Present were: Mrs. Frake, Mrs. Riley, Mr. Schue, Mr. Hancock (7:45pm) and Mrs. Fox (8 pm)

Dunbeck Rd.

A resolution previously adopted by the Planning Board and sent to the Township Council was discussed. Mr. Berleth from Vaughn Partnership participated in this discussion; also, Mr. Anton gave his viewpoints on this subject.

Scoliosis

It was announced by Dr. Aragona that Dr. Laufer, Monmouth Medical Center, would screen youngsters, suspected of having Scoliosis, on March 17, 1979.

Mr. Dennis Berleth gave an up-date on the progress of the construction of the new High School. Problems in obtaining necessary amp service was discussed. Mr. Stutts advised of his contact with a Mr. Bruce of Jersey Central and possibilities of date of availability of necessary higher voltage service.

The next Job Meeting is March 7th; they are held the first Wednesday of each month.

The public was excluded while a personnel matter was discussed. Proper motions were made and carried for this action.

Mr. Anton updated his efforts with regard to a legal matter relating to a bid submitted for the new high school.

Mr. Hancock questioned why he has not received requested reports.

Definition of "flow-thru funds" was given by Dr. Aragona as funds coming from the federal government, to state to the school district for Special Education. The formula per classified child was explained.

Budget

The proposed 1979-80 School Budget was again discussed beginning with the 700 Account where the board had left off at their last budget discussion.

With regard to Instructional Equipment, it was noted that Principals have been requested to submit in priority order their preferences for next year. The need for replacement of high school lockers was also explored.

It was noted during a discussion of the 800 Account that Mr. Stutts has been previously authorized by the board to contact insurance brokers for estimates on necessary coverages.

While the 1000 Account was under discussion, a recommended new position was explained.

Camp Beadleston was mentioned and statements made that suggestions have been received with regard to salaries for this project. Mr. Hancock questioned the necessity for hiring certificated personnel to oversee this program.

Adult School Directorship received the board's attention at this time and the board members in attendance agreed to increases for the Director and his Secretary in the 1979-80 school year.

Development of fields received attention during discussion of the 3200 Account.

It was noted during discussion of the Debt Service account that we will make our first Principal payment of \$400,000. this year.

Public relations for the proposed 1979-80 school budget was referred to and agreed that no expenditure is being approved at this time.

Mr. Schue announced that the items dealing with salaries of the top Administrators would be held until March 6th along with an evaluation matter; that said evaluation should be brought by the board members to the March 6th meeting.

Charge of accounts for presentation of budget will be designated at our March 6th meeting at which time any questions board members still may have with regard to budget items will be further discussed.

Mrs. Frake briefly apprised the board members of her actions with regard to Bill S-1151.
