WHEREAS, a student hereinafter identified as [REDACTED] was a student at the Brick Township Memorial High School on February 11, 1982. Said school is located in the school district of the Township of Brick, situate and located in the County of Ocean and the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, said student was charged with sale and/or distribution of a controlled dangerous substance and/or other chemical substances or compounds on school grounds on February 11, 1982; and

WHEREAS, as of February 16, 1982 student [REDACTED] was suspended from the Brick Township School System for the above set forth charges pending a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, student [REDACTED] was referred to the Child Study Team; and

WHEREAS, student [REDACTED] was afforded a meeting with Gerald J. Bittenbinder, Assistant Principal, Brick Township Memorial High School on February 16, 1982. There was no meeting or hearing conducted by the aforesaid Assistant Principal prior to February 16, 1982 as on the date in question the student [REDACTED] fled the school. The Assistant Principal notified student [REDACTED] father immediately on February 11, 1982 and February 16, 1982 was the date when said student [REDACTED] father, together with student [REDACTED] appeared to meet with Gerald J. Bittenbinder, Assistant Principal. At that time Mr. Bittenbinder discussed the charges with student [REDACTED] and gave student [REDACTED] an opportunity to explain his version of the incident. Mr. Bittenbinder then advised student [REDACTED] and said student's father of said student's suspension from the Brick Township School System pending a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Gerald J. Bittenbinder, Assistant Principal of the Brick Township Memorial High School, on February 17, 1982 by letter notified said student's father of said student's suspension pending a Board of Education hearing; and

WHEREAS, a letter was forwarded to student [REDACTED] and said student's father dated February 22, 1982 wherein student [REDACTED] and said student's father were notified of the charges against student [REDACTED] and a scheduled hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education concerning the aforementioned charges and suspension on Tuesday, March 2, 1982 at 7:00 P.M. at the Administration Building of the Brick Township Board of Education at 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned letters of February 22, 1982 advised student [REDACTED] and said student's father of the right to have an attorney at said hearing and of the student's further right to cross examine witnesses to the incident and of the student's further right to the names of the witnesses to be used by the Board of Education, and the Board did in fact supply said names, and as to the nature of the evidence to be presented at said hearing, and the student's right to give testimony and on the student's own behalf; and

WHEREAS, said letter of February 22, 1982 referred to herein was forwarded by certified mail, return receipt requested; and

WHEREAS, receipts were returned signed for said aforementioned communications indicating in fact that same had been received by student [REDACTED] and by the aforesaid student's father; and

WHEREAS, said letters of February 22, 1982 were also hand delivered to said student [REDACTED] and said student's father on February 23, 1982; and

WHEREAS, said student [REDACTED] and/or said student's father retained counsel, Thomas J. Gunning, Esq. of the Law Firm of Sim, Sinn, Gunning & Fitzsimmons; and

WHEREAS, said counsel requested a postponement of the aforementioned hearing date from March 2, 1982 to March 9, 1982 which was granted; and

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matter on Tuesday, March 9, 1982 at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented thereto; and

WHEREAS, student [REDACTED] was represented by counsel; and

WHEREAS, student [REDACTED] through counsel stipulated that he had been afforded procedural due process and had been fully advised of his rights; and

WHEREAS, student [REDACTED] and said student's father and Thomas J. Gunning, Esq. appearing for and on behalf of said student [REDACTED] were given a full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question, as to student [REDACTED] background and potential and as to any mitigating circumstances concerning same; and

WHEREAS, the said hearing was continued with consent of counsel and with waiver by counsel of the 21 day period required for a hearing from the date of initial suspension;

and was reconvened on Thursday, April 29, 1982; and

WHEREAS, said student [REDACTED] through counsel stipulated that he had been afforded procedural due process and had been fully advised of his rights in so far as all matters to that time and date but reserved the right to contest due process concerning the actual imposition of penalty by the Board; and

WHEREAS, said student, [REDACTED] conceded his guilt to the charge of attempted sale and/or distribution of a controlled dangerous substance, to wit, marijuana, on school grounds on February 11, 1982; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education

a) Gave careful and deliberate consideration to the statements made by the student [REDACTED] and by others who appeared for and on behalf of said student.

b) Made a finding of fact that said student [REDACTED] attempted the sale and/or distribution of a controlled dangerous substance to wit: marijuana, on school grounds on February 11, 1982.

c) Considered the findings and report of the Child Study Team with its attendant finding and classification of said student [REDACTED] as "Classifiable, [REDACTED]".

d) Considered the findings and report of Dr. Morris Reby dated March 9, 1982; and

e) Considered other matters admitted into evidence at the aforesaid hearing.

WHEREAS, based on said reports and evidence and based on its findings of fact made on the aforesaid hearing date of April 29, 1982 and giving careful consideration to the competent advice of its Deputy Superintendent of Schools, Warren Wolf; and considering the past deportment of student [REDACTED] in the Brick Township School system and student [REDACTED] background and potential and academic achievements and also considering the fact that said student [REDACTED] received a previous "Internal Suspension" (G.A.S.P.) for a period of ten days for the offense of smoking "pot" (marijuana); and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the hearing of April 29, 1982: President, William Bell, Anthony Donofrio, Carol Benton, Harold Tremper and Robert Roblenski; and

WHEREAS, only the same members considered the aforementioned report of the Child Study Team and other matters contained herein, no other members entering into said deliberations; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Township of Brick considers the aforementioned charge a serious offense that cannot be condoned which does materially and substantially interfere with the requirements of the appropriate discipline and safety to the students and operation of the school system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that student [REDACTED] be expelled from the Brick Township School System for the 1982-83 school year with continued homebound instruction for the remainder of the school year and without homebound instruction for the remainder of the expulsion period. Said student may apply for readmission to the

Brick Township School System for the 1983-1984 school year, subject to review and reconsideration of the Brick Township Board of Education. Said student is not to be permitted in the school buildings or on the school grounds, nor to ride the school buses or take part in any school activities.

