the fact that the Child Study Team report rendered the said student R.V. as "Perceptually Impaired".

b) Gave careful consideration to the competent advice of members of its administrative staff who appeared at the aforesaid hearing during its deliberations.

c) Considered the past deportment of student R.V. in the Brick Township School System and said student's background and potential and academic achievements; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Township of Brick considers the aforementioned charge a serious offense that cannot be condoned which does materially and substantially interfere with the requirements of appropriate discipline and safety to the students and operation of the school system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that student R.V. be expelled from the Birck Township School System. As a result of expulsion student R.V. is not to be in the school buildings or on the school grounds; nor permitted to ride the school buses or take part in any school activities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Brick Township School System shall permit student R.V. and or his parents to receive counseling from the Guidance Department at the Brick Town Memorial High School with regards to alternative means of completing Student R.V.'s high school education, as well as, referring student R.V. and or his parents to agencies providing drug rehabilitation programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if student R.V. and or his parents wish to avail themselves of the above mentioned services through the Guidance Department, they should make all arrangements with Mr. James DeFabio, Principal of Brick Town Memorial High School.

At 8:30 p.m. this meeting was declared open for public discussion, after which board members were asked if they had any final comments. Mr. Tremper spoke of teacher negotiations, and noted that this board is dedicated to doing the best possible job in getting this matter resolved. As per memorandum of agreement, Dr. Aragona noted that the teachers and the board have been designated to come up with the salary schedule guides.

Athletic accomplishments throughout the district were noted and dates of State Championship games were also discussed.

At 8:35 p.m. motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to adjourn.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session Meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of discussing BTEA Negotiations and Guides.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Bittmann (7:40pm), Mr. Bell, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Tremper, and Mr. Williams (7:40pm)

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Pagano and Mr. Sendzik (8:07pm)

At 7:30 p.m. Mr. Roblenski opened the meeting and declared a recess until Mr. Williams and Mr. Bittmann arrived at 7:40 p.m. at which time the meeting was declared open.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posed on November 29, 1983 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Stutts read the resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing BTEA Negotiations and Guides. Motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

Mr. Pagano presented informational material to Board Members and Administration as background for the presentation he was about to make on the proposed guides for the B.T.E.A. He noted that would show the Board's position at this time, and asked that he be permitted to complete his presentation before board members asked their questions. He had provided pads and pencils in order that board members could note their questions as he spoke.

He noted in his presentation that the services of a representative from New Jersey School Boards Association had been in the district for two full days working on these guides, and also had been in frequent telephone contact.

Mr. Pagano showed on a blackboard the step guides which had been given to the BTEA for consideration, and noted that counter guides had been received. The salary raise ranges in the guides were shown for the three year period. Mr. Pagano also defined what a "balloon" step was as the step before the top step of the guide.

The N.J.B.S.A. guides were reviewed and discussed at length by board members. At 9:05 p.m. Mr. Roblenski asked for a recess, and the meeting was resumed at 9:20 p.m. As the meeting was being recessed, a recommendation was made that this matter be given back to the Negotiating Committee to work on an agreeable solution.

Mr. Bittmann requested that this Board move the discussion back to the Negotiating Committee tabling the discussion at this meeting, and that the Negotiating Committee will then bring their recommendations back to the full Board. They also noted that they expect to contact the Negotiator to come back to sit with the Committee. Mr. Bell seconded this request, and a consensus vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Bell-yes; Mrs. Benton-yes; Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mrs. DeConde-yes; Mr. Tremper-yes; Mr. Williams-no; Mr. Roblenski-yes.

At this time a discussion was held as to a time slot to meet with the negotiating team from BTEA in order to continue to review any guides they have to offer. The people representing the Board of Education would be Mr. Pagano, Mr. Tremper, Mr. Bittmann and Mrs. DeConde.

The Brick Township Board of Education held their Pre-Agenda Meeting on Tuesday, December 6, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building for the purpose of discussing items submitted to them for their Action Agenda on December 8, 1983 and discussing in closed session matters involving personnel and litigation.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Bell, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. De Conde, Mr. Tremper and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Mayer, Mr. DiFabio, Mr. Zink, Mr. Anton and Mr. Sendzik (7:50 p.m.)

