All locks on lockers that are unauthorized or for which a combination or duplicate key is not in the possession of the school Principal shall be removed.

The school is not responsible for the contents of the lockers in any event and it shall be the responsibility of the students for security of the lockers by making certain that they are locked after opened and that the combination or key, as the case may be, only be given to the proper authority as set forth above.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting on Thursday, February 17, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of meeting with B.T.E.A. representation to discuss mutual concerns.

Present were: Mr. Bell, Mr. Williams, Mrs. Benton and Mr. Donofrio.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Mayer and Mr. Sendzik.

Sunshine
Law

Mrs. Damadio announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time and place thereof posted on February 14, 1983 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Although the meeting had been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. members of the B.T.E.A. representation were not present at this time. Therefore, Mr. Bell recessed the meeting until B.T.E.A. members arrived.

At 8:00 p.m. this meeting was reconvened when BTEA members arrived. Mr. Bell read a letter from the BTEA thanking the Board of Education for their consideration and rescheduling of the February 9, 1983 meeting in reply to their request.

Future meeting dates were briefly discussed at this time, and Mr. Bell stated that it is the board's intention to alternate the monthly meetings between the BTASA and the BTEA groups.

Policy
Abuse of
Staff

The first item discussed was regard verbal and physical assault on teachers and administrators by students. In the discussion that followed presentation of this item it was agreed that a policy should be formulated and that the BTEA should appoint a committee to work with a board committee in establishing said policy. Mr. Sendzik also informed them that there is legislation which may be of value in the formulation of this policy. Mr. Martucci stated he will advise the Board of Education, after their February 28th BTEA meeting, of the names of people who will work on his committee.

Student
Under-
Achievers

This was an item included on the agenda because of board input. Many avenues of thought were explored while discussing this item. Mr. Grove suggested that teachers may be allowed to have one period less in their daily schedule and have this time available for any student who requires extra help. It was agreed that attendance is an important factor in student progress, and that a firm attendance policy is also needed. Mr. Mayer will provide Mr. Martucci with a copy of the tentative Attendance Policy recently presented for discussion to board members. It was noted by Mr. Mayer that these attendance policies which allow a student to continue attending class after excessive absences, although they may pass said course, they receive no credit on their record for it. He also continued to advise that schools having this clause in their attendance policy usually

have summer makeup time, to allow a student to take that subject and get his credits. However, if Brick Public Schools set up this provision in policy, we would not provide the summer make-up time.

Student Attendance was also made part of the discussion of student underachievers, and it was agreed that good attendance is essential to the progress of students who have a comprehension problem.

Brick Township Memorial High School building conditions next were discussed. Mrs. Warren, Senior Building Representative, of that school was spokesperson for that group. She took issue with statements made by both Mr. Williams and Mr. Bittmann at our February 9th meeting with regard to Memorial High building complaints, etc. Mr. Williams did apologize for his statements and stated that he had been told that there were no heating complaints in the three weeks before the February 9th meeting.

Mrs. Warren had listed areas of concern with the heating and ventilations which still exist. After a long discussion of the still existing problems, Dr. Aragona stated he will meet with the School Nurse, Mrs. Crane, a board member, and other BTEA representation at Mr. Sendzik's office next Wednesday to continue discussion of these continuing conditions.

Mrs. Crane was instructed to duplicate any complaints submitted to her to the building representative who will forward a report on same to the Administration. It was noted that the Ocean County Department of Health has been requested to come in and check the building, and Mrs. Warren requested that they come in after 1:30 p.m. when it really gets bad.

Mr. Grove stated that the B.T.E.A. has been patient to date realizing the problems that the Board has had, and the efforts expended in an attempt to correct the deficiencies. However, he went on to say that if the corrections are not complete by September, 1983 that they will not permit their teachers back in the building; that they will take a stand at that time; they will not allow this to go into another school year.

The location for summer school came into this discussion and it was agreed that it may be wiser to schedule it for Brick Township High School rather than Memorial High School to allow that extra time to assure that all corrections have been made.

Scheduling students for 1983-84 was the next topic presented. Mrs. Sue Molnar stated that this early scheduling has cut into the Guidance programs. She stated that she must sit with approximately 433 students (8th graders) individually to work out their high school schedule request. It was agreed that guidance services to students is of prime importance and that early scheduling should not be tried if children were to be in any way jeopardized. Mr. Bell affirmed that the agreement to see if early scheduling could be done had not been set in concrete, and that if it could not be done this year then we should aim for it next school year.

