RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION
STUDENT

WHEREAS, as students identified as W.D. and E.W. were students at the Brick Township High School on March 22, 1984 and prior thereto. Said school is located in the school district of the Township of Brick, situate and located in the County of Ocean and the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, said students were charged with the following: "Possession of guns on school property and armed robbery of a student, off school property;" and

WHEREAS, said students were afforded a preliminary hearing with Bart H. Brooks, Principal, on March 27, 1984, Mr. Brooks advised that said students were suspended from school pending a hearing before the Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, said student's parents were notified forthwith by telephone and regular mail of the incident and suspension pending a Board of Education Hearing; and

WHEREAS, letters were forwarded to said students and said students parents, dated April 16, 1984, giving notification of the charges and scheduling a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education concerning the aforementioned charges and suspension on Tuesday April 24, 1984, at 8:30 P.M. at the Administration Building of the Brick Township Board of Education 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned letters advised students and said students parents of the right to have an attorney at said hearing and of the students further right to cross examine witnesses to the incident and of the students further right to the names of the witnesses to be used by the Board of Education and the Board did in fact supply said names, and the nature of the evidence to be presented at said hearing, and the students right to give testimony on the students own behalf and to present witnesses on the students own behalf; and

WHEREAS, both letters were forwarded by certified mail, return receipt requested; and

WHEREAS, the receipts were returned signed for, said communication indicating that same had in fact been received by said student's parents and students; and

WHEREAS, said hearing was adjourned with consent and agreement of all parties and re-scheduled for Wednesday, May 9, 1984 at 6:30 P.M. at the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matters on said date, May 9, 1984, at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented thereto; and

WHEREAS, student E.W. was represented by counsel, Robert Dikun, Esquire of the firm of Wilbert, Clynne & Montenegro, Spiral Drive & Burnt Tavern Road, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, said students were fully advised of their rights and fully advised of the applicable procedural due process afforded to them; and WHEREAS, said students appeared with their parents and attorney in the case of student E.W. who appeared for and on behalf of student E.W. and all parties were given a full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question; and

WHEREAS, said students stipulated as to procedural due process; and WHEREAS, the students entered pleas of guilty as to the following charges: Possession of guns on school property and armed robbery of a student, off school property; and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the aforesaid hearing: Robert Roblenski, President, Carol Benton, Joan De Conde, William Bell, Harold Tremper, James Stites, and William Readell, Board Members, and Dr. Louis Aragona, Superintendent of Schools and by Statute ex officio Board Member; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education:

a. Gave careful consideration to reports submitted by Morris Reby, M.A., M.D., dated April 24, 1984, regarding student W.D. and April 12, 1984, regarding student E.W.

b. Gave careful consideration to the Child Study Team reports concerning both students.

c. Considered the past deportment of said students in the Brick Township School System and said students back ground and potential and academic achievements individually; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Township of Brick considers the aforementioned charges as serious offenses that cannot be condoned, which materially and substantially interfere with the requirements of appropriate discipline and safety to the students and operation of the school system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the following action be taken by this Board of Education:

1. That the students will remain on homebound instruction until the end of the school year and be permitted to take their final examinations.
2. That the students participate in psychotherapy by a registered psychiatrist for an extended period of time at the student's parents' own expense and if for any reason the parents cannot afford this then the parents can avail themselves of the advice of our Child Study Team as to the source or place where this would be available to them. However, not at the Board of Education expense. Such places might be available such as the Ocean County Counseling Services, etc.

3. The Board of Education requires reports on attendance and progress, periodic reports at least bi-monthly, and these reports will be received by the Superintendent of Schools so the Superintendent of Schools can make the Board of Education privy to same and the parents and the students agree to execute any and all consents and waivers that may be necessary for the Board to receive said reports.

