PRESENTATION OF DONATIONS TO THE BOARD FOR THE TECHNOLOGY FOUNDATION

Superintendent Ritacco discussed with the Board the defeated technology question which appeared on the ballot during the last School Board election and how that defeat led to the establishment of the Technology Foundation.

Assistant Superintendent Bartlett discussed the importance of technology to this Board and administration, and the need to find a way to provide the children of this school district with technological advances. She pointed out that the defeated question was for \$1.2 million which incorporated the wiring and backbone for all the schools for immediate implementation in September of 1998. This project would have required outside contractors. We were not able to do it that way so we went back to the drawing board. At the last meeting, the Board of Education addressed spending \$100,000 and she believed that some people misinterpreted

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that to mean the \$100,000 we were spending represented the \$1.2 million and it did not. The \$100,000 was earmarked to provide just the wiring, no electronics. We are doing that in-house now rather than contract out which will postpone completion of the project for approximately nine to twelve months. It is something that is important and had to be done. Mrs. Bartlett explained how in addition to running the cables and wires, there is the electronic component of the infrastructure. These expenses will be approximately \$550,000. In the regular budget there were funds from the Distance Learning Grant in the amount of \$430,000. Those funds we originally intended to use to purchase desktop computers. To pay for the file servers and processing servers, we were fortunate to receive a \$200,000 Technology Literacy Challenge Fund Grant. These funds will be utilized to put the infrastructure into place. We also received \$58,000 from a Title 6 Grant. Those funds, which we hoped would purchase computers, will be put towards the infrastructure. We are very lucky though because after the technology initiative was defeated, the PTO's of the district got together under the direction of the Superintendent and the Board of Education and organized the district Walk-A-Thon for Technology which raised approximately \$80,000. In addition, the Superintendent and Board of Education have established a District Technology Fund to raise funds from the community from various partnerships to help us meet the goal of the technology initiative we have.

Superintendent Ritacco related that we are always talking about the importance of technology and no one would argue the need for more computers, more advanced teaching and curriculum, and the integration of computers with our curriculum. The problem is, it is very expensive and very time consuming to get it done. Superintendent Ritacco told the Board that we have approximately 18,000 students and each and everyone of them deserves to have our efforts placed towards preparing them for the future. With that thought in mind, the Board of Education has put together a Technology Foundation. Mr. Ritacco pointed out that we are not just soliciting business to help us from a financial standpoint; we are looking for partners who will help us with their business expertise.

Superintendent Ritacco introduced Representatives from United Water, Mr. Robert Senatore, Mr. Ed Humanick, and Mr. Rich Senatore who presented the Board with a \$15,000 donation to the Technology Fund.

Superintendent Ritacco advised that United Water will be working with the district in developing environmental programs.

Superintendent Ritacco introduced Mr. John March, Senior Vice President for Development, who donated \$5,000 to the Technology Fund on behalf of Community Medical Center.

Superintendent Ritacco was happy to announce a donation of \$5,000 from PNC Bank.

On behalf of the Toms River Education Association, Mr. Jay Wilkinson presented the Board with a \$1,000 donation.

On behalf of the Administrative & Supervisory Council, Mr. William Cardone presented the Board with a \$1,000 donation.

PRESENTATION OF THE 1997-1998 QUALITY ASSURANCE ANNUAL REPORT

Assistant Superintendent Bartlett presented the following verbatim portion of the Quality Annual Assurance Report to the Board and Audience.

"Good Evening! As many of you know, each year every school district in the state is

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required to compile and present a Quality Assurance report to inform the Board of Education, the County Superintendent of Schools and the public of the status of the school district. Each year as I prepare this report, I am struck at first by how fast the year went by, and then, as I begin to highlight the district's accomplishments, I am even more astounded by how many wonderful and exciting things occurred in a very short time. As I assess the district's efforts on behalf of our students, my appreciation for our remarkable and dedicated staff is heightened, and I am once again reminded that without their outstanding efforts day in and day out, none of these exceptional achievements would be possible. The students of the district, their parents, and the community can take pride in these achievements, and I am certain that they too appreciate the efforts and dedication of those staff members who continually give 110% to the 17,700 students in the Toms River Regional Schools district.

As many of you know, included in this report are the school-level objectives for the current year, the results of our 1997-98 objectives, and of student academic performance, the status of mandated federal and state program reviews, professional development initiatives, and parent and community activities which also contribute directly to our district's success.

The State Board of Education, recognizing the challenges students will face as they begin to take their place in our ever changing world, has adopted Core Curriculum Content Standards and cumulative progress indicators to address the status of curriculum, instruction, and assessment in New Jersey schools. These standards and indicators define the knowledge and skills that all students are expected to acquire by the completion of their public school education. District personnel have been working diligently to modify our curricular materials and instructional strategies to ensure that all students reach these high performance levels. Our school and district level objectives have been designed to focus on the Core Curriculum Content Standards and to facilitate staff participation in curricular revisions.

