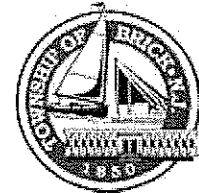

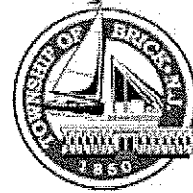

On 05/15/2019 at 2342 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on patrol in the parking lot of the Shell Gas Station located at 1 Lanes Mill Road. During this time, I observed a black colored GMC Acadia bearing NJ registration N44HRE traveling north on Lanes Mill Road.

As the vehicle passed my location I observed the adult female driver come to a complete stop in the middle of the roadway, which obstructed the passage of all vehicles behind her. I further observed that Christina Perrone was the driver of the vehicle. Perrone is documented as a criminal offender in our departmental database. Perrone then entered the parking lot of the Wawa Convenience Store located at 6 Lanes Mill Road. She then quickly exited her vehicle and entered the building for approximately five minutes. Perrone exited the store front, re-entered her vehicle and exited the parking lot and began traveling south on Herborn Ave with her front headlights deactivated.

I requested dispatch conduct a drivers license inquiry on Perrone, which revealed her drivers license was suspended, which is in violation of N.J.S. 39:3-40. I followed the vehicle, activated my emergency overhead lights and conducted a motor vehicle stop in front of the Jersey Farms Convenience Store located at 1820 Lanes Mill Road. There I exited my patrol vehicle and made a passenger side approach.

As I reached the front passenger side window I made contact with Perrone and an adult male front passenger who was identified as Furquan Powell. I asked Perrone to provide me with her drivers license, registration and insurance card. While waiting for her credentials I detected the odor of raw marijuana emanating from inside the vehicle. I also observed trace amounts of green vegetation (suspect marijuana) lying in plain view on the center console area and on the front and rear floor of the vehicle. Ptl. Alexander #216 and Ptl. Haugh #217 arrived on location to assist. Upon their arrival, I requested both Perrone and Powell exit the vehicle and they complied.

I advised Perrone that I observed suspected marijuana inside her vehicle and she voluntarily stated "There's an eighth inside the center console". A search of the vehicle revealed the following evidence:

1. One (1) clear plastic bag of green vegetation, suspect marijuana. The bag was located lying in plain on top of the center console.
2. One (1) black colored "Honey oil" vape / pen cartridge containing suspect marijuana oil. The cartridge was located inside the driver side door compartment.
3. One (1) container labeled "Smart Bud" with green vegetation inside, suspect marijuana. The container was located inside the center console.

I took possession of the recovered evidence and secured it inside a department issued evidence bag. After doing so, I advised both Perrone and Powell of their Miranda rights verbatim from a card that I keep in my uniform shirt. They both stated they understood and agreed to speak with officers on scene. I asked them who the marijuana belonged to and Perrone voluntarily stated the recovered marijuana belonged to her. As a result, I advised her she was under arrest for possessing fifty (50) grams or less of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. She was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. Perrone was then seat belted and secured inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #24. Powell left the scene without further incident. The suspect vehicle was locked and secured on location.

Perrone was transported to police headquarters, where she was booked and processed as per departmental policy. All recovered marijuana was labeled "to be tested". The marijuana was then secured inside the evidence drop box located in the departmental intake room. Deputy Court Administrator Donna Morra was contacted and advised of the incident. As a result, Morra advised that I release Perrone on a complaint summons. She was released from police custody and advised of her future court date.

Perrone was charged with the following on warrant # 1506-W-2019-000504.

1. Possession of 50 grams or less of marijuana: 2C:35-10A(4), 2 counts.
2. Possession of drug paraphernalia: 2C:36-2.

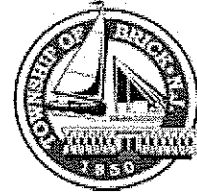
Perrone was issued the following motor vehicle citations:

1. Driving while suspended: 39:3-40, T-162809.

3. Delaying traffic: 39:4-56, written warning.

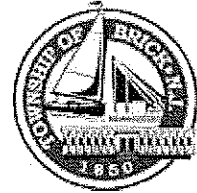

On 05/16/2019 at 0023 hours I (Ptl. Riccio #289) was on patrol traveling on Mantoloking Rd. eastbound behind a gray Toyota Camry (D.E. Reg. 431939). After we crossed the bridge, Mantoloking Road turned into Herbert Street. As the Toyota was approaching Rt. 35 the driver neglected to utilize his right turn signal prior to decreasing his speed (39:4-126).

I stopped the vehicle in Mantoloking Twp. on Rt. 35 near the intersection of Downer Avenue. When I exited my vehicle the trunk, and gas cap to the Toyota opened. I approached the vehicle and was met by Keith Seiler (Driver), and Chardel Holman (Passenger). I asked Keith why he opened the exterior compartments to the vehicle, and he stated his knee had hit the buttons. Keith was visibly nervous, and talking erratically. I asked Keith for his credentials (i.e. license, registration, and insurance) and he provided them all willingly. I asked Keith where he was coming from. He stated he just picked up Chardel and was heading to Walmart. This raised my suspicion due to there being no Walmart on Rt. 35. I asked Keith what Walmart he was going to which he stated the Brick Walmart (1872 Rt. 88). The direction Keith was going was in the complete opposite direction of Walmart. I asked Chardel if he would provide identification, and he provided it willingly. Ptl. Therghesen #249 arrived on scene to assist.

I asked Keith to step out of the vehicle and he did so without incident. Chardel asked if he could step out of the vehicle to smoke a cigarette, and I allowed him to do so. Due to Keith's behavior, and his story not making sense I asked him for consent to search his vehicle. At the conclusion of the consent form being read to him he became defensive about allowing consent, and asked what the steps were from here. I advised him if he were to give consent I would be searching the interior compartment of the vehicle. I further advised him if he were to deny consent a K9 would be requested to respond, and do a sniff for CDS. Keith then voluntarily admitted to having "medical marijuana" in the middle console. Due to Keith's admission I advised him of his Miranda Rights via. a reference card, and he agreed to speak with me. I asked Keith if he had a CUMMA card to which he stated he did not. I searched Keith's person with negative results. A probable cause search of the vehicle yielded a glass cylinder located in the middle console containing the following:

(1) rolled cigar containing green vegetation suspected to be Marijuana.

During the course of the investigation it was discovered Chardel had a warrant for his arrest out of Neptune Twp. (W2017001630 \$1000.00 Full).

Chardel was placed under arrest (handcuffs double locked), and placed into the rear of my patrol vehicle (16). In the rear of my vehicle I advised Chardel of his Miranda Rights via. a reference card, and he was willing to speak with me. Chardel denied knowledge of the marijuana.