4. That there be a re-evaluation by a psychiatrist designated by the Board of Education for both students prior to the beginning

- of the September term and if the recommendation at that time by the psychiatrist designated by the Board of Education is that the students shall return to school, then said students will be re-admitted to the regular school program. Until that time said students shall not be permitted on school grounds for any reason whatsoever.
5. That the examining psychiatrist will receive a copy of Dr. Reby's reports. In the event that a different psychiatrist is utilized by the Board of Education.
6. Students and parents have agreed and consented to all of the above.

Motion was made by Mrs. Benton seconded by Mrs. De Conde and approved unanimously by roll call vote to approve the resolution as read by Mr. Anton.

At 9:07 p.m. Mr. Roblenski opened the meeting for public participation.

After answering questions from members of the audience on a variety of subjects, including award of bid for band uniforms, a motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting at 10:05 p.m.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, May 14, 1984 in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of discussing litigation at Brick Township Memorial High School, and discussing and/or acting upon a matter involving a board member.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Readell, Mr. Stites, and Mr. Tremper (6:32pm)

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Anton, Mr. Stuts and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stuts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on May 10, 1984 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Immediately following, Mr. Stuts read the resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing matters pertaining to litigation and Memorial High School. Motion was made by Mr. Tremper, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

Mr. Abbot Thompson of WHI was present at this time and gave a short presentation to update all members on what progress has been made to date in litigation proceedings. Mr. Anton also briefly referred to what could be expected to be discussed at this meeting.

At 6:45 p.m. the following people arrived for this meeting: Mr. Thomas Carney, Sr., Mr. Dave Kenny, Mr. Ronald Vaughn, Mr. Helmut Reich, and Mr. Barry Cohen. The tapes were running at this meeting and agreement was made by all that they would not be used in any part of any litigation proceedings.

Mr. Thompson first presented an update on deficiencies they determined were present. At 7:20 p.m. Mr. Dave Kenny spoke on behalf of Mr. Carney, rebutting many of the items referred to by Mr. Thompson. Mr. Carney also spoke at this time.

Mr. Barry Cohen was with the representatives of Vaughn Partnership and spoke in their behalf. At 8:00 p.m. all of this group left the meeting with the exception of Mr. Thompson and Mr. James Birdsell who had arrived late. Both of these gentlemen spoke on the discussions held this evening.

Mr. Sendzik updated board members on a meeting he had attended this date with regard to another contractor(B&S) on this project.

An attorney, Mr. Milton Gelzer was introduced to board members at this time. Mr. Gelzer was present for the item to be acted upon at the public meeting to follow.

At 8:30 p.m. Mr. Roblenski noted that the executive session was completed, and he opened the meeting for the public. Mr. Anton was directed to read the following resolution with regard to a board member:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, William M. Bell is a duly elected member of the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, William M. Bell has entered a plea of guilty to Complaint No. S168275 alleging that he did on or about September, 1981 to September, 1982, in the Township of Brick, County of Ocean, New Jersey, unlawfully commit a flagrantly lewd and offensive act which he knew or reasonably expected would be dangerous to E.N., a juvenile who is not a consenting party thereto contrary to the provisions of N.J.S. 2C:14-4; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S. 2C:14-4 reads as follows:

A person commits a disorderly persons offense if he does any flagrantly lewd and offensive act which he knows or reasonably expects is likely to be observed by other nonconsenting persons who would be affronted or alarmed. "Lewd acts" shall include the exposing of the genitals for the purpose of arousing or gratifying the sexual desire of the actor or of any other person.

and, WHEREAS, E.N. at the time of the offense in question was a student of the Brick Township School System although the offense in question did not occur on any school premises; and

WHEREAS, the Ocean County Prosecutor has filed an Order to Show Cause with the Superior Court of New Jersey, Law Division, Ocean County, returnable May 17, 1984, as to why the said William M. Bell should not forfeit his public office on the Brick Township Board of Education pursuant to N.J.S. 2C:51-2; and

WHEREAS, various members of the aforementioned Board of Education have received complaints from the general public indicating alarm and concern over the situation as stated herein; and

