The concurred in a consensus vote taken that Mr. Stutts be allowed to proceed with the award to Student Benefit Plans of the bid for Athletic and Student Insurance for the 1980-81 school year, in accordance with his explanation of quotations received.

At 8:18 p.m. the meeting was opened for audience participation. Among the items discussed were questions as to the safety of the new high school, school hours for 1980-81 for Lanes Mill and Drum Point Schools, classrooms for the Exception Child, tennis courts and stadium for Memorial High, and possible referendum date if the board decides to have one.

Dr. Aragona advised that copies of the Facilities Task Force report would be made available through our school libraries and Township Library for anyone who cared to study same.

Mrs. Fox announced that the board would hold a work meeting on Wednesday, August 13th for the purpose of working on the report submitted by the Facilities Task Force.

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session meeting on Wednesday, August 13, 1980 at 8:00 p.m. in the Administration Building for the purpose of meeting with representatives involved with the construction of Memorial High School and a possible litigation.

Present were: Mrs. Fox, Mr. Bell, Mr. Bertrand, Mr. Donofrio, Mrs. Frake, Mr. Hancock, and Mr. Schue.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Anton, Mr. Sendzik, Mr. Vaughn, Mr. Reich, Mr. DeAntonio, Mr. Lieberman and Mr. Birdsall.

Mrs. Fox announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and Place thereof posted as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News on August 7, 1980.

Motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mrs. Frake and carried unanimously to approve the following resolution read by Mrs. Fox:

WHEREAS, C. 231 P.L. 1975 also known as the Sunshine Law authorizes a public body to meet in executive or private session under certain limited circumstances; and

WHEREAS, said law requires the Board to adopt a resolution at a public meeting before it can meet in such an executive or private session:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE BRICK TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That it does hereby determine that it is necessary to meet in executive session on this date, August 13, 1980, to discuss matters involving possible litigation, and (2) that the matter discussed will be made public if and when confidentiality is no longer required and action pursuant to said discussion shall take place only at a public meeting.

Mrs. Fox confirmed that Mr. Birdsall has been hired by the Board of Education to review our specifications, make an inspection of Memorial High School, and report back to them. Mr. Birdsall stated that he has been requested, on three occasions, by Mr. Carney's representatives to leave the premises. He gave the board additional information as to the dates, etc. Mrs. Fox stated that it is the intent of the Board to get Mr. Birdsall on said site, even if they have to resort to getting a court order to effect same.

A discussion followed as to what lines should be followed to overcome Carney's objection to Mr. Birdsall on the premises.

In answer to Mr. Anton's questions, Mr. Vaughn said there were

several avenues that might be explored as to getting Mr. Birdsall back on the site, without going to securing a court order. Mr. Birdsall could be made an agent of the architectural firm on behalf of the board, etc. He further stated that he would like time to reread the A.I.A. document, check the specifications, and investigate insurance coverages through his agent. He stated that this could be done within a day. Mr. Anton said we would provide his office with a certificate of insurance for Mr. Birdsall, and any other documents or instruments to allow Mr. Birdsall and the photographer back on the job. It was stated that it could happen that by Monday we may have to get a court order if cooperative avenues do not get the desired results.

Mr. Vaughn read a letter from Mr. Carney in which 13 questions were asked, among which was Mr. Birdsall's capacity, area or areas of his inspection, etc. Mr. Anton and Mr. Vaughn concluded replies to the various questions to be written to Mr. Carney.

Mr. Stutts was directed to get the necessary certificate of insurance for Mr. Birdsall on Thursday. Mr. Birdsall estimated that it will take him a week and one-half from the time he starts to complete his inspection.

Completion date for the project was referred to and discussion of previous statements of project being up to date and now the project is behind were questioned.

In the continuance of this discussion, Mr. Vaughn in a conversation with Mr. Anton, said they would prepare a letter of authorization to be hand delivered to Mr. Carney tomorrow, another letter replying to Mr. Carney's one with the 13 questions, include in correspondence that any personnel Mr. Birdsall may be required would also be allowed on project, and the possible setting up of a conference call to talk over any possible problems that may exist.

The board agreed in a consensus vote that if cooperative avenues did not result in Mr. Birdsall getting the required access to the site for his inspection that Mr. Anton should go for a court order.

The need to remove ceiling tile in the upper classrooms and necessary labor to remove same was discussed and it was agreed that Mr. Vaughn should notify Mr. Carney to have the perimeter ceiling tiles removed, exclusive of the outside walls by consensus vote.

Dr. Aragona questioned the possible labor cost to have these tiles removed. Mr. DeAntonio estimated a possible \$2,500. or more. If there are deficiencies found that must be corrected, the contractor would bear the cost of said removal; however, if it is found no problem exists, the cost would be ours. Mr. DeAntonio also informed the board members that the State Department of Education had inspected the project before the ceiling tiles were permitted to be installed.

Mr. Vaughn made a suggestion that he meet with Mr. Birdsall after his inspection to clarify, wherever possible, differences they may have as to compliance with specifications, deficiencies, etc. After a discussion of this approach, the board agreed in a consensus vote with the exception of Mr. Bell, to this informal meeting between Mr. Birdsall and Mr. Vaughn before Mr. Birdsall's report is submitted to the board. It was stressed and agreed to that Mr. Vaughn would in no way try to change nor influence items in Mr. Birdsall's report.

In closing remarks before this meeting was adjourned, Mr. Reich said, in answer to a question asked, that at this time he sees a two month delay in the completion of the building.

At 10:23 p.m. the building representatives left this meeting after Mrs. Fox commended them on the cooperative manner in which this meeting was conducted.

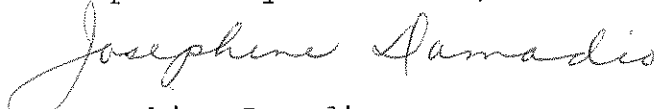

Present were: Mr. Bell (7:20 p.m.), Mr. Bertrand (6:40 p.m.) Mr. Donofrio, Mrs. Frake, Mr. Schue and Mrs. Fox.

Also present: Mr. Stutts, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Sendzik, and Mr. Birdsall.

Mrs. Fox announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News on August 18, 1980.