Keith was placed under arrest (handcuffs double locked), and placed into the rear of Ptl. Therghesen's patrol vehicle (22). I asked Keith if the Marijuana belonged to him only, and he admitted it was his.

The vehicle was parked on Princeton/Rt. 35, and secured by Ptl. Therghesen #249 prior to our departure. Keith and Chardel were transported to H.Q. where they were booked and processed.

Neptune Twp. was contacted and released Chardel on his on recognizance with a new court date.

Keith was released on criminal complaint summons #1506S2019000505 and charged with the following:

2C:35-10A(4) Possession of Marijuana under 50 grams

2C:36-2 Possession of drug paraphernalia

Keith was also issued the following traffic summonses:

39:4-126 Fail to signal (E19-002668)

39:4-49.1 Poss CDS M.V. (E19-002669)

Det. Alvarado #221 was contacted and advised of the incident. All items located were placed into property.

On 05/22/2019 at 2334 hours I was dispatched to 484 Rena Court. Dispatch advised an area resident reported they observed a gold Hyundai Sonata, NJ registration X80JFP and believed the occupants were involved in CDS activity.

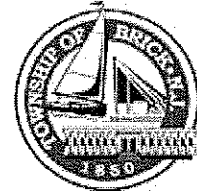
As I arrived on scene I observed a gold color Hyundai Sonata, NJ registration X80JVF parked directly in front of 484 Rena Court. As I approached the vehicle I observed an occupant sitting in the front passenger seat. As I approached the front passenger window I could detect the odor of raw marijuana. Hatch opened the door and I identified myself as a Brick Township Police Officer. As I spoke with Hatch I detected the odor of burnt and raw marijuana emanating from his person. I asked Hatch why he was sitting in the dark alone in the passenger seat. Hatch stated he was taking a nap in the car while his cousin was inside his home. I asked Hatch why he didn't just take a nap in the home, Hatch did not answer. I asked Hatch who's house they were at, Hatch stated it was a family members house but he did not know the name because he had just met them. I asked Hatch for his cousins name that drove him there. Hatch paused then stated he forgot his cousins name. I requested dispatch start me another unit for assistance.

While waiting for an additional unit, Thomas Hatch walked out of the home. Thomas approached me and asked why I was speaking to his son. I explained to Thomas I was investigating a call for service. Ptl. Predrilled #223. Ptl. LaPoint #222 and Ptl. Catalina #263 arrived on scene. I asked Hatch to step out of the vehicle. I asked Hatch if he had anything illegal inside his pockets, Hatch stated he had more marijuana. As hatch stood with Ptl. Catalina #263, I searched the vehicle which revealed (1) glass cartridge containing suspect THC extract. Hatch was placed in hand cuffs and searched incident to arrest which yielded a leafy green substance believed to be marijuana stored inside a plastic baggies in his front right pant pocket. Hatch was placed in the rear of vehicle #38 and transported to police head quarters.

While at head quarters Hatch was booked and processed. Hatch was charged on summons # 1506-S-2019-000521 with 2:35-10A(4) Possession of marijuana under 50 grams and 2C:36-6 Possession of drug paraphernalia. Hatch was released pending a future court date with out incident.

On 05/23/2019 at 1512 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on patrol in the area of Herborn Ave. / Burnt Tavern Rd. operating marked patrol vehicle #24. During this time, I observed a white colored Lincoln sedan bearing NJ registration L39HVU exit the Wawa Convenience Store located at 6 Lanes Mill Road. As the vehicle exited the parking lot I observed approximately two (2) items hanging from the rearview mirror of the vehicle, which obstructed the drivers front windshield. A full inquiry search on the vehicles license plate revealed that the vehicle's registration was expired, which is in violation of N.J.S. 39:3-4.

After observing the above violations, I activated my emergency overhead lights to initiate a motor vehicle stop. The vehicle came to a complete stop in the area of Herborn Ave. / Rosalind Road. I exited my patrol vehicle and made a passenger side approach. There I made contact with two occupants who were identified as Charles Carter (driver) and Jordan Blackwell (front passenger). While speaking with Carter I observed trace amounts of green vegetation (suspect marijuana) lying in plain view in the center console cup holder and on the front passenger side floor mat. Ptl. Testa #265 arrived on location to assist.

During this time, I requested both Carter and Blackwell exit the vehicle and they complied. There I advised both occupants that I had observed trace amounts of marijuana lying in plain view inside the vehicle. Blackwell then voluntarily stated the following: "I smoke weed, I have some in my front pocket". A search of Blackwell revealed one (1) clear plastic bag containing loose green vegetation (suspect marijuana). The bag was located inside the front right jean pocket of Blackwell. I took possession of the recovered marijuana and secured it inside a department issued evidence bag. The evidence was then secured inside my locked patrol vehicle. A search of the vehicle revealed negative results for additional marijuana.

I advised Blackwell he was under arrest for possessing CDS (controlled dangerous substance). He was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. He was secured inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #24. Prior to leaving the scene, the suspect vehicle was locked and secured on location. Carter was issued a total of three (3) motor vehicle citations. Carter requested that we transport him to headquarters in order to wait for the release of Blackwell. Ptl. Testa then transported Carter to headquarters without further incident.

Blackwell was transported to headquarters, where he was booked and processed as per departmental policy. All recovered marijuana that was found during my investigation was labeled to be tested for CDS. The marijuana was properly secured and placed into the evidence drop box, which is located in the departmental intake room. Blackwell was then released on a complaint summons and was advised of his future court date.

Blackwell was charged with the following on complaint summons: 1506-S-2019-000529.

1. Possession of 50 grams or less of marijuana: 2C:35-10A(4).

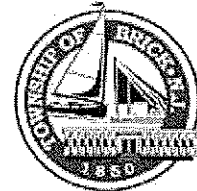

On 05/24/2019 at 2221 hours I (Ptl. Riccio #289) was on patrol in the right travel lane on Rt. 88 westbound stopped at a red traffic light near the intersection of Rt. 70. To the right of me was a gold Dodge Stratus (N.J. Reg. A28KLC) stopped in the right turn only lane. The light turned green and I began to accelerate forward. I observed the Dodge Stratus fail to move forward, blocking the motorists behind him (39:4-67), and fail to make his right turn (39:4-115). The vehicle failed to move for the entire duration of the green light, and it turned red again. I thought this to be suspicious, and waited for the light to turn green again to see if the vehicle would move forward. When the light cycled green I observed the Dodge Stratus cut in front of a vehicle to its left, and accelerate at a high rate of speed traveling down Rt. 70 westbound. The right turn only lane that the Dodge Stratus was in would have had him continue on Rt. 88 westbound.

