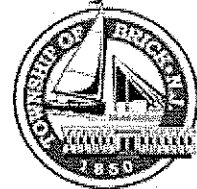

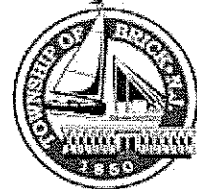

On 03/02/2019 at approximately 1758 hours, I responded to the area of a hit and run motor vehicle accident. (see my NJTR-1 under this case#)

While on scene investigating the motor vehicle crash, a witness, [REDACTED] advised she observed the motor vehicle crash and described the suspect vehicle as a blue ford focus bearing a NJ Registration. [REDACTED] stated she was certain the NJ Registration's last five characters were "13JBJ" but was uncertain as to the first character, possibly an "S".

A check of the NJREG#S13JBJ did not come back to a blue ford focus and as a result of this I attempted different combinations by alternating the first character of the registration and using "13JBJ" as the last five characters. While attempting these combinations, NJREG#F13JBJ, came back registered to a 2007 blue Ford Focus registered to Samuel Sharkey residing at [REDACTED]. Due to these findings, I requested dispatch have an additional unit meet at the residence and Ptl. Kenny #253 responded.

Upon my arrival to the residence, Ptl. Kenny was on scene speaking with the homeowner, later identified as the suspects mother. She advised by Ptl. Kenny the vehicle is owned and operated by her son and that it was parked in the rear of the residence. She was asked when he had arrived at the residence and she stated approximately forty five minutes prior to police arrival.

While awaiting Samuel Sharkey to exit the residence, Ptl. Kenny responded to the rear of the residence to check on the vehicle in question. He advised the vehicle had front end damage consistent with being involved in a motor vehicle accident.

When Samuel Sharkey he immediately begun to lose his balance while standing on a flat level surface. He was asked what happened today and he stated he did not really remember, he just remembered someone sliding in front of him, slamming on their brakes and him tapping them. He was asked why he left the scene and he stated he thought the driver told him to just go. He was asked where he was coming from and where he was headed to and advised that he was traveling from Herbertsville and traveling to his residence. Due to the scene of the crash being out of the way of his stated path of travel, I questioned Mr. Samuel on how he ended up at the scene of the crash. He responded by stating it was in Brick and described a different route.

It should be noted, while speaking with Mr. Sharkey I observed him spread his feet a wide distance apart for balance, swaying, and lose his balance. Though I did not suspect that Mr. Sharkey was operating under the influence of alcohol due to no odor of alcoholic beverages being detected, I asked if he had been drinking and he stated that he had not drank in twenty years. I asked if he had used any narcotics and he stated he had smoked marijuana at approximately 1200.

It was at this time I asked Mr. Sharkey to retrieve his documents from his vehicle, registration and proof of insurance. While walking towards his vehicle, Mr. Sharkey was swaying and was having difficulty walking in a straight path and continued to walk in a diagonal manner. When we reached the vehicle, I observed damage consistent with being involved in a motor vehicle crash and Mr. Sharkey begun to explain how the accident took place.

While retrieving his documents, Mr. Sharkey made an attempt to obtain his license from his pocket, though he had mentioned earlier that he had left it in the interior of his residence.

I then instructed Mr. Sharkey to walk towards the front of the residence. While walking towards the front of the residence, Mr. Sharkey again continued to sway and have difficulty walking in a straight path and continued to walk in a diagonal manner.

While at the front of the residence, I again asked Mr. Sharkey if he had drank at all, to which he stated no he did not drink. He was then escorted to the driveway of the residence, which was a flat level surface, free of any large cracks and or debris.

Due to my observations and statements made by Mr. Sharkey, I believed him to be impaired at the time of the motor vehicle crash and he was advised he was going to be placed through a series of Field Sobriety Tests.

It should be noted each test was explained prior to being administered.

The first test conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test, commonly referred to as HGN. While being explained this test, Mr. Sharkey had his feet set wide apart for balance, swayed, and lost his balance. Mr. Sharkey was given several attempts to perform this test and was unable to follow instruction. Mr. Sharkey continued to move his head even though he was instructed to keep it still. When Mr. Sharkey would keep his head still, he would not track the stimulus and continue to stare straight forward. After several failed attempts, the test was concluded.

The second test conducted was the Walk and Turn Test. While explaining this test, Mr. Sharkey was unable to keep his balance while being given instruction. While performing this test, Mr. Sharkey stopped walking to steady himself, lost his balance while walking, did not touch heel to toe, and walked off the "line" in excess of three times.

The third test administered was the One Leg Stand Test. When explaining this test, I instructed Mr. Sharkey to place his feet together and hands at his side. When giving this instruction, Mr. Sharkey placed his arms parallel to the ground. While performing this test, Mr. Sharkey swayed while balancing and put his foot down in excess of three times.

It was at this time I believed Mr. Sharkey was operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of narcotics at the time of the motor vehicle crash and he was placed under arrest, handcuffed behind his back, double locked, searched and placed in the rear of marked patrol vehicle #19. He was then transported to police headquarters for processing.

Ptl. Kenny remained on scene while a tow truck was dispatched to this scene to impound Mr. Sharkey's vehicle in accordance with John's Law. Point Pleasant Towing later responded to the scene for the impound.

Ptl. Mulcahey #130 responded to headquarters in reference to Mr. Sharkey's arrest to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. (see his supplemental report under this case#)

Ptl. Mulcahey #130 advised the breath samples were in an acceptable tolerance and the result of these tests indicated Mr. Sharkey had a Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) of 0.0%. As a result of this, Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) Ptl. Caulfield #235 responded to headquarters for further testing. (see his supplemental report under this case#)

Mr. Sharkey was given several motor vehicle summons' #1506-T-160898 operating under the influence (39:4-50), #1506-T-160899 Reckless driving (39:4-96), #1506-T-160900 careless driving (39:4-97), #1506-T-161961 following too closely (39:4-89), #1506-T-161962 leaving the scene of an accident (39:4-129B), #1506-T-161963 failures to report (39:4-130), #1506-T-161964 failure to exhibit insurance card (39:3-29C).

In accordance with John's Law, Ptl. Mulcahey responded to Brick Township Police headquarters to retrieve Mr. Sharkey and a potential liability form was explained and signed. While releasing Mr. Sharkey from police custody he stumbled and fell causing him to strike his head on the holding cell. Mr. Sharkey was offered medical attention which he refused. While explaining Mr. Sharkey his motor vehicle summons' he stated sometimes you are better off just driving your car off of a bridge. As a result of this statement, Mr. Sharkey was transported to Ocean Medical Center for a psychiatric evaluation and left in the care of hospital staff.

It should be noted while releasing Mr. Sharkey and returning his property, one vile of Clarity RX was returned to him, he advised this property was not his and believed that the police placed it into his property. Due to the vile containing a clear liquid unknown substance that Mr. Sharkey denied ownership of, the property was subsequently logged into evidence, placed into property, and submitted for testing.

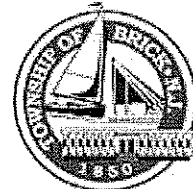
On March 2, 2019 at approximately 1935 hrs I responded to H.Q. to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C in reference to Samuel Sharkey who was in custody for DUI. (See Case Report by Ptlm. Deluca #176)

On arrival, Sharkey was escorted to the booking room. Sharkey was under my direct uninterrupted observation beginning at 1942 hrs. During the twenty minute observation period, Sharkey did not have anything in his mouth. During the observation period Sharkey did not belch or vomit and he did not consume any food or drinks. All portables and electronics devices were removed from the room.

I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Sharkey was read the breath samples instructions verbatim, from the posted sign, which he stated he understood. The instructions were read for the two breath samples that were collected. The breath hose mouth piece was changed after each breath sample. Sharkey's BAC was .00. (See Alcotest 7110III-C report)

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On 03/03/2019 at approximately 0059 hours, I responded to the parking lot at 135 Van Zile Road to assist Ptl. Bennett #279 who was on scene with a suspicious vehicle involving a male subject asleep behind the wheel. The parking lot is located inside a shopping center (Shoppes at Brick) and the vehicle was parked in the east parking lot closer to the Bonefish Grill Restaurant.

Upon arrival, Ptl. Bennett was already at the front driver's side window speaking to the male driver of the vehicle, identified as Johnny S. Ly. The vehicle, a 2019 BMW 530I bearing NY registration HLP2067, was parked across four parking spots in said parking lot, the vehicle's front and rear lights were activated, and Ptl. Bennett had ordered the driver to shut off the vehicle. Ptl. Bennett stated that when he approached the vehicle and saw Ly sleeping in the driver's seat with the engine running, he knocked on the driver's side window to awake the driver, Ly. Ptl. Bennett reported that he had to bang on the driver's side window multiple times before Ly finally woke up and opened the front driver's side window.

As Ptl. Bennett continued speaking with Ly, I approached the front driver's side window as well and began speaking with Ly to gather information as to why he was asleep inside his vehicle. Ly was initially disoriented and reported that he had driven down earlier in the night from Bergen County, NJ to have dinner with a friend at Bonefish Grill in Brick, NJ. Ly was unsure as to why he had fallen asleep, was unsure how long he was in the parking lot, didn't know how he ended up parked in four marked parking spots, and couldn't provide a timeline as to when he left the Bonefish Grill. While continuing to speak with Ly, I observed his eyes were watery, bloodshot, and eyelids were heavy and droopy. In addition, I observed his speech was slow and slurred. I also detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin of the vehicle. While Ly was retrieving his driving credentials, I observed his hand movements were slow and fumbling. Ly was unable to provide the vehicle's registration and insurance card and only exhibited his NJ driver's license. It should be noted that the site of the parking lot is well within 1,000 feet of the St. Dominic's School located at 250 Old Squan Road in Brick, NJ.

At that time, I had Ly exit the vehicle in order to administer field sobriety tests in which he, Ly, had no objection to. As Ly was exiting his vehicle and walking towards the side of his car, I observed him swaying and slightly staggering while walking. While Ly was standing next to his vehicle, I also observed that he was swaying while standing and his stance was very rigid. In addition, a very strong odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Ly's breath while speaking to him outside his vehicle. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Ly stated, "No." The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris. The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Ly as to how to perform the examination, Ly had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Ly continued to sway while standing and had some difficulty maintaining his balance while in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Ly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Ly failed to touch heel to toe on several steps, lost his balance while walking (Stepped off the line on more than one occasion), lost his balance while turning (Began to slightly stagger), and turned incorrectly (Failed to keep his lead foot on the ground).

The final examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining, and demonstrating, the test I observed that Ly was swaying while standing in the starting position. In addition, Ly lost his balance in the starting position. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Ly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Ly was swaying while his right foot was elevated, used his arms for balance several times (Raised arms over six inches), and also put his right foot down multiple times. In addition, Ly only had his right foot elevated approximately 3-4 inches off the ground while performing the test. Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Ly was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol car #44 without incident. Ly was searched at the scene incident to his arrest which yielded negative results for any items of evidentiary value. The rear of my patrol vehicle was searched prior to and after transporting Ly to police headquarters. Ptl. Bennett remained on scene and awaited Joe's Service Center Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law. Once at police headquarters, my weapon was secured in gun locker #1. Ly was then read his Miranda Rights and signed off on the waiver portion of the form (Waived his rights). In addition, I also inspected Ly's oral cavity inside police headquarters which yielded negative results/findings. I then read Ly the NJ D.U.I. Standard Statement form (Implied Consent) in which he agreed to submit samples of his breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine and also observed Ly for twenty minutes (Twenty minutes were managed utilizing my personal wristwatch) prior to administering the test. During said observation time, Ly remained under constant and uninterrupted observation until the administering of the Alcotest machine was fully complete. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, etc.). Ly provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.12%. I then entered the Alcotest breath sample results into the NJSP Alcotest Calculator in which the breath sample results were within acceptable tolerance. Furthermore, a new mouthpiece was used each time Ly provided a breath sample into the Alcotest machine.

Ly was processed, as per department policy, and issued motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50(1506-E19-898), 39:4-96 (1506-E19-899), 39:4-97 (1506-E19-900), 39:4-50(g)(1) (1506-E19-902), 39:3-29B (1506-E19-903), and 39:3-29C (1506-E19-904). Ly was released a short time later to a friend, , who signed and was given the original copy of the Potential Liability form. In addition, Ly was given a

**copy of the Alcohol Influence Report from the Alcotest machine.
My body worn camera was activated during this investigation.**

On 03/04/2019 at approximately 1947 hours, I was operating marked patrol vehicle #15 in the area of 1 Lanes Mill Road observing traffic. During this time I observed a black Hyundai Elantra bearing NJ registration C13JHD, traveling north on Lanes Mill Road. As the vehicle drove by I observed the driver was not utilizing his seat belt. I began following the vehicle. A full plate inquiry revealed the registration to be suspended. I activated my emergency lights and initiated a traffic stop in the parking lot of 1041 Burnt Tavern Road (Rite Aid).

I made a passenger side approach to the vehicle where I made contact with the driver Michael Minnella. I identified myself as a Brick Township Police Officer and requested Minnella's driving credentials. After providing me with his credentials, I requested Minnella to step out of the vehicle and speak with me to which he complied. I told Minnella I detected the odor of raw marijuana emanating from his vehicle. I read him his rights as per Miranda from a card I keep in my uniform pocket. After being read his rights, Minnella stated he understood and agreed to continue speaking with me. I asked Minnella how much marijuana was in his vehicle, and where it was. Minnella told me he only had a pipe that he uses to smoke marijuana which was in the front pocket of his book bag, located on the front passenger seat. Ptl. Smith #231 arrived on scene. I instructed Minnella to stand with Ptl. Scott as I searched his vehicle for contraband. The search of the vehicle revealed the following:

1. One black plastic cylinder container containing under 50 grams of a leafy green vegetation, suspect marijuana.
2. One glass smoking pipe, containing burnt suspect marijuana residue
3. One metal "grinder" (used to prepare marijuana) containing green vegetation, suspect marijuana
4. One blue "dug out case" containing a hard cylinder like cigarette, commonly used to ingest CDS. The case also contained green vegetation, suspect marijuana.

The recovered evidence was placed in a department issued evidence bag. When asked about the recovered marijuana and paraphernalia, Minnella admitted it belonged to him. Minnella was taken into custody. He was searched incident to arrest yielding negative results then placed in the rear of patrol vehicle #15 to be transported back to police headquarters. Minnella's vehicle was secured and left in the Rite Aid parking lot.

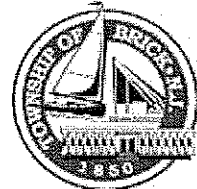
Minnella was booked and processed. The recovered contraband was logged into property and labeled to be tested for CDS. It was then secured in the property room. It was determined by the court that Minnella be released pending a future court date. Minnella was charged as follows on summons (#2019S1506000226).

2C:35-10A(4) Possession of Marijuana
2C:36-2 Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.
39:3-76.2F No Seat Belt on T#161930
39:4-49.1 CDS In A Motor Vehicle on T#161931

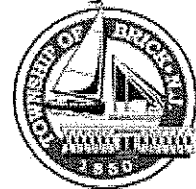

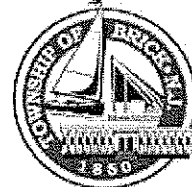
On 03/05/2019 at approximately 1712 hours I, Ptl. Newlund #285, was contacted by Brick Township Drug Enforcement Unit regarding suspicious activity occurring to the rear of the Pleasure Zone (235 Chambers Bridge Rd.) Specifically observing multiple occupied vehicles parked at the rear along the wooded area. Detectives advised one of the vehicles was a gray Honda Pilot (NJ Reg X56KNZ) occupied by a male subject that appeared to be falling asleep in the drivers position with the vehicle running. Due to multiple anonymous reports of suspicious activity behind the Pleasure Zone over recent time periods, marked patrol vehicles were sent to the location to speak with the occupants of the vehicles. Sgt. Shepherd #167, Detective Sgt. Petrola, Detective Alvarado #221, Ptl. Barlowski #284 and I arrived at the location.