WHEREAS, all of the above could impugn the effectiveness and credibility of the Board in the performance of its duties,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS BOARD OF EDUCATION, that the aforesaid Board Member, William M. Bell immediately resign his position as a member of this Board and that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Ocean County Prosecutor and to the Attorney General of the State of New Jersey, Irwin I. Kimmelman, and in the event that the aforementioned Board Member does not so resign, let it be known that this Board supports the Ocean County Prosecutor in his effort to acquire forfeiture of the office in question by said Board Member and hereby authorizes legal representation by Milton Gelzer, Esq., for and on behalf of this Board to join with the Prosecutor of this County in his said effort to acquire forfeiture of this office and to be present before the Superior Court on Thursday, May 17, 1984.

Motion was made Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mrs. Deconde to approve the resolution as read by Mr. Anton. A roll call vote was taken and there was an unanimous approval of same.

Motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Stiles and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting at 8:35 p.m.

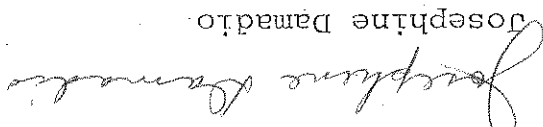
Mr. Roblenski announced the purpose of this meeting and asked if any board member had a nomination for the position of board member to fill the recent vacancy.

Mr. Stuts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing matters involving negotiations. Motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mrs. Deconde and carried unanimously by roll call vote to approve said resolution.

T.W.U.

Representatives of the Transport Union Workers were present at this time to discuss their viewpoints on the recently negotiated salary contract. Mr. Stuts read letters which had been sent to the Board about this matter. Mr. George Letz spoke to board members about their understanding of a conversation that supposedly took place during negotiations. Many negotiation meetings were referred to between the parties and statements made as to their individual understanding of what had been said at these meetings.

A suggestion was made that another meeting be set up with Mr. Calazzo present being he was the person present at most of the TWU negotiations meetings. At this time Mr. Roblenski advised the parties present that this matter will be rediscussed and if there is any change in the position of the Board of Education they will be so advised. He further said that if Mr. Calazzo wanted to he could contact Mr. Stuts for additional discussion.

At 8:07 p.m. this portion of the closed meeting was concluded and a recess taken. The closed session meeting was reopened at 8:20 p.m. for the purpose of discussing Professional Personnel grievances filed. These were presented by the

Negotiations and Grievances Committee, Mr. Stites and Mr. Readel. Three grievances were referred to and recommendations made.

At 9:00 p.m. this meeting was opened to the public. The first order of business was Business and Finance Committee reports. Representatives from The First National Bank of Toms River, Mr. Carl Berg and Mr. Bob Warner, were present to discuss their banking services. They gave a presentation on their services to the Board of Education and answered many questions from Mr. Stites in this regard. At 9:45 p.m. this particular phase of the Buildings and Finance Committee presentation was concluded.

Mrs. Benton next updated the board members on her Committee's accomplishments and Curriculum changes recommended for improvements for the students. She said she will give a list of her committee members to the Board. A second grade spelling bee was one of the recommendations made with regard to stimulating grade level competition. Thoughts were expressed as to having competitions in other subjects, having typing in the Middle schools, and the new computer program was referred to.

The possible need for portable classrooms on strategically located school sites was noted in order to remove the sixth grades from the Middle Schools.

Mr. Readel and Mr. Stites, Special Education Committee members, referred to their first meeting scheduled for June 11th. This meeting will be held at Brick Township High School and Ms. Debra Matrick from the Educational Law Center will be present.

Mrs. DeConde noted that the Board of Education will be receiving insurance quotations on June 8th. It was noted that the total amount of the bid has been decreased this year because we have self-insurance. Mr. Stites stated that he does not recommend a yearly possible switch of self-insurance. Printing services and a proposed trip to Willingboro in this regard were discussed. Mr. Stites is to prepare a cost analysis.

Mr. Stites in his Building and Grounds Committee report referred to the developments in the matter of HVAC at Memorial High School. It was noted that the Court has notified us that we have come to a tentative agreement and papers are being prepared for the Board for final execution of the matter.