The Brick Township Board of Education held their Pre-Agenda Meeting on Tuesday, June 1, 1982 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, 101 Hendrickson Avenue for the purpose of reviewing items for the Action Agenda on June 9, 1982.

Present were: Mr. Bell, Mr. Williams, Mr. Bittmann, Mrs. Benton, Mr. Roblenski, Mr. Tremper, and Mr. Donofrio.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts and Mr. Anton.

Mr. Stutts announced that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on May 27, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk and Brick Town News. Law

This meeting was opened with a discussion of a suggestion of putting tennis courts at Memorial High School. This subject was thoroughly explored from a financial viewpoint to the loss of student parking places. The possibility of working with a Township Committee to solicit funds for this proposed project was also discussed. Considering the financial aspects, etc. it was agreed that tennis courts would not be feasible at this time.

It was noted that a recently cancelled meeting with the Township Council Committee and our Committee should be rescheduled. Mr. Stutts should try to get a date convenient to both committees.

The upgrading of Osbornville School basement was the next topic discussed. Mr. Cramer's total fee of \$18,000. was thought high by many board members being he had, at one time, stated he would work on a .04+ percentage. Mr. Bittmann did request at this point that someone should ask Mr. Cramer for the plans drawn for the Addition at Lake Riviera Middle School which we did pay for.

Dr. Aragona was authorized to contact Mr. Cramer to question if his percentage can be lowered to the previously agreed to 4-4½%. If so, he would like to negotiate and contact the board for direction in order that he could move quickly. He feels that this work should be completed by September. If Mr. Cramer's answer is not agreeable to the board members, then it was agreed other architects should be contacted. Dr. Aragona is to notify, in particular, the Building and Grounds Special Projects Committee, and also attempt to try and get an extension of the time line for this project from the Ocean County Superintendent of Schools.

An item under Curriculum and Instruction regarding a HOSA trip to Chicago was reviewed and approved. Insurance questions were asked and seemed to be adequate.

The award of certificates of recognition to students of both of our High Schools was approved to be done at a public meeting.

Under Finance and Business, both Mr. Tremper and Mr. Roblenski stated they had made arrangements to review the vouchers.

A discussion of the designation of a bank depository was held at this time. Mr. Bittmann requested that the matter be reopened. Many members expressed their views on this change. After a review of what has transpired, a consensus vote was taken as to whether this item should be put back on another agenda for vote. It was 6-1 against putting this item back on another agenda.

It was agreed that the 1982-83 Tax Request Schedule be included on the June 9th agenda. After discussion, it was also agreed that the Board of Education will authorize the employment of an insurance consultant, Mr. Richard Loftberg, to review all insurance proposals to be received late this month. Mr. Tremper was the only "no" vote on this particular item.

Items under Policy referring to athletic competition dinner and/or banquets, and fund raising activities were discussed at length. Mr. Bittmann stated he wants to set a firm policy to cover these items so there will be only one standard. Mr. Bell stated he has hopes that these policy items can be set up and ready for approval possibly by the August meeting. He stated that policies must be read twice, first and second reading, so he would anticipate that these items could be fully approved no later than October this year.

By a 6-1 consensus vote, it was agreed to go along with Mr. Bell's recommendation. It was also unanimously agreed to wait for a policy to be written regard fund raising activities.

Items under Auxiliary were agreed to by all. Mr. Williams had suggested that the teacher authorizing a suspension be identified on the Suspension Report. After reviewing this thought, he agreed that it might not be the wiser move.

At 10:30 p.m. motion was made by Mrs. Benton, seconded by Mr. Roblenski and carried unanimously that the resolution to go into closed session, read by Mr. Stutts, for the purpose of reviewing items under Personnel, be approved.

A leave of absence requested by a teacher was approved after a lengthy discussion. Another item drawing discussion was the daily rate of pay for Substitute Teachers. By a consensus vote of 4-3, it was agreed to raise this daily rate to \$32.00.

The employment of a Board Attorney was discussed at this time. He was requested to leave the meeting during this review. A motion was made to remove the item from the agenda at this time to allow new board members to meet with him for the purpose of reviewing what has happened up to now with the litigation going on. It was finally agreed by a 4-3 consensus vote that the employment item remain on the Action Agenda for June 9th, and that the salary to be approved will be the same as for 1981-82, pending agreement with the Administrators for whatever percentage they will get. It was also directed that new members meet with the Board Attorney to review said litigation, and if deemed advisable, a committee member could sit in with two new board members, and then another committee member with the other new board member. Administration would be welcome if they wished to be present.

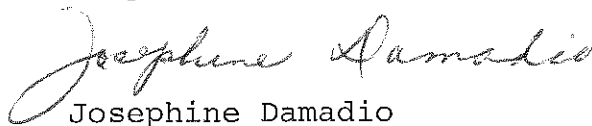
A request for a medical leave of absence from a teacher, in accordance with 18A:30-1 et.seq. was approved after discussion.