Upon my arrival I approached the Honda Pilot, identified myself, and made contact with the male operator (later identified as Brian Strassburg). In speaking with Strassburg, he advised he occasionally goes to the Pleasure Zone to meet other males that he makes contact with on a phone application called Grinder. Strassburg stated he has sexual encounters with the male subjects inside and outside of Pleasure Zone. Strassburg explained he was not at the location on this day to meet anyone specific and was just relaxing from a long day of work by playing games on his phone. Strassburg advised he did not know any of the other occupants in the vehicles in the parking lot and did not have any communication with them. Strassburg initially stated he did not have any illegal narcotics in his vehicle or possession at that time. Moments later when I requested consent from Strassburg to search the vehicle, Strassburg replied "I just wanna go home" and then stated he has approximately a gram of marijuana inside his bag located on the passenger side front seat. At that time I requested Strassburg to step out of the vehicle and requested Det. Alvarado to stand with Strassburg while I retrieved the said drugs in the location Strassburg stated they would be in. A pink glass, approximately 7 inches in length, smoking device with burnt marijuana residue was located in the center counsel as described by Strassburg. Upon opening the black bag I observed a jar containing a plastic bag with labeling "Cali Indoor Cali Bud". Inside the plastic bag was approximately one gram of what appeared to be marijuana. Due to my training experiences I was able to determine the substance to be marijuana (from appearance and smell). A blue and white glass smoking device with burnt marijuana residue was also located in the glass jar with the plastic bag containing marijuana. Strassburg was placed under arrest, searched on scene, and secured in vehicle 13. The Honda Pilot was searched for further narcotics and drug paraphernalia with negative results.

Strassburg was transported to police headquarters without incident. At police headquarters Strassburg was processed as per department policy. Strassburg was charged with 2C:35-10A(4) and 2C:36-2. Strassburg was released on summons 1506 S 2019 000245 with a court date of 03/20/2019 at 0900 hours. The marijuana, glass smoking devices and plastic bag that contained the marijuana was entered into the police evidence room.

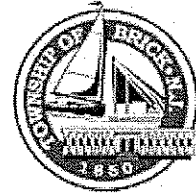

On 02/05/2019 at 1850 hrs, while I patrolled the area of Lanes Mill Road and Sally Ike Road, I observed a black Jeep compass bearing NJ reg M30KEH following too closely to a vehicle in front of it. I ran the displayed tag through a motor vehicle inquiry, no results were returned. Dispatch also attempted to run the tag with negative results. I conducted a motor vehicle stop on the suspect vehicle in the area of Herbertsville Road and Lanes Mill Road. Before I approached the vehicle, I observed both the passenger and driver reach around the vehicle and into a bag. Ptl. Firreno 283 and Ptl. Riccio 289 arrived on scene to assist.

I approached the vehicle on the passenger side and made contact with the passenger, Lawrence Finch, and the driver, Melissa Toney. Toney's hands shook while she attempted to locate her motor vehicle documents. Finch also reached towards the dashboard several times. I could smell the odor of raw marijuana emanate from the interior passenger compartment of the vehicle. I had Toney step out of the vehicle and advised her that I could smell the odor of marijuana emanating from inside of the vehicle. She stated that she did not have anything on her, but she did not know if Finch had any contraband. Finch had stepped out of the vehicle to check a 2 month old infant in the rear passenger seat of the vehicle. When he did, I could smell the odor of raw marijuana emanating from his person. I advised Finch of his Miranda rights, he stated he understood them and that he would be willing to speak with me. While I searched Finch's person he reached for his waistband several times, I advised him to keep his hands out to his sides. During the search he stated that he had something inside of his pants. I asked Finch to take the contraband out of his pants, he reached in and pulled out a plastic bag which contained suspect marijuana. Finch also stated that there was a "roach" on the dashboard next to the cigarette packs. The contraband was taken and secured in my patrol vehicle.

Finch was taken into custody and placed in the rear of patrol vehicle 44, the rear seat was searched prior. I advised Toney of her Miranda rights which she stated she understood. I asked her if there was any contraband inside of the vehicle, she stated there was not, and that I could search the car if I wanted to. Ptl. Firreno and Ptl. Riccio searched the interior of the vehicle with negative results. Toney was issued a written warning for careless driving 39:3-97. Finch was transported to Headquarters and removed from the rear of patrol vehicle 44, the rear seat was searched after. Finch was taken inside of Headquarters, searched, processed and released on complaint summons 1506 S 2019 000246 2C:35-10A(4) Possession of Under 50 Grams Marijuana, 2C:36-2 Possession of CDS Paraphernalia. The evidence recovered on scene was secured in the property room at Headquarters. DEU DSgt. Petrola 201 was advised of the incident.

On 03/06/2019 at approximately 2337 hours, I (Patrolman Patrick #296) was dispatched to 407 Brick Boulevard (Drum Point Arms Apartment Complex) to assist Patrolman Scott Smith #231 on a traffic stop.

Upon arrival, I observed Ptl. Scott speaking to a male subject in the driver seat of a 2003 gold Ford Explorer (NJ Registration: E17GRF). The male subject was later identified as Alfredo Jimenez (Jimenez). After he finished speaking with Jimenez, Ptl. Scott briefed me on the motor vehicle stop. According to Ptl. Scott, he observed Jimenez fail to maintain his lane on three separate instances. Ptl. Scott conducted a motor vehicle stop at the Drum Point Arms Apartment Complex after he observed these motor vehicle violations. While speaking with Jimenez, Ptl. Scott detected an odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from Jimenez's breath and he admitted to drinking two (2) or three (3) beers approximately one (1) hour prior to the stop. An Initial Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus conducted by Ptl. Scott further indicated Jimenez was operating his motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

After Ptl. Scott briefed me of the motor vehicle stop, we instructed Jimenez to exit his vehicle to conduct a series of field sobriety tests to determine if he was under the influence of alcohol. Ptl. Scott performed the sobriety tests while I observed Jimenez's performance (See Supplemental Report by Ptl. Scott).

Based on my training and experience, and what was observed by Ptl. Scott and I during and prior to the tests, it was determined Jimenez was under the influence of alcohol. I placed Jimenez under arrest utilizing the double-locking mechanism, searched his person, and inventoried his belongings. Jimenez was placed in the back of marked patrol vehicle #01 for transportation to headquarters. Jimenez's vehicle was secured by Ptl. Scott and towed by Joe's Service Center as per John's Law.

I returned to headquarters with Jimenez and placed him on a bench in the booking room. It should be noted, Jimenez fell asleep in the rear of my patrol vehicle while en route to headquarters. Jimenez was read his Miranda Rights at 0029 hours by Sergeant Dierking #204. Due to a language barrier, Jimenez was explained his rights in Spanish. Jimenez understood and waived his rights by signing the paper explaining his rights in Spanish. Jimenez was then read the New Jersey Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators by Sgt. Dierking, and Jimenez agreed to submit samples of his breath after reading the Spanish version as well (See Supplemental Report by Sgt. Dierking).

Results of the chemical breath test showed Jimenez had a Blood Alcohol Content of 0.09%. It should be noted, test results were within acceptable tolerance as per the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

After Jimenez was finished being booked and processed, he was placed in the Juvenile Holding Cell, where he was allowed to contact his brother, _____, who agreed to come pick-up Jimenez from the police department.

Jimenez was given copies of his complaints, and advised of his mandatory court date on 03/21/2019 at 1600 hours. Jimenez signed off on his property bag and released to _____ on 03/07/2019 at 0206 hours as per John's Law.

Jimenez was charged with the following:

- Driving While Intoxicated (39: 4-50) on Complaint-Summons 1506-T-161688
- Reckless Driving (39:4-96) on Complaint-Summons 1506-T-161689
- Failure to Maintain Lane (39:4-88) on Complaint-Summons 1506-T-161690
- Unlicensed Driver (39:3-10) on Complaint-Summons 1506-T-161691

OfficerID: ssmith, Narrative

On 03/06/2019 at 2329 hours, while on patrol in marked police vehicle #150, I observed a vehicle bearing NJ registration E17GRF traveling North on Brick Blvd in the area of Drum Point Rd. While traveling behind the above mentioned vehicle, I observed it travel from the right most lane across the fog line and into the shoulder two separate times. As the two lanes on Brick Blvd opened to a third lane, the above suspect vehicle failed to merge into a single lane and instead traveled in both the right most lane and middle lane until I activated my overhead lights to initiate a motor vehicle stop.

The vehicle pulled off of Brick Blvd and into Drum point Arms Apartment Complex. I approached the vehicle on the driver's side and spoke with it's driver and sole occupant, Alfredo Jimenez, at which time I identified myself and asked him for his driver's license. Jimenez immediately admitted to driving without a license, before providing me with the vehicle's registration and insurance cards. As Jimenez spoke to me through the open driver side window, I was able to detect the scent of an alcoholic beverage on his breath. I

asked Jimenez if he had been drinking tonight, and he stated he had two or three beers approximately 1 hour ago, and has been drinking since approximately 1700 hours. I conducted an initial HGN test at which time I detected the onset of nystagmus in each eye and observed equal tracking in each eye with no signs of trauma. Ptl. Patrick #296 arrived on scene to assist with the investigation.

I asked Jimenez to step out of the vehicle in order to perform standardized field sobriety tests. We moved to an area behind his vehicle that was evenly paved, brightly lit, and clear of any debris with a bright and clearly painted yellow line marking a parking space.

The first test I conducted was the HGN test. I had Jimenez stand facing me with the yellow painted line extending out in front of him, with his heels together and toes of his feet separate while keeping his hands down to his sides while I conducted the test. I detected a lack of smooth pursuit in his right eye, the onset of nystagmus in both eyes prior to 45 degrees, and distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes. While attempting to maintain the test position, I detected Jimenez sway from side to side and front to rear and was able to continuously detect the scent of an alcoholic beverage on his breath.

For the second test I had Jimenez stand in the starting position for the walk-and-turn test, placing his left foot in front of his right foot touching heel-to-toe along the painted yellow line while keeping his hands down at his sides. I instructed him to not move or begin the test while I explained and demonstrated it for him. During the instruction phase, Jimenez stepped off the line and raised his hands from his sides for balance.

I instructed him, once told to begin, to take 9 steps forward touching heel-to-toe along the yellow painted line, counting each step out loud, looking down at his feet as he walked, and keeping his hands down at his sides. On his ninth step he was instructed to take a series of small steps in order to turn around and again take 9 heel-to-toe steps in the same manner as earlier. After explaining the test, I then physically demonstrated the test while again explaining it. I asked Jimenez if he had any injuries that would stop him from performing the test as instructed and he stated he did not. I asked Jimenez if he takes any medication or prescription drugs and he stated he did not. I asked Jimenez if he had any questions about this test and he stated he did not and he was instructed to begin.

Jimenez failed to touch heel-to-toe on multiple steps, raised his arms above his waist for balance, failed to initially count each step until reminded to do so, and stepped off the line several times.

For the last test, I had Jimenez take the starting position for the one leg stand, with his heels together and toes of his feet apart, facing me, with his hands down at his sides. I asked Jimenez if he had injured himself from the last test and he stated he did not. I again instructed him to not begin the test until told to do so and to listen while I explained and demonstrated this test. Jimenez stated he understood.

Jimenez was instructed, when told to begin, to lift the foot of his choice six inches off the ground, keeping his toe pointed forward with his knee straight and his hands down at his side, while counting out loud one thousand-and-one, one thousand-and-two, and so forth until told to stop. After explaining the test I then physically demonstrated the test while again explaining it. I asked Jimenez if he understood the test and he stated he did, at which time he was told to begin.

Jimenez placed his foot down while performing the test and raised his arms above his waist for balance.

Based upon the above observations and his own admission of having consumed alcoholic beverages prior to driving, Jimenez was placed under arrest for DUI, 39:4-50. Ptl. Patrick placed him under arrest and transported him to headquarters to be processed. Glenn's Towing arrived to the scene to impound Jimenez's vehicle as per John's Law.

OfficerID: sdierking, Narrative

On 03/7/19 at 2350 hours Ptl. Patrick #296 arrested Alfredo Jimenez for DUI. Ptl. Patrick transported Jimenez to headquarters, where he was secured in the booking room.

I assisted Ptl. Patrick by operating the Alcotest 7110. I began my 20 minute observation of Jimenez and activated my body worn camera to record the observation.

I advised Jimenez of his Miranda Rights he read a Spanish language copy as I read it in English. Jimenez stated he understood and signed the Waiver portion of the form, which was witnessed by myself and Ptl. Patrick. I then read Jimenez the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators while he read along a Spanish language copy of the statement. When asked if he would provide samples of his breath for testing, Jimenez responded "Yes".

During the 20 minute observation period Jimenez did not place any foreign objects in his mouth or regurgitate. After the 20 minute observation period I deactivated my body worn camera and it was removed from the room. It should be noted that all other portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room prior to activating the Alcotest, including cell phones, the laptop computer and portable radios.

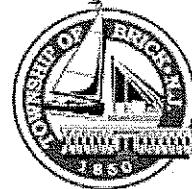
After the 20 minute observation period I activated the Alcotest and entered Jimenez's information into the machine. I advised Jimenez of the posted instructions for providing breath samples, which he stated he understood. I then placed a new mouthpiece on the machine (from a sealed bag) and Jimenez provided breath samples.

Jimenez provided 3 samples after receiving an error message on the first test. The error was "Blowing not allowed". He then provided 2 additional satisfactory samples. It should be noted that for each test I provided a new mouthpiece from a sealed bag for Jimenez to use. I also explained, in detail, how to provide a breath sample prior to each breath collection attempt and during each attempt. Jimenez's breath test result was 0.09 BAC.

On 03/09/19 at 1908 hours, Ptl. Mulcahey #130 and I responded to the area of Rt.70 and Duquesne Blvd. in reference to a three car motor vehicle accident. (See Accident Report).

While Ptl. Mulcahey was speaking to the at fault driver, Carlos Rodriguez Jr., he detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his breath. When asked how much he had to drink, Rodriguez stated two beers. Subsequently, I asked Rodriguez to step out of the vehicle to conduct Standard Field Sobriety Test to which he complied.

I brought him to an area of the side of the road that was flat, level and free of debris. I advised him I would explain, demonstrate and ask him if he understood each test prior to asking him to begin. Rodriguez stated he understood each test after they were demonstrated. Furthermore, I asked him if he had any medical problems which would preclude him from taking the test. Rodriguez stated he had a problem with his right knee and ankle from playing basketball. He went on to say, he didn't have surgery or consult a doctor about it. Rodriguez agreed to complete the test.

The first test was Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus. Rodriguez advised he did not have any problems with his eye yet wore glasses for distance. While conducting the test I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. The test was complete with six out of six hit/clues.

The second test was the One Leg Stand Test. Rodriguez stated he would use his left leg to conduct the test. When he started he swayed and placed his thumbs in his pockets for balance. He did not count out loud and placed his foot down after approximately 5 seconds. He started again and bent his right leg holding it over one foot off the ground still not counting out loud. He placed his foot down stating he couldn't keep his knee straight. He then attempted the test utilizing his right leg down and started over. He again did not count out loud, and placed his foot down prior to being told to stop. During the test Rodriguez swayed and raised his hands and arms up to balance. The test was stopped after he put his foot down the third time.

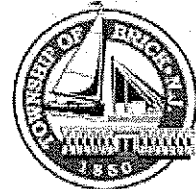
The third test was the Walk and Turn Test. Rodriguez was unable to hold the starting position while I was explaining the test. When he began he did not walk heel to toe crossing each foot in front of the other, touching the side of his heel each time. When he came to the turn he lost his balance almost falling over. He continued on the return stopping to steady himself and stepped off the center line. He completed the test.

