The Brick Township Board of Education held a Work Session Meeting on Thursday, February 18, 1982 at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of reviewing the proposed 1982-83 Budget. This meeting was held at the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bittmann (8:27 p.m.),
Mr. Donofrio, Mrs. Fox, and Mr. Williams (7:45 p.m.)

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Mayer,
and Mr. Murphy.

This meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mr. Hancock and recessed immediately for lack of a quorum.

This meeting was reconvened at 7:45 p.m. by Mr. Hancock, after which Mr. Stutts read the Sunshine Law as follows:

The New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on February 11, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News.

Mr. Hancock presented board members and Administration with his review of plans presented by Administration to them on February 9, 1982.

In presenting same, he stated he aims to end split sessions by September, not to go over 30 students to a class, and not to open up Laurelton School again.

Dr. Aragona responded to Mr. Hancock's first question as to why plans had been presented without work copies to board members. Dr. Aragona explained that the figures presented were concepts and overviews prepared up until the last hour previous to the meeting that evening of February 9th and said presentation had been made to give the board members areas to be considered. He stated that the figures were not exaggerated, they were the result of findings of the Administrators who had put many hours into the preparation of same.

Mr. Murphy explained the reasoning behind figures shown as of March 1, 1980 as to capacity of named schools. He explained that these figures included the inclusion of a sixth grade in these schools at the time a referendum was being proposed and it was thought sixth grades might be returned to the previously K-5 buildings.

This discussion continued involving many other areas of concern by board members. Mr. Williams had a concern that if sixth grades are returned to the previously K-5 buildings that those students will be losing out on Shop, being as they would not have the facilities for same available.

Mr. Mayer replied that he does believe that we will not be hurting the sixth grade students, rather we would be accentuating other academic subjects at this grade level.

Mr. Williams stated his concern is for the quality of education.

The effects of the loss of the Additions Program at Lake Riviera Middle School was discussed, and Mrs. Fox stated that she had really believed in this program, but had to flex as it became apparent the need was no longer as bad for the additional classrooms as it was originally when the plans were first formulated.

She recommended that the material presented by Mr. Hancock should be taken home and reviewed more thoroughly by board members and discussed at a later date when board members were more familiar with its contents. This was agreed to and a date of February 25, 1982, 7:30 p.m. was set to continue the discussion of the proposed 1982-83 Budget and this report.

At this time the Budget was reviewed in the following areas:
400 Health was agreed to in its entirety.

500 Transportation - After areas of this account were discussed, it was agreed it was all right as is.

600 Operation of Plant - A review of telephone service costs was made at this time, also monies needed to care for the grounds around our school buildings. Mr. Williams also asked that improvement to building costs on a five year project basis be worked up. Substitute pay for Custodians as well as overtime for same was reviewed and \$20,000. was cut from the 610B account, decision to be made by Administration. The 600 Account Account is now all right, with the \$20,000. agreed to cut.

700 Maintenance - After a review of this account, it was agreed it is all right as is.

800 Account was also agreed to as is.

900 Account was cut \$25,000., leaving \$10,000. in this account.

At 11:00 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried to adjourn this meeting.

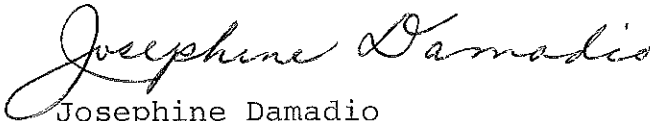

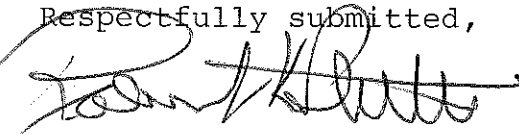

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Pre-Agenda Meeting on Tuesday, March 2, 1982 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building for the purpose of reviewing and discussing items presented for the Action Agenda.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Donofrio, Mr. Williams, and Mrs. Fox.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, and Mr. Anton.

The New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of any public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, The Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on February 25, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

The agenda was presented by Mr. Hancock for discussion by board members. The possible sale of Laurelton School was referred to and reference was made to a remote possibility that the district might want to reopen the school should our enrollment go up or to assist in getting the middle school students off split sessions.

Mr. Hancock recommended that an item be included on the next agenda to come to a definite conclusion whether the school will be offered for sale, lease, etc., or held for possible future school needs. The Attorney was directed to research and advise just what legal steps would be involved regard sale, lease, etc.

With regard to an item regarding property the Board of Education allegedly owns was referred to our Board Attorney for a title search.

Minutes were agreed to, and also items under Curriculum and Instruction. The items under Finance and Business were also discussed. It was noted that several vouchers would be ordered to be held pending additional information being gotten regard same.

The connection of the sump pump to the generator at Memorial High school was left on the agenda for public approval after the need for said connection was discussed at length. Mr. Bell said he thought possibly the architect should be responsible for this expenditure being it was their omission that it was not in the specifications prepared by them.

The burglar alarm system for Midstreams School was reviewed and it was agreed that additional quotations should be secured.

The request for payment of monies owed the architect was also reviewed and the attorney was directed to advise, after research, if the bill should be paid.

Items under Personnel, both Teaching and Non-Teaching, were reviewed and agreed to. The retirement of an employee under the Teaching section was discussed with reference what a great loss it will be to our district.

The Civil Service Audit and its financial effect on the budget was also gone over.

At this time Mr. Hancock set March 9th to hold a budget review meeting. The board reviewed the items under Auxiliary and also referred to the dates for future meetings.