Our goal over the past two years related specifically to grades 5, 7 and 9 environmental education and the specific results of this goal by school are listed on pages 12-17 in this report. However exceptional these results are, in my estimation, they pale in comparison to the underlying outcome of this goal---exploring science instruction at all levels. This district wide review of science education has had residual results which we could not have imagined when we began this goal. As staff members worked through this process, and, as individual schools became involved with the specifics of this goal, a whole new understanding of science literacy emerged. Educating today's students so they will become a scientifically literate populace rests on the premise that science is an active process. Learning science is something that students do--not something that is done to them. To quote the National Science Education Standards, "Hands-on' activities, while essential, are not enough. Students must have 'minds-on' experiences as well." Appropriate science instruction assists students with skills of observing, inferring, and experimenting. Science also leads students to ask questions, construct explanations, communicate their ideas to others, identify assumptions, use critical and logical thinking, and consider alternative explanations.

With these new understandings of scientific literacy, staff members worked together to review materials appropriate for numerous levels of science instruction. In order to review materials appropriate for numerous levels of science instruction. In order to facilitate an articulated curriculum, staff from various levels met and shared perspectives. A new science program was adopted for grade 6 which represents Course 1 in a science program. Students will continue with Course 2 and 3 at intermediate school. Once again, appropriate articulation has been successful.

Teachers continued with their exploration of science materials at summer workshops

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and volunteers at the elementary level are presently piloting a number of different science programs--programs which they have chosen. Ongoing teacher dialogue within and between levels ensures that our science program will continue to evolve to meet the needs of our students and of society. Even though the time frame for this goal is over and the goal has successfully been met, the district will continue its work upgrading the science curriculum. As we begin on another goal, we do not consider our previous goal completed merely because we met the standard.

Our science goal had another most beneficial result. As part of our initiative to assist teachers with science literacy, the district contracted with the Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences Institute (EOHSI) which has developed environmental health education materials to address many pressing environmental health issues including solid waste management, water pollution, and other environmental risks and hazards. Through these programs students learn to take responsibility and to work on a collaborative basis to address environmental issues within a community. These training sessions, while excellent, were costly, and continuing to train other grade level teachers did not seem possible within our budget. However, through federal funds which have become available for environmental health education, we hope to continue this training. We have been working closely with the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry and it looks very possible that ATSDR, recognizing the value of continued EOHSI teacher training for our district, will be able to provide approximately \$48,000 to continue with this initiative. This special funding is another example of partnerships providing exceptional educational opportunities for staff and students.

These type of experiences will allow us to continue with our science curriculum work as we move toward our next two-year goal--Social Studies.

The social studies goal, which is specific to grades 6, 8 and 9 is designed to increase student awareness of the historical relationships that exist among cultures, those factors that can link or separate cultures, and how and why cultures have changed over time. As recent world events have highlighted, we live in an increasingly interdependent world. More than ever before in the history of the world, people from different cultures, civilizations and regions are connected to each other technologically, politically, and economically. As we move into the next millennium, our citizens will need attitudes and behaviors that recognize and promote interdependence and cooperation among nations. Learning about the world beyond the borders of the United States allows students to see things from the perspective of other peoples of the world. Hopefully, as student awareness of the diversity and cultural values of others increases, their understanding and appreciation of differences will also increase.

For this school year, in addition to the social studies objective, we will continue with the second year of a technology objective. During the past summer, district personnel have trained almost 800 staff members in the district's new Technology Training Center. This \$300,000, state of the art teaching facility, has been made possible through the donation of funds, equipment and services. Mr. Ritacco and the Board of Education, recognizing the high cost of incorporating technology into the facilities, have pursued alternate funding sources for technology. They spearheaded a Technology Fund and the parent-teacher groups raised over \$80,000 last June in the first annual district wide Walk for Technology. At tonight's meeting the district will be receiving other donations to this technology fund. Superintendent Ritacco and the Board of Education believe that when schools, parents, and businesses join together, we can contribute significantly to student success. Working in tandem, we can better prepare our graduates for their school-to-work transition and we can enhance the educational program

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and experiences for children by including the parents and the community in our educational endeavors.

As we said last year, the major challenge in technology, which this district is facing head on, is understanding where we want to go, why we want to go there, and how we can best get there within the funding sources that are available. Since we know that staff development is the most critical layer for successful technology implementation, our corporate training center is the hub of our technology plan. Staff development is as important to the district as the installation of wiring, hardware and software. Connecting all schools to the Internet is wonderful, but just getting on the information superhighway is not enough. While we have to address the logistics of wiring and technical concerns, we must also focus on the pedagogical and organizational changes necessary for success. Appropriate staff development will raise teachers' consciousness of the power of technology and will allow them to share with us the most appropriate classroom uses.

Just as staff development is an important component in technology, it is critical in other areas as well. And, just as we formed partnerships to help us with our technology goals, we have forged a significant partnership to assist us with our staff development goals. The Toms River Education Association has worked very closely with administration to provide professional development opportunities for staff. It is this spirit of commitment that sets Toms River Schools apart from other educational institutions. Not only did the teachers' association offer many professional development workshops pertinent to their members, they worked in partnership with the Board of Education and the administration to initiate NJEA's Family Involvement Training in Toms River. They have trained staff members throughout the district to present workshops for parents to increase parental involvement in the schools. The research about parental involvement is clear -- when parents are involved in their children's education, children excel. That is why the district is so grateful that the teachers' association is working so diligently with us to boost parent participation in and understanding of educational issues.

