Motion was made by Mr. Roblenski, seconded by Mrs. DeConde, and carried unanimously by roll call vote to approve the Resolution to go into closed session.

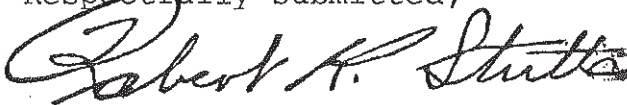
Mr. Seymour Kagan briefed the Board of Education regarding the status of negotiations with Teacher Aides.

Prior to beginning the Pre-Agenda Items, Mrs. Benton acknowledged two Fifth Grade students in the audience holding signs which read, "Put Williamsburg on the Agenda." Mrs. Benton asked if Mr. Wolf would please give an update as to the status of this trip. Mr. Wolf noted that a meeting has not been held regarding the Williamsburg trip so no final decision has been made. However, a meeting will be scheduled in the very near future and a decision made at that time.

WILLIAMS-

Mrs. Benton requested Mr. Wolf present the Pre-Agenda Items in lieu of Dr. Aragona being called away.

The first category presented was Curriculum and Instruction. Mr. Robert Horn, Representative of the Ocean County Vocational School, with Mr. William Henry, Superintendent of the Ocean County Vocational School, would like to take a few moments to address the Board regarding Vocational Education. The presentation would consist of approximately twenty minutes enlightening the Board of the future progress of Vocational Education and to share with the Board future concerns, curriculum affairs and a general update of Vocational Education. The Board was in agreement to meet with Mr. William Henry and Mr. Robert Horn. They will make their presentation at the Pre-Agenda Meeting scheduled for November 14, 1985 at 7:30 p.m.

C & I

Mr. Wolf next spoke about the filing of the ESL Education Program Plan/Update for the 1985-86 school year. At the present time fifteen Brick students qualify. Mrs. Noelle Muller, who is the teacher for English as a Second Language, works with the children and makes them a part of the learning process. He further explained that the school district files the applications and is then reimbursed by the State for no less than 60% funding reimbursement.

FINANCE
& BUSINESS

Finance & Business was the next area discussed. In addition to the approval of Vouchers were the intra-budget transfers for the 1985-86 school year which will be updated at different times throughout the school year by the Business Administrator.

A discussion followed regarding the approval for payment of finance charges for auto, fleet and liability insurance for the 1985-86 school year to the New Jersey School Boards Association Insurance Group. Mr. Stutts noted that he has written to and met with the insurance agent, Commercial Viking Insurance Company, about the Board's concern of a 9-3/4% finance charge levied against the Brick Township Board of Education by our own State organization. Commercial Viking explained that the insurance carrier, Marsh McLellan, did not have a surplus to fund the approximate twenty-seven school districts who did not pay their total premiums up front, thus these districts were being charged a finance charge with the understanding that it will be reimbursed to the school districts with interest July of 1986. This has been requested in writing.

Mrs. DeConde gave an update of a recent meeting with the Finance Committee, Mr. Serhus of Commercial Viking Insurance, Dr. Aragona and Mr. Stutts to discuss premiums comparing last year's \$80,000 to over \$600,000 for the 1985-86 school year. This is more than an 800% increase over last year which may cause a 3½¢ to 4¢ tax increase next year. Some considerations to remedy this increase were possible alternate carriers, changing existing policy deductibles, lower liability and exploring exclusions.

After some discussion, a recommendation was made to send a letter to Mrs. Hazel Gluck, newly elected Commissioner of Insurance, from the Board for any assistance legislation may possibly offer in this matter.

Personnel Teaching was reviewed and agreed upon. Item (h), negotiations and pending litigation, was being held for closed session.

Mr. Wolf requested that an item be placed on the Agenda; a request for leave of absence for child care with a replacement for this teacher to follow.

Personnel Non-Teaching was presented by Mr. Stutts and the Board was in agreement.

AUXILIARY

Auxiliary Items were reviewed consisting of reports, student enrollment, out-of-district placement of students, jointures and transportation contracts.

Mr. Wolf addressed the Board with a request from our three medical inspectors regarding reconsideration for their annual salary in lieu of new mandated sports physicals by the State which are more extensive. It was suggested that this item be held for closed session.

The State conducts a three-day seminar for newly elected Board members. Mr. Roblenski asked Dr. Aragona to make note at this time of a special upcoming event. Dr. Aragona noted under the category Auxiliary that the week of October 13 is going to be a very special week in that it commemorates Alpha Delta Kappa International Honorary Sorority for women in education. In Brick Township we have the Sigma Chapter. It consists of approximately twenty-five active women in education and the President is Mrs. Linda Starzman, a district teacher. Dr. Aragona introduced Mrs. Starzman who gave a brief explanation of the Chapter and distributed a pamphlet to the Board which further explains ADK. Dr. Aragona noted that a motion will be passed this evening proclaiming the week of October 13 as Alpha Delta Kappa Week.

Motion that the Board of Education authorize the filing of the ESL Education Program Plan/Update - 1985-86 school year.

Motion that the Board of Education approve the District Objectives for the 1985-86 school year as follows:

1. Ninth grade students (859) will demonstrate improved proficiency in writing skills by obtaining a mean score of 7.8 or better on the essay portion of the Spring 1986 HSPT, an increase of .3 points over the mean essay score obtained on the 1985 HSPT.
2. Ninth grade students (859) will demonstrate improved proficiency in mathematics by obtaining a mean score of 70 or better on the mathematics portion of the Spring 1986 HSPT, an increase of 6.2 points over the mean score obtained on the 1985 HSPT.
3. The mean score obtained by ninth grade students (859) on the inferential comprehension skill cluster of the reading portion of the 1986 HSPT will be 82.5 or better, an increase of 2.1 points over the mean score obtained on the 1985 HSPT.

These objectives were identified after a needs assessment using standardized test data. The standards were struck after an analysis of district, county, and state HSPT results.

Motion was made by Mrs. DeConde and seconded by Mr. Readell and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education approve payment of vouchers in the amount of \$3,118,969.64.