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law Sunshine Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on December 1, 1983 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

The Pre-Agenda was presented for discussion by Mr. Roblenski. Taking it page by page, he asked members if they had any questions on the items shown, beginning with approval of minutes, and then to the item under Buildings and Grounds with regard to a letter received from L. W. Biegler, Inc. regarding insurance coverage in civil action with Vaughn Partnership. Mr. Anton was asked to clarify this letter to the board members and he explained it was a disclaimer letter advising that they do not cover anything in the suit between the Board of Education and Thomas J. Carney, Inc.

Items under Curriculum and Instruction were next reviewed. Messrs. Mayer, DiFabio, and Zink were present to discuss the proposed high school mathematics program revisions for 1984-85.

Mrs. Benton next referred to the proposed resolutions for the New Jersey School Boards Delegates Meeting on December 10, 1983 and briefly referred to a few of them, for example, having foreign languages in the elementary schools, and a resolution that if the State mandates a program that they should then fund it. She asked board members who may be interested in giving her input on the resolution for this meeting to contact her and she will share the information she has.

Dr. Aragona, at this time, brought two requests to the attention of the board members, one was for an overnight trip for the Brick Memorial High School Golden Mustang Marching Band from Tuesday, March 20, 1984 through Saturday, March 24, 1984 to Seaworld, Orlando, Florida and the second one was from the Brick Township Memorial High School Cheerleader Coach to attend the 1983-84 National High School Cheerleader Championship Finals in Orlando, Florida March 2-6, 1984.

Trips

At this time some of the Cheerleaders were present with Mrs. Burke. A parent spoke on behalf of the Cheerleaders requesting the board's financial assistance. It was noted that the Board does not budget funds and that each student group usually have money-raising efforts to get the needed money for these trips.

A consensus vote was taken as to giving permission for these two groups to go on the requested trips and they were agreed to unanimously.

Business & Finance

Items under Business and Finance were presented by Mr. Stutts. He referred to an item about the proposed 1984-85 school budget, and Dr. Aragona asked Mr. Bell how he preferred it be handled. The CAP was referred to by percentage, and Mr. Bell said he would like the present figures, which are over CAP, reduced to the CAP level. No time schedule to meet to discuss the proposed budget was set at this time.

Mrs. Benton requested that board members be reminded that they must also attach receipts to their vouchers when submitting same for any expenses they may be applying for reimbursement.

The next item was to have Mr. Huss present the Synopsis of Audit; however, he was unable to present same as he was awaiting information from the Board Attorney.

The termination of the Agency/Brokerage relationship between Commercial Viking and Connecticut General was the next item on the agenda. Mr. Serhus had presented information to Mr. Stutts, this date, whereby he could save the Board \$270,000. After much discussion a suggestion was made that Viking be given 90 days after the first quarter to prove he can save the money he refers to. A consensus vote was taken and Mr. Tremper was the only -No- vote. It was requested that Mr. Serhus submit reports and that Mr. Stutts give a monthly report of progress, if available.

The next item referring to Attorney fees was held for closed session.

One of the bid items to award bid for graduation caps and gowns was explained by Mr. Stutts.

Pages 5 and 5A referring to Teaching Personnel were next reviewed and agreed to. One item to discuss a grievance at board level was held for a meeting with the teacher and her representative, and the Board's committee, Mrs. DeConde and Mr. Bell, who were to request an extension of time to answer said grievance. It was agreed to schedule a 7:30 p.m. meeting on Thursday, December 8th before the Regular Meeting to discuss this matter, and direction was given that the teacher be sent her Rice notice and that the meeting be duly advertised.

The next two items dealt with salary guides for Teacher Aides and the need for a Speech Therapist. The discussion of the salary guides was held for closed session, and Mr. Wolf was directed to go ahead with whatever has to be done regard the employment of a Speech Therapist.

Items under Non-Teaching Personnel were next discussed and agreed to. Two were held for closed session.

Items under Policy and Auxiliary were next reviewed and agreements reached.

At 9:25 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a motion to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing matters involving personnel and possible litigation.

A motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

Mr. Roblenski declared a short recess, and the meeting was reconvened at 9:45 p.m.