During the 1997-98 school year, working closely with the teachers' association, the district has continued to offer a comprehensive program of professional enhancement activities related to the implementation of school-level plans, the Core Curriculum Content Standards, and new courses and texts.

In keeping with our district philosophy to design professional development opportunities that are not only student-focused and reflective of professional needs, but also underscore the concept of collegiality, we have continued to provide released time to meet professional staff development needs. During the course of the school year, 1,356 professional days were granted. Our in-house programs have been grade, department, or K-12 curricular specific with three curricular areas receiving considerable attention - science, primary language arts and technology.

Another significant component of this report relates to the academic achievement of the students in the district. The School Report Card, compiled by the State Department of Education is sent home to all parents in the district. This school year, we expect that the reports cards should be available from the State Department for distribution in December. Some of the data on the report card deals with state assessments given in grades 4, 8, and 11. Last May all grade 4 students were administered the ESPA test in language arts literacy, math, and science. Each year it is anticipated that an additional subject area will be added to the test, either in spring of grade 4 or fall of grade 5. As of yet, we have not received any information from the state on the results of the grade 4 test, but when we do we will be sharing the results with the public. At the 8th grade level, 95% of our students exceeded the

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state standards in reading, 90% exceeded this standard in math, and 89% exceeded the writing standard. On the grade 11 HSPT 97% of the graduates passed this graduation test in all three areas - reading, math and writing. Presently the State Department is designing new assessment instruments at all three grade levels to more closely assess the Core Curriculum Standards, so our present students in addition to taking the EWT and HSPT are also taking the field test for the new grade 8 test, the GEPA and the new grade 11 instrument, the HSPA.

The Class of '98 distinguished themselves beyond their HSPT results. Of the 1047 graduates, 87% plan to continue their education, 85% at two or four year institutions. There were 340 acceptances to schools rated by Baron's as Most and Highly Competitive where superior students with very high SAT scores encounter a great deal of competition for admission. Graduates from the Class of '98 were accepted to many prestigious schools such as Columbia, Cornell, Princeton, the University of Pennsylvania, and Cal Tech. Not only have a majority of our graduates pursued higher education, but many return and tell us how well-prepared they were to meet the rigorous demands of their college courses.

Section VI of this report delineates all federal and state programs which have been reviewed by federal and stage agencies. All program reviews found the district to be in compliance with rules and regulations.

The final two sections deal with community and parental involvement - the cornerstone of all educational ventures. As I referenced earlier in this report, education is not a solitary venture and we in Toms River are blessed by the support and willingness of the staff, the parents, and the community to share in our educational endeavors. Brown University President, E. Gordon Gee, introducing a ground breaking report in March from the Annenberg Institute on Public Engagement for Public Education said, "The one thing that sets apart the thriving schools from those that are struggling is the support of the local community."

The support of the community made our \$21 million dollar building referendum a success and as you will see during Mr. Mullins portion of this report, the building projects have all been completed or will be completed for the next school year.

Pages 33 and 34 of this report outline community involvement activities for the 1997-98 school year. As you review this extensive list, one cannot help be struck by the wide variety of help we have from the community -- activities arranged by such groups as the veterans, the Network Officers, and representatives of Building a Healthier Ocean County. Our parental involvement initiatives expanded this year to include parental conferences at the elementary level and we continued our transition forums for students and parents entering intermediate and high schools.

On a personal note, this will be the last QAAR report that I will get to present. As I reflect on my last 30 years in education, I recognize how blessed I have been to have worked in this school district--for our main focus-our mission so to speak- has always been how to best serve the needs of the students of our schools. As educators, we must never lose sight of that mission and we must continue to provide students with the most exemplary educational experiences in spite of those naysayers who believe that this is not important or even possible.

Robert Fritz, the author of 'Corporate Tides: the Inescapable Laws of Organizational Structure', purports that organizations advance when a clear, widely understood vision creates tension between the real and the ideal, pushing people to work together to reduce the gap. In this school district the staff continues to work wholeheartedly to bridge the gap between the real and the ideal, pushing people to work together to reduce the gap. Proposed school

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standards and testing schemes must not let us lose sight of the fact that a long list of facts and skills is not a curriculum. Our vision must continue to include strategies for developing a curriculum which treats students as real people in the real world. James Beane in this month's Educational Leadership contends that curriculum should treat students with dignity. "We should ask that the curriculum bring our young people into contact with the most important and current ideas, through the best resources we can find...We should ask that the curriculum offer our young people a chance to critique existing knowledge and construct new meanings, accepting no fact as authoritative simply because it appears in a book or on the Internet...We should ask that the curriculum serve the best interests of our young people and our democracy and not be implicated in the ambitions of politicians or the profit desire of the corporate marketplace."

A curriculum should bring young people into their future -- confident in their ability to think and to make connections. Ladies and gentlemen, I have no doubt that the dedicated and committed staff of this district will continue to meet this challenge and maintain their vision of excellence. A climate for change exists and this climate will flourish because this district and this Board are willing to encourage experiments, to celebrate success, to forgive failure and to remain steadfast in our mission to make the impossible possible.

