Motion was made by Mr. Cevasco, seconded by Mrs. Russell and carried unanimously by roll call vote to approve the Resolution as follows:

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill A-2215 (Littell), Compulsory Interest Arbitration in Labor Disputes Involving School Personnel, represents a significant departure from New Jersey's well established policy on collective negotiations in public schools; and

WHEREAS, said Bill rejects the State's traditional opposition to public employee strikes as inimical to the interest and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, said Bill will severely undermine the entire collective bargaining process in education by replacing mutual and voluntary local agreements with Court Ordered imposed settlements; and

WHEREAS, the special needs of the school environment may not be given appropriate consideration by an interest arbitrator; and

WHEREAS, the Bill will allow an arbitrator who is not an

expert in education to apply a pre-established criteria without considering the special needs of each individual school environment in deciding a dispute; and WHEREAS, said Bill does not address the needs of a community to have a continuous thorough and efficient system of local education which is guided by the community's expectations and its ability to pay;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Brick Township Board of Education that they oppose A-2215 as it is not designed to promote the public interest or quality of education; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Governor, Senate, Assembly, Commissioner of Education and all local Legislators requesting that said Bill be opposed.

COMMENTS**

The meeting was opened to Board Members for comments. Mrs. Russell and Mr. Cevasco gave short reports on the Curriculum and Personnel Committees. Mr. Stites mentioned flags left out at night unlighted. This will be corrected. Mr. Stites suggested the possibility of obtaining our tax dollars from the Township on a basis where we would be making the interest on the money rather than the Township. Mr. D'Ambola suggested that the Finance Committee look into this.

AUDIENCE

A senior citizen stated his concerns with the recent 8½% raises given employees as he feels many senior citizens are struggling with the rising taxes. Dr. Aragona assured him that our budget is well below cap and the only true way to judge is to look at the per pupil cost. Our per pupil cost is much lower than other districts. Our students achieve about average of other districts with a lower per pupil cost. Mrs. Benton stated that this Board is not insensitive to senior citizens, but reform must come from Legislators.

Another member of the audience voiced his concerns regarding the Brick Township High School Girls' Track Team and he felt he was not getting answers. He was told to make an appointment with Dr. Aragona.

At the conclusion of the audience comments, Mr. Wolf asked to address the Board to rebut some of the comments which had been made. He stated that our kindergarten curriculum is constantly changing and improving, we have Goals and Objectives set up and he is sure that no one in another district would ever give an opinion of another district. He stated that he had met with the gentleman who had the concerns with the girls' track team twice for two hours each, plus four phone calls, and another meeting had been set up with the coach. Any letters or complaints that he receives he tries to take action on immediately. Mr. D'Ambola expressed appreciation for Mr. Wolf's comments and also thanked Mr. Mayer and Mr. Murphy for their input.

At 10:42 p.m., motion was made by Mr. Stites, seconded by Mr. Readel and carried unanimously by roll call vote to go into Closed Session.

The Resolution to go into Closed Session was read by Mr. Stutts as follows:

WHEREAS, C. 231 P.L. 1975, also known as the Sunshine Law, authorized a public body to meet in executive or private session under certain limited circumstances; and

WHEREAS, said law requires the Board to adopt a Resolution at a public meeting before it can meet in such executive or private session:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE BRICK TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT: 1. That it does hereby determine that it is necessary to meet in executive session on May 18, 1989, to discuss a personnel matter; and 2. That the matter discussed will be made public if and when confidentiality is no longer required and action pursuant to said discussion shall take place at a public meeting.
