AUDIENCE

Mr. Nadeo asked again about status of Budget review by County Superintendent. Mr. Stutts stated that our response to Council cuts was forwarded to Administrative Law Judge and he will have to have time to review and make his determination. Was answer received from New Jersey School Boards Association on questions raised regarding possible violation of Open Public Meetings Act at June 29, 1989 meeting? Mr. Cevasco stated that he called N.J.S.B.A. and they again responded that their duty was only to aid Board attorney and they could only go by their guidelines. Mr. Nadeo mentioned that at previous meeting Mrs. Benton had expressed concern about defining how and when public may speak at Board meetings. Mr. D'Ambola said Policy Committee is working on this. Mr. Stites of Policy Committee said he assumes that since no Board member has contacted him regarding changing the existing policy, they are satisfied with it as is.. Existing policy states that the public may only speak at the conclusion of all voting. He stated that past Board Presidents had allowed liberties under this policy. Mr. Nadeo stated that Mr. D'Ambola had previously stated that the public would be allowed to speak at Pre-Agenda meeting and was he now changing his mind on that.? Mr. Nadeo asked for a copy of the Policy Mr. Stites had referred to. Mr. Stites read the pertinent statements from this Policy, which stated, at the discretion of the President, the public may speak only after the business portion of the meeting. It did not specify Pre-Agenda or Regular Public Meeting. Mr. Nadeo will send Mr. D'Ambola something in writing regarding his concerns over this issue. Mr. Nadeo also asked if something had been done about looking in to the solvency of the institutions holding our investments. Mr. Stutts has assured the Board that we do not have investments in any of the institutions in question. Mr. Stites mentioned that he would like to have a report of ratio to capital of our institutions. Mr. Nadeo asked if he might be able to obtain copies of the minutes when they are available. Mr. Stutts said it is not the policy of the Board to distribute minutes to the public; however, they are always available to the public for review in the Board Office. If the public wants a copy of the minutes, they must pay for the copies. Mr. Nadeo also asked what the Board's position is on the State Board of Education program on teaching values. Mr. D'Ambola said no conclusion has been reached as yet, will be discussed for future. Another member of the audience asked for a report of classes with thirty or more students in them. Dr. Aragona should have this available for him at the next month's meeting.

RECESS

At this point a ten minute recess was called for. Mr. D'Ambola explained to the audience that after the recess the Board would be going into Open Executive Session and that due to the delicate nature of matters to be discussed he would ask the public to refrain from making any comments. After Open Executive Session the Board would be going into Closed Executive Session to discuss matters unrelated to the ones discussed during the Open Executive Session.

Motion was made by Mr. Stites, seconded by Mr. Readel to go into Closed Session. Before a vote was called for, Mr. Stites stated that due to the nature of some of the discussion which might take place at Open Executive Session it may prejudice his ability as a Board member to function as a Board member and he felt that it was necessary to go into Closed Session. Mr. Readel stated that he had asked at the August 10 Board meeting that the Board go into Closed Session at a future meeting for purpose of discussing substance of cover letter which all Board members and administrators received with respect to certain litigation which had transpired in the past. Since then he has been personally served with a summons by the staff member that he had intended to discuss at the Closed Session. If meeting is now going to be in Open Session, he does not feel he is protected from new litigation. He will not be able to participate in Open Executive Session and he again requested that the meeting be held in Closed Session. Mr. Collins stated this matter involved disciplinary action to be taken against an employee and by law a Rice notice was sent to this employee and the employee exercised their right to have the matter discussed in Open Executive Session. A motion to move this discussion into Closed Session would be a violation of the employee's rights. Mr. Stites stated since he also has been named as defendant in pending litigation to which Mr. Readel referred, how do they protect themselves, will Mr. Collins assume responsibility as their legal counsel during this Open Executive Session. Mr. Collins stated that it is his job to represent the Board of Education, but not on an individual basis. He pointed out that disciplining of an employee is a Board members' duty if they feel there has been a violation of employment relationship. Mr. Stites asked how does he and other Board members protect themselves during discussion of these matters. Mr. Collins stated that their protection is that they acted in their elected capacity. Mr. Readel asked if he understood the preceeding correctly, does this mean he would have to get his own legal counsel? Mr. Collins stated that not under every single circumstance does he represent individual Board members in their actions, under all circumstances he represents the body politic. Mr. Collins informed Mr. Stites that there was no way that this matter could be discussed in a Closed Session meeting, since it is the employee's right to chose open or closed session.