I will turn the floor to Mr. Mullins who will present the concluding section of this report."

Business Administrator Mullins, assisted by Community Liaison Officer Pat Hanlon, presented the Board and audience with the following visual display of various projects throughout the district:

(1) Intermediate West opened this past September with a nine classroom addition, (2) one of several projects approved by voters in the February, 1997 Comprehensive Building Referendum. (3) Students changing classrooms along this hallway are coming from (4) a science classroom shown here in August and (5) and today with Mrs. Milo and her students, (6) an art classroom and (7) one of several regular classrooms. (8) A new bus court was also built, (9) providing easy access for both buses in this lot and parents in West's original entry circle.

(10) At the district's Central Administrative Offices, (11) several special education and (12) child care classrooms (13) were completed this past summer. (14) Also included is an All-Purpose Room for gym and lunch play.

(15) Construction is continuing, ahead of schedule at the Joseph A. Citta Elementary School, (16) located on the west side of Route 9, south of Cox Cro Road. (17) The 850 student elementary school is due to open next September.

(18) At Washington Street Elementary School, (19) a new driveway was constructed from Washington Street. (20) The school now has its own gymnasium, (21) complete with a gym office and bleachers, and (22) a stage for all different types of programs and assemblies. (23) From the former All-Purpose Room, two thirds of the space is used for the lunch room. (24) The remaining space was renovated (25) into two teaching stations.

(26) Physical education and health facilities at (27) Toms River High School South are being expanded. (28) The facilities include a new weight room and (29) Ladies Athletic/Team room facilities.

(30) Students have returned to the district's oldest facility, the "J" Building. (31) Two

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classrooms are being used for (32) alternative school classes. (33) Another 3 classrooms are being used for special education (34).

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AGREEMENT FOR CERTAIN LEGAL SERVICES ADOPTED BY THE TOMS RIVER REGIONAL BOARD OF EDUCATION, IN THE COUNTY OF OCEAN, NEW JERSEY

Whereas, there exists a need for specialized legal services in connection with the authorization and the issuance of bonds and bond anticipation notes by the Toms River Regional Board of Education, in the County of Ocean, New Jersey (the "Board"), including the review of such procedures and the rendering of approving legal opinions acceptable to the financial community; and

Whereas, such special legal services can be provided by a recognized bond counsel firm, and the law firm of DeCotiis, Fitzpatrick & Gluck, Trenton, Teaneck and Toms River, New Jersey is so recognized by the financial community; and

Whereas, funds are or will be available for this purpose.

Business Administrator Mullins pointed out the historic lows being matched by interest rates in the public markets. He advised that it is fair to assume that the district could save in excess of a half million dollars. That money would be a direct reduction in the debt service payments that we will have to make, therefore, a reduction for the taxpayers of the district. Mr. Mullins indicated that along with our financial advisor, Public Financial Management, Inc. he supports the recommendation.

WHEREAS, school construction is a growing concern for school districts, and Board Members and taxpayers need to be given every cost savings tool for new construction projects; and

WHEREAS, school officials are currently required by law to take bids for construction contracts from both single and multiple contractors and are not permitted the option of bidding these contracts as single, multiple, or both as is permitted for municipalities, counties, and state and county colleges; and

WHEREAS, not permitting school districts the option of bidding contracts as single, multiple, or both often leads to school officials acting as the general contractor in dealing with multiple contracts and disputes which has resulted in higher costs for the project; and

WHEREAS, school districts should be granted the flexibility to provide for a construction method which is best suited for the needs of the project and the taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the NJSBA Delegate Assembly, at the May 1998 meeting, reaffirmed Association policy which states:

Construction Bidding Options

The NJSBA seeks to amend N.J.S.A. 18A-18 to permit Boards of Education several options in bidding construction projects: to prepare separate bids for each branch of work in a construction project; to bid for all the work and materials required in a single contract; to use "fast-track" bidding on construction; or any workable combination thereof; and

WHEREAS, legislation has been introduced in the New Jersey Legislature S-987 (Kyrillos/O'Connor)/A-2277 (DeCrose/Doria), to provide school districts with this important option and cost saving measure; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Toms River Regional Schools supports S-987/A-2277 and directs that a copy of this resolution be sent to all legislators representing the 9th, 10th and 30th Legislative Districts; and, be it further

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RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution also be sent to the New Jersey School Boards Association and the Ocean County School Boards Association.

9/22/98**Exchange Program to Germany**

This summer I was able to take part in an exchange student program to Grafenau, Germany. Grafenau is located in western Bavaria near the Czech border, about two hours from the large city of Munich. It is a small picturesque town right in the heart of the Bavarian National Forest. The program allowed me to live with a German host family, attend school at the Gymnasium (the German high-school) , and see the sights of Bavaria and nearby Austria through day trips with the program, and with my German host family. I was completely immersed in the culture of Bavaria, which is unique from that of the rest of Germany.

