Re: Nominees to fill vacancy on Livingston Council

Dear Council Members and Mr. Turtletaub:

Pursuant to section 11 of the New Jersey Municipal Vacancy Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:16-1 et seq., the Livingston Democratic County Committee ("Committee") hereby submits to the Livingston Township Council ("Council") *Michael M. Vieira, LAURIE S. Kahn* *[insert names of three nominees here, in the* *disjunctive]* *Scott Goldman* (collectively referred to herein as "Nominees") for the Council's selection of a successor to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Council Member Michael M. Silverman ("vacancy"). It is our understanding that Mr. Silverman's resignation from the Council was effective as of Tuesday, January 1, 2019 (the "occurrence of the vacancy"). Accordingly, it is the Committee's position that its submission of the Nominees herein has been made within fifteen (15) days of the occurrence of the vacancy and has therefore complied with the initial timing requirement of N.J.S.A. 40A:16-11. The Committee respectfully recommends that the Council appoint a successor to fill the vacancy from one of the Nominees on or before Wednesday, January 30, 2019. Should the Council fail to appoint a successor from one of the

Nominees on or before January 30, 2019, the Committee is empowered by section 11 to timely appoint one of the Nominees to fill the vacancy, and such person shall be sworn in immediately.

Given that Mr. Silverman was elected to the Township Council as a nominee and registered member of the Democratic Party, it is the opinion of the Committee that the Council must appoint a registered Democrat as his successor¹. The Committee has thus submitted to the Council only registered Democratic nominees to fill the vacancy and, pursuant to the New Jersey Appellate Division's decision in Kukasch v. Cote, the Council does not have discretion to appoint any individual other than from among the names submitted by the Committee². Therefore, the Committee urges that Mr. Silverman's successor must be a registered Democrat and that the Council must abide by the Committee's selection for his replacement by appointing one of the Nominees herein submitted.

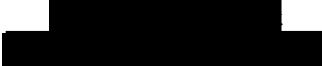

When my daughter was born 20 years ago, I left my career in retail management. I had worked my way up from a trainee at Saks Fifth Avenue to shoe buyer and eventually to divisional merchandise manager at Bergdorf Goodman. I was responsible for \$60 million in annual sales and managed 18 employees. I later moved on to other positions in the fashion industry but, in 1998, I returned to the suburbs to focus on this new chapter in my life. So, for the past 15 years, I have volunteered in diverse ways in our community, ranging from PTA president, to English language tutor, to working with field organizers on a political campaign. Each distinct position has strengthened my ties to Livingston, making me feel more connected to the community I love. As my husband proudly states, I am the busiest unpaid person he has ever met, and I am writing now to express my interest in the vacant seat on the Livingston Town Council.

Making the move from my professional life to a new volunteer role was a challenge. When my daughter entered kindergarten, I began to volunteer with the Collins School PTA, starting as recording secretary, then treasurer for two years and moving on to president of the PTA. These jobs prepared me for my future roles as Mt. Pleasant VP of fundraising, PT Council treasurer, LHS PTA president and co-chair of Project Graduation—the all-night, post-graduation event for high school seniors. I held this position for five years and was responsible for every aspect, from fundraising, advertising, finding a location, sourcing entertainment, organizing buses to the venue and crowd control.

A new and exciting challenge, teaching English as a second language to non-English speaking members of our community, enabled me to learn stories about my students' diverse backgrounds, cultures and languages. I got to know and understand residents of our township that I would not have otherwise met. Our classes became more like friendly get-togethers—we would go to the Ritz diner to practice ordering off the menu or go to the mall to return items.

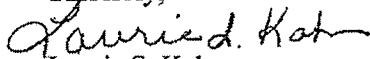
A relatively new opportunity, volunteering with the National Council of Jewish Women/Essex has enabled me to assist underserved women in Essex County. My committee solicited donations and obtained a generous grant to expand access to feminine hygiene products for women and young girls. Along with my co-chair, we also produced a mini-documentary highlighting the struggles these women face monthly.

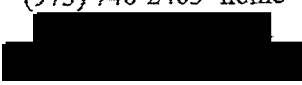
Earlier this year, I spent nine months working on Mikie Sherrill's campaign—making phone calls, knocking on neighbors' doors, doing donor research, working at a canvassing staging location and more. 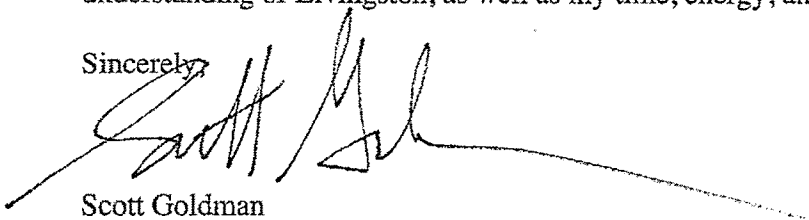