The first held item was one regarding billing for legal services involving litigation. The matter was reviewed and Mr. Anton asked for guidance as to the board's wishes on future billings. The reasoning given by Mr. Anton was acceptable to board members.

The memorandum prepared by Mr. Stutts about salary guides for Teacher Aides and selected fringe benefits was discussed at this time. Mr. Stutts was directed by Mr. Bell's questioning to prepare other figures for said group for further review at the 7:30 p.m. meeting to be held on December 8th.

Mr. Stutts discussed the requests for negotiations by the Civil Service Supervisory personnel. Mr. Tremper asked for a report showing present salaries and what the proposed percentage increase would reflect in the individual salary structures. Mr. Tremper thought we would like to prepare a three-year guide for this group.

Mr. Stutts also discussed a TWU item and was given direction on same.

The next item to be discussed was emergency delegation of power to chief administrator in periods of "emergencies". Many opinions were offered as to the possible effects of such a resolution at this time. Mr. Bell stated he was fully in agreement as to the need of this and wanted his approval of same noted for the time when a consensus vote would be taken. He left this meeting about this time at approximately 10:30 p.m.

Mr. Anton was asked for an opinion in answer to one posed by a board member who felt that if such emergency did arise an emergency meeting of the Board could be called. Mr. Anton answered that with the Sunshine Law limitations of 48 hour notices that we might not be able to comply with same if we had to take an immediate action. A consensus vote resulted in agreement with all but Mr. Tremper.

A motion was then made by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mrs. DeConde that the Board of Education delegate emergency powers to the chief school administrator during periods that the Board of Education may define as "emergencies"; that the Chief Administrator of this district shall have the following powers in consultation with the Attorney, Board Secretary/Business Administrator:

1. To employ for the duration of the emergency such personnel as he deems necessary.
2. To assign and reassign all personnel as necessary.
3. To assign immediately any administrator or supervisor from his position as he deems necessary for the operation of the schools during the emergency situation and to make such temporary

appointments as are necessary to fill vacancies caused by such reassignment.

4. To establish daily salary rates for all such emergency personnel at a minimum of \$75.00.
5. To extend the normal work day as required, and to authorize and pay overtime rates in accordance with State Law.
6. To declare a minimum school day in accordance with State law.
7. To cancel all extra curricular activities when he deems said cancellation to be in the best interests of the school district.
8. To contract for or otherwise obtain transportation, food, telephone and such other services as he deems necessary.
9. To close any district school building.
10. To authorize Attorney to move to enjoin a strike.

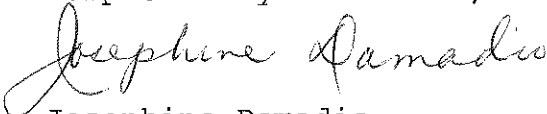

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Murphy and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Wolf read the open public meetings act as follows: The New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on December 5, 1983 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Dr. Aragona stated facts pertaining to the grievance filed by a Kindergarten teacher about insufficient preparation time. He had sought an extension of time on said grievance hearing at board level; however he has had no response from the Association. He said we are at the deadline, and that the teacher had replied to a Rice notice that she preferred this to be held in public session. She had been again contacted, this date, and had been asked if there was any change in her decision to hold this public. The reason for the filing of this grievance was given by Dr. Aragona and he did note that some additional preparation time had been agreed to in addition to that in the contract with BTEA. Mr. Murphy also gave input on this matter.

At 8:00 p.m. Mr. Roblenski declared the public meeting open and had Mr. Stutts reread the Sunshine Law. The Board then returned to the discussion of this grievance. After many recommendations and suggestions were made, a motion was made by Mrs. Benton, and seconded by Mr. Bittmann to sustain the Superintendent's position on this matter, that is, denying the Grievance. A roll call vote was taken with the following results: Mr. Bell-no; Mrs. Benton-yes; Mr. Bittmann-no; Mrs. DeConde-yes; Mr. Tremper-yes; Mr. Williams-no; and Mr. Roblenski-yes. It was noted that it is agreeable with the board members that if the teacher and the Association chooses to rediscuss this further with the Superintendent it can be scheduled and again reviewed by the Board.