Living with a German host family was definitely the most interesting part of the trip, and I feel this is the experience from which I learned the most from. My family was the Haerings, who were extremely kind and helpful. The family consisted of Dr. and Mrs. Haering (he's a dentist and she helps in his practice) Cornelia, 15, twin boys Daniel and Dominik, 11, Elisabeth, 6, and Gertie the housekeeper. The house was very large and modern. I shared a room with Cornelia, which was new since I have not had to share a room since I was nine. It was a little crowded sometimes, but it was also really nice, we would just hangout there and talk about all the differences between our towns, schools, and countries. The customs in Bavaria are very different from those in America, which I found out the first day. The biggest difference was eating styles. In my host family every

meal was eaten together, breakfast, lunch and dinner. This was very strange to me because in my family we're lucky if we simply eat dinner together four days out of the week. Also, each plate is totally clean when they are finished, nothing is wasted, and the food is also eaten very fast. These were both things that took getting used to. On my first day there I was about halfway through the meal when I looked up to see that everyone else had finished and their plates were empty. I definitely had to adjust the way I ate to fit in. The water was also something new, there they drink only mineral water, which took some getting used to. Another big difference was the TV, the kids never watched it, except maybe to catch the news or to watch a sporting event. Instead they played games. I have never been in a house that contained so many board games. The people in Germany are also a lot more energy and waste conscious, and they walk more. Other cultural differences were simple dining etiquette, letting others know you are finished eating requires placing your fork and knife together on a diagonal across your plate. Also, the order of the meals was different, breakfast in the morning consisted usually of plain yogurt with fruit, rolls, bread, or cereal. At one o'clock was the main hot meal, and at around six o'clock a cold "lunch" type meal was served, usually bread with butter (not mayonnaise) with either cheese or meat on top, there was always a variety. My family was very helpful to me by explaining certain do's and don'ts, giving directions, and trying to show me as much as they could about their culture.

Attending school in a foreign country was also an interesting experience that I will never forget. The school day began at eight AM and ended at one PM. There were six periods in a day and two fifteen minute pauses after the second and fourth period. My day consisted of three morning classes with the other American students. Each day we would

have two German lessons from teachers from the Gymnasium, in which we practiced grammar, speaking, and writing, and sometimes received homework. Our third period was taught by our American chaperone. We usually used that period to discuss our different experiences and feelings about our host families or anything else. During our first week we had to go to class with our German host student to get a taste of their classes. This was actually pretty boring after the first day, we really couldn't take part in the class and the teachers basically didn't want us there since we were a distraction. After the first week we were able to leave school and go down to Grafenau to explore, shop, go to the bank, post office, or phone, on our own. The only problem was that the town was located on a very steep hill, the school at the very top, and the post office, bank, etc. were at the very bottom. All of us got a lot more exercise than planned from hiking up and down the hill everyday. Being in school was very strange at first. We (all the Americans) were stared at everywhere we went, after a few days we could ignore it, but it was very weird knowing everyone is watching you because you're new, and different, and speak another language. I think this is one of the reasons why all of the American students bonded so much, they all became my best friends in the world, simply because we had a country in common. Some major differences that I noticed about the school are that they do not use hall passes and there wasn't a strict dress code like the one we have. The students were treated much more like adults. In fact, when I explained to the students and their parents that at my school we aren't allowed to wear tank tops, backless shoes, etc., they thought it was really ridiculous. Another, perhaps more important difference was that in every classroom hung a crucifix with Jesus on it. Although this is against federal

law, Bavaria clings to its Catholic background. Academics seemed to be much better at the Gymnasium than here in America. Students are required to take at least three languages and begin learning in the fifth grade, so most people we met spoke English considerably well. After awhile we all began to make German friends there and had more of a social life, which was very different from that here in America since the legal drinking age is 16. There, instead of sneaking liquor somewhere and everyone getting smashed, you hang out at bars and talk and play pool and everyone pretty much stays okay. Its not such a big deal there as it is here, they do not on the most part drink to get drunk.

Another large social event was the Volksfest. It was a weeklong celebration with boardwalk rides and a large beer tent set up in the Kurpark. It was very fun and very cultural to hear the traditional Bavarian folkmusic and learn the drinking songs. It was also a sobering experience. In Bavaria the neo Nazis are gaining strength and over 300 showed up to the beerfest on the big nights. They can be very scary people, and I unfortunately had the experience of speaking with a few of them. They don't like Americans, but I think in a way they admire us, or envy our strength, I'm not sure which. Other than that it was a lot of fun. Other cultural experiences included going to the school play of Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat, visiting local museums and castle ruins, and small street shows in my town. There was even a country line dancing contest one night that was extremely funny. My family also took me to the movies and fests in other towns, as well as day trips to the beautiful cities of Vienna, Passau, and Munich. We shopped and saw all the tourist attractions. With the program I took day trips to Salzburg in Austria where we saw not only the city but the palace of Hohenbrunn, which was rigged with water tricks. We also traveled to Munich, the Bavarian National Forest, a beer

factory, Regensburg, a glass factory, and two of the great monuments that Ludwig the first built as well as the castle of Herrenkimsee. Everywhere we went was extremely beautiful and educational. The most interesting part was simply living in the town though. It did seem boring sometimes but I feel that my understanding of not only the German language, but also the culture and traditions of the people, and most importantly the adapting to a different way of life. When I did return home I felt totally out of place because I had grown used to living a different life, I had to readapt to my American lifestyle and friends. The transition is something I shall never forget. This trip enabled me to learn not only about the culture of an another country, but about my own country, and myself as well. I thank you, the Board of Education, for helping me to take part in such a wonderful program.

