Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of these meetings to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on November 24, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Immediately following this announcement, Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing a Student Personnel matter. Motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously to approve said resolution.

Items under Curriculum and Instruction were reviewed and direction given.

Under Finance and Business Mr. Tremper stated that he had reviewed the Vouchers and that same were in order. Mr. Huss was present at this time to review the 1981-82 Audit.

This was followed by a discussion of a grants program. Mr. Stutts referred to a course held in Washington, D.C. where someone from this staff could go and see what grants are available from foundations and other sources such as private industry, and charitable organizations. These would be other than federal, state, etc. The item under this category referring to a firm who has already made a presentation to the Board of Education with regard to securing grants was held pending research into the program Mr. Stutts referred to.

An item directing that purchase orders be submitted on a bi-weekly basis for review was discussed at length. All of the attending members agreed that the present format should not be changed; however they agreed that if the board member who had recommended the item to be included on the agenda still wants to discuss it further that it can be put on a discussion agenda on a later date.

The next item discussed was under Policy and referred to Policy No. 456 (Alcohol and drugs). There was a long discussion and viewpoints offered as to how some members thought this policy might be revised to treat incidents on an individual basis. Dr. Aragona was directed to confer with Mr. Sendzik and present a suggested revision of said policy for approval at our next meeting.

An item referring to staff communication with board members was discussed and it was agreed 5-1 that these employee groups should meet with a full board rather than with a committee.

The item on Policy 490 was held until closed session.

Auxiliary items were next discussed. Among the items reviewed and agreed to were the General Assistance Employment Program, the Youth Advisory Committee program, using an identification system for school equipment similar to the one used by our Police Department, cleanup of Brick Township parking lot by a handicapped student, (additional information is to be secured on this regarding supervision of student, nature of his handicap, etc.), alarm system for Memorial High School, and awards for students in sports programs other than Varsity.

At 10:30 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a resolution to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing items under Personnel, including a student matter request under Policy.

A member of an employee's family was present at 10:37 p.m. to make a specific request. She presented her appeal to board members. After she left, the board continued their discussion of her request and took a consensus vote as to whether they wanted same put on the next agenda for approval. It was denied by a 5-1 vote, and Dr. Aragona was directed to advise her of their decision.

Meeting

The Brick Township Board of Education held a meeting on Thursday, December 2, 1982 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue.

A Student Hearing scheduled for 7:00 p.m. was cancelled. The discussion meeting was scheduled to follow immediately after the Student Hearing.

Present were: Mr. Bittmann (7:45 p.m.), Mrs. Benton, Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Tremper, Mr. Donofrio and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Sendzik and Mr. Murphy.

Sunshine Law

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted on November 29, 1982 as follows: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Full Sessions 1983-84

Dr. Aragona stated at this time that he felt we could go to full sessions, throughout the district, for the 1983-84 school year.

Mr. Murphy was present with visual equipment to show board members the projections prepared by the Administration in this regard. He showed charts spelling out enrollment figures, average class size, number of rooms to be used for the various class levels, and class size range, high and low, for the Kindergarten to Eight divisions.

Mr. Murphy went on to present slides showing number of classrooms in each of the elementary schools to be available in September, 1983, and stated he felt we would be able to operate with a manageable class size in all schools. He also stated that it is probable that going on to full session will result in a possible staff reduction.

Mr. Murphy completed his presentation at 7:55 p.m. after which Dr. Aragona brought up the subject of selling Laurelton School. Mr. Bittmann volunteered his services to work on a committee for this purpose. It was agreed that Administration should proceed to advertise, or do whatever is legally necessary, and that Mr. Bittmann be appointed a liaison person to work with Administration.

Full Sess. Motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Bittmann and carried
Plan Appr. unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education approve that the recommended full session plan for 1983-84 be implemented.

Field Trip Motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Bittmann and carried unanimously that the Board of Education approve a Field Trip Request from Emma Havens Young School, 5th Grade Science class, to visit Ocean County Planetarium on December 21, 1982.

Policy
456.1 The next item that was discussed was one dealing with proposed revisions to Policy No. 456.1. At this time, after discussion of proposed

changes, as spelled out in the motion on the agenda, a consensus vote was taken with the following result as to approving the recommended revision: Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mrs. Benton-no; Mr. Roblenski-yes; Mr. Tremper-no; Mr. Donofrio-yes; and Mr. Williams-yes.

