R E S O L U T I O N

WHEREAS, a student hereinafter identified as S.E. was a student at the Brick Township Memorial High School on December 22, 1981. Said school is located in the school district of the Township of Brick, situate and located in the County of Ocean and the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, said student was charged with possession and/or use of a controlled dangerous substance on school grounds on December 22, 1981; and

WHEREAS, as of December 22, 1981 student S.E. was suspended from the Brick Township School System for the above set forth charges pending a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, student S.E. was referred to the Child Study Team; and

WHEREAS, student S.E. was afforded a meeting with Gerald J. Bittenbinder, Assistant Principal, Brick Township Memorial High School on December 22, 1981 at which time Mr. Bittenbinder discussed the charges with student S.E. and gave student S.E. an opportunity to explain his version of the incident. Mr. Bittenbinder then advised student S.E. and said student's father of said student's suspension from the Brick Township School System pending a hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, Mr. William F. Brouillette, Principal of the Brick Township Memorial High School, on December 23, 1981 by letter notified student S.E. and said student's father of said student's suspension pending a Board of Education hearing; and

WHEREAS, a letter was forwarded to student S.E. and said student's father dated January 6, 1982 wherein student S.E. and said student's father were notified of the charges against student S.E. and a scheduled hearing before the Brick Township Board of Education concerning the aforementioned charges and suspension on Monday, January 11, 1982 at 7:00 P.M. at the Administration Building of the Brick Township Board of Education at 101 Hendrickson Avenue, Brick Town, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned letters of January 6, 1982 advised student S.E. and said student's father of the right to have an attorney at said hearing and of the student's further right to cross examine witnesses to the incident and of the student's further right to the names of the witnesses to be used by the Board of Education, and the Board did in fact supply said names, and as to the nature of the evidence to be presented at said hearing, and the student's right to give testimony and on the student's own behalf; and

WHEREAS, another letter was forwarded to student S.E. and said student's father dated January 8, 1982 wherein student S.E. and said student's father were notified as to an additional witness and as to the deletion of a witness previously set forth in the aforesaid communication of January 6, 1982; and

WHEREAS, both letters of January 6, 1982 and January 8, 1982 referred to herein were forwarded by certified mail return receipt requested; and

WHEREAS, receipts were returned signed for all of said aforementioned communications indicating in fact that same had been received by student S.E. and by the aforesaid student's father; and

WHEREAS, said letters of January 6, 1982 and January 8, 1982 were also hadn delivered to said student S.E. and said student's father; and

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matter on Monday, January 11, 1982 at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented thereto; and

WHEREAS, student S.E. was not represented by counsel; and

WHEREAS, student S.E. was fully advised of his rights and fully advised of the applicable procedural due process afforded to him; and

WHEREAS, student S.E. and said student's father appearing for and on behalf of said student S.E. were given full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question, as to student S.E.'s background and potential and as to any mitigating circumstances concerning same; and

WHEREAS, said student S.E. conceded to the charges against him and his guilt of same; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education:

a) Gave careful and deliberate consideration to the statements made by the student S.E. and by others who appeared for and on behalf of said student.

b) Made a finding of fact that student S.E. possessed and used a controlled dangerous substance on school grounds on December 22, 1981.

c) Could not make any further findings at this hearing date because of student S.E.'s failure to report to the Child Study Team and, therefore, held everything in abeyance pending said student's submission to the Child Study Team and the receipt by the Board of Education of the report of said Child Study Team; and

WHEREAS, the Board received a copy of the report of the Child Study Team showing said student S.E. to be "classified"; and

WHEREAS, based on said report and based on its findings of fact made on the original hearing date of January 11, 1982 and giving careful consideration to the competent advice of its Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Louis Aragona and considering the past deportment of student S.E. in the Brick Township School System and student S.E.'s background and potential and academic achievements and also considering said student S.E.'s previous suspension for a period of ten (10) days for a similar offense; and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the hearing of January 11, 1982: President, Richard Hancock, Anthony Donofrio, Arthur Williams, Judith Fox and Phillip Bertrand; and

WHEREAS, only the same members considered the aforementioned report of the Child Study Team and other matters contained herein, no other members entering into said deliberations; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Educaion of the Township of Brick considers the aforementioned charge a serious offense that cannot be condoned which does materially and substantially interfere with the requirements of appropriate discipline and safety to the students and operation of the school system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that student S.E. be transferred from the Brick Township Memorial High School to the Brick Township High School and placed in a Socially Maladjusted/ Emotionally Disturbed class for three periods per day with the remainder of said student's schedule to be developed by the building Principal. In addition, said student will attend the Northern Ocean Counseling - on going participation. The above placement is in accordance with the Child Study Team report.

That the Board of Education accept the resignation of Lisa Dorritie from the Work Study Program effective February 16, 1982.

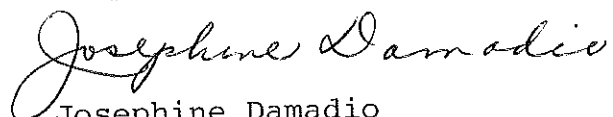

The Brick Township Board of Education held a Public Hearing on the Proposed 1982-83 School Budget at 8:00 p.m. at Veterans Memorial Elementary School, Hendrickson Avenue, on Wednesday, March 10, 1982.