POLICY GROUP ON GLOBAL ECONOMY AND TRADE

Part I

The European Union (EU) consists of thirteen member states as follows: Belgium, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Austria, Finland, France, Portugal, Spain, Germany, Poland, and the Czech Republic. Thus far, Great Britain has declined all offers of induction into the European Union. The motives of the European Union are not only to strengthen all European relations, but also to achieve economic greatness through the creation of a common currency. The currency, known as the *Euro*, is to be introduced on January 1, 1999, and is expected to be fully operational by the year 2002.

Part II

The United States will acknowledge the fact that the European Union may cause a slight recession in the United States agricultural economy. This recession should not, however, be a long-term effect on the United States economy. We are under the impression that as long as the euro is introduced and the EU grows, the agricultural products of Eastern Europe will be used as the primary source of soil products in the union.

But the recession of agriculture is not the United States' greatest fear. In fact, this growth in Eastern European agriculture may favor the United States in the long run. We also think that this growth can be balanced by the United States' technological advances over the nations of the European Union. Because of the economic chaos in Japan at this time, the United States is ready to accept the responsibility of technological steps forward.

Part III

Every major horror in the history of the world was committed in the pretext of an altruistic motive. -Ayn Rand

We, the United States, understand the necessity to form an economic bloc among nations for a continued success in the said area. We prescribe fully to this ideology to induce successful trading and economic stability, but the united power should not outgrow its intended purpose of promoting a fair economic environment. In no way will

the United States comply with any military or foreign policy alliances that are exclusionary toward any nation that is not involved in the unified Europe. We are confident that the pre-existing treaties and alliances (i.e. NATO) are sufficient to provide protection for this bloc formed by the European Union.

Part IV

If the United States' policy toward the European Union is violated, in a case such as military alliances, the United States will take the following actions immediately:

(A) *Diplomacy* - Through summit meetings, the United States will first confront the European Union concerning any problems by diplomatic means. The U.S. Department of State will host meetings to try to promote peaceful negotiations. If sufficient conclusions cannot be reached, further action will be taken.

(B) *Sanctions* - The United States will seek the support of global institutions, such as the United Nations and OPEC. Through the United Nations, the United States will implement an embargo, which would limit the economic capabilities of the offending EU members. Along with OPEC, the United States would increase the tariff on oil. If these sanctions do not cause the disbandment of European forces, other sanctions will be justified and implemented as needed.

(C) *Military Action* - The United States will not initiate military confrontation unless fired upon by a member of the European Union.

RECIPIENT AGREEMENT

This agreement dated _____, is made by Automated Weather Source, Inc., 2-5 Metropolitan Court, Gaithersburg, Maryland 20878 ("AWS"), NBC Subsidiary (WNBC-TV), Inc., 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, New York 10112 ("NBC 4"), and Toms River High School East ("Recipient"), with respect to NBC 4's donation to Recipient of a "PC-MET Weather Station System."

RECITALS

1. AWS manufactures and sells PC-MET Weather Station Systems, each of which is comprised of a data logger, sensor suite, shelter, and mounting hardware (the "Hardware") and a computer program for local and remote access to the data collected (the "Software"), which systems enable multiple, remote sites to collect and access weather data within a network.

2. NBC 4 has developed a program to enable certain schools and other educational institutions in the New York area designated by NBC 4, including Recipient, to collect and access weather data within a network established by NBC 4 (the "NBC 4 Network").

3. NBC 4 wishes to donate to Recipient one (1) PC-MET Weather Station System (the "System"), comprised of the Hardware and Software, which will enable Recipient to collect and access weather data within the NBC 4 Network, which is comprised of Recipient, NBC 4 and other schools and institutions designated by NBC 4.

AGREEMENT

Accordingly, the parties agree as follows:

1. Donation: NBC 4 will donate the System to Recipient.

2. Recipient Site: Recipient agrees by accepting this donation to provide appropriate external and internal sites for installation of the System. At the time of delivery and during the Warranty Period (as hereinafter defined), the System installation site must conform, at Recipient's cost, to all of the space, electrical, and environmental requirements provided to Recipient by NBC 4.

3. Installation: Recipient agrees that it shall be solely responsible for, and shall bear the entire expense of the installation of the System, including the obtaining of all approvals and required permits. AWS agrees that it shall provide installation support in the form of written and video instructional materials. Recipient agrees to use all reasonable efforts to complete installation of the System, to include access to a telecommunications line in accordance with Paragraph 4. within 30 days of delivery of the System. Recipient shall have the option to purchase separate installation services from AWS at AWS' then standard installation rates. Such installation does not include final connection to the telecommunications line in accordance with Paragraph 4. Should Recipient fail to install the System within 30 days, Buyer will be provided written notification of such failure and Recipient will promptly return the System to the Buyer and shall have no further rights to the System. Recipient shall bear all shipping costs associated with return of the System, and is responsible for any damages to the System.

