The Brick Township Board of Education held their Pre-Agenda Meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 4, 1989 in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick, N.J.

Present were: Mr. Stites, Mrs. Russell, Mrs. Benton, Mr. Readell, Mr. Leahy, Mr. Cevalasco and Mr. D'Ambola.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

Dr. Richardson was introduced to present the Board of Education with an overview of our Special Education program. He introduced Angie Finn who explained the Alcohol and Drug program. She mentioned that one out of twenty students will have a problem with alcohol and/or drugs. Ms. Finn outlined the various programs in which she counsels troubled children and the positive things that are being done. Dr. Richardson made a presentation to the Board regarding the Special Education programs that our district has available. He explained the Resource Room program and stated that the goal was to move as many children as possible back into the regular program. He mentioned that we have the only program in the area for autistic children. Project Return was developed to bring as many children as possible back into our programs instead of being sent out of district. This project saves money for the district. Dr. Richardson explained the concept of Modified Classrooms and he outlined the procedures followed when a student is referred to the Child Study Teams. Mr. D'Ambola thanked Dr. Richardson and Ms. Finn for their excellent presentations and for the help they are giving to the students.

The meeting was opened to the public and there were many questions, mostly dealing with the budget cut recommended by the Town Council. Mr. D'Ambola informed the public that it was necessary for the Board to go into Closed Session to discuss personnel matters, possible litigation and the proposed budget cuts. After returning to Open Session, the budget cuts will be discussed and the public will be given a chance to question.
