

Mr. Bittmann spoke of a large complex expected to be built in Brick, and questioned the impact said construction could have on our enrollment. Mr. Hancock replied that this type of building usually does not result in too many kids. Mrs. Fox said it is her experience that Brick is having an influx of older people. Mr. Williams offered that the cost of transportation to their places of employment from Brick deterred many from locating here. We are too far away from industry. Dr. Aragona said that in looking ahead to 1983 he felt we should keep Laurelton School to have classrooms in the "bank" if our enrollment should rise unexpectedly.

Mr. Hancock referred to acreage adjacent to Midstreams School which he thought might be wise to acquire by condemnation to also have land in "the bank" for expansion purposes if enrollment should unexpectedly rise. Mr. Hancock felt that our Attorney should be directed to look into how we might obtain this acreage. Mrs. Fox did say at this point that she believes it should be developed into a park for the township.

Mr. Wolf began discussion of various implementations of suggestions made this evening with regard to getting students off split sessions. He said we can bring back some of the students we presently send out of district, possibly 26, leaving approximately 31 which would still have to be sent to other schools. This would effect a possible \$120,000. savings to the district. He explained possible changes in Special Education, which could take care of some of our Special Education students within our own buildings. Savings in transportation costs would also enter the picture of savings.

Mr. Wolf continued his discussion explaining transferring students from Emma Havens to Drum Point, putting an Emma Havens 5th grade back to Osbornville. Class sizes were discussed as part of this plan being explained. He said that Drum Point would become K-6, Emma Havens K-6, Osbornville K-5, Midstreams K-6, Lanes Mill K-6, Veterans Elementary and Herbertsville also K-6. Some would have Special Education classes in these buildings. The 6th grades in these buildings might be on split session, and this would allow the 7th and 8th grades in Lake Riviera and Veterans Middle to go full time. These changes, if they were to go into effect, would result in a reduction of staff.

The next plan discussed would be the same as the first except that it would include the reopening of Laurelton School. However, we would still have classes with a student number in the thirties.

The third plan would have 6th grades split, but would not include the reopening of Laurelton School. This plan, if put into effect, might reduce class size to 27, with no class over 29, and it would reduce the number of possible reduction in staff.

Dr. Aragona expressed serious concerns about the first two plans, and their effect on our rating. He felt plan 3 had merit. We have 1600 students on split session now, and this would reduce that figure to 800. Mrs. Fox questioned the effect of adding a Cafeteria to Veterans Memorial on plan 3. She also had questions on our district classification.

She questioned why our entire district is so classified, when in her opinion, the County should classify school by school, not just one general one. She asked Dr. Aragona to write to Mr. Zach asking for individual classification of schools rather than district-wide rating. Dr. Aragona answered that this letter could be written but he was under the impression that the decision was made at the Commissioner's level, and also that if we are to split 6th grades as discussed, that move would put us back in the same classification, as previously.

Dr. Aragona stated we can go off split sessions. Decisions will have to be made. The concept of putting 8th graders in the High School could be explored, but he believes the leaning is not towards doing this. He also referred to the possibility of a prevocational program for middle school youngsters to be held at the High School.

Mr. Donofrio congratulated the Administration for the work put into putting these program suggestions together. He felt that we could run into objections from certain groups if we were to suggest putting 8th graders in the High School. Mr. Bell stated that he is opposed to the reopening of Laurelton School.

In an consensus type question to board members by Mr. Hancock, it appeared that all board members were in unanimous agreement to not considering the reopening of Laurelton School. The money to make the needed renovations to said building to house pupils would be a large sum. After it seemed that all agreed that we should hold Laurelton, Mrs. Fox stated she felt we really should try and sell this building. The conversation continued in this regard, and Mr. Hancock stated he felt if we could not sell it we should consider leasing it.

In answer to Mrs. Fox's question, statement was made that these reports were based on our December 31, 1981 enrollment report. She said she does not favor neither plan A or B, and that she has concerns with 8th graders in the High School. She wondered if some kind of a self-contained middle school within the High School could be worked out sometime in the future, if said plan was workable.

It was agreed at this time to meet on Thursday, February 18, 1982 to discuss the proposed 1982-83 budget. In the wrapup to follow, consensus vote was that all were in agreement with plan "C" (3).

Mr. Hancock asked members to prepare their suggested areas of possible cuts. He said he would like to review them, if possible, before the February 18th meeting, in an effort to see where board members were in agreement with certain line item cuts.

Dr. Aragona asked about continuation of the Additions Program, and he was advised that this could be handled at the February 10th meeting by the vote of the board on a particular motion in this regard.

Motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Williams and carried unanimously to adjourn at 9:50 p.m.
