Present from the Board of Education: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Readell, Mr. Stites and Mr. Tremper.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Anton.

The Sunshine Law was read by a member of the Township Council staff.

After deliberation on the 1984-85 defeated school budget, President Roblenski called our Board to order for the purpose of adopting the revised budget for 1984-85.

Motion was made by Mrs. Benton and seconded by Mrs. DeConde to accept a reduction in the amount to be raised by taxes in the amount of \$432,000. A roll call was taken with unanimous approval.

The 1984-85 school budget which was adopted is as follows:

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting on Tuesday, April 24, 1984 for the purpose of discussing asbestos and to discuss litigation at Brick Township Memorial High School. These meetings began at 6:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue. The Student Hearings scheduled to follow these discussion meetings were cancelled.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Readell, and Mr. Tremper.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton, Mr. Sendzik, Mr. RossNagel, and Mr. Ead.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on April 12, 1984 as follows: Board Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Roblenski announced that the purpose of this portion of the meeting was to discuss asbestos in our schools, and he turned the meeting over to Mr. Stutts who introduced Mr. Asbestos Bill Ross Nagel who gave a slide presentation on asbestos and gave his viewpoints and statistics on allowable percentages of asbestos and the many forms it comes in. He compared medical statistics of lung disease due to asbestos with those due to cigarette smoking. He reported on the testing done by his company in our schools.

Questions were asked and answered from members of the audience, and Mr. Ross Nagel described the many ways that asbestos testings had been done. Mr. Tremper suggested that a progress report be included on future agenda (to be given verbally by Mr. Stutts) to keep parents up-to-date on the asbestos situation. It was agreed by attending board members that they would follow the advice of Mr. Ross Nagel and stay on the summer schedule for removal of asbestos in the schools involved.

At 8:00 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed Closed session for the purpose of discussing matters involving Session litigation and Memorial High School. Motion was made by Mrs. DeConde, seconded by Mrs. Benton and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

A recess was called, and the meeting resumed at 8:15 p.m. at which time it was turned over to Mr. Anton for his presentation on the updating of information on the litigation for Memorial High School.

Litigation

Mr. Anton discussed a possible settlement with one of the contractors involved in the litigation for Memorial High School giving figures on costs to date, including legal and consultant fees and the alternatives to settlement that we may incur if we go to court. At the completion of this discussion, and a summary of possible costs and possible amounts of settlement, it was agreed that after meetings to be held on Thursday and Friday (April 26 and 27), if he deemed them possibly acceptable by this Board of Education that he will prepare settlement figures and come back to the Board at a Special Meeting for board approval or disapproval.

At 9:15 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Tremper, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

Resolution

WHEREAS, as of April 1, 1983, the position of Director of Pupil Personnel Services was established by this Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, the job description for said position is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has consulted with its Administrators for advice and recommendations as to the education needs of the district; and

WHEREAS, it is the considered decision of the Board of Education that in providing a thorough and efficient education for the students of the district and for the mutual benefit of the school system, the students and the community, and the collective benefits thereof, that the position be abolished.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS BOARD OF EDUCATION AS FOLLOWS:

Pursuant to the New Jersey Statutes and the Rules and Regulations contained in the New Jersey Administrative Code that the position of Director of Pupil Personnel Service be abolished effective June 30, 1984.

Resolution

WHEREAS, as of April 1, 1983, the position of Director of Pupil

Personnel Service was established by this Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Frank Racanelli was appointed to that position and has served in that position until this date; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has consulted with its Administrators for advice and recommendations as to the needs of the system of Education; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid position has been abolished by a Resolution duly adopted by this Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, the reasons and rationale for said abolishment as set forth in the aforementioned Resolution be included as though fully set forth at length.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS BOARD OF EDUCATION AS FOLLOWS:

1. Pursuant to the New Jersey Statutes and the Rules and Regulations contained in the New Jersey Administrative Code that the aforesaid Mr. Frank Racanelli be terminated in the position of Director of Pupil Personnel Services as of June 30, 1984, and that said employment will not be offered in the 1984-85 calendar year and that he may within 15 days request in writing a statement of reasons for such nonemployment pursuant to and in accordance with N.J.S.A. 18A:27-3.2; and

2. That the employee be restored to his previous position.

Mr. Bell asked many questions with regard to the rationale for these proposals. Mr. Wolf replied and noted that the position requires someone in it with the necessary background, experience and certification. Mr. Bell continued with other areas that he wished clarification on and Mr. Wolf explained, at length, the reasons for these proposed actions.

Mr. Stites also asked questions and Mr. Wolf also replied to him giving him the information requested.

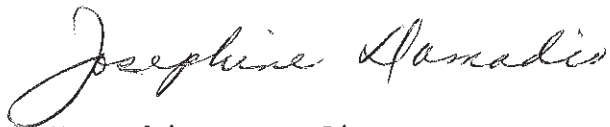

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Student Hearing at 6:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue on Tuesday, May 1, 1984 followed by their pre-agenda meeting held for the purpose of discussing and/or acting upon items submitted to them for the Action Agenda.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mr. Bell, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Readell, Mr. Stites and Mr. Tremper.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Anton.