Mrs. Benton suggested that board members should be taken on a tour of all school buildings, possibly on a Saturday, in order that they may have an idea of what each building is like.

It was noted that Mayor Newman had requested a meeting with our Buildings and Grounds Committee and it was agreed that Mr. Readell, Mr. Stites and Mrs. Benton would attend as board representatives.

Mrs. Benton spoke of legislation the board should consider, and referred to N.J.S.B.A. where we should seek passage of legislation to help school boards like ourselves who are in positions such as we had. It was agreed that it should be discussed at a future meeting.

Mrs. Benton further asked if board members could look at requisitions for items, before bids are sent out, in order to see if the materials are really needed. She also suggested that the Board consider a policy that a board member in their third year not be permitted to attend Conventions, and that no board member decides on their own that they are going to a particular seminar or convention.

Dr. Aragona noted that they are in the process of interviewing for the position of Director of Special Education Service.

At 10:50 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Stites, seconded by Mrs. Benton and carried unanimously to adjourn this meeting.

The Brick Township Board of Education held meetings on Tuesday, June 5, 1984 beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, for the purposes of discussing and/or employment of Personnel and to discuss the Pre-Agenda.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Stites, Mr. Readell (7:13 p.m.), Mr. Tremper and Mr. Williamson. Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Sendzik and Mr. Anton.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published Law Sunshine as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, and Brick Town News.

Mrs. Benton made a motion, seconded by Mrs. DeConde and carried unanimously that the Board of Education approve the resolution read by Mr. Stutts to go into closed session at 7:02 p.m. for the purpose of discussing a personnel matter.

At this time Dr. Aragona updated the board members on their search for a Director of Special Education Services. He noted that the particular person recommended after interviewing a total of 13 applicants had been asked to be present this evening for the purpose of allowing the board members to meet and ask questions of this individual. Dr. Aragona went on to list the gentleman's educational background and work experience with the State Department of Education. He also noted the salary that was expected for the position. The person Dr. Aragona was referring to will be able to begin employment on August 1, 1984 with necessary administrative certification for said position.

At 7:30 p.m. the scheduled Pre-Agenda Meeting was opened and the public notified that the closed session was not complete and at 7:32 p.m. the Board returned to the closed portion to complete their discussion. Many questions were asked as to applicants from within the system, etc. Both Dr. Aragona and Mr. Wolf answered many many questions in many areas, and at 7:55 p.m. the gentleman was invited into the meeting. He was introduced as Mr. Jim Richardson. He answered questions from board members relating to many areas including his experience, his places of employment and his reasons for electing to join the Brick Township Board of Education.

At 8:10 p.m. Dr. Richardson left the meeting and a discussion ensued Dr. J. as to whether the board members felt, after this interview, that he was the man for the job. A motion was suggested to employ this man if the board members were in agreement as to his employment. The members agreed that they were favorably impressed and that they were in agreement that Dr. Richardson should be hired.

At 8:23 p.m. the pre-agenda meeting was opened for the public.

Two students from Brick Township High School presented board members and members of the administration with their Yearbook.

Mrs. Miller spoke of the 9:30 a.m. bus schedule for beginning time for Veterans Memorial Elementary School and requested, if possible, that the time be changed to an earlier one. It was explained that this is a case of "sharing"; that each elementary school has had time changes so no one school is continually on an early or later schedule which may create a hardship for parents.

EPA

At 8:55 p.m. the agenda was presented for discussion. Dr. Aragona gave a presentation on the trip to E.P.A. in New York on June 1st, with regard to asbestos. He explained that EPA's concern is primarily "did you post notices to inform employees of its existence" rather than a directive to remove same.

Mr. Stutts noted that the firm of Anderson, Ballis and Lindstrom have prepared plans and specifications for the removal of asbestos and that necessary work will be bid and done prior to the opening of school in September.

Mr. Stutts discussed a letter received from an attorney who questioned buying a portion of our land in the Drum Point Road school area. The Board directed Mr. Stutts to advise that we do not want to sell and/or exchange any land at this time.

