At 8:15 p.m., Mr. Roblenski declared the Regular Public Meeting be adjourned, a fifteen minute recess taken, and the Public Hearing be opened at 8:30 p.m., as advertised.

Mr. Roblenski declared the Public Hearing Meeting opened at 8:30 p.m. Mr. Stutts was designated to present the proposed 1985-86 School Budget and after his presentation, the members of

the audience would be able to ask any questions on any area of the budget. Mr. Stutts stated that a copy of the budget was made available to the public and advertised in two local newspapers.

The proposed 1985-86 School Budget reflects an approximate 8½¢ tax decrease for school purposes. This has no reflection on the Township or the County tax rates. Mr. Stutts explained that the budget is made up of three sections: Current Expense which represents 95% of the total budget, and the remaining 5% for Capital Outlay which provides monies for remodeling to sites or school facilities and Debt Service which provides monies for interest and principal on mortgages for various schools. At present, five mortgages are still outstanding; Emma Havens Young School (will be paid in full October 1985), Lake Riviera Middle School, Veterans Complex, Brick Township High School and the most recent Brick Township Memorial High School. Current Expense is up 3% over 1984-85.

Mr. Stutts explained that on Election Day, April 2, 1985, three items would appear on the voting strip; Three Year Terms, One Year Term, and Current Expense, Capital Outlay. He explained that the first six candidates are running for three year terms, three seats are open, and candidate number seven is running for a one-year unexpired term.

One of the questions asked by the audience was referring to the revenues we are anticipating.

A Midstreams teacher inquired about the parking lot facilities for teachers. Mr. Wolf and Mr. Stutts met with the Township Engineer to see how best to handle those areas. It is being reviewed, however, there is nothing definite as yet.

There being no further questions from the audience, motion was made by Mr. Williamson, seconded by Mrs. Benton and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the Board of Education adopt the proposed 1985-86 School Budget as follows:

The next item dealt with the recommendation of Mr. Bart Brooks, Principal of Brick Township High School, to change the Eleventh and Twelfth Grade English Programs from a half-year elective format to full-year courses titled English III and English IV. The programs would be offered at two levels. Level A would be designed for college-bound students; Level B for students not planning to go on to higher education. Mr. Williamson asked how this would reflect on Brick Memorial High School. Dr. Aragona said that Memorial High School will continue with the same curriculum it has, the reason being two: (1) the recent change in principalship and (2) at that point in time we will be going through the Middle Atlantic States Evaluation and felt not ready to make the curriculum change there at that time. However, Memorial will be adopting the same changes in the following year.

Finance and Business was the next item presented for discussion. Mrs. DeConde noted a reduction of \$4.80 for the payment of Vouchers reducing the total to be approved for payment to \$2,966,395.70.

The Board of Education was requested to extend the Heating Fuel Oil #2 Contract for the 1985-86 SY with the existing corporation. Mr. Stutts explained that the prices we are paying now are lower than last year and we are guaranteed those prices keeping in mind that the price will fluctuate depending upon the tank prices

in Newark so there may be a price fluctuation during the school year.

Under Personnel Teaching Dr. Aragona announced to the Board that he is not recommending any Sabbaticals for this year as we had none last year. The items were presented and agreed upon. Mr. Wolf explained that a person was not yet named for an Assistant Coaching position because the posting was not completed as of this date. However since the season is underway it would be approved retroactively. (BMHS)

All items under Non-Teaching Personnel were agreed upon with an additional item added; that being for the approval of contracts of employment and salaries for the 1985-86 SY for all permanent and provisional non-teaching personnel as per list submitted.

Auxiliary items were presented and agreed upon with Mrs. Benton announcing the appointment of Mr. Roblenski as Delegate and Mr. Williamson as Alternate Delegate for the New Jersey School Boards Association to N.J.S.A. 18A:6-46.

An additional item was introduced for the adoption of a Resolution proclaiming the week of May 12 through May 18, 1985 as Special Education Week for the handicapped in conjunction with the New Jersey School Boards Association and the Association of Schools and Agencies.

1. No change in English 1 and 2. These are presently full year, five credit courses offered on three levels of difficulty: college prep., general and remedial.
2. Elimination of the junior-senior elective format with the exception of the following half-year courses:
 - a. ADVANCED PLACEMENT 1 and 2 - These would remain as free electives, outside of normal requirements, for senior who wish an additional challenge. Seniors may choose these courses in addition to or instead of, their regular English classes.
 - b. JOURNALISM-This course would continue as a free elective for sophomores, juniors, and seniors, and would tie in closely with the production of the school newspaper.
 - c. SPEECH- This course would continue as a free elective for sophomores, juniors, and seniors. There is a general feeling that today's students are not articulate enough. Good speech has implications for job opportunities, drama, everyday social relationships.
 - d. BASIC SKILLS READING-This course would continue of necessity, as it is a component of the state mandated basic skills instruction process. Students who fail the MBS test are required to take this course.
3. Replacement of the elective format with full year, five credit courses in English 3 and English 4, to be required of all students for graduation.

Whereas English 1 and 2 are offered on three levels, it is the feeling of the Department that there is no need for a remedial level in third and fourth year English. Therefore, English 3 and 4 would be offered on only two levels -3A, 4A for definite college preps., 3B, 4B for general, vocational, undecided students

English 3 would concentrate on basic skills in grammar, compositions and expression, coupled with a chronological study of American literature from colonial days to the present. Greatest stress would be placed on those works which shape or mirror important elements of American life. The difference between 3A

and 3B would be the quantity and quality of the work, and the pace of instruction. English 4 would continue to concentrate on grammar and composition, with much work devoted to the development of critical thinking skills through written expression. The literature segment of the course would deal with selected world classics which have influenced the thought and enriched the lives of mankind. Again, the A and B segments would be distinguished by quantity, quality and pace.

Motion was made by Mrs. DeConde and seconded by Mr. Stites and carried unanimously by roll call vote that the items A and B under Finance and Business, that the Board of Education approve payment of Vouchers in the amount of \$2,966,395.70