At 7:30 p.m. Mr. Stutts announced that the pre-agenda meeting was declared open and noted that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on April 26, 1984 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Immediately thereafter a resolution was read and again approved to go back into closed session to complete the Student Hearing begun at 6:30 p.m. Mrs. Benton had proposed the resolution, Mr. Tremper seconded same and it carried unanimously.

At 7:35 p.m. the pre-agenda was presented for discussion, and all members agreed that they had no problems with Minutes listed on page 1.

The item with regard to Township cleanup program was discussed and direction given Mr. Stutts to reply to correspondence in this regard. Mr. Stutts was also directed to communicate with Township members with regard to the proposed new field construction and renovation in conjunction with the municipal government. It was directed that a meeting should be set up with our Buildings and Grounds Committee to discuss this item further, and also, as per Mr. Tremper's request, that this Committee should find out how much this will cost the Board of Education. Hopefully, this information will be complete and in report form for the Committee Meeting on May 15th.

At 7:50 p.m. Mrs. DeConde made a motion to approve the resolution to return to closed session for the purpose of finalizing the Student Hearing begun earlier this evening. Mr. Tremper seconded the resolution and it carried unanimously.

Mr. Anton and the student's attorney discussed the charges and the recommendations of the Board of Education which were agreeable to the student's attorney, the student and the parent present (Mother). The student was cautioned about his behavior, and the provisions set forth by the Board of Education for the student to return to class on May 2nd.

At 8:20 p.m. the open session was returned to.

Items under Curriculum and Instruction were reviewed. Mr. Bell requested that a report be prepared showing how many students are involved in the alcoholic program referred to. Mr. Anton commented on the agreement to be signed in regard to this program and noted he has some suggestions as to changes he feels should be incorporated in same.

The next item was to discuss Special Education Curriculum and finance. Mr. Wolf gave a financial report on the monies received and the monies spent. Many areas of concerns entered into this discussion and Mr. Wolf answered in detail to each and every item questioned.

At this time Mr. Anton read a resolution with regard to the Student Hearing conducted earlier this evening. Motion was made by Mr. Tremper, seconded by Mr. Readel and carried unanimously by roll call vote to move the resolution as read by Mr. Anton. (Resolution will be recorded at the end of these minutes.)

The voucher to be paid were next on the pre-agenda. Mr. Bell questioned one item on the bill list dealing with legal fees. Mr. Stutts noted that bid items, not available tonight, will be included on the Action Agenda for May 9th. These will include Band Uniforms, Teaching Supplies, Athletic Supplies, and possibly other. Mr. Stutts also noted that we had only appointed our banks until June 30, 1984 at our Organization Meeting, and requested board direction on this item. It was agreed that contact should be made with other banks to see what other banks may be offering.

Mr. Stutts also noted that Mr. Lofberg had completed the specifications for the insurance bid which Mr. Stutts would like to have returned on May 31st. This was further discussed and direction given that the Insurance Committee should discuss the specifications before they are prepared for distribution to the insurance companies for bid. Mr. Stutts noted that this could delay the date for receipt of the bids, as insurance companies will require time to review and prepare bids.

The next category to be reviewed was Teaching Personnel. Dr. Aragona asked that board members read the items and if there were any questions on specific motions they would be answered. One motion was revised, because the original intent had been moved on April 30th, to create the position of Director of Special Education Services. Notation was also made that an idea would be included on the Action Agenda to abolish the position of Audio-Visual Coordinator effective July 1, 1984. One item on an employee's request for board consideration for partial payment of his salary for the period he was out due to family illness was discussed at length from many angles and a consensus vote taken to pay him (RS) a partial salary had the following result: Mr. Bell-yes; Mrs. Benton-no; Mrs. DeConde-no; Mr. Readel-yes; Mr. Stites-yes; Mr. Tremper-yes; and Mr. Roblenski-no.

Non-Teaching Personnel was next discussed. The items requiring discussion included the creation of a position of Supervisor of Printing to be become effective July 1, 1984. After a very lengthy review of this item including discussion of the proposed job title, the costs of this proposed printing facility, the cost of equipment to be purchased, the possibility of leasing equipment, jointures with other districts to do their printing,

the exploration of possible use of the facilities of the Vocational School for our printing needs, and the proposed salary for the person supervising said facility, the Board took a consensus vote as to Mr. Bell's recommendation that this position not be created. The results of this vote was all noes to Mr. Bell's recommendation.

A consensus vote was then taken to approve tabling this item for further study and to remove the two items dealing with same from the Action Agenda at this time. The result was as follows: Mr. Bell-no; with all other members giving an affirmative vote.

Mr. Roblenski recommended that a Committee composed of Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Tremper with Mr. Stutts meet and discuss this matter.

The next item referred to a letter from TWU with regard to paid sick leave, teachers vs. TWU. After Mr. Stutts updated the board members, Mr. Bell presented a letter he had received from Mr. Leitz. A consensus vote was taken on a recommendation to meet with TWU representatives at the Committee Report meeting on May 15th. All agreed to this meeting with the exception of Mr. Tremper.