4. Access to Telephone: Recipient shall be solely responsible, at Recipient's cost, to follow all procedures outlined in the Operations Manual, and for the installation and maintenance of all telecommunication lines and electrical utilities necessary for the operation of the System and the operation of the NBC 4 Network on a continuous year-round basis, and for maintaining the System in a state of operation that will allow NBC 4 and AWS, and any third party authorized by NBC 4 and AWS hereunder, on-call access to the data stored in the System logger.

5. Inspection and Acceptance: Recipient shall be solely responsible for the inspection of the System when delivered.

6. Alterations and Attachments: Recipient shall not make any alterations or attach any device or other item to the System as donated and installed without the prior consent of AWS.

7. Warranty, Maintenance and Service:

(a) Warranty: AWS warrants, for a period of one (1) year from the date of actual delivery of the System (the "Warranty Period"):

(1) Software: That the software shall be free of bugs, defects, errors, flaws, nonconformities, problems, viruses and /or other imperfections ("defects"), excluding only defects resulting solely from Recipient's improper installation or use, or from unauthorized alteration or modification of the Software. Upon notice to AWS of any warranted defect, AWS shall, at its option, either cure the defect by providing assistance and instruction or by replacing the Software. If requested by AWS, the Recipient shall return the defective Software to AWS by the means specified by AWS, and AWS shall bear all shipping expenses in connection therewith.

(2) Hardware: That the Hardware shall be free of defects in materials and workmanship, excluding only defects resulting solely from hazards (including, but not limited to, fire, power failures or surges, vandalism, etc.) and natural causes (including, but not limited to, earthquake, flood, lightning, wind and flying debris, etc.), from Recipient's improper installation, maintenance, or operation of or from unauthorized alteration or modification (including attachment of unauthorized devices) to, the Hardware or any component thereof. Upon notice to AWS of any warranted defect, AWS shall, at its option, either repair or replace the defective Hardware or component thereof. If requested by AWS, the Recipient shall return the defective Hardware or component thereof as designated by AWS by the means specified by AWS, and AWS shall bear all shipping expenses, in connection therewith.

(b) Maintenance and Service: Except as otherwise expressed herein, Recipient shall be solely responsible for performing all maintenance and service on the System in accordance with the AWS manual, except that, upon expiration of the Warranty Period, Recipient shall have the option to

purchase such maintenance and service assistance, if any, as AWS may then be offering at the then-standard AWS network maintenance and service price and terms.

(c) AWS AND NBC 4 DISCLAIM THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSES AND MERCHANTABILITY WITH REGARD TO THE SOFTWARE, HARDWARE AND SYSTEMS. THERE ARE NO OTHER WARRANTIES BY AWS, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, REGARDING THE HARDWARE, SOFTWARE AND/OR SYSTEM EXCEPT AS SET FORTH IN THIS PARAGRAPH.

(d) NBC 4 makes no warranties hereunder with respect to the Hardware, Software and/or System.

8. Damage to Property or Premises: Recipient agrees to waive any and all claims against AWS and/or NBC 4 for damage, loss or liability to Recipient's premises or property arising out of or in connection with the installation, operation and/or maintenance of the Hardware, Software and/or System.

9. Limitation/Disclaimer of Liability:

(a) AWS's liability related to the manufacture, delivery, or use of the Hardware, Software and/or System, the components thereof, and/or supplies used and services provided in connection therewith, shall be limited to the purchase price of the Hardware, Software and/or System giving rise to, or which is the subject of, the claim, save and except only for claims arising out of the willful misconduct, recklessness, or gross negligence of AWS or as provided in Paragraph 12 below. Recipient expressly waives any claim against AWS arising out of the Hardware, Software and/or System for indirect, incidental, special or consequential damages, including, without limitation, claims for loss of business, market share, profits, or prospective advantage.

(b) Recipient expressly waives any and all claims against NBC 4, its officers, agents, employees or representatives of any nature whatsoever arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, or

Recipient's possession or use of the System or participation in the NBC 4 Network.

10. Software Revisions and Upgrades: If AWS creates any revision to or upgrade of the Software after the date of this Agreement, upon Recipient's request, AWS shall furnish such revision or upgrade to recipient at the then-current AWS price and terms for such revision or upgrade.

11. Licenses and Rights: AWS retains all rights to the design of the Hardware, Software and System, to the data collected by the System, to the concept and name "PC-MET Weather Station System," and to the name "Automated Weather Source," which rights Recipient hereby acknowledges and agrees not to assert or claim any interest in, save and except only as otherwise expressly granted in this paragraph:

(a) Software:

Subject to Recipient's compliance with this Agreement, AWS grants Recipient a royalty-free license to use the Software, together with the right to make one copy, for backup purposes, of the Software. If such backup copy needs to be replaced because of physical degradation or destruction, Recipient shall have the right, at its sole option, either to make an additional backup copy or to obtain a replacement copy from AWS.

(b) Data:

(1) Subject to Recipient's compliance with this Agreement, AWS grants to Recipient a license to use the data collected by Recipient and stored in Recipient's data logger solely for educational and instructional purposes.

(2) AWS and NBC 4 shall each have the right to access and use the data stored in Recipient's System data logger. Recipient agrees to allow and provide continuous access by AWS and NBC 4 to the data stored in Recipient's System data logger, except when the System is being used by Recipient.