I attempted to close the distance on the vehicle, but was having trouble due to heavy traffic at the time of this incident. I utilized my emergency lights and sirens to move vehicles out of my way. When the roadway opened I observed the vehicle to be far ahead of my position. I was able to close the distance on the vehicle, and stopped it on Cedar Bridge Avenue near the intersection of Wedgewood Road.

I approached the vehicle and was met by the driver, Nabate Montgomery. While walking up, Nabate was leaning forward with his right hand down appearing to be concealing something under the seat or in his sock. I asked Nabate for his credentials (i.e. license, registration, and insurance), and he provided all of them willingly. While speaking with Nabate I could detect the odor of raw marijuana emanating from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. Ptl. Smith #231, Ptl. Thergesen #249, and Ptl. Bailey #293 arrived on scene to assist.

I asked Nabate out of the vehicle and he did so without incident. I asked Nabate if there was anything illegal in the vehicle. He stated "No". A probable cause search of Nabate's person yielded negative results. A Probable cause search of the vehicle yielded the following:

- (1) Can "Smart Bud" containing approximately 3 grams of marijuana located in a black backpack on the front passenger seat floor
- (2) empty cigar wrappers commonly used to prepare marijuana for inhalation located in the middle console

During the course of the investigation it was discovered Nabate's driving privileges were suspended (39:3-40), and he had an outstanding ATS warrant for his arrest out of Wall Township (E19-1781, \$600.0) Full).

As a result Nabate was placed under arrest (handcuffed/double locked). I advised Nabate of his Miranda Rights via a reference card, and he did not wish to speak with me. The vehicle was parked in the grass off of the roadway and secured prior to our departure by Ptl. Bailey.

Nabate was transported to H.Q. where he was booked and processed without incident. Nabate paid his bail in full for the Wall Twp. warrant, and was released on his own recognizance.

Nabate was released on criminal complaint summons #1506S2019000534, and charged with the following:

- 2C:35-10a(4) Marijuana under 50 grams
- 2C:36-2 Drug Paraphernalia

Nabate was also issued the following traffic summonses

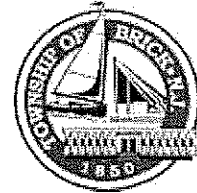

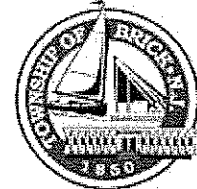

On 05/24/2019 at 0130 hours Ptl. Docherty #275 and I, Ptl. Shevchuk #294 were on stationary patrol at the intersection of Lanes Mill Rd. / Burnt Tavern Road. During this time, I observed a silver Ford sedan bearing NJ registration A56LGL traveling north on Lanes Mill Road. I further observed that the front windshield was smashed and had a substantial amount of cracks, which is in violation of N.J.S. 39:3-75. I also observed that Rodney Davis was the driver of the vehicle. Ptl. Docherty is familiar with Davis from prior police related encounters. He is a repeat criminal offender and is known to have outstanding warrants issued for his arrest. Warrant checks on Davis revealed the following warrant issued for his arrest:

1. Brick Township Municipal Court: 2C:12-1A(1), #W-2019-000464, NO BAIL.

Due to the observed motor vehicle infraction and the warrant issued for his arrest I activated my emergency overhead lights to conduct a motor vehicle stop. The suspect vehicle came to a complete stop in the area of Lanes Mill Rd. / Alexander Road. I made a driver side approach and made contact with two occupants who were identified as Rodney Davis (driver) and Colleen Carney (front passenger). Ptl. Oliverio #286 and Ptl. Hentges #288 arrived on location to assist. I advised Davis to exit the vehicle and he complied. I advised him he was under arrest for having an active outstanding warrant issued for his arrest. He was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. He was seat belted and secured inside the rear compartment of patrol vehicle #24. As I returned to the suspect vehicle Ptl. Docherty advised me that he had observed the following CDS (controlled dangerous substance) and drug paraphernalia lying in plain view.

1. One (1) small clear plastic bag containing suspected CDS residue. The bag was observed lying on the front passenger side floor mat. Through Ptl. Docherty's police training, knowledge and experience he knows that this specific type of bag is commonly used to package and store various types of CDS.

2. One (1) green colored plant stem, suspected marijuana stem. The stem was observed lying on the front passenger side floor mat. There was also trace amounts of green vegetation, suspected marijuana lying on the front floor of the vehicle.

As a result, Carney was advised to exit the vehicle and she complied. I asked Carney if the observed CDS / drug paraphernalia belonged to her and she denied ownership. A search of the vehicle revealed the following additional evidence:

1. One (1) unmarked gray colored vaporizer instrument containing a glass oil cartridge with suspect marijuana oil inside. The vaporizer pen was located inside the passenger side glove compartment.

2. One (1) small plastic bag containing suspected CDS residue. The second bag was located inside a black tool bag in the trunk of the vehicle. The black tool bag was accessible from the back seat of the vehicle. Specifically, the entire rear seat had the ability to fold down, where there was easy access to the trunk of the vehicle.

Ptl. Docherty took possession of the recovered marijuana / drug paraphernalia and secured it inside a department issued evidence bag. The evidence was then secured inside my locked patrol vehicle. Prior to leaving the scene, the suspect vehicle was locked and secured on location. Carney then left the scene without further incident. Davis was transported to headquarters, where he was booked and processed as per departmental policy. All recovered marijuana and drug paraphernalia that was found during my investigation was labeled to be tested for CDS. The evidence was properly secured and placed into the evidence drop box, which is located in the departmental intake room. Deputy Court Administrator Michele Edgin was contacted and advised of the incident. As a result, Edgin placed Edgin's criminal charges on a warrant. Davis was transported to the Ocean County Jail and was lodged without further incident.

Davis was charged with the following on warrant # 1506-W-2019-000502

1. Possession of drug paraphernalia: 2C:36-2.
2. Possession of 50 grams or less of marijuana: 2C:35-10A(4),
3. Possession of under 5 grams of hash: 2C:35-10A(4).

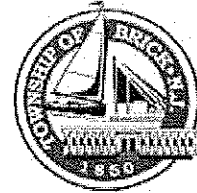

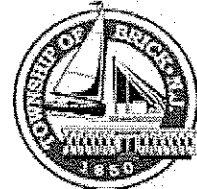

On 6/26/19 at approximately 1300 hours I was dispatched to 85 Lake Point Dr. in reference to a suspicious vehicle. Dispatch advised an area resident stated a dark colored SUV was doing "donuts" on the property. I am familiar with the location. It is a vacant property in a secluded area with no dwellings.