Mr. Bell said after further discussion of this subject that the

Board will accept recommendations from the Administration as to the Budget figures to be approved with regard to anticipated teacher needs next school year. A consensus vote was taken and all attending board members were in agreement that early scheduling would be postponed until next school year, and that the Administration should prepare as accurate as possible estimation of teacher needs for 1983-84.

Mr. Martucci reaffirmed their next anticipated meeting date with the Board and it was agreed that it is to be tentatively set for the third Thursday in April.

The need for Memorial High School students to make up days lost due to the recent malfunction was referred to and the B.T.E.A. asked that they be allowed input as to how to make up whatever makeup time is necessary.

Early out for students was directed held with another item referring to updating Brick Township High School to Brick Township Memorial High School standards. However, early-out did get discussed to some degree at this time. It was explained that early outs had been decided against at the beginning of the school year. However, due to complaints from parents as to the need for their child to work for monetary reasons, early release was permitted under certain conditions. Apparently some students are abusing the privilege and Mr. Bell asked Mr. Martucci to appoint another BTEA Committee to come back with a report on this subject and recommendations.

The recent posting of the Principal position in Memorial High School was reviewed and direction given that a new posting be made for this position opening same up to anyone who is certified, and to extend the time for the applications to be returned.

At 10:15 p.m. motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

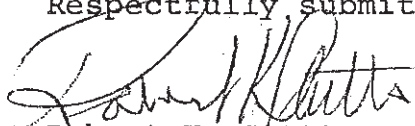

Meetings

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting at 7:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue to receive an update from Mr. Pagano on B.T.E.A. negotiations to date, and at 7:30 p.m. a Pre-Agenda Meeting to discuss items submitted for review and discussion for the Action Agenda on March 9, 1983.

Present were: Mr. Bell, Mr. Williams, Mrs. Benton (7:06 pm), Mr. Bittmann (7:08 pm), Mr. Donofrio (7:08 pm), Mr. Roblenski and Mr. Tremper.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Pagano and Mr. Sendzik (7:20 pm)

Sunshine Law

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on February 23, 1983 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Following this Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the reason of discussing matters involving negotiations. Mr. Tremper moved to approve said motion, Mr. Roblenski seconded it and it was carried unanimously.

BTEA

Negotiations

Mr. Pagano was present to discuss previously held meetings with B.T.E.A. with regard to negotiations. He did state that the next meeting would be held on March 10, 1983.

Mr. Pagano had statistics listed on the blackboard in the meeting room and took each item and explained in detail discussions held to date. He also distributed informational folders to those present which presented additional information on said negotiations. He asked for and was given direction as to guidelines for future negotiations.

At 7:45 p.m. Mr. Pagano completed his presentation at which time Mr. Stutts gave a brief summary of TWU negotiations to date.

Still being in closed session, an item under Professional Personnel referring to a recently revised administrative contract was discussed and direction given that this position be a twelve-month one beginning with the 1983-84 school year.

An item under Buildings and Grounds relating to alleged health hazards and the possibility of obtaining medical tests in connection with Brick Township Memorial High School. There was a very lengthy discussion of this subject. Thought was given to authorizing members of the teaching staff in the alleged problem areas to go for medical tests. After many thoughts were expressed as to the possible result of panic, it was agreed that employees in these areas would be advised that they can have medical testing, if they wish, for their own piece of mind. (Mr. Bittmann had left at 8:30 p.m.)

Another item under Teaching Personnel to discuss allegations regarding a teaching staff member was brought to the table at this time, while still in closed session, and it was agreed that temporarily, pending legal disposition of the matter, someone should be appointed to the position in question.

At 8:55 p.m. Mr. Donofrio made a motion to open this meeting for public discussion; Mrs. Benton seconded it and it was carried. A recess was called for ten minutes.

An item under Buildings and Grounds regard the need for fencing around Memorial High School ball fields was discussed and agreement made that a maximum of \$2,500. can be expended for this project.

Items under Curriculum and Instruction were held until later as they would require considerable time to discuss. The Vouchers under Finance and Business were approved, as well as an item to pay a small judgment.

The items under the Teaching and Non-Teaching sections were reviewed and agreed to. Policy was the next category gone over, the first three items were related to ones that had to be approved on second reading. The fourth motion referred to a policy on Alternative Physical Education Program and board members discussed the copy of said policy included. It was agreed that the policy could be acted upon now and the regulations for same developed later.

An item referring to a fund raising project at Midstreams School was reviewed and Mr. Roblenski had a lot of input as to the learning experience this project was for the students involved. Direction was given that Mr. Doege be given the go-ahead to continue his efforts.