The informational notice which came in from the State Department of Education advising of a cut in State Aid was reviewed and Mr. Hancock was of the opinion that The New Jersey School Boards Association legal department should be contacted to ascertain if this cut could be made at so late a date after most districts had prepared and advertised their proposed 1982-83 school budgets.

Mr. Stutts was requested to update his report to show what he expects the Capital Surplus to be on June 30, 1982.

At 8:50 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Donofrio, seconded by Mr. Bell and agreed to by all to adjourn this meeting.

The Brick Township Board of Education scheduled a Student Personnel Hearing for 7:00 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue to be followed by a Work Session at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of continuing their review of the proposed 1982-83 School Budget.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Williams, Mr. Donofrio (7:20 p.m.), and Mr. Bittmann (9:35 p.m.)

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Stutts, Mr. Mayer, Mr. Murphy, Mr. Anton, and Mr. Sendzik.

Mr. Stutts announced at the Student Hearing which began at 7:25 p.m. due to the lack of a quorum previous to this time that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of any public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on March 4, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

There was no determination made at the student hearing, and it was agreed to adjourn this meeting for approximately two weeks.

Following completion of above-referred to hearing, the Work Session for the review of the proposed 1982-83 School Budget was opened by Mr. Hancock at 8:45 p.m. He again took roll call, and Mr. Stutts again read the Open Public Meetings Law, as stated above.

The cut of \$738,000. in State Aid was discussed, and avenues which could be reviewed as to handle this additional money that now would be needed in the Current Expense budget to offset this loss. Mr. Hancock stated we now have \$995,000. in Capital Surplus, and felt that some of this could be transferred to Current Expense.

The balance left in Capital Surplus was a great concern to all because of the necessary repairs needed throughout the district, but especially in Brick Township High School, to prepare for the Middle States Evaluation. The Township tax rate and the impact of the school budget on same was discussed at length.

Mr. Stutts explained how the tax rate for school purposes is determined, and how the increase in the school budget would increase the rate per hundred of valuation. At first, before considering transfer of monies from Capital Surplus to Current Expense it was stated there could be a .60¢ per hundred increase in the tax rate due to the school budget. It was unanimously agreed that a question will be on the ballot for April 6, 1982 for the voters of Brick Township to vote on transferring monies from Capital Surplus to Current Expense. At this point the suggested amount was \$850,000.

Mr. Hancock asked members to suggest other cuts that could be made from this budget to affect an additional decrease. A long discussion followed as to the merits of eliminating split sessions in full or in part, with resulting increased class sizes. Mr. Hancock felt if we increased class sizes somewhat it could result in a substantial saving in teachers' salaries.

Board members and Dr. Aragona expressed their viewpoints with regard to this proposal. It seemed to be, however, the consensus of opinion by the majority present, that no definite decision be made now as to eliminating splits; that this decision could be made in June when the yearend enrollment figures come in.

Mr. Williams was concerned about teachers possibly losing their jobs. He felt that if we were able to get assistance from the Township with regard to the maintenance of school fields, being our grounds are used by the entire Township, that monies earmarked in the budget for renovation of fields could be eliminated and effect a decrease in the Budget. The meeting that had been scheduled with the Township Council this week was cancelled and rescheduled for mid April.

Dr. Aragona stated when the subject went back to split sessions and full sessions for the middle schools that he would, too, like to see full session for the district as a goal. He further stated that he is concerned with large class sizes. He noted that classrooms in the newer elementary schools are not as spacious as those in the older buildings, and that crowding could create an atmosphere not conducive to learning. He repeated that he would like to be able to make a decision in June as to whether we go on or off splits.

Mr. Donofrio agreed a decision should wait until June. Mr. Williams said he had misgivings about eliminating splits and going on full sessions if it meant increased class size. He referred to a situation in Lake Riviera Middle School many years ago when splits were eliminated in that school, and full sessions instituted, with the Principal complaining that the overcrowding resulted in a worse condition than the splits.

In reply to Mr. Bittmann's question as to what would happen to the quality of education if we continue on splits, Mr. Murphy explained administrative viewpoints why they opt for splits and lower class sizes. He emphasized the need for a teacher to be able to work with students in their early years when the basics are being instilled in the children. Larger class sizes do not allow a teacher that ability to work as closely with students as he feels is critical in the first three years of a child's life in school.

Again there was a consensus requested as to whether to make the decision this evening as to schedule full day sessions or continue split for the grade level in the discussion, and the majority agreed that a decision would not be made tonight, and definite plans will be presented in June.

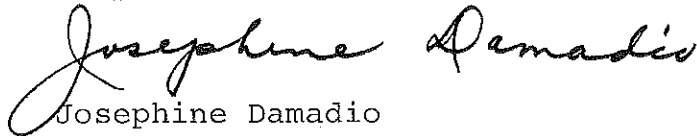
At this point the discussion went back to transferring monies by an item on the ballot for April 6, 1982 from Capital Surplus to Current Expense. Mr. Stutts recommended transferring the amount of State Aid cut by the State of \$738,000. to Current Expense, and eliminating the proposal on ballot for Capital Outlay in the amount of \$241,000., thus effecting a cut in the school tax rate.

These figures were changed back and forth as board members expressed concerns about leaving the Capital Surplus Account short in funds for the needed school building repairs throughout the district. It seemed that the figure agreed to at this point was to cut \$200,000. from the amount that had been originally been scheduled to have gone on ballot for Capital Outlay.

Mr. Hancock asked if the board members would agree to cut "x" number of dollars from the presented Current Expense budget and agree later where this would be taken from. It appeared that all wanted it left as is for now.

At 10:55 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Hancock, seconded by Mr. Donofrio with agreement by all to adjourn this meeting.