Upon arrival I observed a black GMC (NJ Reg.A70GNJ) parked by the lagoon. There were three subjects in the vehicle. I approached the vehicle which had its windows open and greeted the occupants: Tyler Gleason (driver), [REDACTED] (front passenger), and Jakub Lacki (right rear passenger). I asked the subjects why they were on the property, and asked what they were doing. As Gleason was speaking I immediately observed a clear glass smoker pipe next to Lacki, and a black medal marijuana grinder between his legs.

At this time I requested another officer to my location. Ptl. Gesky (#184), and Ptl. Talty (#250) arrived to assist. I asked Lacki to hand me the grinder. He complied. There was a minute amount of marijuana inside of it. Looking at the glass smoker pipe, I observed marijuana in the mouthpiece. I asked the subjects who owned the marijuana. Lacki stated "it's mine".

At this time I took possession of the glass pie and removed Lacki from the vehicle. I asked Lacki if he had any drugs on him. Lacki stated "I only have this" and handed me a vape pen with a clear glass cartridge. Lacki informed me it had contained THC oil.

A search of the vehicle did not result in any more CDS or paraphernalia. I advised Lacki that he was under arrest, placed him in handcuffs which were double locked, and placed him into the rear of marked patrol vehicle #35. I placed all of the CDS items in my vehicle. [REDACTED] was advised that the area is private property and not to return.

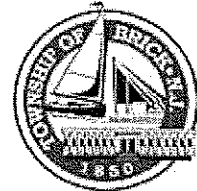

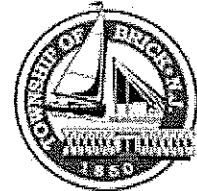

On 05/28/2019 at 2210hrs Ptl. Dinnebeil #268 and I were dispatched to 316 Tennessee Drive for a report of a possible domestic dispute called in by a neighbor. Police dispatch advised that a male and female were outside and the female was screaming (See incident #33455-19 for details). While en route, we were further advised by police dispatch that the male party left the residence in a silver colored Honda Civic traveling slowly towards Pine Tree Drive.

As I was traveling up Pine Tree Drive towards Tennessee Drive, I observed a silver Honda Civic (NJ-P50HTA) approach the intersection of Tennessee Drive and Pine Tree Drive coming from the direction of 316 Tennessee Drive. As the vehicle came to a stop at the stop sign, I observed a white male driver (later identified as Michael Celauro) and a white female passenger in the front seat (later identified as Samantha Carter). I conducted an investigative motor vehicle stop on the vehicle at the same intersection to inquire further and see if they were the involved party.

Upon approaching the driver side window, I began speaking with the two subjects to see where they were coming from. Both advised that they were coming from a friend's house at 316 Tennessee Drive, and stated they left because their friend and his wife were fighting. While standing at the driver side window, I observed in plain view a multi colored glass smoking pipe commonly used to smoke marijuana resting in the center console. I also detected the odor of marijuana inside the vehicle. Upon removing Celauro from the vehicle, and speaking with him further, he advised there was a metal grinder containing marijuana also in the center console near the glass pipe. At this time, I verbally advised Celauro of his Miranda Rights and he stated the grinder, pipe, and marijuana were all his.

Ptl. Dinnebeil arrived on location to assist. Celauro was searched and found to be clear of any contraband. Carter was then removed from the vehicle and searched as well with negative results. I then entered the vehicle and retrieved the pipe which contained suspected marijuana residue. I also located the metal grinder from the console which contained an amount of loose suspected marijuana inside. The items were secured as evidence in the rear of my patrol vehicle. A further search of the vehicle was conducted by no other contraband was located.

At the conclusion of the search, I secured Celauro in double locked handcuffs to the rear of his torso and advised him that he was under arrest for possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. He was escorted over to the rear of my patrol vehicle where I searched the rear passenger compartment and found it to be free of any debris or contraband. I then secured Celauro in the compartment. Celauro's vehicle was parked legally and secured. I then retained the vehicle keys and transported Celauro to police headquarters for processing. Carter remained on location and called a friend to pick her up.

Upon arrival at headquarters, I removed Celauro from the rear compartment and it was again searched with negative results. I then escorted him inside, secured my duty weapon in one of the designated gun lockers, and escorted Celauro into cell block #2 where he was further searched and secured in accordance with departmental policy. He was then escorted into the booking room for processing.

Celauro was issued and served with summons #S-2019-000553 for 2c:35-10a(4)(Possession of Marijuana less than 50 grams) and 2c:36-2(Possession of Drug Paraphernalia). He was also issued traffic summons E19 003031 for 39:4-49.1(Possession of CDS in Motor Vehicle). Celauro was then released pending his court dates. All items of contraband were logged into property as evidence. Det. Mauro #207 of DEU was notified of the arrest.

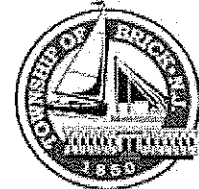

On 05/31/2019 at approximately 1707 hours I observed a white Toyota bearing NJ registration X55HVF with dark front tinted windows traveling North on Chambersbridge Rd in the area of Sprucewood Dr. I began traveling in the left lane behind the vehicle when I then observed a large cloud of smoke exit the vehicle from the front driver side window. As we moved forward in traffic and I drove through the cloud of smoke, I was immediately able to recognize its odor as burnt marijuana. I initiated a motor vehicle stop activating my overhead lights and sirens. The suspect vehicle turned into the parking lot for Buyrite Liquors at 60 Chambersbridge Rd in Lakewood Township. I activated my body worn camera as I approached the vehicle on the driver side to speak with the operator, later identified as Yenifer Mendez-Navarro. I asked Yenifer for her license, registration and insurance information which she then began to obtain. As we spoke, I was now able to immediately detect the scent of raw marijuana coming from within the vehicle. I asked Yenifer if there was any marijuana in the vehicle and she stated there was not. Ptl. Prendeville #223 and Ptl. Haugh #217 arrived on scene to assist with the investigation. Also in the vehicle, was Gina Mendez (front passenger seat) and Refugio Menes-Rodriguez (rear driver side seat).