Present were: Mr. Hancock, Mr. Bell, Mr. Bittmann (9:10 pm)
Mr. Donofrio and Mr. Williams.

Also present: Dr. Aragona, Mr. Wolf, Mr. Stutts, and Mr. Anton.

Mr. Stutts announced at this time that the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time, and place thereof posted as follows on March 4, 1982: Board Office Bulletin Board, Asbury Park Press, Ocean County Times-Observer, Municipal Clerk, and Brick Town News.

Mr. Hancock directed that Mr. Stutts present an overview of the accounts as shown in the proposed 1982-83 budget. After completion of explanations of necessary differences Mr. Stutts noted to the public that our State Aid had been cut in the total amount of \$738,377. and read a resolution to include on the April 6, 1982 ballot the following proposal:

Approve the transfer of Capital Surplus in the amount of \$738,377.00 for the purpose of reducing the tax levy of the 1982-83 school budget in the categories listed: (1) \$681,157.00 to the Current Expense Budget to support the 1982-83 reduction of State Aid; (2) \$56,169.00 of Capital Surplus be transferred to Debt Service Budget to support the 1982-83 reduction in State Aid; and (3) \$1,051.00 of Capital Surplus to support 1982-83 Capital Outlay Budget reduction in State Aid.

Motion was made by Mr. Bell, and seconded by Mr. Donofrio to approve the above resolution. A roll call vote resulted in a unanimous approval. (Mr. Bittmann was not present at this time.)

Questions were asked by members of the audience about petitioning the Governor of New Jersey about restoring this money to the boards of education throughout the State of New Jersey. It was noted that the New Jersey School Boards Association was actively working to get these monies back to the school districts. After a discussion of this subject, motion was made by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Donofrio and carried unanimously that the Board of Education adopt a resolution to petition the Governor of

the State of New Jersey to restore the State Aid, \$738,377. to Brick Township, and time is of the essence and all school districts are suffering and certainly the children should not have to suffer at the hands of the State government.

Many members of the audience asked numerous questions on the budget from the capsule version of said budget which had been prepared and distributed.

As the audience asked questions about various increases, board members attempted to clarify the need for same. At many times suggestions were made that the Board consider making cuts this evening. It was noted by some that the presented budget was needed to satisfy the needs of the district.

It was noted that it is absolutely necessary to conclude, this evening, the budget figures to be approved and submitted to the public on ballot for April 6, 1982. A thought was presented to possibly adjourn the Public Hearing for more review. Another thought expressed by Mr. Hancock was to approve the budget with a flat reduction of \$500,000. Other members in discussing this item felt they could not agree to blind cuts without knowing specifically where the suggested cut would be made from.

As audience members continued to participate in the discussion of this budget, board members and administration answered them.

At 10:55 p.m. motion was made by Mr. Bittmann and seconded by Mr. Bell to adopt the Budget as proposed, as follows:

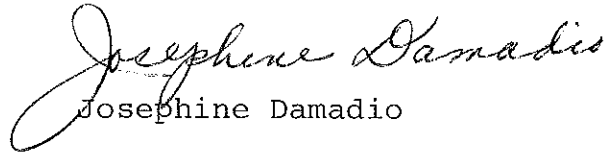

WHEREAS, a hearing was convened concerning the above matter on Tuesday, March 23, 1982 at the aforementioned location before the Board of Education of the Township of Brick; and

WHEREAS, a stenographic record was made by a certified court stenographer of which all parties were advised and consented thereto; and

WHEREAS, student D.D. was not represented by counsel; and

WHEREAS, student D.D. was fully advised of his rights and fully advised of the applicable procedural due process afforded to him; and

WHEREAS, student D.D. and said student's father and mother and others appearing for and on behalf of said student D.D. were given a full opportunity to address the Board as to the incident in question, as to student D.D.'s background and potential and as to any mitigating circumstances concerning same; and

WHEREAS, said student D.D. conceded to the charges against him and his guilt of same, with the exception of the word "forced" as set forth in charge 2; and

WHEREAS, the following members of the Board of Education were present at the aforesaid hearing: Richard Hancock, President, William Bell, Vice President, Arthur Williams and Anthony Donofrio; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education:

a) Gave careful and deliberate consideration to the statements made by student D.D. and by others who appeared for and on behalf of said student.

b) Made a finding of fact that student D.D. did conduct himself as charged.

c) Gave careful consideration to the Psychological Evaluation report dated March 22, 1982.

d) Gave careful consideration to the competent advice of members of its administrative staff who appeared at the aforesaid hearing during its deliberations.

e) Considered the past deportment of student D.D. in the Brick Township School System and student D.D.'s background and potential and academic achievements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that student D.D. be re-admitted to the Brick Township School System on the condition that said student participate in supportive counseling at the Northern Ocean Counseling Service, to which said student and said student's parents have agreed.