Subsequently, Rodriguez was taken into custody for driving while intoxicated. He was transported to police headquarter for processing. His vehicle, P98KWK-NJ, was impounded as per "John Law." I responded to Brick Police Headquarters, to operate the Alcotest. Ptl. Mulcahey led Rodriguez into the Booking room. Rodriguez was read his rights and the standard statement. He was continuously observed in an excess of 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Rodriguez had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, K9 vehicle transmitter, BWC etc.) Rodriguez provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Rodriguez's BAC was recorded at 0.19%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

Rodriguez was issued the following summons 39:4-50 DUI T161114, 39:4-96 Reckless T161115 and 39:4-97 Careless E19001071. He was released to his mother, Yolanda Rodriguez, after signing the Potential Liability Warning.

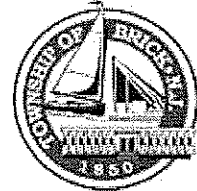

On 03/10/2019 at approximately 0050 hours, I was backing Ptl. Alexander #216 on a motor vehicle stop in the area of Route 70 eastbound, near Kentwood Boulevard. I was in marked patrol vehicle #14, positioned directly to the rear of Ptl. Alexander's patrol vehicle in the shoulder. Both vehicle's overhead emergency lights were activated. While in this position, I observed a black Jeep Cherokee pass closely to our vehicles, in the right lane of travel and I observed that there were no other vehicles on the roadway. I then exited the shoulder to affect a motor vehicle stop on said vehicle, in violation of N.J.S.A. 39:4-92.2, (failure to change lanes for emergency vehicles).

I then affected a motor vehicle stop on the vehicle (NJ-X68KTR), in the area of Route 70 and Morris Avenue. Ptl. Alexander also responded. I approached the passenger side window of the vehicle and observed one female driver, identified as Brittany Kenna. I identified myself and asked the driver to provide her license and vehicle documents. While I was speaking with Kenna, I detected the odor of burnt marijuana emanating from inside the vehicle. I then asked Kenna if there were anything illegal inside her vehicle to which she replied, "Yes, there is a little bit of weed."

I then asked Kenna to safely step out of the vehicle while Ptl. Alexander directed her to the rear of the vehicle. I informed her that I could smell marijuana inside her vehicle and she stated there was about a gram inside the center console. I then searched her person which was negative for weapons or CDS. Ptl. Alexander then remained with Kenna, while I conducted a search of the vehicle.

During search of the vehicle, I located the following CDS and paraphernalia in the center console.

(1) clear zip lock bag containing approximately 1.5 grams of suspected marijuana

(1) silver "\$" grinder containing suspected marijuana

(10) burnt cigar blunt wrappers containing burnt suspected marijuana

I then returned to Kenna and placed her into custody, handcuffed her to the rear, and conducted a search of her person again before placing her in the rear of my patrol vehicle. All CDS was secured in an evidence bag. Ptl. Alexander moved Kenna's vehicle off of Route 70 and onto the corner of MacArthur Drive and Harding Drive.

Upon arrival to Police Headquarters, I secured my department issued firearm and escorted Kenna to the cell block where she was searched a second time. Kenna was directed to the booking room for processing. Kenna was fingerprinted and photographed without incident.

Kenna was charged on complaint summons 1506-S-2019-000264 for the following:

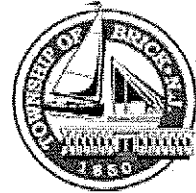

My body worn camera (VHC2-027006) was activated throughout the entirety of this incident. The backseat of my patrol vehicle was searched prior to, and following the transport of Kenna to police headquarters. My department issued firearm was secured prior to entering the cell area and processing room. Kenna was searched again prior to being placed in a holding cell. Kenna was also screened for suicidal tendencies with negative results. Standard 30 minute prisoner checks were conducted throughout her custody time per departmental policy and guidelines.

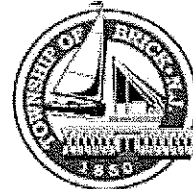

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On March 16, 2019, at approximately 1430 hours, Ptl. Carter #280 and I, responded to the area of 614 Parker Avenue for the report of a tan four door sedan parked at the end of 4th Street smoking CDS.

Upon my arrival, I observed a gold Toyota Camry, bearing NJ registration L38GUL, parked at the end of the road, near the water. The vehicle was occupied by two males and as I approached the driver's side of the vehicle, I could immediately begin to smell raw marijuana emanating from the vehicle. The male sitting in the driver's seat, Yehudihea A. Vazquez, provided his driver's license as I observed a red, yellow, and green grinder containing marijuana sitting on the lid for the center console of the vehicle. I asked Vazquez what's on the center console and he replied, "a grinder." He handed me both parts of the grinder and the lid was placed on top to secure the suspected marijuana. I asked Vazquez whose the marijuana and grinder belonged to and he stated, "It's mine." I then instructed Vazquez out of the car where he was placed in custody. While placing Vazquez in handcuffs, I asked him if there was anything else in the vehicle and he replied, "Yes. There's about an 1/8 in the glove compartment" as he told the passenger to remove it. The passenger, Michael J. Sonzogni removed a manila envelope and a dark colored glass pipe and handed it to me. Vazquez was then searched incident to arrest before being secured in the rear of my patrol car after making sure there was no contraband in the back seat.

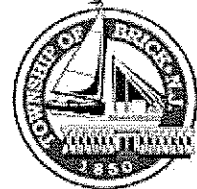
I returned to the vehicle and began speaking with Sonzogni, who was sitting in the front passenger seat. As I walked around the car, I observed his hands in down on the floor appearing to conceal something in the draw string style book bags. I saw a blue glass pipe, utilized for ingesting marijuana, sticking out of the bags that were on the floor where his hands were. Sonzogni was asked to step out of the vehicle where he was placed under arrest. While placing Sonzogni in handcuffs, I asked him if there was anything else and he advised he has a small amount of marijuana in his bag as well. He was searched incident to arrest and also placed in the rear of my patrol car. On the front passenger side floor, I located the blue glass smoking pipe along with another one, a brown "sharp stone" grinder in a blue fabric. I also located a zip lock bag containing a black sock with a glass jar with a colored skull within it. Inside the jar was the small amount of green vegetation, suspected to be marijuana, described by Sonzogni.

The vehicle was secured and remained parked on scene. Both individuals were transported to Headquarters. They were escorted inside where my service weapon was secured in the appropriate locker. Both males were then searched once again before being placed in the holding cells to be booked. Special Police Officers Bolch and Kontogiannis processed Vazquez and Sonzogni accordingly. Complaints were generated for 2C:35-10A(4) possession of marijuana under 50 grams and 2C:36-2 possession of drug paraphernalia and issued to both males. Both males were released with a future court date.

The suspected marijuana and paraphernalia were logged into property to be tested for CDS.

On 03/16/19 at approximately 1526 hours I, Ptl. Carter #280 was on patrol in the area of Krauser's, 660 Herbertsville Rd. While traveling down the roadway an unidentified male ran into the roadway to flag me down in reference to an intoxicated driver. The male pointed to a black truck pulling out of the parking lot and advised that was the vehicle.

As the Black Chevy Silverado bearing NJ Reg. L29 KMA passed me the operator, later identified as Andrew Boyle failed to maintain his lane, crossing the double yellow line into oncoming traffic. I proceeded to follow the vehicle which was traveling at a rate over 49 mph in a 40 mph zone. Additionally the vehicle had tinted windows and failed to utilize the turn signal on several occasions. Once I activated my emergency lights to conduct a traffic stop Boyle failed to stop at the earliest convenience despite the roadway being safe to do so. Boyle eventually stopped the vehicle in front of 212 Cleveland Ct, rolled the window back up, and abruptly exited the vehicle. Also residents from 212 Cleveland Ct exited the residence and began encroaching the traffic stop. Prior to additional units arrival I opted to detain Boyle in mechanical restraints due to the initial failure to stop and rolling up the windows concealing his movements.

Ptl. Defluri #270 and Ptl. LaPoint #222 arrived on scene shortly after. In the short interaction with Boyle I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath when he spoke. Boyle's clothing was disheveled and his fly on his jeans was open. Boyle's eyes were also watery and bloodshot. The mechanical restraints were removed to perform various tests to judge Boyle's intoxication level.

Boyle was led to an area which was flat and clear of debris. He was advised I would be conducting a series of tests to judge his sobriety. I asked Boyle if he had any physical ailments that affect his balance or walking to which he advised no. Boyle did not that he does have seizures occasionally, however this does not affect his balance or walking.

Boyle was explained the first test would be the one leg stand test. Prior to beginning the test Boyle was explained the starting position and asked to remain in that position for the remainder of the instructional phase. The test was explained and demonstrated for Boyle. I confirmed that Boyle understood the instructions and was asked to begin the test.

While explaining the test I observed Boyle swaying in a slight circular motion. Boyle began the test before being instructed to do so. Additionally Boyle widened his feet and did not remain in the staring position before beginning the test. When Boyle began the test his arms raised immediately and he failed to look at his toe as instructed, despite numerous verbal instructions to do so. Boyle was only able to lift his foot for a very brief amount of time before having to place it down for balance. The time Boyle raised his foot was not sufficient enough to complete the test. Additionally Boyle did not look at his foot as instructed. Boyle failed the test despite numerous attempts.

Boyle was instructed the next test would be the walk and turn test. The starting position was demonstrated and Boyle was asked to remain in this position for the remainder of the instructional phase. The test was explained and demonstrated for Boyle. Boyle again advised he understood the instructions.

Again while explaining the test I observed Boyle swaying in a slight circular motion and failed to remain in the starting position. When Boyle began the test he raised his arms for balance. Boyle forgot the instructions for the test despite acknowledging he understood them just before. Boyle also turned in a manor which was inconsistent with the demonstrated turn, nearly falling in the process.

Ptl. LaPoint conducted the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test which indicated a failure resulting in a 6 of 6. During the testing Boyle continued to sway in a circular motion.

Based on Boyle being unable to complete any of the tests and failing the tests he was placed in custody for driving while intoxicated. Boyle was placed in double locked mechanical restraints and transported to headquarters in patrol vehicle 07. The rear seat of vehicle 07 was searched prior to and after Boyle's transport. Once at Brick Police Headquarters all needed DWI paperwork was completed. Ptl. Defluri responded as well to operate the Alcotest 7110. See his supplemental report for additional details. The Alcotest Calculator was deemed to be within acceptable tolerances and revealed a blood alcohol level of 0.21 Boyle was issued the following summons:

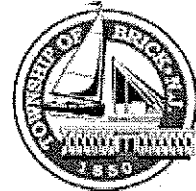

Once at headquarters and I conducted an uninterrupted twenty minute observation utilizing the clock on the computer in the booking room. Prior to the observation period I observed Andrew's oral cavity to be free of any foreign objects. Further, during the observation period he did not regurgitate or belch. At the completion of the twenty minute observation period I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Andrew gave a total of two adequate breaths, each time utilizing a new mouthpiece. Andrew's breath samples recorded 0.21% BAC. which were within acceptable tolerance.

On 03/16/2019, at approximately 2301 hours, officers were dispatched to Jack & Mikes Bar and Grill 979 Cedar Bridge Ave., in reference to a disorderly persons. According to the complainant, later identified as [REDACTED] there was a white male wearing a blue shirt and a leather jacket tapping his waste band making threats to [REDACTED] that he had a gun.

Sgt. Matthews #210 and Ptl. Rossi #240 first arrived on scene and advised that the male subject in question left in a white suv down Cedar Bridge toward Mantoloking Rd.. Officers began checking the areas of Mantoloking Road, Hooper Ave., and Drum Point with negative results.

While searching for the vehicle in question, Sgt. Matthews observed a white Hyundai Tucson bearing NC FDT4348 at the red light of Mantoloking Rd., and Cedar Bridge Ave. matching the description of the vehicle. When the light turned green Sgt. Matthews conducted a motor vehicle stop on the above mentioned vehicle in the parking lot of 940 cedar Bridge Ave.. Sgt. Thomas #164, Ptl. Firreno #283, and I arrived on location to assist.

Once the vehicle was stopped we immediately requested the driver to step out of the vehicle. The driver, later identified as John Carpino matched the description gave by [REDACTED] Sgt. Matthews and I immediately patted down Carpino for any weapons. There was none found on his persons at this time. After checking him for weapons, I asked Carpino if he was at Jack & Mikes bar earlier and he replied that he was. I then asked what occurred there and he claimed that he confronted [REDACTED] in regards to [REDACTED] grabbing him from and pulling him to the ground approximately a year ago. Carpino advised he told [REDACTED] that he wanted to finish the incident from a year ago like men outside tonight. According to Carpino when [REDACTED] refused to confront him, he left. I asked Carpino if he ever threatened [REDACTED] with a gun or tapped his waste band signaling that he had one. Carpino denied that he did neither and just left.

At that point, after speaking to Carpino, I responded over to Jack and Mikes Bar and Grill to speak with [REDACTED] Ptl. Firreno, along with Sgt. Matthews and Sgt. Thomas remained on scene with Carpino and conducted a DWI investigation see Ptl. Firreno's report for further details.

Upon my arrival, at the bar, I spoke with [REDACTED] in regards to what occurred. [REDACTED] stated that Carpino came into the bar and recognized him right away. According to [REDACTED] the owners have requested that Carpino was not to be served or allowed in the bar. [REDACTED] advised he approached Carpino and advised him he had to leave. According to [REDACTED] however, Carpino refused to and began making threats that he was going to, "do him in ", and began tapping his waste band, claiming he was, "packing heat".

[REDACTED] concerned that Carpino might be carrying a gun decided to call police. According to [REDACTED] at that point, Carpino finally walked out and left.

[REDACTED] at this time requested that Carpino be advised he is no longer allowed in Jack & Mikes Bar and Grill. I advised [REDACTED] of the case number for the report and responded back to Headquarters.

Carpino was advised at (HQ) at 0110 hours on 03/17/2019 that he is no longer allowed into Jack & Mikes Bar and Grill establishment as per management.

OfficerID: malexander, Narrative

On March 16, 2019 at approximately 2350 hours I (Patrolman Alexander #216) responded to Brick Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest for Patrolman Firreno #283.

Patrolman Firreno led the suspect, John Carpino, into the Booking room. I explained to Carpino I was going to be operating the Alcotest. I first checked the inside of his mouth for any residual alcohol or foreign objects, which was negative. I then read Carpino his Miranda Rights and The New Jersey Attorney General's Standard Statement Form for Motor Vehicle Operators, which Carpino stated he understood his rights and would provide breath samples. Carpino was observed in excess of 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Carpino had burped or regurgitated. Prior to administering the test all electronic devices were removed from the room. Carpino was then given the test and provided two breath samples, as required by law. Carpino's reported BAC was recorded at 0.09%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

My body worn camera was activated up until I operated the Alcotest.

OfficerID: MFirneno, Narrative

On 03/16/2019 at approximately 2301 hours, Sgt. Thomas #164, Sgt. Olsen #184, Sgt. Matthews #210, Ptl. Rossi #240, Ptl. Theibault #258, Ptl. Stephenson #278 and I were dispatched to 979 Cedar Bridge Avenue (Jack & Mike's Bar & Grill) for a report of a disorderly person threatening an employee with a gun. While en route, dispatch advised the suspect left the scene in a white SUV crossover heading towards Mantoloking Road. The responding units began canvassing the area.

At 2301 hours, Sgt. Matthews made a traffic stop in the area of 920 Cedar Bridge Avenue on a vehicle matching the suspect vehicle's description. The traffic stop was for failure to maintain lane and littering (flicking a cigarette out the window). Ptl. Theibault arrived on scene. Sgt. Matthews made contact with the driver, John Carpino, who was confirmed as the suspect. Carpino was asked to step out of the vehicle. He was immediately pat-frisked for weapons by Sgt. Matthews and Ptl. Theibault yielding negative results. During this time I arrived on scene.

As Ptl. Theibault and I spoke with Carpino, I was able to detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. Carpino was asked to provide his driver's license. As Carpino attempted to look through his wallet, he dropped it on the floor. After slowly picking his wallet up, Carpino shuffled through various cards in his wallet attempting to locate his license. I observed Carpino shuffle past his license without realizing. As Carpino shuffled through the various cards for a second time, he again passed his license. Ptl. Theibault pointed out Carpino's license to him. As I watched Carpino shuffle through his wallet, I noticed his hand movements which were slow and fumbling. I asked Carpino how much alcohol he consumed this evening. Carpino stated he had about three glasses of wine. I advised Carpino I would be administering him a series of field sobriety tests.