(3) Recipient may not grant access to the data stored in Recipient's System data logger to any third parties without the express written consent of AWS and NBC 4.

(4) Recipient is expressly prohibited from using the data stored in the System data logger or providing such data to any party other than as expressly set forth in this Paragraph 11(b).

12. Indemnity:

(a) AWS will at all times, as of and following the date of this Agreement, indemnify and hold harmless Recipient, the State of New York, the following additional parties: _____, and all of the foregoing's employees, agents and representatives, from and against any and all actual and alleged claims, damages, liabilities, judgments, settlements, costs and expenses (including without limitation legal expenses and costs) arising out of or in connection with:

(i) the Hardware, Software and/or System, including without limitation, in connection with the infringement of any patent, trademark, trade secret, proprietary information, protected semiconductor chip mask work, or copyright, excluding only matters arising from unauthorized alterations or modifications of the Hardware, Software, and/or System made by Recipient and/or;

(ii) any breach of any representation, warranty, covenant or obligation contained herein. Recipient shall promptly notify AWS in writing of any alleged infringement with respect to the System. AWS may at its option, conduct the defense in any such third party action arising as described herein. Recipient agrees to cooperate with AWS in the defense of such action. To avoid any infringement (even if not alleged) AWS may, at its option, at no charge to Recipient, obtain a license to use, modify, or substitute software which is equivalent to the Software.

(b) The parties hereto expressly agree that NBC 4 shall have no liability under this Agreement with respect to the manufacture, delivery, operation, installation and/or use of the Hardware, Software and/or System, the components thereof, and/or supplies used and services provided in connection therewith. Recipient shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless

NBC 4 its officers, agents, employees and representatives, against any and all claims, actions, suits, liabilities, costs (including attorneys' fees) or expenses of any kind arising out of or in connection with Recipient's possession or use of the System or participation in the NBC 4 Network.

13. Notices: Any notice given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed given on the date delivered or three (3) days after the date of mailing, certified, return receipt requested, at the addresses shown above.

14. Default: A party shall be in default if it fails to cure, or undertake reasonable efforts to cure, any breach of any material term or condition of this Agreement within ten (10) days after written notice from the other party setting forth the nature of such breach with particularity. Any breach by AWS in respect of a component of the System, including, without limitation, the Hardware or Software, shall be deemed a breach as to that component only.

15. Term of Agreement: The initial term of this Agreement shall be three (3) years, commencing on the date of this Agreement. The term may be extended for one or more annual terms as NBC 4 and Recipient may agree in writing. On expiration of the term of this Agreement, as it may be extended, NBC 4 and Recipient shall have no further obligations to each other, except as set forth in those paragraphs which, by their terms, are intended to survive the expiration of this Agreement.

16. Termination:

(a) On Default: NBC 4 may terminate this Agreement at any time effective immediately on Recipient's or AWS's default as set forth in Paragraph 14 above. NBC 4 shall provide notice to all parties to that effect. On termination by NBC 4 as a result of Recipient's default, Recipient shall forfeit the donation and return the System to NBC 4 within three (3) days of termination. Recipient may terminate this Agreement at any time effective immediately on NBC 4's or AWS's default as set forth in Paragraph 14. Recipient shall provide notice to all parties to that effect.

(b) Absent Default: In the absence of default by either or both of Recipient and AWS, NBC 4 may terminate this Agreement at any time in its sole discretion on ten (10) day's written notice to Recipient, provided that Recipient shall be entitled to keep the donated System. NBC 4 shall provide notice to AWS of such termination.

17. Non-Assignment:

(a) Recipient may not assign this Agreement or any of its rights or obligations hereunder, including, without limitation, the right to use the Hardware, Software and/or System, to any third party, except with the prior written consent of NBC 4 and AWS. Any assignment by Recipient not permitted hereunder shall be void and shall be deemed a default by Recipient.

(b) This Agreement may not be assigned by NBC 4 or AWS, except, in the case of an assignment by NBC 4, with AWS's prior written consent, or in the case of an assignment by AWS with NBC 4's prior written consent; provided, however, that either NBC 4 or AWS may assign this Agreement or any of its rights and/or obligations hereunder to any party purchasing all or substantially all of its stock or assets, or any party controlling, controlled by or under common control with NBC 4 or AWS respectively. Any assignment not permitted hereunder shall be void and shall be deemed a default by the assigning party.

18. Authority: The undersigned represents and warrants that the undersigned has the full and complete authority from Recipient to execute this Agreement on behalf of Recipient.

19. Miscellaneous: This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York. The terms and conditions contained in this Agreement shall constitute the complete and entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. This Agreement shall not be varied in its terms or conditions by any subsequent agreement or representation, or except by an instrument in writing, signed by AWS, NBC 4, and Recipient. The failure by Recipient, AWS and/or NBC 4 to insist upon strict performance of this Agreement, or to exercise any rights or remedy herein, shall not be construed as a waiver of such party's rights to

assert such right to remedy or to rely on such right or remedy at any time thereafter. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same agreement. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and shall remain valid and enforceable. If any party should be in default under Paragraph 14 above, either of the nondefaulting parties shall have the option, without waiving another right or remedy, to terminate this Agreement.