I informed Yenifer that I would be conducting a search of the vehicle based upon my detection of the odor of marijuana inside. All occupants exited the vehicle and moved to the rear bumper with Ptl. Prendeville while I conducted the search. The following items were located inside:

In the map pocket of the front driver side door was an empty cone container of "Raw" brand rolling papers. Inside a White Castle food bag, (which was initially observed in Yenifer's lap after I had approached the vehicle) I located several portions of green vegetative matter suspected of being raw marijuana. It appeared to have been dumped into the bag to conceal its location. Those portions were recovered for evidence. There was a drinking mug with a rubber cap in the cup holder of the center console. On the lid of that cup was a small portion of green vegetative matter suspected of being marijuana. Upon opening that lid, I observed a brown liquid with tea-bags and several small portions of green vegetative matter floating on the top of the liquid, also suspected of being marijuana. It appeared that another amount of marijuana had been poured into the tea to conceal its location. On the floor of the front passenger seat I located a small plastic bag containing an amount of green vegetative matter suspected of being marijuana. Next to the bag, was a small spray bottle of liquid air freshener. Its location with the marijuana on the floor, absent any other items at all, indicated it had been used in an attempt to mask the odor of marijuana in the vehicle. On the front passenger seat were several small portions of green vegetative matter suspected of being marijuana. In the front passenger side door pull handle pocket was a cone container of "Raw" brand rolling papers, which did contain 3 unused unfiltered rolling papers. Also in the front passenger side door pull handle pocket was a small cardboard tube used in the production of marijuana cigarettes, which did contain a small amount of burnt marijuana pressed into the end. In the rear of seat portion of the center console was an unopened "game" brand Tropical flavored cigarillos, commonly used in the production of marijuana cigarettes. Next to the cigarillos was another empty cone container of "Raw" brand rolling papers. All of the above was seized as evidence for processing at headquarters. As I removed the plastic bag of marijuana from the front passenger seat floor, Ptl. Prendeville advised me that Gina Mendez admitted ownership of that specific bag of marijuana.

Based upon the above investigation, Yenifer was placed under arrest for the marijuana located inside of the White Castle bag, the small portions of marijuana located upon the center console, in the tea, and for possession of drug paraphernalia for the containers of "Raw" brand rolling papers and "Game" brand cigarillos located within the car. Gina Mendez was charged with possession of marijuana for the small bag of suspected marijuana located on the floor of the front passenger seat and for the admission to the possession thereof. She was also charged with possession of drug paraphernalia for the possession of the plastic bag which did contain said marijuana and for possession of the liquid air freshener used to conceal the possession of said marijuana.

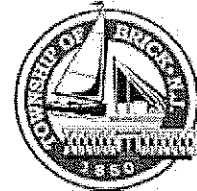
Both suspects were searched after being placed into a pair of handcuffs. They were placed into the rear of Ptl. Haugh's patrol vehicle and transported to headquarters where they were processed as per departmental policy and procedure. Refugio was given control of the vehicle with permission of Yenifer and was released from the scene.

Yenifer was charged with 39:4-49.1 on summons E19-3130 and 39:3-75 on summons E19-3131, and 2C:35-10A(4) and 2C:36-2 on summons 1506-S-2019-570 and was released. Gina was charged with 2C:35-10A(4) and 2C:36-2 on summons 1505-S-2019-569 and was released.

Sgt. Olsen #185 of DEU was notified of this incident.

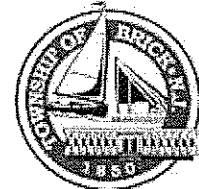

On 06/08/2019 at 1928hrs I was dispatched to the area of 319 Bay Lane for a report of two subjects in a vehicle possibly smoking CDS. While en route Dispatch advised the vehicle was a gray Acura bearing NJ registration F80KUS, and was occupied by a male and female.

Upon arrival, I observed the above vehicle parked in front of 320 Bay Lane. I could see there was a male driver and female passenger. I pulled up and parked directly behind the vehicle. As I exited and approached the passenger side, I could see the driver lean down towards the center console briefly. I walked up and knocked on the front passenger window. When the window rolled down, I made contact with the occupants of the vehicle (later identified as Jyrese West and Blessin Reid). I asked what the two were doing parked in this location. West advised that they were from Jersey City, and they were waiting for someone to come and pick up the vehicle. While speaking with them, I detected the odor of raw marijuana emanating from inside the vehicle. I could also see in plain view resting near the center console a freshly rolled suspected marijuana cigarette (commonly referred to as a "Blunt"). At this time, I instructed West to shut the engine off and step in front of the vehicle to speak with me. Special Officer John Kisch #S76 arrived on scene to assist.

While speaking with West at the front of the vehicle, I advised him of the reason I was there. I also informed him that I could smell marijuana inside the vehicle, and asked if there was any inside. West advised that there was a blunt and a small bag of marijuana both in the center console area. I instructed Reid to step out of the vehicle and stand at the rear with Ofc. Kisch, which she did. I then entered the vehicle briefly and removed the suspected marijuana cigarette. Upon observing it closer, I could see that it was full of suspected marijuana that had not yet been smoked. At this time, I secured West in double locked handcuffs to the rear of his torso and advised him he was under arrest. I then escorted him to the rear of my patrol vehicle.

Once at my patrol vehicle, I searched West incident to arrest. I then verbally advised West of his Miranda Rights. When I was finished, I asked if West understood his rights and he indicated that he did. I then questioned him about the suspected marijuana. West advised that they were on their way to Seaside Heights for the evening from Jersey City. He stated that he was pulled over by another officer for having tinted windows. West advised that the officer issued him a summons and told him not to drive since his license was not valid, so he remained at this location and called his mother to come and pick the two of them up. West advised that they had not yet smoked any marijuana, and stated that the Blunt and bag of marijuana belonged to him.

After speaking with West, I searched the rear passenger compartment of my patrol vehicle for any debris or contraband with negative results. I then secured him inside the compartment. After doing so, I searched the passenger compartment of the Acura for any further contraband. I located a small clear baggie containing suspected marijuana on the center console near where the blunt was located. I also located a smaller, partially smoked suspected marijuana cigarette in the ashtray. The inside of the vehicle, however, did not smell of burnt marijuana, and neither subject appeared to be under the influence. The partially smoked suspected marijuana cigarette must have been in the vehicle from a previous incident. No other contraband was located in the vehicle.

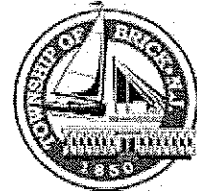
Reid contacted West's mother who advised that she was en route from Jersey City. Reid then secured the vehicle and requested to be transported back to headquarters to wait for West there. I secured all contraband in an evidence bag in my patrol vehicle. I then transported West to police headquarters for processing. Reid was transported by Ofc. Kisch to headquarters where she would wait in the lobby for West.

Upon arrival at headquarters, I removed West from the rear compartment. After again searching the compartment with negative results, I escorted him inside where I secured my duty weapon inside one of the designated gun lockers. I then escorted him into cell block #1 where he was further searched and secured in accordance with departmental policy. West was then escorted into the booking room where he was processed and served with Summons #S-2019-000587 for 2c:35-10a(4)(Possession of Marijuana Under 50 Grams) and 2c:36-2(Possession of Drug Paraphernalia). I also served West with traffic summons E19 003358 for 39:4-49.1(Possession of CDS in Motor Vehicle). He was then released pending his court date. All items of contraband were logged into property as evidence.

