Another suggestion was that when an employee first requests a leave of absence he should be informed in the letter advising him of board approval of said initial leave that extensions will not go beyond three years, or whatever time limit is agreed to. It was also noted that when these requests are presented to the Superintendent that deviations could be possible due to circumstances. Mr. Anton will work with Dr. Aragona to compose the language which will be used to notify employees of the limitations of leaves.

Leaves

The balance of the items in this section were discussed and agreed to.

Non-Teaching Personnel items were next reviewed and agreed to along with two additional items which Mr. Stutts said he was going to add to the Action Agenda.

Mr. Roblenski set the following dates for next month's meetings: April 11th at 7:00 p.m. - Pre-Agenda Meeting, and 8:00 p.m. - Organization Meeting to be followed by Regular Monthly Meeting.

Minutes

Mr. Roblenski presented the pre-agenda and asked if anyone had objections to the minutes listed. Hearing none, he continued on to page 2 which showed Curriculum and Instruction items which were read and discussed by Dr. Aragona.

The third item under this section referred to graduation requirements to become effective September, 1984 for incoming ninth grade students. All board members agreed to the revisions and commended the Committee which had worked on this matter.

Vouchers

The next category discussed was the payment of Vouchers. Mrs. DeConde with Mrs. Benton had checked the vouchers being presented for payment and discussed areas they had questions on. They asked that a total amount of \$6.43 (\$5.75 and .68¢) be deleted from the bill list for approval.

The Personnel sections were held at this time pending consensus as to whether these items would be discussed in closed or open session.

Policy

The Board reviewed the recommended revisions to the regulations for the Attendance Policy. Mr. Mayer was present and answered questions from board members. The consensus vote was that all were in approval of the recommended revisions and approval would be requested on the March 14th Action Agenda.

Auxiliary

The items under Auxiliary were next reviewed and Dr. Aragona noted that the graduation dates noted on the agenda were subject to change if additional days were required (in case of snow days, etc.) to have the Seniors complete their 180 days.

Personnel

A consensus vote was taken as to whether the board members chose to discuss personnel items in closed or open session and it was agreed to continue in open session.

Miss Janice Mayer, School Alcohol Advisory Committee, was present at this time with Mr. E. Armstrong and Miss J. Lucér. Miss Mayer discussed the progress made in the schools since the implementation of their Alcohol/Dangerous Substances program.

She explained the sessions held with members of the teaching staff to train them in handling students in need of said support. Questions were asked of the Board as to considering giving release time to the teachers in order that they can facilitate this program. Note was made that with a teacher's full schedule they do not have the available time to sit down with the students needing this type of counseling.

It was agreed that this must be considered.

Mr. Roblenski opened this meeting at 7:30 p.m. and asked Mr. Lynch if he wanted to present their agenda items for discussion. Mr. Lynch noted that their agenda began actually with commentaries from their association and discussed each one as written on said distributed agenda.

They noted their feeling on the newspaper article on SAT scores in Ocean County, their feelings on the high rate of staff absenteeism that occurred on Martin Luther King Day, discussed the reduced but still existing condition of political appointments, their support of a broad based study of school level staffing, the need for Custodial substitutes being available, the single annual retirement dinner for all retirees of the district, and inequities in student loading throughout the district. Each of these items were presented by and discussed by Mr. Lynch.

He next itemized recommendations from the BTASA asking for a study to explore greater budgetary controls by Principals by allowing the individual schools to put their allotted monies where they felt it was needed most, the need for instructional equipment, and the needed for availability of parking spaces at various schools for traveling supervisors and visiting central administrative personnel.

Mr. Roblenski noted that the Board will explore the legalities which may be involved with their first recommendation, and noted his regret that instructional equipment items are so frequently cut from requests in the budget because of CAP limitations. He also asked that the possibility of putting up signs in parking areas, where needed, be looked into.

At 8:40 p.m. Mr. Roblenski noted a coffee break would be allowed, and the meeting was resumed at 8:55 p.m.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting on Monday, February 13, 1984 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of discussing the withheld payment of Vouchers from the February 8th meeting, and approving payment of same if deemed appropriate.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Bell, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Tremper, and Mr. Williams (7:32 p.m.)

Also present: Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on February 9, 1984 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Roblenski announced that this meeting had been scheduled to discuss payment of vouchers withheld at the meeting on February 8, 1984 and asked Mr. Bell to present his views on the discrepancies he alleged were on the bill list. The first item to be discussed was the telephone bill, and how we can control the use of toll calls. Mr. Bell suggested a method of monitoring of phone calls be instituted.

Mr. Stutts had prepared a report explaining the breakdown of costs on a telephone bill and how there is a system in effect which does not allow indiscriminate use of the telephones by our employees. Most employees must go through the switchboard when making a toll call by dialing our operator who records and puts the call through for them. She keeps a daily log of toll calls which is filed with the Business Administrator.

The gasoline bill was the next item to be discussed, particularly the instance that the billing showed it was delivered by a truck whose meter was not operating. Many aspects of the subject of gasoline were brought into the discussion at this time including brand, octane, etc.

The subject of the telephone was again referred to and recommendation made the telephone company should be contacted to ascertain if they have available an unlimited message unit service for an account as large as ours.

The matter of the improper use of telephones at the radio stations by students was discussed at length and the two supervisors present noted what disciplinary actions have been taken. It was agreed by board members that their telephones are a necessity to their successful operation of the radio stations and that they should not be removed as previously suggested. Notation was made that the involved students would be suspended from the radio stations for the remainder of this school year and where possible the students will repay the Board of Education for their misuse of the telephones.

At 8:45 p.m. Mr. Roblenski opened the meeting for public participation.

Mr. Williamson, a member of the audience, asked a question of the Attorney as to how a 3-3 vote was classified as to its effect. He also asked how absentions are counted, whether or not they are counted with the majority.

A newspaper article on SAT scores was also discussed.

Another question regard the computer program not being available to students in the 9th and 10th grades next year was answered by Dr. Aragona.

Attendance Policy and possible revisions was next discussed after questions from the audience. It was noted that the policy since its implementation has had excellent results, and requires little modification.

At 9:45 p.m. Mr. Roblenski asked the board members for their closing comments, after which motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Bittmann and carried unanimously at 10:05 p.m. to adjourn this meeting.