I asked Carpino to recite the alphabet slowly and clearly without singing. Carpino started to sing the alphabet. I stopped Carpino, explained the test once more and then asked him to start again. Carpino completed the task successfully without incident.

Next I began explaining the One Legged Stand Test. I explained and showed Carpino the starting position. I asked him to stand both feet together with his hands at his side while I explained the test further. Carpino advised he could not complete any walking tests because he broke his leg twice within the last year. I asked Carpino, how he managed to walk around the bar this evening if his leg was so severely damaged. Carpino did not answer the question. He just repeated his leg was injured. I advised Carpino he would not need to walk for this test. I explained the test to Carpino, again requesting his arms remain at his side while his feet remain together until I told him to begin. I advised Carpino that when instructed, to lift one leg of his choice approximately six inches off the ground and to count by one-thousands until instructed to stop. Carpino struggled to keep his balance in the starting position. His arms waved to the sides as his body swayed. Carpino took small steps to catch his balance. After multiple times attempting to properly assume the position, Carpino lifted his leg off the floor and counted "one one-thousand" and then dropped his foot. Carpino attempted the test multiple times on both legs, never being able to hold his foot up past one one-thousand. After several failed tries, we moved onto the next test.

Finally I attempted to explain to Carpino the walk and turn test. I displayed the starting position to Carpino. I asked him to assume the starting position while I give him further instructions. I requested Carpino to stand one foot in front of the other, heel to toe. Carpino attempted to assume the position; however, every time he placed one foot in front of the other, he would lose his footing taking several steps to regain his balance. After attempting multiple times, Carpino was not successfully able to stand heel to toe. Carpino stumbled so hard, Ptl. Theibault assisted Carpino to regain his balance to help him from falling. Due to safety reasons I terminated the final test.

Due to Sgt. Matthews observation of Carpino failing to maintain lane, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath, combined with failing two of the three administered psychophysical tests, he was placed under arrest for 39:4-50. (Driving Under the Influence). Carpino was hand-cuffed to the rear using two handcuffs (Double-locked) due to his size. Carpino was searched incident to arrest yielding negative results, then placed in the rear of patrol vehicle #15 for transport. A search of Carpino's vehicle yielded negative results for additional alcohol or contraband. Dispatch advised D&L Towing was en route to tow Carpino's vehicle as per John's Law. Sgt. Matthews remained on scene until D&L took custody of the vehicle.

At headquarters Carpino was booked and processed. Ptl. Alexander #216 responded to headquarters and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Alexander's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered, the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest, Ptl. Alexander advised me, Carpino provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.09%.

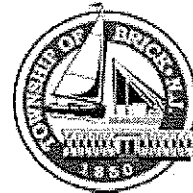

OfficerID: ccarter, Narrative

On 03/17/19 at approximately 2317 hours I, Ptl. Carter #280 was working DUI patrol in the area of Brick Blvd nearing the intersection with Cedar Bridge Ave. While in the area I observed a Black Volvo bearing NJ Reg L96 KFJ with window tint. The vehicle utilized an exit from Brick Blvd to Jackson Ave where the vehicle operator, later identified as Gerard Marasco failed to stop for a posted stop sign. The vehicle then continued down Jackson Ave at a rate of 30 mph in a 25 mph zone. I conducted a motor vehicle stop of the vehicle at the intersection of Linden Ave and Jackson Ave.

Upon making contact with Marasco he advised he was coming from PJ Sweeneys, 447 Brick Blvd. When Marasco spoke I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. Marasco's clothing was dirty and he dropped cigarette ashes on himself. Marasco's eyes were bloodshot and watery as well. Ptl. Mancini #282 responded to the scene.

Based on my observations I opted to perform a series of tests to judge his sobriety. Marasco was asked to exit his vehicle onto a section of roadway which was clear of debris and obstructions. Ptl. Mancini conducted the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test which produced a result of 6 out of 6 hits. See Ptl. Mancini supplemental report for more details. While Ptl. Mancini conducted the test I observed Marasco swaying in a circular motion.

I asked Marasco if he had any physical ailments that affected his balance or walking to which he advised no. Marasco did note that his knees were "screwed up" from BMX riding, however it does not affect his walking or balance.

Marasco was explained the first test would be the one leg stand test. Prior to beginning the test Marasco was explained the starting position and asked to remain in that position for the remainder of the instructional phase. The test was explained and demonstrated for Marasco. I confirmed that Marasco understood the instructions and was asked to begin the test.

While explaining the test I observed Marasco swaying in a slight circular motion. When Marasco began the test he nearly fell over. Marasco also failed to look at his toe as instructed. Marasco was only able to lift his foot for a very brief amount of time before having to place it down for balance. The time Marasco raised his foot was not sufficient enough to complete the test, resulting in a failure.

Marasco was instructed the next test would be the walk and turn test. The starting position was demonstrated and Marasco was asked to remain in this position for the remainder of the instructional phase. The test was explained and demonstrated for Marasco. Marasco again advised he understood the instructions.

Again while explaining the test I observed Marasco swaying in a slight circular motion and he failed to remain in the starting position. When Marasco began the test he raised his arms for balance. Marasco's steps were not all heel toe as required and he stumbled several times.

Based on Marasco being unable to complete any of the tests and failing the tests he was placed in custody for driving while intoxicated. Marasco was placed in double locked mechanical restraints and transported to headquarters in patrol vehicle 07. The rear seat of vehicle 07 was searched prior to and after Marasco's transport. Prior to booking procedures my duty weapon was secured in accordance with policy. Once at Brick Police Headquarters all needed DWI paperwork was completed. Ptl. Mancini remained on scene awaiting a tow truck to impound Marasco's vehicle in accordance with John's Law.

Ptl. Bennett #279 responded as well to operate the Alcotest 7110. See his supplemental report for additional details. The Alcotest Calculator was deemed to be within acceptable tolerances and revealed a blood alcohol level of 0.09.

Marasco was issued the following summons:

T162082 Driving While Under the Influence (39:4-50)
T162083 Failure to Stop(39:4-88)
T162084 Reckless Driving(39:4-96)

Marasco responded to Headquarters and completed a Potential Liability Waiver acknowledging responsibility of Marasco. Marasco was released to _____ and his vehicle was entered impounded into AEGIS.

OfficerID: mbennett, Narrative

On 03/17/2019 I assisted Ptl. Carter #280 in acting as Alcotest Operator for his DWI arrest of Gerard J. Marasco. I assisted Ptl. Carter in escorting Marasco into police headquarters from his patrol vehicle. Once inside, I secured my duty weapon in one of the designated gun lockers and removed my portable police radio and cellular phone from my person. Marasco was secured and escorted

into the booking room by Ptl. Carter. I entered the booking room and visually confirmed that there were no foreign objects in Marasco's mouth (i.e. gum, breath mints, etc.) I then began the twenty minute observation period of Marasco at 2350hrs.

During the observation period, I read Marasco the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement form and he agreed to provide breath samples. I also read him his Miranda Rights and he agreed to talk to me. Marasco advised that he consumed one shot and three Yuengling Lager beers prior to driving his vehicle. While conducting the observation period, I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage inside the booking room. I also noticed that Marasco's speech was slow and slurred when he spoke to me.

At 0011hrs, I deactivated my body worn camera and handed it to Ptl. Theibault #258 through the doorway so he could take it to another location. I then began entering Marasco's pedigree information into the Alcotest Unit. After obtaining two acceptable breath samples from Marasco, his blood alcohol content was found to be 0.09% BAC (sequential file #02832). The results were then entered into the Alcotest calculator by police dispatch and found to be within the allowable tolerances. See Ptl. Carter's case narrative for further details.

OfficerID: emancini, Narrative

On 03/17/2019 at approximately 2318 hours, I responded to the area of Jackson Avenue and Linden Avenue to back Ptl. Carter #280 on a motor vehicle stop. Ptl. Carter informed me that he suspected the driver to be intoxicated and requested for me to implement the horizontal gaze nystagmus field sobriety test.

I approached the drivers door and asked the driver, identified as Gerard Marasco, to exit his vehicle. I asked Marasco if had anything to drink which he responded, "I only had about three beers." While he was speaking, I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. I also observed that his eyes were watery. I then advised Marasco that I was going to perform a test of his eyes and directed him to stand in the starting position, which was standing feet together while holding his arms down at his sides. Marasco was advised to remain in this position during the test.

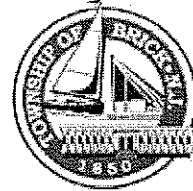
While Marasco was in the starting position, he was swaying from side to side. I first asked Marasco if he had any medical ailments or defects to his vision or eyes. Marasco replied that he wears reading glasses, but no medical issues.

Marasco displayed lack of smooth pursuit, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation, as well as onset of nystagmus prior to forty five degrees in both eyes. There was also indication of vertical nystagmus in both eyes. The test was then concluded and my observation indicated 6 out of 6 clues for intoxication. Throughout the test, Marasco was observed swaying side to side.

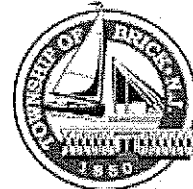

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On 03/18/2019 at approximately 2150 hours, I responded to the entrance of Kohl's Plaza (664 Route 70) to assist Sgt. Catalina #229 in reference to a motor vehicle complaint. (See supp. report by Sgt. Catalina). Upon arrival, I observed Sgt. Catalina with his emergency lights activated attempting to effectuate a motor vehicle stop of the suspect vehicle (2017 Honda Civic New Jersey registration H85JFT). The vehicle struck a curb with both passenger side tires during the stop. The vehicle then began to reverse almost striking Sgt. Catalina's patrol vehicle.

Sgt. Catalina and I exited our vehicles and approached the suspect vehicle. Both officers activated Body Worn Cameras (BWC) upon approach. I made contact with the driver later identified as Nathaniel Ramirez. I ordered Ramirez to turn off the vehicle; he complied and shut the engine. Ramirez began fumbling with documents inside the vehicle. His speech was slow and hard to understand. Ramirez was requested to exit the vehicle; he complied and was directed toward the rear of his vehicle. Ramirez was slow moving and stated he was just coming from his house and wanted to get "out of the house". Ramirez eyes were glassy and pupils constricted. Ramirez had trouble answering basic questions and insisted he was coming from his house. Believing Ramirez to be under the influence of alcohol and/or narcotics, I requested he perform standardized field sobriety tests (SFSTs). Ramirez was directed to a clean, level, and well-lit area in the parking lot. The following psycho-physical (divided attention) tests were explained and demonstrated to Ramirez, 1) Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN), 2) Walk and Turn Test, 3) One Leg Stand Test.

For the instruction phase of the first test, I instructed Ramirez to stand with his feet together and his arms at his sides while I explain the test. I advised Ramirez to keep his head still and move only his eyes for the test. I instructed Ramirez to follow the tip of my pen (stimulus) with his eyes only. Constricted pupil size and equal tracking were observed in both eyes. I conducted the tests; at conclusion the following three (3) indicators were present in each eye for a total of six indicators (6).

- 1) Lack of smooth pursuit
- 2) Distinct nystagmus at maximum deviation
- 3) Onset prior to 45 degrees

Vertical nystagmus was also present. Ramirez moved his head several times while performing the test.

For the instruction phase of the second test, I instructed Ramirez to place his right foot in front of his left foot (heel to toe) on the solid white parking line as I explain and demonstrate the test. Ramirez initially was unable to place his right foot in front of left without losing balance. Ramirez was asked if he had any injuries, he explained he had "mini seizures" when he was younger. After explaining directions and demonstrating the test to Ramirez, I advised him to begin the test. Ramirez began walking, on the eight step Ramirez stopped to balance himself. While completing his ninth step and turning, Ramirez lost balance. While walking back, Ramirez stopped on the second step to ask for direction again, also again losing balance. Ramirez walked eleven steps and stopped again losing balance while turning.

I explained the final test, one-legged stand to Ramirez. He was instructed to raise his right leg six inches from the ground while keeping his hands at his sides. Ramirez was instructed to count out loud one-one thousand, two-one thousand, and so on. Ramirez began the test by lifting his right leg off the ground; he maintained this position for approximately two (2) seconds and placed his leg on the ground while raising his arms. Ramirez had trouble maintaining balance after being given the opportunity to perform with both legs. Ramirez was unable to complete the test

Based on Ramirez dangerous driving, signs of impairment, HGN present, and his inability to follow my directions or successfully complete any of the divided attention tests, Ramirez was arrested for operating a motor vehicle under the influence. Ramirez was placed into custody and secured in the rear of my patrol vehicle. Ramirez was searched per departmental procedure prior to being placed in my vehicle which was also searched prior.

Sgt. Catalina and I approached Ramirez's vehicle to search for evidence of intoxicants, while at the rear passenger side door, I detected the odor of raw marijuana emanating from the interior compartment of the motor vehicle. A search of the vehicle revealed the following items:

- 1) Two (2) 'Royal Oil' THC cartridges located in the center console
- 2) One (1) 'Exotic Carts' THC cartridge reading "THC 80-85%" on the packaging located in the center console area
- 3) One (1) circular plastic tums jar containing marijuana 50 grams or less

The items were seized and later placed into evidence for testing

Ramirez was transported to Police Headquarters in vehicle #35. At headquarters, I secured my duty weapon and escorted Ramirez to cell block #1 where he was searched per departmental policy. Ramirez was escorted to the processing room where booking procedures

began; Ptl. Deluca #276 assisted. This area was free from any type of electronic devices on me, Ramirez and any officers who entered the room (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, laptop, etc.). Ramirez was seated and read Miranda warnings at 22:10 hours. At 22:12 hours, I began a constant, uninterrupted observation of Ramirez in excess of twenty minutes. I read the New Jersey D.W.I. Standard Statement form to Ramirez. When asked to provide breath samples, Ramirez stated "Yes". My observation continued throughout my entire contact with Ramirez during which time he belched several times. My observation period restarted at 22:38 hours, where I again began a constant, uninterrupted observation of Ramirez in excess of twenty minutes. This observation continued throughout my entire contact with Ramirez during which time he did not belch, vomit, or place anything in his mouth. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine. Prior to operation, Ptl. Deluca and I deactivated and secured our BWCs. After each test, a new clean mouth piece was used. At the conclusion of the test, Ramirez provided sufficient breath samples yielding a BAC of 0.00%.

Believing Ramirez to be under the influence of a narcotic, I requested a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) responded to headquarters to complete a DRE evaluation. DRE Thomas Caulfield (Brick PD #235) responded to headquarters and administered a DRE evaluation. (See report by DRE Caulfield). Ramirez also provided urine which was placed into evidence for testing.

Ramirez was issued the following motor vehicle summonses:

Ramirez vehicle was towed per Johns Law by D&L towing.

Ramirez was released to the custody of _____ who completed the potential liability form.

On 03/18/19 at 2143 hours, while on patrol in the area of Chambers Bridge Road and Brick Boulevard, dispatch requested units to check the area near Outback Steakhouse for a motor vehicle, a 2017 Honda Civic bearing New Jersey registration H85JFT being driven by a possible intoxicated driver.

Across the intersection was Ptl. Mulcahey #130 who was already behind the suspect vehicle and I pulled behind him. I moved my marked patrol vehicle directly behind the Honda Civic and when the traffic signal turned green, the Civic went across the intersection.

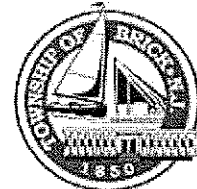
Once the vehicle was across the intersection, it failed to maintain its lane of travel by changing into the right lane and then crossed over the double yellow line into traffic. The vehicle was being driven in an unsafe manner which prompted me to advise another unit who was in front of the vehicle to watch out so it does not get struck by it.

We stopped at the intersection of Chambers Bridge and Route 70 for the red traffic signal. The driver then put the vehicle in reverse and drove back towards my vehicle to bring the vehicle off of the curb. At this time Ptl. Talty #250 arrived on scene and we approached the driver's side of the vehicle.