On 06/09/2019 at 2357 hours, K9 Officer Smith #231 and I (Ptl.Oliverio #286) responded to the area of Rt.88 and Burrsville in reference to an erratic driver. Dispatch advised a third party caller observed a white Nissan Sentra almost hit several mailbox's.

Ptl. Smith #231 located the vehicle in the area of Robbins St and Princeton Ave. The suspect vehicle (White Nissan Sentra #B18JAS) was partially parked in the drive way of 7 Robbins Ave. The back end of the vehicle was still in the roadway, causing a delay in traffic (39:4-56).

When we approached the vehicle, we detected the odor of burnt marijuana emanating form inside the passenger compartment of the vehicle. I asked the driver (identified as Brian Doyle) to step out of the vehicle to which he did without incident. I inquired if there was anything inside the vehicle, to which he advised he just smoked a "joint" and that he was still in possession of a THC cartridge. The cartridge was located in his left pocket. A search of his person yielded the said cartridge. A probable cause search of his vehicle yielded an additional THC cartridge (packaged in a blue cardboard box) located in the drivers side door.

Subsequently, Doyle was placed under arrest for possession of 50 grams or less of marijuana (2c:35-10a(4)).He was handcuffed double locked, searched incident to arrest, and placed in the back of marked patrol vehicle #27. He was then transported to Headquarters were he was processed without incident.

The back of my patrol vehicle was searched before and after Doyle was placed inside of it, yielding negative results. Also my service weapon was secured in locker #01 at the front desk before Doyle was brought back to the cell area.

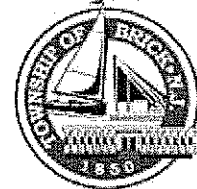

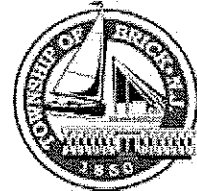

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On 06/16/2019 at approximately 2248 hours, I, Ptl. Caulfield #235, was working a DUI grant detail in Brick, NJ in patrol vehicle #36.

At that time, I was dispatched to the parking lot of 189 Chambers Bridge Road to assist Ptl. Smith #231 on a motor vehicle stop involving a possible intoxicated driver (See Ptl. Smith's Supplemental Report). Upon arrival, the female suspect, identified as Leanne E. Braly, was standing outside the vehicle speaking with Ptl. Riccio #289. I then approached Braly, identified myself to her, and began speaking to her. While initially speaking with Braly, I observed that her speech was slow and slurred. In addition, I observed that both of her eyes were watery, bloodshot, and both eyelids were heavy and droopy. I also detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. When asked if she had consumed any alcoholic beverages, Braly stated she drank one Jameson and ginger-ale mixed drink earlier this afternoon while on a tourist yacht in New York City, NY.

At that time, I explained to Braly that I was going to administer field sobriety tests at the scene in which she, Braly, had no objection to. As Braly was walking towards another section of the parking lot, I observed her slightly swaying while walking. While Braly was standing in the parking lot, I also observed that she was swaying while standing and her stance was rigid. When asked if she had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Braly stated no. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris. The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Braly as to how to perform the examination, Braly had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. Furthermore, I observed that Braly was swaying in both in a front to back and side to side motion during parts of the test.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Braly continued to sway while standing and had some difficulty maintaining her balance while in the starting position. Braly also started the test prior to being instructed by me to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Braly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Braly failed to touch heel to toe on several steps, lost her balance while walking (Stepped off the line on more than one occasion), lost her balance while turning (Braly pivoted causing her to slightly stagger), and turned incorrectly (Failed to keep her lead foot on the ground).

The final examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed that Braly was swaying while standing in the starting position.. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Braly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Braly was swaying while her left foot was elevated and also put her right foot down on more than one occasion. Furthermore, Braly only had her left foot elevated approximately 3-4 inches off the ground while performing the test.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Braly was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Point Pleasant Borough PD headquarters in patrol vehicle #36 without incident. Prior to placing Braly into my patrol car, I inspected Braly's oral cavity. Braly stated she had invisalign strips on her teeth and that she would be able to remove said strips. The rear of my patrol vehicle where Braly was seated was checked prior to her being transported, as well as, when I arrived at Point Pleasant Boro PD. Both checks yielded negative results. A search of Braly incident to her arrest also yielded negative results. Ptl. Smith #231 remained on scene and awaited Route 88 Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Once at police headquarters, Braly was read her Miranda Rights and signed off on the waiver portion of the form (Waived her rights). In addition, I also inspected Braly's oral cavity once again inside Point Pleasant Borough PD headquarters. At that time, Braly removed the invisalign strips from her teeth and an inspection of her oral cavity after said removal yielded negative results/findings. I then read Braly the NJ D.U.I. Standard Statement form (Implied Consent) in which she agreed to submit samples of her breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine and also observed Braly for twenty minutes (Twenty minutes were managed utilizing my personal wristwatch) prior to administering the test. During said observation time, Braly remained under constant and uninterrupted observation until the administering of the Alcotest machine was fully complete. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, etc.). Braly provided sufficient breath samples and her BAC was 0.09%. I then entered the Alcotest breath sample results into the NJSP Alcotest Calculator in which the breath sample results were within acceptable tolerance. Furthermore, a new mouthpiece was used each time Braly provided a breath sample into the Alcotest machine.

After the Alcotest was administered, Braly was transported to Brick PD headquarters by me without incident. Once again, the rear seat of my patrol vehicle was checked prior to the transport, as well as, after arriving at Brick PD headquarters. Both checks yielded negative results/findings. Upon entering Brick PD headquarters, I secured my duty weapon inside a designated gun lock box located in the watch commander's room. Braly was then processed, as per policy, and issued motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50 (1506-E19-3535), 39:4-96 (1506-E19-3536), 39:4-97 (1506-E19-3537), 39:4-88B (1506-E19-3538), and 39:4-49.1 (1506-E19-3539). Braly was also charged with several CDS related offenses by Ptl. Smith as a result of the motor vehicle stop. Braly was released a short time later to a family member, [REDACTED], who signed and was given the original copy of the Potential Liability form. Furthermore, Braly was given a copy of the Alcohol Influence Report from the Alcotest machine.

My body worn camera was activated during this incident.

OfficerID: ssmith, Narrative

On 06/16/2019 at 0152 hours I observed a Jeep Grand Cherokee, NJ-F80KNG, traveling North on Chambers Bridge Rd in the area of Salmon St. The vehicle had made several abrupt swerves between the left and right lane, with its front and rear passenger side tires crossing between the two lanes of travel. I activated my overhead lights and sirens to initiate a motor vehicle stop and activated my department issued body worn camera.