MOTION TO GO INTO CLOSED SESS. DEFEATED Motion to go into Closed Session was defeated with the following roll call vote: Mr. Stites, present, Mrs. Russell, no; Mrs. Benton, present; Mr. Readel, present; Mr. Leahy, no; Mr. Cevalasco, no; and Mr. D'Ambola, no.

MOTION TO GO INTO OPEN EXEC. SESSION Motion to go into Open Executive Session was made by Mr. Cevalasco, seconded by Mrs. Russell and carried by the following roll call vote: Mr. Stites, present; Mrs. Russell, yes; Mrs. Benton, present; Mr. Readel, no; Mr. Leahy, yes; Mr. Cevalasco, yes and Mr. D'Ambola, yes.

At this point, 9:15 p.m., Mr. Stites, Mr. Readel and Mrs. Benton left the meeting. Mr. Leahy stated that since the Board members who had wanted this, had left the room and Mr. Leahy had not had the intent to make this motion in the first place he felt that a motion should be made to go out of Open Executive Session. Mr. D'Ambola stated that he felt responsible to bring this matter to a conclusion and since the four remaining Board members had not been on the Board when the matter to be discussed had taken place, he felt he would like to get answers. Mr. Leahy stated that the original intent was to discuss disciplinary action to be taken and he would not be in favor of this. Mr. Leahy asked if we close this Executive Session does this put this matter to rest. Mr. Collins said there has been no action by the Board but there is nothing to preclude future action.

MOTION TO CLOSE OPEN EXEC. SESS. Motion was made by Mr. Leahy, seconded by Mrs. Russell to close the Open Executive Session. Before taking a vote discussion ensued.

DISCUSSION OF WHETHER THERE IS NEED TO TAKE ANY ACTION Mr. D'Ambola stated that it has been brought to the attention of the Board that disciplinary action may have to be taken on one employee. He would like some input from Administration as to their recommendations as to whether there is something that must be done at this point. If discipline is necessary he does not want to be remiss in his responsibility. Dr. Aragona suggested he consult with the Board attorney. Mr. Collins stated that there are no pending charges and someone in Administration would have to initiate action and the Board would follow the legal course of action. Mr. D'Ambola asked for further information on this from both Mr. Sendzik and Mr. Collins and Administration if there is an obligation to take some action.

She wanted this item to be tabled until a fourth objective could be established, especially since there was no mention of an objective for grade eleven. Dr. Aragona explained that some years we have more than others, but motivating force is not quantity, but

what we need for this particular exercise and he asked Mr. Mayer to explain further. Mr. Mayer explained that these objectives are due in to the County Office by September 30 each year. We only had four objectives last year because a fourth was added at the eleventh hour because it was realized that two schools did not achieve sufficient mastery of arithmetic skills at the third grade level and we were obliged to adopt the fourth objective because of this.

Mr. Stites stated that he would assume that these objectives have been devised by our professional staff, with input from administration who are looking at their goals and objectives and the County will be looking at them and he does not feel the Board should interfere, we should put our confidence in the professionals who devoted their time and training to develop these standards of testing. Mr. D'Ambola said he would like to see the Curriculum Committee give a report on these Objectives and possibly it should be tabled. Mrs. Benton asked if the due date of September 30 is irrevocable?

If so, maybe these objectives could be considered for next year. Mr. D'Ambola said a phone call to the State would get us an extension. Mr. Readel asked was this item on the Agenda last week, he was informed that it was, and he stated that should have been the time to discuss this. Mrs. Russell commented that it was a walk thru last week and she did not have time to review it for discussion. Mr. Stutts suggested that the Board adopt the three objectives tonight so that we may meet the State deadline for submission and then at the next meeting additional objectives or changes could be done, so that we could meet the deadline. Mr. D'Ambola suggested amending item (c) to read pending review of the Curriculum Committee. This was satisfactory to the Board.