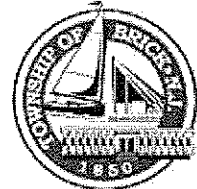

On 03/20/2019 at 2041 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on patrol in the rear parking lot of the Brick Motor Inn located at 912 Route 70. As a police officer I have observed and conducted numerous drug related arrests and investigations in the parking lot of the Brick Motor Inn. During this time, I observed a black Honda Accord with no front license plate backed into a parking space in the middle of the parking lot. I later identified the rear license plate as NJ temporary registration T181988.

The vehicle had various pieces of trash (Wendy's Restaurant bags) lying around the vehicle. I further observed that there were two occupants inside the vehicle. It appeared as if the passengers inside had littered the trash around the vehicle. As I passed the vehicle I observed the rear passenger lay down across the rear seat and the front passenger lower his upper body and tilt the front passenger seat back to hide his person.

I then exited my patrol vehicle and made a passenger side approach on the suspect vehicle. There I made contact with two occupants who were identified as Donte Kolas (front passenger) and Jessica Jobes (rear passenger). I asked Kolas what they were doing in the parking lot and he related that they were waiting for a friend to get home from work. While speaking with Kolas I detected the raw odor of marijuana emanating from inside the vehicle. I also observed trace amounts of green vegetation (suspect marijuana) lying in plain view in the center console area of the vehicle. As a result, I requested Ptl. Riccio #289 respond to the scene. Both Kolas and Jobes were then advised to exit the vehicle to which they both complied. Outside the vehicle I detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the clothing of both Jobes and Kolas. As a result, I conducted a search of Kolas for marijuana, which revealed negative results.

Ptl. Riccio then advised Jobes of her Miranda rights verbatim from a card that he keeps in the front pocket of his uniform shirt. Jobes then stated she understood and agreed to speak with officers on scene. There I asked Jobes if there was any marijuana inside her vehicle. Jobes then raised her hand and pointed in the direction of passenger side glove compartment. Jobes further related that there was a small amount of marijuana near that location. Ptl. Riccio also advised Kolas of his Miranda rights to which he also stated he understood and agreed to speak to officers on scene. A search of the interior of the vehicle revealed the following evidence:

1. One (1) plastic container with green vegetation inside, suspect marijuana. The plastic container was located inside the passenger side glove compartment. I also located a burnt marijuana cigar inside the plastic container.
2. One (1) plastic bag containing edible chocolate "brownies" containing suspect marijuana. The "brownies" were located inside the glove compartment. During this time, I stopped my search and asked Jobes if the recovered "brownies" contained marijuana to which she stated yes.

Upon completion, I asked Jobes if there was any contraband inside the trunk. Jobes then stated that there was a "bong" inside the trunk. Through my police training, knowledge, and experience I know that a "Bong" is a pipe that is commonly used to smoke marijuana. A search of the trunk revealed the following evidence:

1. One (1) white colored rubber "bong" marked with multiple pictures of one-hundred dollar bills. The "bong" contained burnt vegetation, suspect marijuana. The "bong" was observed lying in plain view as I opened the trunk.
2. One (1) black colored digital scale labeled "AWS" covered in green vegetation, suspect marijuana.
3. One (1) multi-colored glass pipe containing burnt vegetation, suspect marijuana. The scale and pipe were located inside a blue back pack inside the trunk.
4. Multiple pieces of assorted metal jewelry (rings, necklaces, bracelets, ear rings), which were located inside the blue back pack. I asked both Kolas and Jobes about the jewelry and she (Jobes) stated it belonged to her.

I then removed the blue back pack from the trunk and asked Jobes and Kolas who the bag belonged to and Kolas stated it was his bag. As a result, both Jobes and Kolas were placed under arrest for possessing CDS (controlled dangerous substance) and drug paraphernalia. Both Jobes and Kolas were placed into handcuffs to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. Ptl. Riccio then seat belted and secured Jobes inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #16. While I seat belted and secured Kolas inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #24. All recovered CDS and drug paraphernalia located on scene were sealed inside department issued evidence bags and secured inside patrol vehicle #24. The suspect vehicle was locked and secured prior to leaving the scene. Both Jobes and Kolas were then transported to police headquarters, where they were booked and processed as per departmental policy. All recovered suspect marijuana that was found during my investigation was labeled "to be tested". All evidence (drug paraphernalia, CDS) was properly secured and placed into evidence locker #09, which is located inside the departmental intake room. Both Kolas and Jobes were released from police custody on a complaint summons and were advised of their future court dates

Jobes was charged on the following complaint summons: 1506-S-2019-000302.

- Possession 50 grams or less of marijuana: 2C:35-10A(4), two counts.
- Possession of drug paraphernalia: 2C:36-2.

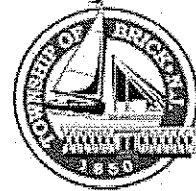

On 03/21/19 at 0025 hours I, Ptl. Hentges #288, was on patrol (patrol vehicle #11) traveling north on Herbertsville Rd in the area of Maple Ave. While traveling on Herbertsville Rd I observed a white GMC Sierra bearing NJ registration K42JWE stopped at the light on Herbertsville Rd and Maple Rd.

Shortly after the traffic signal changed to green the vehicle began to proceed through the intersection. While the vehicle started to go through the intersection it started to drift to the right and crossed over the fog line. The vehicle was across the line for approximately 30 feet before jerking back into road way. Approximately 200 yards further down the road over half of the vehicle crossed over the double yellow line into the opposing lane for roughly 80 yards.

After I observed the motor vehicle violation I activated my patrol vehicle's overhead emergency lights. After approximate 200 yards the vehicle did not stop so I activated my patrol vehicles siren. Shortly after activating my siren the vehicle turned onto Thiele Rd and stopped in the middle of the Rd. Upon initiating the motor vehicle stop, I exited my patrol vehicle and approached the front driver side window that was closed. I asked the driver to lower his window and he proceeded to unlock his door multiple times. After he lowered his window I identified myself, and requested the driver/arrestee, identified as Donald Phillips, to exhibit his driving credentials.

As Phillips was retrieving his vehicle documents, I observed that his hand movements were very slow and fumbling. After handing me his driving credentials, I asked Phillips where he was coming from and/or if he had consumed any alcoholic beverages. Phillips stated that he had a work party at the River Rock Restaurant and Marina Bar (1600 Rt. 70). Phillips stated that he had consumed a few beers in the hour before leaving the restaurant. As I continued speaking with Phillips, I observed his speech was very slow and slurred. In addition, I observed his eyes were watery, bloodshot, and eyelids were very heavy and droopy. I was also able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin compartment of the vehicle.

At that time, I had Phillips exit the vehicle in order to administer field sobriety tests in which he, Phillips, had no objection to. As Phillips was exiting his vehicle and walking towards the front of his vehicle, I observed he was swaying and sagging while walking. While Phillips was standing in front of his vehicle, I also observed that he was swaying while standing, his knees were sagging, and his stance was very rigid. In addition, a very strong and overwhelming odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Phillips breath while speaking to him outside his vehicle. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Phillips stated that he had arthritis in both of his knees and his elbow. I asked Phillips if he would attempt the test and he advised that he would.

The first test I conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Phillips as to how to perform the examination, Phillips had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While attempting to administer the test Phillips was swaying both front to back and side to side. Phillips was unable to focus on the tip of the stimulus. I advised Phillips multiple times to not move his head during the test which he was unable to do. Due to Phillips moving his head and not following the stimulus with his eyes I terminated the test.

The second test I conducted was the Walk and Turn Test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Phillips continued to sway while standing and had much difficulty maintaining his balance while in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Phillips had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Phillips had to stop walking to steady himself, failed to touch heel to toe on every step, lost his balance while walking (Stepped off the line), used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), lost his balance while turning (Began to stagger), and turned incorrectly, and took an incorrect amount of steps.

The next examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed that Phillips was swaying and sagging while standing in the starting position. . Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Phillips had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Phillips was swaying while his leg was elevated, used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), Phillips attempted to raise his foot but was unable to keep it raised for more then a second. Phillips attempted the test multiple times and every time was not able to keep his foot raised for more than a second before dropping it for balance.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Phillips was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol car #11 without incident. Ptl. Joaquim #271 remained at the scene and awaited Rt. 88 Auto Body to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Therghesen #249 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Therghesen advised me, Phillips provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.18%.

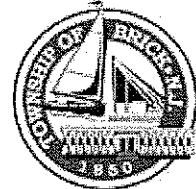

On 03/21/2019 at 2045 hrs, while I patrolled the area of Burnt Tavern Road and Lanes Mill Road, I observed a white Toyota Camry bearing NJ Reg Z98HYK in the right most left turn lane to travel onto Lanes Mill Road. I was in the left most turn lane just next to the suspect vehicle. The light changed to green, the suspect vehicle and I began to turn at which time he switched into my lane without signaling.

Once on Lanes Mill Road the suspect vehicle drove in the center median for approximately 50 feet. I conducted a motor vehicle stop on the vehicle in the area of 1891 Lanes Mill Road. I approached the vehicle and made contact with the driver, Luis Henry. Henry provided me with his license, but was unable to locate his registration and proof of insurance. Ptl. Prendeville 223 arrived on scene to assist. I asked Henry if he had anything to drink tonight, he stated that he had 3 beers approximately an hour ago. I had Henry step out of the vehicle and onto the sidewalk where the ground was level to begin field sobriety tests. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of field sobriety tests, Henry stated that his knees have been bad since birth. The field sobriety tests were conducted in a well lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Henry what his highest level of education was, he stated that he attended college. I asked Henry if he well versed in the English language, he stated he was. While Henry spoke I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanate from his person and breath.

The first examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand-Test. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Henry had no questions and was instructed to begin. Henry was unable to perform the test for more than 1 second without putting his foot down to prevent himself from falling. I terminated the test due to Henry being unable to perform.

The second examination conducted was to recite the alphabet starting with A and ending with Q. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Henry stated he had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Henry slurred several times. While he recited, he went from the letter L to the letter P. He then went from the letter S to the letter U, then the letter T. After that he slurred the letters X, Y and Z.

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Henry was unable to maintain the starting position, he had his feet canted out to the side and swayed side to side. After fully explaining and demonstrating the test, Henry had no questions and was instructed to begin, when he was ready. Henry failed to count his all steps aloud and took 10 steps forward. After the 10 steps forward, Henry stopped and stared at me. I advised him he was supposed to take 9 steps back in the opposite direction. He then took 11 more steps back. Though out the entire test, Henry failed to put his toe to his heel even once. due to the traffic violations, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Henry's breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests, I placed Henry under arrest for 39:4-50 Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol. Henry was placed into the rear of patrol vehicle 18, the rear seat was searched prior. Henry was transported to Headquarters to be processed. Once at Headquarters, Henry was removed from patrol vehicle 18 and the rear seat was again searched. In Headquarters, Henry was searched and taken into the booking room.

Ptl. Therghesen 249 responded and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen's supplemental report). Prior to the Alcotest being administered, the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices. At the conclusion of the Alcotest, Ptl. 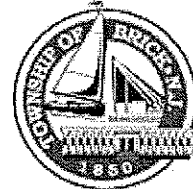

On 03/22/19 at approximately 0044 hours I was on patrol in marked patrol vehicle #42 in the area of Mantoloking Road and Church Road. While traveling Westbound on Mantoloking Road I observed a black Ford F-150 Bearing NJ registration F63JMP traveling in front of me. While following behind the vehicle I observed the vehicle failing to maintain lane, specifically by swerving from the center of the lane onto the right hand shoulder and then back towards the median. The vehicle was also traveling 50 MPH in a 40 MPH zone. I closed the distance and conducted a traffic stop on Burton Parkway off of Mantoloking Road.

I approached the driver side of the vehicle and made contact with the driver, later identified as Isaquiel Escalona-Flores. As Escalona-Flores rolled down his driver side window I immediately detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from inside of the interior of the vehicle. I asked Escalona-Flores for his drivers license, vehicle registration and insurance card. Escalona Flores advised he did not have a drivers license or the registration to the vehicle. While Escalona-Flores spoke I also detected an odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath and I observed his eyes to be bloodshot and watery. At this time Ptl. Mesmer #292 arrived on scene as backup. While speaking with Escalona-Flores he retrieved the registration and insurance card but stated he did not have the registration to the vehicle though he was holding it in is hand. I began to attempt to identify Escalona Flores and asked him for his name and date of birth. Escalona-Flores initially advised his date of birth was 03/23/93 which was later determined to be incorrect (03/23/83).

Next I asked Escalona-Flores if he had any alcoholic beverages to drink and he stated that he had two cups of wine while at a friends house. I asked Escalona-Flores to step out of the vehicle in order to conduct psychophysical evaluations to which he complied. The first test I attempted to administer was the alphabet test, I asked Escalona-Flores if he was familiar with the alphabet but he stated no. Next I administered the one leg stand test. Before explaining the test I asked Escalona-Flores if he had any injures and he stated no. I advised Escalona-Flores not to begin any of the tests until I told him to do so. I then advised Escalona-Flores to stand with his feet together with his arms at his sides while I demonstrated and explained the test. I advised Escalona-Flores to lift the leg of his choice approximately six inches off of the ground, to look down at his raised leg and to count in the following fashion, one thousand one, one thousand two, one thousand three, until I told him to stop. Before I could tell Escalona-Flores to begin he started the test. Escalona-Flores raised his right leg off of the ground and looked down without counting. I reminded Escalona-Flores to count out loud and he counted one thousand two before immediately placing his foot back down onto the ground and stated "even if I'm not drunk I can't balance". Escalona-Flores again tried the test and was unable to keep his foot off the ground past three seconds and stated I can't.

The next test I administered was the walk and turn test, which was explained and demonstrated. I advised Escalona-Flores to stand with his right foot in front of his left foot, heel to toe, keeping his arms at his sides. I then advised Escalona-Flores to take nine steps heel to toe while looking down and counting his steps out loud. I asked Escalona-Flores if he understood the directions and he stated yes. Escalona-Flores began the test and took a total of four steps, counted four of his steps and then stated nine before turning around improperly. After Escalona-Flores turned around to come back he again took four steps then stated nine and again turned around improperly before finishing the test. At this time Escalona-Flores was placed under arrest for driving while intoxicated. A search of the interior of the vehicle was negative for any further intoxicants. At this time Escalona-Flores was searched incident to arrest and transported to headquarters for processing. Ptl. Mesmer remained on scene with the vehicle which was later impounded by Lepore's Towing as per John's Law.

Upon arrival at headquarters Escalona-Flores was processed and photographed per department policy. Ptl. Therghesen #249, a certified Alcotest operator, responded to headquarters to take samples of Escalona Flores' breath resulting in a 0.14% BAC (see Ptl. Therghesen's case supplemental report for further information). After completion of processing Escalona-Flores' responded to headquarters and was explained/signed a potential liability warning. stated he understood and Escalona Flores was released from custody to without incident.

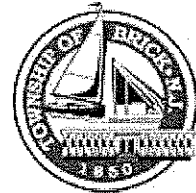

On 03/22/2019 at approximately 0102 hours, I responded to Brick PD HQ, to operate the Alcotest for Ptl. Melia #267. I led the suspect, Isaquiel Escalona-Flores, into the Booking room. After reading Escalona-Flores his rights and the standard statement, Escalona-Flores was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Escalona-Flores had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Escalona-Flores provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Escalona-Flores's BAC was recorded at 0.14%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

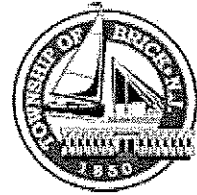

On 03/22/19 at 0103 hours, I (Ptl. Oliverio #286) while on patrol in the area of 580 Brick Blvd (Boston Market) observed a suspicious vehicle parked behind the store.