The vehicle pulled into the parking lot of the Singin Gas Station located at 189 Chambers Bridge Rd. I approached the vehicle on the driver side and spoke with the operator, Leanne Braly. I advised Braly for the reason for the motor vehicle stop and requested her license, registration and insurance information. Braly stated she was coming home from a "yacht party" she attended in NYC where she stated she had consumed alcoholic beverages early in the evening. As I spoke with Braly, I detected the scent of an alcoholic beverage on her breath as well as the smell of both burnt and raw marijuana coming from within the vehicle. Braly appeared nervous and could be seen swallowing, nervously licking her lips, and her heart rate appeared to be elevated, visible by her carotid artery pulsing on her neck as she spoke. Braly's words were slow and slurred, and her hand motions were slow as she handed me her documentation. Ptl. Caulfield #235 and Ptl. Riccio #289 arrived on scene to assist. Ptl. Caulfield was working a DUI enforcement detail and took over the investigation into a possible violation of DUI-39:4-50. See his case report for further details. As Ptl. Caulfield spoke with Braly, I deployed my partner, K9 Echo #917, to conduct an external sniff of the vehicle for narcotics. See my K9 report for details on that sniff.

Based upon the smell of burnt marijuana in the vehicle, and K9 Echo's positive indication to the presence of a narcotic odor, a search of the vehicle was conducted. Inside of the vehicle, I located the following contraband:

- One green and glass vaporizer pen cartridge with a brown resin fluid inside, suspected of being marijuana resin extract, AKA Hashish oil. The cartridge was labeled "Smart Cart Organic" with a marijuana leaf emblem as a part of the logo.
- One E-Z Wider brand double wide cigarette rolling papers, commonly used to roll marijuana cigarettes.
- Two "Zootz" brand "Gold Label Indica" vaporizer cartridge boxes. The boxes were empty and did not contain the cartridges. The boxes were clearly marked as "100% natural cannabis" with a labeled cartridge content of 90.3% THC.

While conducting a search of the vehicle and its contents, a large amount of money was located in Braly's purse. Due to high winds and the unsecured nature of the bills, they were not initially removed from the purse out of fear of losing the bills as they were itemized and counted on the side of the roadway.

Based upon Ptl. Caulfield's observations, and the items discovered during the search of her vehicle, Braly was placed under arrest. See Ptl. Caulfield's report for details relating to her charges for the DUI. Braly was advised of her charges and upon hearing of the discovery of the empty cartridge boxes and the single cartridge, Braly specified that the boxes should have been empty (admitting knowledge of their existence) and that the single cartridge was loose and not contained in a box (admitting knowledge of its existence). This statement was a spontaneous response to her charges, and was not in response to any questioning from either myself or Ptl. Caulfield.

Braly was transported to headquarters where she was processed as per departmental policy and procedure. During processing, the large amount of bills was removed from her purse to be counted and immediately returned to her. Upon removing the money from the purse to be counted, a small plastic bag of green vegetative matter, suspected of being marijuana, fell from within the folds of the bills. The marijuana was seized as evidence and the money was counted (\$1,103.00) and was returned to Braly. When the money was returned to Braly she acknowledged the money belonging to her.

Based upon the items located inside of her vehicle and the marijuana located during processing, Braly was charged with the following offenses:

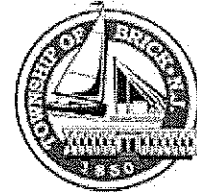
- 2C:35-10A(4) - DP offense - for possession of less than 50 grams of suspected marijuana that was found falling from within money she acknowledged as being her own.
- 2C:35-10A(4) - DP offense - for possession of less than 5 grams of hash, for having a vaporizing pen cartridge containing hash oil that she acknowledged possessing in her vehicle.
- 2C:36-2 - DP offense - for possession the empty boxes that had previously been used to store and contain hash oil vaporizing pen

cartridges, for the plastic bag used to contain the suspected marijuana, and for the cigarette rolling papers suspected of being used to roll marijuana cigarettes.

After DUI processing, Braly was released on multiple motor vehicle summons' from Ptl. Caulfield. She was released with the above charges on summons number 1506-S-2019-000613.

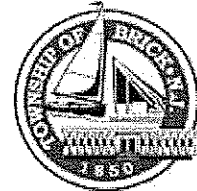

On 06/18/2019 at approximately 0225 hours, I was backing Ptl. Riccio #289 in the parking lot of Wawa (6 Lanes Mill Road) who was out with a suspicious vehicle. While with Ptl. Riccio, I observed a silver Ford Escape, (NJ registration G12LHG) occupied by one female, parked in front of the store. At approximately 0236 hours, I cleared from Ptl. Riccio and I observed the said vehicle was still parked in front of the store and the female in the driver seat was hunched over and appeared to be asleep. I then approached the vehicle from the rear and advised Dispatch of my location. Ptl. Riccio and Ptl. Joaquim #271 also responded to my location.

I approached the driver side window and observed the female subject, identified as Nicole Spadaccino, who was looking down at her cell phone. I asked her if she was okay and she stated she was sending a long text message. While speaking with Spadaccino, I noticed that her speech appeared to be slurred, her eyelids were droopy and her eyes appeared to be bloodshot and glassy. She stated that she had just got out of work and she stopped at Wawa to get candy. I informed her that I observed her in the parking lot for a prolonged period of time and I was checking on her. I asked Spadaccino to provide her license, and I observed her fumbling her purse and wallet. I then asked if there were any illegal substances inside the vehicle to which she stated there was not. I instructed Spadaccino to exit the vehicle and asked her to perform field sobriety tests based on my observations to which she agreed.

While outside the vehicle, I implemented the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test, and I did not observe any indication of intoxication. Spadaccino displayed zero out of six clues. No further field sobriety tests were conducted at this time.

Upon further speaking with Spadaccino, I asked her where she was coming from again and she stated that she was at her boyfriend's house. It should be noted that earlier, Spadaccino stated that she just got out of work. I inquired what time she left her job and she stated, "Around, 1230". The current time was approximately 0241 hours. Spadaccino then began stuttering and slurring her speech stating that she went to Wawa for candy after seeing her friend. I then asked Spadaccino for consent to search her vehicle based on the reasonable suspicion, to which she agreed and signed off on BTPD consent to search form. I advised her of her right to be present, refuse and request to stop the search at any time, which she stated she understood.

Before searching the vehicle, I asked Spadaccino again if there was anything illegal inside the vehicle which she responded, "Honestly there might be a blunt rolled, I can show you where it is." I advised Spadaccino to remain next to her vehicle with Ptl. Joaquim while Ptl. Riccio and I searched the vehicle.