Going back to the items under Curriculum and Instruction, the next one discussed was the Alternate School Program proposed, intended for children identified as special needs. The proposal to conduct this program in Laurelton School was also included in this discussion. Mr. Wolf described what the program would be along with the informational material which had previously been distributed. After a lengthy discussion, the board members agreed unanimously that they do want the program, and also that Laurelton Campus should be the site for said program.

Mr. Wolf discussed the School-Within-A-School concept at Brick Township High School for special education students, the time of instruction running from approximately 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. This program is aimed at bring back some of the students we are presently sending out to other districts. A consensus vote showed all members in favor of this program.

The next item to discuss creation of a Preschool Special Education Program in conformance with State mandates was reviewed. It was stated that said program would start in September, 1983 and at the present time two sections are planned for Midstreams School. This program would be for handicapped 3 to 4 year olds.

Mr. Wolf next discussed assistance by teachers to the under-achievers, which is optional to teachers, not mandated as someone led a board member to believe.

The recommendations from the Middle States Evaluation were referred to as to budgetary impact of same. The next item referring to needs of the Practical Arts Department at Brick Township as reported by Mr. Wolfersberger tied in with this so they were, to a degree, discussed together. It was agreed that the P.A. system at Brick High was in serious need of repair, and that a Job Placement Counselor should be considered. The possibility of the availability of getting a grant was also discussed.

Mr. Stutts felt that Mr. Wolfersberger's request for the Practical Arts Department should be acted upon in this year's budget. He will check into cost and get updated prices for the board.

The request to waive Science graduation requirements for student J.K., Senior at Memorial High School was agreed to.

The concerns and recommendations of the Middle School Principals were also reviewed from the informational material distributed. The additional instructional help necessary to make the full session work, and the possible addition of an internal suspension teacher was also explored.

Mr. Stutts asked which board members would be assigned various accounts for the Public Hearing to be held March 9th. Board Members agreed that Mr. Stutts should present the proposed 1983-84 school budget that evening.

At 11:10 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Williams to adjourn this meeting.

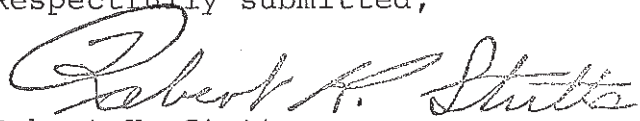

Meetings

The Brick Township Board of Education met on Wednesday, March 9, 1983 in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue beginning at 7:30 p.m. for the following purposes: 1) to discuss a personnel matter(s) in closed session, 2) to conduct their Regular Public Meeting, and 3) to hold a Public Hearing on the proposed 1983-84 school budget.

Present were: Mr. Bell, Mr. Williams, Mrs. Benton, Mr. Bittmann, Mr. Donofrio, Mr. Roblenski, and Mr. Tremper.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton, and Mr. Sendzik.

Sunshine Law

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time and place thereof posted as follows on March 3, 1983: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Towns News.

Closed Session Resolution

At 7:32 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing personnel matters. Mr. Donofrio made a motion to approve said resolution, Mr. Williams seconded it and it carried unanimously.

Mr. Bell briefly summarized the purpose of this meeting to discuss allegations made against a teacher. He summed up the charges which were made, the discussions with the board attorney, and recommendations made by the attorney and administration.

Mr. Bittmann questioned why the board members had not been given a complete file on the matter and Mr. Bell explained that it has never been the practice of this Board of Education to distribute information of this type which could possibly get into the wrong hands and prove to be detrimental to the employee.

At 7:58 p.m. the public was notified that the Regular Meeting was convened and adjourned by motion of Mr. Williams, second by Mrs. Benton and unanimous agreement in order to complete the personnel discussions. As the discussion on this matter continued, a consensus vote was taken and agreement reached that the board members would like information distributed to them before they make their decision. The Superintendent was directed, after another consensus vote was taken with unanimous agreement, to see that these reports are copied tomorrow and sent out to board members. After reading the information, board members agreed that they will then make their decision as to whether any further action is to be taken at this time, that is, if they want the matter brought back before the full board for the purpose of certifying charges.

A newspaper article about a coaching position was presented for discussion by Mr. Roblenski. After this matter was briefly

reviewed, Mr. Wolf was requested to bring the Athletic Directors to a board meeting in the near future to explain to board members the method of selecting coaches.

At 8:20 p.m. Mr. Bittmann made a motion to close the executive session and open the public meeting. This motion was seconded by Mr. Williams and agreed to by all.