I pulled in to the parking lot and made a drivers side approach to the vehicle. I was met by the driver Mahz Zafar, who stated he was there with his friend, Shadeisha Brown. The two were just there finishing up their food and recording a video for you tube. While speaking with Zafar I detected the odor of raw marijuana coming from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. I asked Zafar if there was any thing in the vehicle to which he stated no he smoked two (2) days ago. At this time Ptl. Rotondo #252 and Ptl. Hentges #288 arrived on scene to assist.

I requested both Brown and Zafar to exit the vehicle, to which they did without incident. I advised Zafar, I would be performing a probable cause search of the vehicle due the odor of raw marijuana. I again asked Zafar if there was anything inside the vehicle to which he stated just a roach.

The search yielded the following:

- One (1) clear plastic bag of green vegetation (suspect marijuana) located in a black bag on the dash board of the passenger side.
- One (1) package of "raw" rolling papers (commonly used to smoke CDS) located in the same bag
- One (1) package of "Green Game" cigars (commonly used to smoke CDS) located on the floor near the drivers seat.
- Two (2) open bottles of "Twisted Tea" hard ice tea.

I then spoke with Brown and asked her age to which she stated she was nineteen (19). I asked if Zafar provided her the alcoholic beverages that were located inside his vehicle to which she stated yes.

I then asked Zafar if the marijuana located in the bag was his, he stated yes. When I asked him about the "Twisted Teas" he stated he did not wish to speak any further.

Zafar was placed under arrest, he was handcuffed (double locked), and placed in the back of marked patrol vehicle #27. I then transported Zafar to headquarters, where he was booked and processed without incident.

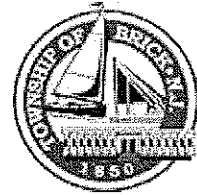
The back of my patrol vehicle was searched before and after Zafar was placed inside. Also my duty weapon was secured in a locker located at the front desk prior to Zafar being processed.

On 03-22-2019 at 2327 hours, Ptl. Alexander #216, Ptl. Haugh #217, Ptl. Prendeville #223, Ptl. Melia #267, and I, Ptl. Person #262 responded to the area of 468 Brick Boulevard (KFC) in reference to a white Chevrolet pickup truck bearing NJ registration X72KPK that struck a telephone pole. Dispatch advised the driver of the vehicle fled the scene on foot, and was wearing a flannel shirt and blue jeans. A witness stated he observed the driver hide something behind a bush and ran up the same street that the bush was located on. Dispatch advised the vehicle's registered owner was Richard Hanscom, a 42 year old male.

Ptl. Haugh was on scene first, and a patron of P.J. Sweeney's pointed in the area of University Court. Ptl. Prendeville arrived on scene with his K9 partner and began a track (Please refer to Ptl. Prendeville's K9 report.) Ptl. Prendeville advised that during the track, they located a cell phone behind a bush in the area of University Court. When I arrived on University Court, Ptl. Haugh and Ptl. Prendeville located a male wearing a plaid shirt and blue jeans (similar style and color to a flannel shirt) hiding behind the property of 450 University Court. The subject matched the description of the registered owner and was subsequently identified as Richard Hanscom, the registered owner of the vehicle that struck the pole approximately 100 yards away.

Ptl. Haugh handcuffed and detained Hanscom just prior to my arrival. When I arrived, Hanscom advised the cell phone police located was his. Hanscom advised he was not injured from the crash and refused any medical attention. While speaking to Hanscom, I detected an odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from his breath. Hanscom slurred his words and could not stand up and walk on his own. While walking Hanscom to the area of our patrol vehicles, Ptl. Haugh and I had to hold onto him to prevent him from falling. Hanscom was polite and cooperative, but his behavior changed several times as he laughed and became emotional as we spoke to him. Standardized Field Sobriety Tests were not performed because Hanscom's level of intoxication and since Hanscom could not stand up on his own.

I advised Hanscom he was under arrest for driving while intoxicated, and placed him into the rear of marked patrol vehicle #31. I transported him to the Brick Township Police Headquarters for processing without incident. While transporting Hanscom, the interior of my patrol vehicle had a strong odor of alcoholic beverages.

At headquarters, and during the booking process, Hanscom randomly blurted out that he knew why he was arrested, but also blurted out that he had no idea his vehicle was involved in a motor vehicle accident. Ptl. Haugh, certified ALCOTEST 7110 MKIII-C operator advised Hanscom refused to provide breath samples. Please refer to Ptl. Haugh's case supplemental report for further details.

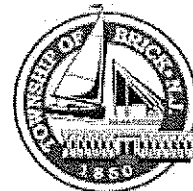
On 03-23-2019 I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Upon my arrival I made contact with the arrestee Richard Hanscom and observed him in excess of twenty minutes. Prior to the start of the test I read Hanscom his Miranda rights. When I asked him if he understood his rights he raised his thumb but refused to sign the rights form.

I then read Hanscom the N.J Attorney General's Standard Statement form. After reading the form in it's entirety Hanscom's response was "I reserve my rights to remain silent." I then advised Hanscom that his response was not acceptable and read him the second paragraph and asked him if he would submit to the breath test. Hanscom responded with "I reserve my right to remain silent" and I documented his response on that form.

The refusal was entered into the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C and printed the influence report. That report was given to dispatch to be entered into the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator and that report was submitted under this case. Hanscom was also issued a separate summons for refusal.

On 03/24/2019 at 1558 hours I got dispatched to a motor vehicle complaint in the area of the Visitation Church, 730 Lynnwood Avenue. The caller advised they observed a silver Honda Accord bearing New Jersey registration LE22WH driving with a flat passenger side front tire and swerving all over the road. The caller advised the vehicle was traveling west on Mantoloking Road through the intersection of Mantoloking Road and Hooper Avenue when it disregarded a red traffic signal and continued west on Cedar Bridge Avenue out of view of the caller.

I responded to the area to search for the vehicle. While I was checking the area for the vehicle dispatch advised me the registered owner of the vehicle was Thomas Przygocki. Przygocki had two possible addresses in town, 2747 Hooper Avenue building 2 apartment 2 and 450 Brick Boulevard. Both locations checked negative for Przygocki or his Honda.

Dispatch received a second call about Przygocki, reporting they observed him strike the curb in front of Denino's Pizza, 869 Mantoloking Road, then continue east down Mantoloking Road. The second caller advised the observed Przygocki's Honda driving east on Mantoloking Road and they watched it pull into the Sunoco gas station, 643 Mantoloking Road. I responded to the Sunoco and Ptl Miller #218 and Ptl Talty #250 were dispatched as back up officers. Upon my arrival to the Sunoco I observed Przygocki's vehicle parked in front of the mechanic shop area unoccupied. The vehicle had minor damage to the passenger side of the front bumper, a flat and shredded passenger side front tire, as well as a severely damaged passenger side front rim. Looking through the window of the mechanic shop, I saw Przygocki speaking to an employee.

Przygocki saw me and came outside. Przygocki advised me he was talking to the employee about getting his tire fixed. Przygocki stated he was driving around Brick and Silverton house shopping and when he realized his tire was flat he began driving to Sunoco because he grew up in the area and trusted the shop. Przygocki seemed very indifferent about the fact he had been traveling a substantial amount on a flat tire and swerving all over the road. While speaking with Przygocki he appeared to be in a daze. Through out my entire interaction with Przygocki he was not able to tell me how his tire went flat or describe exactly where he was coming from. when I first noticed Przygocki's dazed state I asked him if he had any medical conditions or ailments to which he replied no.

Ptl Miller and Ptl Talty continued speaking with Przygocki while I went to my vehicle to check Przygocki's license. While speaking with Przygocki Ptl Talty observed a prescription pill bottle for Diazepam in Przygocki's vehicle. When asked about the prescription, Przygocki told Ptl Talty he could have the bottle and opened the car door to retrieve it. For officer safety reasons, Ptl Talty did not want to allow Przygocki to reach around inside his vehicle. Przygocki told Ptl Talty he could retrieve the bottle himself. The prescription had Przygocki's name on it and was filled three days prior to this incident on 03/21/2019. The prescription was filled with fifteen (15) pills and the instructions read to take one a day. There were only two (2) pills left in the bottle. Przygocki told Ptl Talty the pills were for pain he has from an operation and showed Ptl Talty he had a Colostomy bag attached to his stomach.

Ptl Talty came over to me to inform me on what information he had gathered. Ptl Talty also advised me Przygocki appeared to be under the influence of some type of narcotic. Ptl Talty conducted the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN) test on Przygocki and advised me he received six (6) out of (6) hits. For additional information in reference to the test conducted by Ptl Talty see his supplemental report filed under this case number.

I approached Przygocki and asked him if he had any medical conditions or disabilities which would hinder him from being able to perform Standardized Field Sobriety Tests which require walking and balance. Przygocki replied no and I began to explain and demonstrate the test directions to him.

I then began to give Przygocki instructions on the walk and turn test. I told Przygocki to stand with his right foot in front of his left, heel to toe and keep his hands at his sides. Przygocki could not stand heel to toe without losing his balance and spreading his feet apart for balance. I instructed Przygocki not to begin the test until I finished explaining it to him and told him to begin. I demonstrated the test for Przygocki while explaining "Start with your right foot in front of your left touching heel to toe. Take nine (9) steps in a straight line while counting each step out loud and touching heel to toe with each step. Once you take your ninth step you will stop and pivot 180 degrees using a series of small steps and take an additional nine (9) steps back in the direction you started from, counting out loud and touching heel to toe with each step." After Przygocki stated he understood the directions I instructed him to begin the test. Przygocki began the test and started out counting properly and touching heel to toe with his steps. After three (3) steps Przygocki was no longer able to touch heel to toe and began to exhibit signs of balance trouble by walking with his feet next to each other instead on putting one in front of the other as instructed. After completing his ninth (9th) step Przygocki needed to be reminded of the instructions. Przygocki did not turn around properly and began taking his steps back towards where he started. Przygocki was counting each step but failed to touch his heel to his toe with every step and again began to walk with his feet next to each other. Przygocki was counting his steps but after he got to his ninth (9th) step he continued walking and would have walked into Ptl Miller if Ptl Miller had not stepped back and order Przygocki to stop.

The next test I explained to Przygocki was the one legged stand test. I told Przygocki to stand with his feet together and arms at his sides while I explained the test. While demonstrating my instructions I explained, " Stand with both your feet together and arms at

your sides. When instructed to do so you will pick up the leg of your choice and raise that foot approximately six (6) inches off of the ground. You will hold the position and count out loud, one one thousand, two one thousand, three one thousand and keep counting in the same manner until told to stop. Przygocki stated he understood the instructions. Przygocki raised his right foot approximately three (3) inches off of the ground and held it there while counting. Przygocki was continuously tipping over raising his arms and leaning onto his car for support. Przygocki stated he was not good at the test. I told Przygocki he could take a moment to collect himself and attempt the test again. As he did on the previous attempt Przygocki raised his right foot approximately three (3) inches and began counting. Przygocki was swaying and struggling to balance. While counting Przygocki skipped the number seven. Przygocki was continuing to have trouble keeping his balance and kept dropping his foot to the ground. I did not want Przygocki at risk of getting injured and instructed him to keep his foot on the ground.

Przygocki was again asked if he had any medical conditions which could be effecting him. Przygocki advised he was a diabetic and he was due for a meal. As a precaution Brick Police EMS were requested to the scene. EMS unit #535 arrived on scene and began to treat Przygocki. Przygocki. Sgt Olsen #185 arrived on scene. After examining Przygocki EMS advised they did not see and signs he was suffering from any medical problems. Przygocki refused further medical treatment with EMS and signed off with them. Seeing the SFST results were not effected by a medical issue I informed Przygocki he was under arrest for Driving Under the Influence. I placed Przygocki in handcuffs. The handcuffs were double locked and Przygocki was searched incident to arrest revealing a knife attached to his wallet chain. The knife was taken off of the chain and left in Przygocki's vehicle per his request. After the prisoner cage of vehicle #27 was checked Przygocki was seated inside to be transported to headquarters. Przygocki's nearly empty prescription bottle was seized as evidence. The prescription remained in my possession until it was later photographed at headquarters. The Photos were burned onto a disc and submitted into property. The prescription was given back to Przygocki after it was photographed. Ptl Talty remained on scene with Przygocki's vehicle until Legacy Automotive arrived on scene to impound the vehicle as per John's Law.

Upon arrival to headquarters I was met by Ptl Miller to assist with escorting Przygocki into headquarters. Upon entering headquarters I secured my weapon before taking Przygocki into the processing area. Przygocki was escorted into the cell block where he was searched again providing negative results. Przygocki was not able to where a prisoner belt because of his colostomy bag. With the approval of Sgt Matthews #210 Przygocki was searched again and handcuffed in the front.

Ptl Talty responded to headquarters to conduct the Alcotest on Przygocki. For additional information in reference to the Alcotest see Ptl Talty's supplemental report filed under this case number. Due to the results of the Alcotest Drug Recognition Expert Thomas Caufield (Brick PD #235) was requested to respond to headquarters to conduct an examination on Przygocki .For additional information in reference to DRE Caufield's examination see his report filed under this case number.

Due to the report dispatch received of Przygocki striking the curb, Ptl Talty responded to the area and located the curb Przygocki struck. For additional information in reference to the accident see Ptl Talty's accident report filed under this case number.

On 03/24/2019 at 1613 hours, I responded to Sunoco (643 Mantoloking Road) to assist Ptl. Zolezi and Ptl. Miller. Headquarters dispatched units to this location for a possible intoxicated driver. Upon arrival, I observed Ptl. Zolezi speaking to a male subject, identified as Thomas Przygocki, outside of his vehicle (2017 Honda Civic NJ:LE22WH).

Przygocki appeared sluggish and slow moving while speaking to Ptl. Zolezi. Przygocki speech was slow and slurred. Przygocki was having trouble completing sentences. I asked Przygocki if he was under the influence of any alcohol which he denied. To assist Ptl. Zolezi, I administered the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN) test. For the instruction phase, I instructed Przygocki remove his glasses and stand with his feet together and his arms at his sides while I explain the test. I advised Przygocki to keep his head still and move only his eyes for the test. I instructed Przygocki to follow the tip of my pen (stimulus) with his eyes only. Dilated pupil size and equal tracking were observed in both eyes. I conducted the test; at conclusion the following three (3) indicators were present in each eye for a total of six indicators (6).

- 1) Lack of smooth pursuit
- 2) Distinct nystagmus at maximum deviation
- 3) Onset prior to 45 degrees

Vertical nystagmus was also present. Przygocki moved his head several times while performing the test.

Ptl. Zolezi administered Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs) and determined Przygocki was under the influence. Przygocki was placed into custody and transported to Police Headquarters. (See report by Ptl. Zolezi)

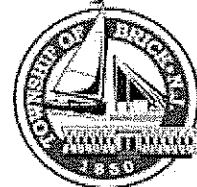
I responded to headquarters to assist Ptl. Zolezi and administer Alcotest to Przygocki

At headquarters, I secured my duty weapon and activated my BWC. I met Przygocki who was seated in the booking room for processing. Przygocki was read Miranda warnings at 17:55 hours; I began a constant, uninterrupted observation of Przygocki in excess of twenty minutes. This observation continued throughout my entire contact with Przygocki during which time he did not belch, vomit, or place anything in his mouth. I read the New Jersey Standard Statement form to Przygocki. When asked to provide breath samples, Przygocki agreed. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine. Prior to operation, I deactivated and secured my BWCs. The booking area was free from any type of electronic devices on me, Przygocki and any officers who entered the room (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, laptop, etc.). After each test, a new clean mouth piece was used. At the conclusion of the test, Przygocki provided sufficient breath samples yielding a BAC of 0.00%.

Believing Przygocki to be under the influence of a narcotic, I requested a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) responded to headquarters to complete a DRE evaluation. DRE Thomas Caulfield (Brick PD #235) responded to headquarters and administered a DRE evaluation. (See report by DRE Caulfield).

On 03/27/2019 at approximately 1257 hours I was on patrol in marked police vehicle #14 traveling East on Route 70. I approached the intersection with route 88 and entered the right turn only lane in order to turn onto route 88. Directly in front of me was a black Kia Soul bearing New Jersey registration D45FEU.