Mr. Wolf discussed a recommended assistance program in cooperation with the Ocean County Mental Health program to be conducted at Brick Township High School after which motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously to approve this pilot program.

Mr. Bittmann requested information on class sizes in the two high schools. It appeared to him that some high school classes were very small, and he wanted information as to why this situation existed. Dr. Aragona explained that this sometimes is the result of trying to balance schedules to even out a class size, program considerations, program/student considerations--students dropping subjects after a week or two of the semester start. A suggestion was made that it might be advisable to have students make their course selections earlier so that it could be better judged which classes did not have a large enrollment.

Dr. Aragona also advised that many of the classes are mandated, and must be available; however, he asked that the board make a decision as to which ones they would recommend dropped. Later in the closed session Mr. Wolf referred to these small class sizes and stated that many are necessary to aid the slow learner, who, too, has a right to an education at a pace he can handle.

At 9:00 p.m. Mr. Stutts read a motion to go into closed session for the purpose of discussing personnel matters, and an item concerning possible litigation. Motion was made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously to approve said resolution as read by Mr. Stutts.

At this time Mr. Stutts presented a request for a six-day leave of absence for Mrs. Ruth Smith, Cafeteria, without pay, from December 8, 1982 through December 15, 1982. Motion was made by Mr. Tremper, seconded by Mr. Roblenski and carried unanimously to approve this requested leave of absence.

Mr. Wolf brought back to the attention of the board members requests from two teachers with regard to use of personal days and days without pay, for the purpose of marriage. The Board had not gone along with these requests at the November 30th meeting; however, they reversed their decision and approved both requests. Mr. Williams suggested that possibly we should go back to where the Administration takes care of these matters on their level, and there was not stated opposition to his recommendation.

At this time the subject of policy revision and the particular student again came up for discussion. It was discussed at length as to whether the student should be punished for the full 90 school days or 90 days. Many felt that the policy change was necessary to put flexibility into it for the purpose of being able to have the punishment fit a particular infraction.

The motion that was discussed during the open session and approved by a 4-2 vote by motion of Mr. Donofrio and second by

Mr. Bittmann with roll call vote as follows: Mr. Bittmann-yes; Mrs. Benton-no; Mr. Roblenski-yes; Mr. Tremper-no; Mr. Donofrio-yes; and Mr. Williams-yes is as follows:

Move that the Board of Education approve on first reading, revision in the regulations of Policy 456.1, Item A. (8-e), "Students Under the Influence of Alcohol, Controlled Dangerous Substances, Chemical Substances and/or Compounds"; and Policy 456.2, Item B (1-e), "Use and/or possession of Alcohol, Controlled Dangerous Substances, Chemical Substances and/or other Chemical Compounds - First Offense."

The regulations cited above shall be changed from "A ninety (90) school day prohibition from active or passive student participation in extra curricular school activities" to "A prohibition of up to ninety (90) days from active or passive student participation in extra curricular school activities. Students may appeal in writing said prohibition to the Superintendent within ten (10) days. The student shall be given written notice of the appeal process."

Many more thoughts were expressed on this proposed revision, including those of Mr. Wolf. When Dr. Aragona requested recommendation from the Board regard handling the specific case referred to this evening, Mr. Williams stated that the matter should be left in the hands of the Superintendent to do whatever he see fit to do.

The next item discussed was a letter received from Mr. Schrader, J.M. DiGiancinto and Associates, Inc. regarding Brick Township Memorial High School ventilation. Mr. Stutts explained briefly what the intent of the letter was.

The next item for discussion referred to settlement of secretarial staff grievance regarding adjustments before Union election. Mr. Stutts read a letter from T.W.U. which stated their position as to amount of settlement expected by TWU, and Mr. Stutts referred to counter offers he had made to TWU. The matter was held for further negotiation of money figures.

Brick Township Memorial High School's Senior Class Trip to be held January 30-31, 1983 at McAfee was approved at this time.

Mr. Stutts also brought to the attention of the Board that Roller Forum had offered to donate ice-making equipment and a consensus vote was taken whereby it was unanimously agreed to accept same.

At 10:18 p.m. the closed session was completed and it was announced that we were now in open session.

Motion was made by Mr. Bittmann, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education ratify the contract between Brick Township Central Office Administration (BTCOA) and the Brick Township Board of Education effective July 1, 1982 through June 30, 1983.