The update on Memorial High School Student Activities Accounts was briefly given by Mr. Stutts.

The Auxiliary category was next on the pre-agenda. Mr. Wolf answered questions on the bus time schedule for 1984-85 recommended for approval. An Advisory Committee for Special Education was also created at this time.

The school calendar for 1984-85 (proposals) was discussed at great length including suggestion calendars received from the BTEA. (Mr. Bell had left the meeting before this discussion began.) After many many thoughts were expressed, it was agreed by consensus vote that they would go along with the administration recommendation. Mrs. Benton did note that she wished to reserve her vote for further consideration.

Mr. Roblenski noted a letter from Mr. Cohen, Brick Township Hospital Association, requesting that our Band be provided for their July 4th event. Mr. Wolf also noted an addition to Field Trip requests..

At 12:10 a.m. motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Stites and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

RESOLUTIONSTUDENT
HEARING

WHEREAS, a student hereinafter identified as T.B. was a student at the Brick Township Memorial High School on April 4, 1984. Said school is located in the school district of the Township of Brick, situate and located in the County of Ocean and the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, said student was charged with the following: "Violation of School Board Policy No. 5531.8, truancy, unexcused absences from class and assaulting a teacher;" and

WHEREAS, student was referred to the Child Study Team; and

WHEREAS, student was afforded a preliminary hearing with Mr. James H. Wolfersburger, Assistant Principal, Brick Township Memorial High School, and Mr. Raymond K. Messemer, Assistant Principal, Veterans Memorial Middle School, April 5, 1984, at which time charges were discussed with said student and said student was given an opportunity to explain his version of the incident and advised of his suspension from the Brick Township School System pending a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, said student's parents were notified forth-with by telephone and regular mail of the incident and suspension pending a Board of Education hearing; and

WHEREAS, letters were forwarded to said student and said student's mother, dated April 15, 1984, giving notification of the charges and suspension on Tuesday, April 24, 1984, at 8:00 P.M. at the Administration Building of the Brick Township Board of Education, 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned letters advised said student and said student's mother of the right to have an attorney at said hearing and of the student's further right to cross examine witnesses to the incident and of the student's further right to the names of the witnesses to be used by the Board of Education, and the Board did in fact supply said names, and the nature of the evidence to be presented at said hearing, and the student's right to give testimony on the student's own behalf and to present witnesses on the student's own behalf; and

WHEREAS, both letters were forwarded by certified mail, return receipt requested; and

WHEREAS, the receipts were returned signed for, said communications indicating that same had in fact been received by said student's mother; and

WHEREAS, said hearing was adjourned and rescheduled for Tuesday, May 1, 1984 at 6:30 P.M. at the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matter on said date, May 1, 1984, at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented

WHEREAS, said student was fully advised of his rights and fully advised of the applicable procedural due process afforded to him; and

WHEREAS, said student and said student's mother and Steven R. Maslo, Esquire, appeared for and on behalf of said student and were given a full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question; and

WHEREAS, said student entered a plea of guilty as to the following charges: Violation of School Board Policy No. 5531.8, Truancy, unexcused absences from class and assulting a teacher; and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the aforesaid hearing: Robert Roblenski, President, Carol Benton, Joan De Conde, William Bell, James Stites, Harold Tremper, and William Readell, Board Members, and Dr. Louis Aragona, Superintendent of Schools and by statue ex officio Board Member; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education:

- a) Gave careful consideration to the Child Study Team report, dated April 25, 1984.
- b) Gave careful consideration to the competent advice of members of its administrative staff who appeared at the aforesaid hearing during its deliberations.
- c) Considered the past deportment of said student in the Brick Township School System and said student's background and potential and academic achievements; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Township of Brick considers the aforementioned charges as serious offenses that cannot be condoned which does materially and substantially interfere with the requirements of appropriate discipline and safety to the student and operation of the school system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that said student is to be returned to the classroom forthwith, on the following terms and conditions:

1. The Board strongly recommends and requires continued individual and family counseling until a recommendation is returned from the Agency that is performing the counseling that it is no longer necessary. As far as the juvenile is concerned, it is the understanding of the Board that he is presently under the aegus of the Juvenile Aid Bureau.
2. That the Child Study Team keep in contact with the Juvenile Aid Bureau and with whatever agency or individual is performing the family counseling and report progress periodically back to the Administration.
3. That the student's presence be limited strictly to the geographical area of the Brick Memorial High School except on authorized school activities.
4. That there be no further truancy.
5. That there be no further unexcused absences.
6. That there be no tardiness.

7. That there be an apology both orally and personally, as well as in writing.
8. That the administration will review the student's file for compliance at the end of the school year and that the attorney for the student and the parents understand and agree that this is in effect probationary and any violation of any of the above terms and conditions or any deviation from accepted behavior and all school rules and regulations will return the student for further disciplinary action by this Board of Education, at which time it will have every right to review and consider the student's entire record including the charges we are dealing with tonight.