The signal turned green for the right turn lane and the Kia did not move. I beeped the horn and still the vehicle did not move. I beeped again and the driver of the vehicle through her hands in the air and put her left turn signal on. Additional traffic behind me began to beep their horns as well. I used my vehicle's public address system to give two verbal commands for the vehicle to follow the lane of travel. The vehicle continued to sit in the lane delaying traffic, in violation of 39:4-56, until there was a green signal for traffic to proceed straight along Route 70. Once the straight signal turned green, the driver of the Kia made an unsafe lane change(39:4-88B) from the turn only lane to the eastbound lanes of route 70 which was also a violation of 39:4-124 because the vehicle failed to turn from the designated turn lane. This action caused another vehicle to hit the brakes in order to avoid a collision.

At this time I activated my overhead lights and initiated a traffic stop. The vehicle pulled over into the Dunkin Donuts parking lot located at 909 Route 70. The vehicle parked on the line separating two marked parking spaces. As I made a driver's side approach on the vehicle, the driver, later identified as Kylene Anderson through her New Jersey driver's license, opened the door and handed me her registration and insurance. As she did this she was apologizing for her driving and stated she was just trying to follow her GPS. When Anderson opened the door I observed her to be operating the vehicle in violation of 39:9-74, specifically by having objects hanging from the rearview mirror causing an obstruction of view. As I looked into her eyes I could see that they were blood shot and watery. Anderson almost immediately stated she was concerned about getting fired. She stated that she was on her way to her job as a home health aid and did not want to be late. As she was speaking I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. I also observed her eyelids to be droopy and her face flushed. Through the duration of our encounter she became increasingly upset and began crying at times. She repeatedly stated that she was concerned about getting fired.

I requested she supply me with her driver's license as she had already supplied me with her other documents. She retrieved her wallet and was unable to get her license out after several attempts. She requested that I retrieve her license from the wallet for her. I had little trouble removing the wallet and then handed the wallet back to her. I asked Anderson where she had been coming from and she replied she had just gotten her hair cut. I asked if she had any alcoholic beverages and she stated she had not. I advised her that I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. She added that she had just come from her mother's house. I asked her what that had to do with her having anything to drink and she said she had a bloody mary. At this time Sgt. Kelly #241 and Ptl. Stephenson #291 arrived on scene to assist.

Sgt. Kelly requested Anderson exit the vehicle and he performed the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus(HGN) test on her. Sgt. Kelly advised me he received five hits out of six on the test. Sgt. Kelly continued to speak with Anderson regarding her alcohol intake for the day. Anderson then stated she had two bloody marys earlier in the morning and they contained vodka. Sgt. Kelly asked Anderson if she had taken any prescription medication which would have impaired her ability to drive. Anderson advised that she was prescribed methodone and she had taken that prior to driving.

At this time I advised Anderson that I was going to perform two additional field sobriety tests on her. I brought her to a flat, level area of the parking lot which was free of all debris and dry. I asked her if she had any injuries that would prevent her from being able to complete the test to which she replied she did not. The first test was going to be the walk and turn test. I instructed Anderson into the starting position. I instructed her to place her right foot in front of her left while touching heel to toe with her arms at her side. Anderson immediately began walking towards me at this time. I stopped her and instructed her to remain in the starting position until I was finished explaining the test. Anderson again attempted to start the test prior to the completion of my instructions and she was stopped. I was then able to finish instructing the test and Anderson stated she understood how to proceed. Once instructed to begin the test, Anderson almost immediately lifted her arms for balance. She was unable to touch heel to toe multiple times and also stepped off the line in order to regain her balance. Additionally, once she reached nine steps forward she spun around 360 degrees and then asked what she was supposed to do. She then turned 180 degrees and returned to the starting area.

The next test I administered was the one leg stand. I instructed Anderson to stand with her feet together and her arms at her side. I instructed her to lift the foot of her choice off the ground six inches and count 1000-1, 1000-2, 1000-3, etc until she was instructed to stop while keeping her hands at her side. She stated she understood how to proceed and was advised to begin. Anderson kept her foot approximately two inches off the ground for the majority of the test. She placed her foot down multiple times to regain her balance and raised her arms for balance. After reaching 1000-19 she continued by counting 20, 21, 22, 23 until she got to 30. She did not say 1000 and counted increasingly fast as she went through the 20s.

At this time, based off of the above circumstances, I placed Anderson under arrest for driving under the influence. She was handcuffed, double locked, and placed into the rear of patrol vehicle #14. At the start of my shift I confirmed the rear of the vehicle to be free of debris and contraband. She was then transported to headquarters. Once at headquarters I secured my weapon in a gun locker and Anderson was escorted to the cell block. She was searched and found to be free of any contraband. She was then

transported to the booking area where Ptl. Boronkas #165 had arrived to operate the Alcotest machine(See his case supplement for additional information). Anderson submitted acceptable breath samples and her blood alcohol content was found to be 0.19%.

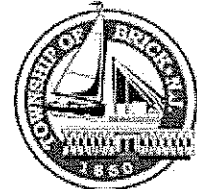

On 03/27/19 at 2152 hours I (Patrolman Mesmer #292) was on patrol in marked patrol vehicle #09 in the area of Chambers Bridge Rd and Brick Blvd. At that time I observed a black Nissan Versa bearing New Jersey registration G15ALP traveling southbound on Chambers Bridge Rd towards Brick Blvd with no headlights on in violation of 39:3-47. At that time it was cool, clear, and dark outside with streetlights present.

I then got behind the suspect vehicle as it turned southbound onto Brick Blvd from Chambers Bridge Rd. I then activated my overhead emergency lights and initiated a motor vehicle stop. The suspect vehicle came to a stop in the right hand lane of Brick Blvd southbound. I then instructed the driver over the PA system to pull into the gas station that we were in front of to get out of the lane of travel. As the driver pulled into the Exxon gas station (600 Brick Blvd) I observed his right rear tire drive over the curb. The vehicle then came to a stop in the gas station parking lot.

I then exited my patrol vehicle and made a driver's side approach on the suspect vehicle. I began speaking with the driver by identifying myself as a police officer and requesting his drivers license, registration, and proof of insurance, to which he complied. At that time I identified the driver as Mitchell Fiedler. Fiedler's eyes appeared to be red and watery as I spoke with him. The smell of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Fiedler's breath. I then asked Fiedler where he was coming from and he informed me that he was coming from bowling at Ocean Lanes. I then asked Fiedler if he had consumed any alcoholic drinks while he was there and he stated that he had one beer with his dinner around 7:00pm but that was it.

At that time Patrolman Person #262 arrived on location to assist. I then instructed Fiedler to step out of the vehicle in order to conduct field sobriety testing to which he complied. As Fiedler exited his vehicle he appeared to stumble. Ptl. Person asked Fiedler how much he had to drink and at this time he stated two beers.

The first test that was conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test by Ptl Person. Ptl. Person then explained the test to Fiedler and he advised that he understood the instructions. Ptl. Person then administered the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. At the conclusion of the test, Patrolman Person advised me that Fiedler had lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation, and the onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. I first asked Fiedler if he had any medical conditions that would interfere with this test and he advised that he had a prior injury to his hip several years ago. Fiedler further advised that he had no current problems with his hip that would effect his ability to perform the test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I advised Fiedler to remain in the starting position with his feet together and his arms at his side. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Fiedler had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Fiedler was swaying while his leg was elevated, used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), and lowered his foot to the ground three times during the test.

The third test I conducted was the Walk and Turn Test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Fiedler was unable to maintain his balance in the starting position a moved his legs several times for balance. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Fiedler had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Fiedler had to stop walking to steady himself, failed to touch heel to toe on every step, lost his balance while walking (Stepped off the line), used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), and turned incorrectly.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Fiedler was taken into custody and handcuffed to the rear utilizing the double locking mechanism. At that time, Legacy Towing arrived on location and impounded the vehicle under John's Law. Fiedler was then transported by me to Brick Police headquarters in marked patrol car #09 without incident. The rear seat of the patrol car was searched for any contraband both prior and after transport with negative results.

Ptl. Therghesen #249 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Therghesen advised me, Fiedler provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.07%.

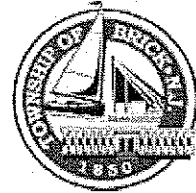

On 03/27/2019 at approximately 2221 hours, I responded to Brick PD HQ, to operate the Alcotest for Ptl. Mesmer #292. Ptl. Mesmer #292 led the suspect, Mitchell Fiedler, into the Booking room. After reading Fiedler his rights and the standard statement, Fiedler was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Fiedler had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Fiedler provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Fiedler's BAC was recorded at 0.07%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

On 03/29/2019 at approximately 0250 hrs while on patrol, in marked patrol vehicle #26, on Village Way in the area of Nottingham Drive I observed a black Chevrolet Cobalt parked at the dead end of Nottingham Drive, facing the woods. The vehicle was parked away from any of the neighboring driveways and no other vehicles were in the area. After I began to travel on Nottingham Drive the vehicle turned its lights on and began to leave the area. I turned my vehicle around in order to observe the vehicle and obtain the license plate (NJ T10LBC). When I passed the Cobalt the driver slowed his vehicle as if to move to the side of the road to let me pass, but did not move to the side of the road. I once again turned around and followed the Cobalt out of the neighborhood via Midstreams Place then traveled south on Midstreams Road. While following behind the Cobalt on Midstreams Road I observed the vehicle cross the center line on at least three occasions prior to turning left onto Jordan Road towards Route 88. While on Jordan Road I observed the vehicle cross the center line on three more occasions. At this time I activated my overhead emergency lights and stopped the vehicle on Jordan Road in the area of Colonial Drive. Ptl. Therghesen #249 responded to the scene in order to assist with the stop.

I made a drivers side approach and identified myself to the driver, later identified as Joshua Kingston, and requested the following documents: his drivers license, vehicle registration, and vehicle insurance. Kingston provided me with the vehicle registration and insurance, then paused as if he believed he provided me with all the requested documents. I once again requested his drivers license, and Kingston began to search the vehicle for his wallet. While searching for his wallet Kingston slowly fumbled between his pants pockets, the area between the front seats, and the right rear passenger seat, where a backpack was located. While speaking with Kingston his speech was slowed and slurred, and his eyes appeared watery and bloodshot. I then had Kingston step out of his vehicle and began to inquire with what he was doing parked on Nottingham Drive. Kingston stated he had gotten out of work at the TGIF Fridays restaurant in Toms River at approximately 2100 hrs, and decided to park and take a nap before returning to his mothers residence at 648 Spiral Drive. Outside of the vehicle Kingston leaned against the trunk of his vehicle for balance, and continued to show the same signs of impairment. At this time Ptl. Therghesen administered the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test (HGN) to Kingston. Ptl. Therghesen advised he observed six indicators.

After the failed HGN test I advised Kingston I would be administering the rest of the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests. The tests were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from debris on the side of Jordan Road. Kingston asked what would happen if he refused the tests, and after being advised of the penalties he reluctantly agreed to perform the tests. When asked if he had any existing injuries or medical conditions that would impair him from performing the tests and he advised he had prior knee injury to his right knee.

The first test I administered was the One Leg Stand Test. I instructed Kingston to stand in the starting position (feet together with hands at his side). I then explained and demonstrated the test for Kingston, to which Kingston replied he understood the test. While explaining the test Kingston moved he feet apart in order to maintain balance, and moved his hands from his side for balance. While performing the test Kingston raised his left leg less than six inches off the ground, and did not count aloud for the first couple seconds. Kingston had to raise his arms from his side more than six inches for balance, and dropped his foot to the ground after he started counting. After one attempt at the test Kingston stated he was done with the test and refused to make anymore attempts.

The second test I administered was the Walk and Turn Test. I instructed Kingston to stand in the starting position (right foot in front of left foot, touching heel to toe). I then explained and demonstrated the test for Kingston, to which Kingston replied he understood the test. While explaining the test Kingston began to sway side to side. Kingston left the starting position, and stood with his feet side by side, shoulder width apart. While performing the test Kingston did not touch heel to toe on the first three steps, on the fourth step when he touched heel to toe he stepped off of the line to the right, and stumbled on a fifth step before stopping the test. After one attempt Kingston refused any further attempts at the test.

At this time Kingston was taken into custody for Driving Under the Influence. He was handcuffed behind his back (double locked), searched incident to arrest, and placed into the rear of marked patrol vehicle 26. The rear of the vehicle was searched prior to and after transporting Kingston. A search of the vehicle where Kingston was reaching, the between the seats, and the backpack in the back seat yielded the following: his wallet, with his New Jersey Drivers License, was located between the seats, and a half drank plastic vodka bottle in the backpack. Legacy Towing responded to the scene and impounded the vehicle per John's Law.

I transported Kingston to Police Headquarters without incident. At Police Headquarters I secured my gun and knife prior to Kingston being processed per department policies. Ptl. Therghesen responded to Police Headquarters in order to operate the Alcotest 7100 MKIII-C machine (see Case Sup). Kingston refused to provide breath samples. Kingston's mother responded to Police Headquarters, was explained, and signed the Potential Liability Warning Form, prior to Kingston being released to her care. 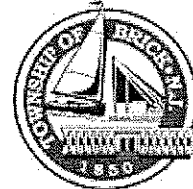

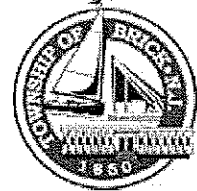

On 03/28/2019 at 2044 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on patrol in the area of Lanes Mill Rd. / Primrose Ln. operating marked patrol vehicle #24. During this time, I observed a green colored Toyota sedan bearing NJ registration E26HJJ traveling north on Lanes Mill Road. I further observed that the driver of the vehicle was failing to maintain their lane of travel. Specifically, I observed the driver cross the center yellow traffic line a total of four times with their driver side front and rear tires. As the driver crossed the center yellow traffic line each time they swerved back across the center lane and crossed the fog line with their passenger side tires.

As a result, I activated my emergency lights and conducted a motor vehicle stop in the area of Lanes Mill Rd. / Pennsylvania Ave. Ptl. Stephenson #278 and Ptl. Firreno #283 arrived on location to assist. There I made a passenger side approach and made contact with five occupants. I asked the driver for her credentials (drivers license, registration, insurance) and she was identified as Marie Diaz. I asked Diaz why she had been failing to maintain her lane of travel and she stated it was because she was dancing inside the vehicle. While speaking with Diaz I detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the front passengers breath and clothing. I then requested the adult male passenger exit the vehicle and he complied. There he was identified as Sharuby Warford.

I asked Warford if he had smoked any marijuana today and he related that he had smoked marijuana earlier in the day. I asked him if he had any marijuana on his person or inside the vehicle and he stated its in my jacket. Warford further related that he had an unknown amount of marijuana inside his green jacket. I asked him where the green jacket was located and he stated it was inside the vehicle, where he had been seated. Ptl. Stephenson then removed the green jacket from the vehicle and handed it to me at the rear of the vehicle. A search of the green jacket revealed one (1) clear plastic bag containing loose green vegetation, suspect marijuana. The suspect marijuana was located inside an inner pocket of the jacket. I then advised Warford that he was under arrest for possessing a controlled dangerous substance. He was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. Search incident to arrest revealed one (1) blue colored "GAME" cigar wrapper containing loose green vegetation, suspect marijuana. The "GAME" cigar wrapper was located inside the front jean pocket of Warford. Warford was then secured inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #24. All recovered evidence was sealed inside a department issued evidence bag as per departmental policy. Prior to leaving the scene, Diaz was issued one (1) motor vehicle citation for failing to maintain her lane of travel.

Warford was then transported to police headquarters, where he was booked and processed as per departmental policy. At headquarters, dispatch advised that Warford had an active outstanding warrant issued for his arrest (Ocean County Sheriffs Office, Non-support, #1011-17W, \$53,330.92 / FULL). All recovered marijuana that was found during my investigation was labeled to be tested for CDS. All evidence (drug paraphernalia, CDS) were properly secured and placed into evidence, which is located in the departmental intake room. Warford stated he was unable to post bail. As a result, The Ocean County Sheriffs Office was contacted and advised of the incident. The Ocean County Sheriffs Office then arrived on location and took custody of Warford. He was then transported to the Ocean County Jail.