Agenda

Curriculum and Instruction items were next discussed. One item referring to the three year lease/purchase of 2 micro Host Computers and 82 terminals at \$200,000. per annum from Instructional Systems Inc. pending review of contract and bid specifications by the Board Attorney was discussed at great length. Mr. Murphy was present at this time and was directed to give our new members informational material previously distributed to board members. It was also suggested that our new members may wish to visit a school where this service is in operation.

A motion to employ an elementary instrumental music teacher for a summer program was discussed and agreed to.

A request to pay tuition for students to attend the Summer Arts Institute at Monclair State College was reviewed and denied. (Mrs. Benton had left the room before this discussion was begun.)

Items under Finance and Business were next reviewed. Mr. Stutts is to note the cost of the two used buses being purchased including refurbishing of same with the item on the Action Agenda.

The bids shown were questioned because they were not explicit as to what was actually being ordered. They were deleted pending review by Mrs. DeConde, with the exception of one for 2 Type B vehicles.

The next category was Professional Personnel. Unless there were specific questions on the pages in this grouping, the members continued on the following page.

At this time it was recommended that a formal motion be made and

acted upon with regard to the employment of Dr. Jim Richardson to the position of Director of Special Education Services.

Motion was made by Mr. Williamson, seconded by Mrs. Deconde and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education appoint Dr. James Richardson to the position of Director of Special Education Services for the school year July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985 effective August 1, 1984 at an annual salary of \$48,700. pro rata pending receipt of paper work with regards to administrative certification; said salary to be pro-rated for the eleven months of the contract.

Dr. Aragona was requested to prepare a profile on Dr. Richardson for distribution to the media and others.

An additional item with regard to monies owed two teachers for extra curricular work were presented and approved to be paid.

A request from a teacher for payment for sick days over and above those she had previously earned and used, with deduction for substitute pay, was reviewed and denied.

It was agreed that a policy should be formulated to cover these types of requests, and possibly the basics could be reviewed at a Committee Meeting.

Items under Personnel, Non-Teaching were next discussed. One item to approve Mr. Stuts as the Civil Service Appointing Authority was explained to the new board members by Dr. Aragona.

An item under Auxiliary to discuss the appointments of our Board Attorney and Board Auditor were the next to receive more lengthy discussions. Mr. Anton had left the room during this period. The Attorney's salary and added fringe benefits were noted along with his billings for particular extra services.

It was agreed that a Committee will meet with the Superintendent and Attorney to see what they can work out. The committee will consist of Mr. Tremper and Mrs. Benton.

In additional discussion regard employment of a Board Auditor, it was agreed, upon recommendation of the Superintendent, that the Building and Finance Committee set up meetings to review this position and bring their recommendations back to the Board.

Mrs. Benton referred to an item under Auxiliary to discuss a sample policy on convention attendance for School Board Members. She read some informational material from New Jersey School Boards Association on this proposed policy, and it was agreed that she should give her information to our Attorney for review.

Another item under Auxiliary to send two high schools athletes and their coaches to Los Angeles, California for Pre-Olympic Trials in the Intermediate Hurdles was reviewed and denied.

Present were: Mr. Roblenski, Mrs. Benton, Mrs. DeConde, Mr. Readell, Mr. Tremper (7:05 p.m.) and Mr. Williamson.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on June 7, 1984 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, and Brick Town News.

Mr. Martucci was present as the President of the B.T.E.A. and Mr. Roblenski asked him to begin his discussion of the agenda they presented.

The first item was on an agenda dated March 27th and referred to passing of the school budget. This is mute at this time.

Building conditions was the second item and this discussion was opened with references to problems still existing at Memorial High School. Both Dr. Aragona and Mr. Stutts answered questions on many rooms and areas of Memorial High School. Mr. Stutts also noted that plans and specifications are completed for submission to the State Board for approval and the work is expected to be done in the Art and Science areas before September of this year.