Warford was charged with the following on complaint summons: 1506-S-2019-000326.

1. Possession of 50 grams or less of marijuana: 2C:35-10A(4).
2. Possession of drug paraphernalia: 2C:36-2.

Diaz was issued the following traffic citation:

1. Failure to maintain lane: 39:4-88b, 1506-T-161954.

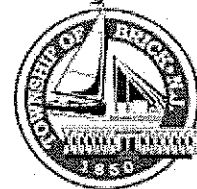

On 03/30/2019 at 2142 hours I (Ptl. Mesmer #292) was on patrol in marked patrol car #29 and was in the area of Route 88 W and Fort Street when I conducted a random license plate inquiry of a silver Acura sedan bearing NJ registration X49JTP. The license plate inquiry revealed that the registration to the vehicle expired on 02/28/2019. I then activated my overhead emergency lights and initiated a motor vehicle stop in front of 1672 Route 88 W (Speedway Gas Station).

At that time I made a drivers side approach on the vehicle and identified myself to the driver. I then requested for the driver's license, registration, and proof of insurance. The driver complied with my request. While I was conversing with the driver I recognized through my training and experience an overwhelming smell of raw marijuana emanating from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. The driver was identified as Emmanuel Alduendecruz. While speaking with Alduendecruz he appeared extremely nervous as his hand were shaking and he continued to avoid eye contact with me. While looking inside of the vehicle I observed a dark colored rolled cigarette in the center cup holder along with several packages of "Swisher Sweets" which are commonly used to ingest marijuana.

At that time Ptl. Oliverio #286 arrived on scene to assist. I then asked the driver if he had consumed any alcohol which he denied. I further asked the driver if he had anything illegal in the vehicle and he replied "Only a little weed". I then instructed Alduendecruz to exit his vehicle to which he complied. As Alduendecruz exited his vehicle, I observed a small clear plastic bag containing a green leafy vegetation in the drivers side door side lower open compartment. I then brought Alduendecruz to the rear of his vehicle and Ptl. Oliverio conducted a search of his persons which yielded negative results for any contraband. At that time I read Alduendecruz his Miranda Rights from a card that I keep in my uniform pocket and he stated that he understood.

I then conducted a probable cause search of the passenger compartment of the vehicle and located the following:

1. One clear plastic bag containing a green leafy vegetation
2. One metal grinder
3. One package of "Swisher Sweets"
4. One dark color rolled cigarette containing suspect marijuana

At that time Alduendecruz was placed under arrest and handcuffed to the rear utilizing the double-locking mechanism. He was then secured in the rear seat of marked patrol vehicle #29 and transported to headquarters without incident. Alduendecruz's car was then secured and parked in the adjacent parking lot. The rear seat of my patrol vehicle was searched both before and after transport for any contraband which was negative. Upon arrival at headquarters Alduendecruz was processed according to department procedure without incident.

Alduendecruz was charged with 2C:35-10a(4) possession of under 50 grams of marijuana and 2C:36-2 possession of drug paraphernalia. His charges were placed on summons 1506-S-2019-000340 and he was later released along with his property pending a future court date.

Alduendecruz was also issued the following motor vehicle summons:

On 03/31/2019 at 0220hrs I, Ptl. Bailey #293, was in patrol vehicle #02 traveling Rt 70 West just passing Van Zile Road. While on patrol I observed a black Dodge Durango bearing NJ Registration A37HDD driving east bound on the west bound side. The above vehicle almost collided with my vehicle as it passed me. After the vehicle passed me, I completing a U-turn, and closed the distance between myself and that vehicle. I then conducted a motor vehicle stop in the area of Van Zile road and Barrett Walk.

I utilized a drivers side approach, identified myself and asked the driver, identified as Alberto Morale's-Palacios, for his driving credentials. (Drivers license, Registration and Proof of Insurance) Alberto only provided me with his license. I asked Alberto if he knew where he was going and he stated "home". I asked Alberto had he been drinking tonight he said "yes at a party". I asked Alberto how many drinks he had tonight he stated "2". Next I asked Alberto out of his vehicle to conduct field sobriety tests. At this time Ptl. Oliverio #286 and Ptl. Hentges #288 arrived on scene to assist.

Ptl. Hentges attempted to conduct the HGN test but was not able to complete it due to Alberto not following directions.

When asked if Alberto had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, he stated "no". The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris.

The first examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Alberto in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Alberto had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Alberto had to be reminded several times to count his steps out loud. Alberto did not touch heel to toe once or go in a straight line on the first nine steps. On the second nine steps he did not count and stepped off the line multiple times.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Alberto in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Alberto had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test he did not count and repeatedly dropped his foot to the ground for balance. I terminated the test and asked if he would like another try he stated "yes". On the second attempted he was worse so I terminated the test completely.

Due to the traffic violations I observed, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Alberto's breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). Alberto was transported to HQ by me without incident. Ptl. Oliverio remained at the scene and awaited Joe's Service Center Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Docherty #275 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Docherty supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Docherty advised me, Alberto provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.17%.

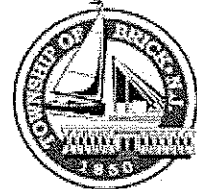
On 03/31/2019 at approximately 0240 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 responded to police headquarters in reference to a D.W.I. arrest to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C for Ptl. Bailey #293. (Refer to his case report for further information). All portable electronic

devices were removed from the booking room. At approximately 0250 hours, I began direct observation of the arrestee Alberto Morales-Palacios. I observed that he did not have any foreign objects in his mouth, and did not have anything to eat or drink.. At 0257 hours, I read Alberto his Miranda Rights to which he stated "Yes" at 0257 hours.

The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement was then read to Alberto. He stated "I can try" at 0303 hours. I then read the additional NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement paragraph to Alberto and when asked if he would submit to breath testing a second time he stated "I can test, yes" at 0305 hours. Alberto was continuously observed for more than 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Alberto had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Alberto successfully provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Alberto's BAC was recorded at 0.17%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

On 03/31/19 at 0249 hours Sgt Thomas #164, Ptl. Joaquim #271, Ptl. Mesmer #292, Ptl. Patrick #296, and I responded to the area of Beaverson Blvd/ Old Toms River Rd in reference to an accident (See Ptl. Joaquim's accident report). Dispatch advised that a vehicle had struck a pole and there were wires down. Dispatch also advised that the subject was out of the vehicle and asking the caller for a ride to his house.

On arrival the male subject identified as Iqbal Khan was out of his vehicle and walking around. He was attempting to get a ride away from the scene and made no attempt to contact 911 about the accident. I also observed the telephone pole (#JC5708BK) had been struck and was completely split. I asked Khan if he had any injuries from the accident or if he wanted to be seen by Brick Police EMS and he advised that he did not need to be seen. While speaking with Khan I was able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. Khan was also swaying while I was speaking with him. When Khan was walking to the sidewalk I observed him to be unsteady on his feet. I asked Khan where he was coming from tonight and he stated that he was coming from Applebee's in Parsippany, NJ. Khan advised that he had three beers while at the restaurant.

After making these observations I asked Khan if he would perform standardized field sobriety tests. While walking to the rear of my vehicle, I observed he was swaying and sagging while walking. While Khan was standing in front of my patrol car, I also observed that he was swaying while standing, his knees were sagging, and his stance was very rigid. In addition, a very strong and overwhelming odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Khan's breath while speaking to him outside his vehicle. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Khan stated he had high blood pressure. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris.

The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Khan as to how to perform the examination, Khan had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Khan continued to sway while standing and had much difficulty maintaining his balance while in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Khan had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Khan failed to touch heel to toe on every step, lost his balance while walking (stepped off the line), and turned incorrectly.

The third test conducted was the One Leg Stand. Khan completed this test without incident.

Based on the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Khan's breath, the motor vehicle accident, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests, I placed him under arrest (handcuffs double locked). Khan was transported to HQ by me without incident. Ptl. Joaquim #271 remained at the scene and awaited Legacy Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle as per John's Law.

Ptl. Docherty #275 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Docherty's supplemental report for further information). 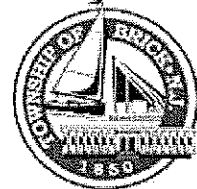

(Refer to his case report for further information). All portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room prior to operating the Alcotest instrument. At approximately 0345 hours, I began direct

observation of the arrestee Iqbal Khan. I observed that he did not have any foreign objects in his mouth, and did not have anything to eat or drink.. At 0351 hours, I read Khan his Miranda Rights to which he stated "Yes" at 0352 hours.

The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement was then read to Khan. He stated "yes" at 0405 hours. Khan was continuously observed for more than 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Khan had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Khan successfully provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Khan's B.A.C . was recorded at 0.12%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

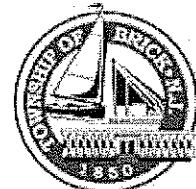

On 03/31/2019 at approximately 2244 hours, I observed a dark colored Honda Civic bearing NJREG#G33GDH fail to stop at a stop sign located at Hooper Avenue and Brick Boulevard, a direct violation of NJ Title 39:4-144. As a result of my observation, I advised dispatch I would be conducting a motor vehicle stop of the suspect vehicle, which contained two occupants, and the vehicle ultimately stopped in the area of Awards of Brick located at 799 Brick Boulevard.

As I approached the suspect vehicle, I made a passenger side approach. While at the vehicle, I was able to identify the driver as Lindsay Parker, who already had her license, registration and proof of insurance ready without request. While speaking with Ms. Parker and the passenger, later identified as Devon Jones, I detected the odor of raw marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle.

It was at this time Ptl. Mulcahey #130 arrived on scene as a back-up officer, and the suspects were requested to exit the vehicle. Upon exiting the vehicle, both suspects were advised of the detected odor and requested to remain with Ptl. Mulcahey while a search of the vehicle was conducted.

A search of the vehicle lead to the following:

- one clear plastic bag containing suspected raw marijuana located between the front passenger seat and front passenger door.
- one clear plastic bag containing suspected raw marijuana in the center console, as well as a one package of "Game" cigarillos commonly used to ingest marijuana, and a "vape" style pen containing one cartridge with suspected THC.
- one copper colored grinder containing an image of Bob Marley with suspected raw marijuana residue and a package of "Game" cigarillos were located in a back pack in the vehicle. The backpack was located on the rear seat of the vehicle, on the passenger side, and contained male clothing.

As a result of the search, both subjects were placed under arrest, handcuffed behind their back, searched, double-locked, and placed in the rear of separate patrol vehicles. Both subjects were also read their Miranda Warning separately and both advised they understood this warning. Ms. Parker opted to exercise her rights and wished to not be questioned any further at this time.

Both subjects were then transported to police headquarters for processing. Upon arrival to headquarters, I secured my department duty weapon and patrol knife in a secured lock-box prior to interacting further with the suspects. Upon securing the above mentioned, both suspects were processed per department policy, fingerprinted and photographed.

While at headquarters, on call Detective, Detective Sgt. Petrola #201, was contacted and advised of the incident.

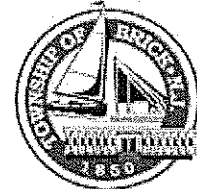
Ms. Parker was charged with possession of marijuana 50 grams or less (2C:35-10a(4)) and possession of drug paraphernalia (2C:36-2) on summons#1506-S-2019-000342. In addition, Ms. Parker also received two motor vehicle summons' failing to stop at stop sign (39-4-144) and possession of a controlled dangerous substance in a motor vehicle (39:4-49.1). After receiving these summons' Ms. Parker was released.

Mr. Jones was charged with possession of marijuana under 50 grams or less (2C:35-10a(4)) and possession of drug paraphernalia (2C:36-2). As a result of Mr. Jones Public Safety Assessment (PSA) score, his charges were placed on a warrant, warrant#1506-W-2019-000343, and transported to Ocean County Jail.

It should be noted, my patrol vehicle was searched at the beginning of my shift and again after transporting Mr. Jones. No additional contraband was located after the completion of this transport.

OfficerID: mhentges, Narrative

On 04/05/19 at 0042 hours I was on patrol (vehicle #11) traveling west on Cedar Bridge Avenue in the area of Brick Blvd. As I was approaching Brick Blvd I observed a Green Jeep Cherokee NJ registration K46KVM make the illegal left turn from Cedar Bridge Ave onto Brick Blvd southbound. After making the left turn I followed the vehicle onto Brick Blvd and after making the turn the vehicle drifted two (2) lanes. The vehicle then went from the second right lane back into the left lane without using its signal. Shortly after getting back in the left lane the road began to curve left. The vehicle did not start to turn and again went through two (2) lanes before jerking to the left. After observing the motor vehicle violations I activated my overhead emergency lights.

After activating my lights the vehicle got into the left turn lane from Brick Blvd onto Drum Point Rd. The vehicle stopped at the red light and proceeded to go through the red light onto Drum Point Rd. Shortly after going through the light the vehicle stopped on Drum Point Rd. I used my vehicles PA system and advised the driver to pull into Drum Point Plaza (335 Brick Blvd).

Upon initiating the motor vehicle stop, I exited my patrol vehicle, approached the front driver side window, identified myself, and requested the driver/arrestee, identified as Paul Hanley, to exhibit his driving credentials. While Hanley was looking for his documents I advised Hanley that I had stopped him because of the illegal left turn and failure to maintain lane. While initially speaking with Hanley, I immediately detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin of the vehicle.

As Hanley was retrieving his vehicle documents, I observed that his hand movements were very slow and fumbling. Hanley attempted to hand me his wallet and ask to get his licence out because he was having difficulty doing it himself. After handing me his driving credentials, I asked Hanley where he was coming from and/or if he had consumed any alcoholic beverages. Hanley stated he was leaving TGI Fridays (709 Rt.70) and admitted to having a couple beers. I asked Hanley why he would have been on Cedar Bridge Ave if he was leaving TGI Fridays and he stated that he was actually leaving Jack And Mikes (979 Cedar Bridge Ave). As I continued speaking with Hanley, I observed his speech was very slow and slurred. In addition, I observed his eyes were watery, bloodshot, and eyelids were very heavy and droopy.

At that time, I had Hanley exit the vehicle in order to administer field sobriety tests in which he, Hanley, had no objection to. As Hanley was exiting his vehicle and walking towards the front of his vehicle, I observed he was swaying and sagging while walking. While Hanley was standing in front of his vehicle, I also observed that he was swaying while standing, his knees were sagging, and his stance was very rigid. In addition, a very strong and overwhelming odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Hanley's breath while speaking to him outside his vehicle. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Hanley stated no. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks and/or debris.

The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Hanley as to how to perform the examination, Hanley had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes and distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes.

The second examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Hanley continued to sway while standing and had much difficulty maintaining his balance while in the starting position. In addition, Hanley once again kept starting the test before being instructed to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Hanley had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Hanley failed to touch heel to toe on every step, lost his balance while walking (Stepped off the line), used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), and turned incorrectly (Pivoted on his left foot).

The final examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed that Hanley was swaying and sagging while standing in the starting position. In addition, Hanley kept starting the test before being instructed to begin. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Hanley had no questions and was instructed to begin. Hanley was swaying while his right leg was elevated, used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches). In addition, Hanley was unable to keep his left leg elevated for no more than approximately ten (10) seconds before losing his balance and/or putting his right foot down.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Hanley was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol car #11 without incident. Ptl. Rotondo #252 remained at the scene and awaited Brick Performance to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Thergesen #249 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Thergesen supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Thergesen advised me, Hanley provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.20%.

After reading Hanley his rights and the standard statement, Hanley was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Hanley had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Hanley provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. After Hanley completed the breath test, the Alcotest had a control test fail and stated a solution change was needed. Ptl. Hentges #288 and I transported Hanley to Point Pleasant Borough PD to utilize their Alcotest machine. Hanley again was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Hanley had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Hanley provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Hanley's BAC was recorded at 0.20%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.