During the vehicle search, Ptl. Riccio located a pink plastic bag on the floor of the front passenger side of the vehicle which contained the following:

- Six (6) hashish oil vaporizer cartridges
- Four (4) cigar blunt wrappers containing greenish brown vegetation
- One white sealed container containing greenish brown vegetation
- Two (2) "Zig Zag Blunt Wrappers"
- One pair of scissors in a bag containing "Zig Zag Rolling Papers"

Based on the above listed, I placed Spadaccino into Police custody. I handcuffed Spadaccino to the rear utilizing double locking handcuffs, searched and placed her into the rear of my patrol vehicle without incident. Spadaccino was transported to Police Headquarters for processing.

At Police Headquarters, Spadaccino was fingerprinted, photographed, and charged on complaint form 1506-W-2019-000618 with the following charges:

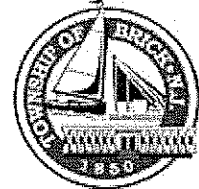
- NJSA 2C:35-10a(4); possession of marijuana under 50 grams
- NJSA 2C:35-10a(4); possession of hashish oil
- NJSA 2C:36-2; CDS paraphernalia

Based on Spadaccino's elevated PSA score, I contacted BMC Court administrator Lisa Newton, and Spadaccino was charged on a warrant. Spadaccino was subsequently transported to Ocean County Jail without incident.

My body worn camera was activated throughout the entirety of this incident. The backseat of my patrol vehicle was searched prior to and following the transport of Spadaccino to headquarters. My department issued firearm was secured prior to entering the cell area and processing room. Spadaccino was searched again prior to being placed in a holding cell. Spadaccino was screened for suicidal tendencies with negative results. Standard 30 minute prisoner checks were conducted per departmental policy and guidelines. Additionally, all evidence was logged into property room as per departmental procedure. Det. Alvarado #221 of BTPD DEU was advised.

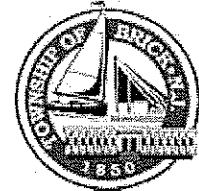

On 5/16/2019 at 2253 hours, I (Ptl. Oliverio #286) responded to the area of Drum Point Rd and Hooper Ave in reference to a hit and run report. Dispatch advised that an accident just occurred in the area of Brick Blvd and Drum Point. A witness, [REDACTED] called dispatch and advised he followed the suspect vehicle (Black Lincoln Navigator NJ. Reg #H76JGA), to the area of Laurel Ave and Downey Ave.

Upon arriving at the intersection of Laurel Ave and Downey Ave I observed the suspect vehicle. I made a drive side approach and was met by the operator, Laurence Crisman. I asked Crisman if he was involved in a accident, to which he replied "yes". While speaking with Crisman I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the passenger compartment of his vehicle. Crisman's speech was slurred, his movements were slow and his eyes were watery. I inquired if he had been drinking tonight, to which he advised me he pulled over following the accident on Drum Point Rd and had two (2) drinks. He then spontaneously uttered, he made a wrong turn down a one way street and stuck a vehicle. He then panicked and left the area. At this time Ptl. Thergesen #249 and Ptl. Mesmer #292 arrived on scene to assist. I asked Crisman to step out of his vehicle to which he did without incident. I then informed him that I would like to run him through tests to determine if he was impaired.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of field sobriety tests, he stated yes, I am very sick but would not elaborate further. The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Crisman what was his highest level of education, he stated college. I asked Crisman if he was well versed in the English language he stated Yes.

The First examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Crisman in the starting position, he swayed back and forth, and came out of the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Crisman had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Crisman did not lift his leg, he leaned to his right and placed his hand on his vehicle for balance and stated I cant do this I broke my right leg years ago.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Crisman in the starting position, he raised his arms for balance and separated his feet, causing him to come out of the starting position. I was unable to fully demonstrate the examination, due to Crisman starting it before being told to do so. He took nine (9) steps none of them being heel to toe, stopped and stated "I am done". At this time all test were terminated.

Due to the him leaving the scene of an accident, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Crisman breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). Crisman was transported to H.Q. by me without incident. Ptl. Thergesen #249 remained at the scene and awaited Point Pleasant Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

While transporting Crisman to H.Q. the interior of my patrol vehicle was filled with the odor of an alcoholic beverage.

The back of my patrol vehicle was searched before and after Crisman was placed inside, yielding negative results. Also my service weapon was secured in a locker located at the front desk, prior to Crisman being escorted to the cell area.

Once at H.Q. I operated the Alcotest instrument. I removed all electronic devices, and portable radios from the testing area in the booking room prior to breath testing. I read the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples Crisman stated, No I refuse. I then read the second part of the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples Crisman stated, "No" again.

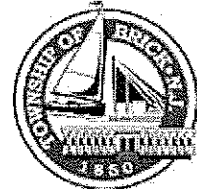

On 05/17/2019 at 0115 hours I (Ptl. Riccio #289) was on patrol in the area of Princeton Avenue and Rt. 70. My patrol car (16) is equipped with a LPR (License Plate Reader). During that time my vehicle's LPR hit on a beige BMW advising the vehicle was unregistered. I confirmed the vehicle's expired registration through the DMV database. As I closed the distance on the vehicle I observed a bracket around the rear license plate covering the letter "Garden State".

I closed the distance and stopped the vehicle on Rt. 88 in front of the Camp Mall shopping center (1905 Rt. 88). I approached the vehicle and was met by the suspect/driver, Keith Bovenzi. I observed Keith's hand movements to be slow, his eyes were watery, and his speech was slightly slurred. I asked Keith for his credentials (i.e. license, registration, and insurance) and he provided all of them willingly. I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. I asked him where he was coming from and he stated the Finnigans Bowling Center (101 Locust St. Lakewood, NJ). I asked him where he was going, and he stated he was going to Sycamore Dr. in Brick Township. This raised my suspicion due to Sycamore Dr. being on the opposite end of town, and he was approximately (5) miles out of the way. Ptl. Bailey #293 arrived on scene to assist. I asked Keith if had anything to drink to which he stated he had (3) beers, and his last one was about (30) minutes ago.

I asked Keith to step out of the vehicle, and he did so without incident. While speaking with Keith I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. I advised Keith I would like to run him through field sobriety tests and he agreed to do them.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to do the field sobriety tests, Keith stated he had a traumatic brain injury, spinal injury, and hip injury. The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Keith what his highest level of education was and he stated "12th grade". I asked Keith if he was well versed in the English language he stated "yup".

The first examination conducted was to recite the alphabet. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the test, Keith had no questions and was instructed to begin. Keith completed the test without incident.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Keith had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Keith raised both arms 90 degrees for balance. Keith also raised his foot approximately (15) inches off of the ground. Keith made it to (16) when I terminated the test.

The third examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Keith had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test he raised both arms 90 degrees (for balance) for the first (2) steps. I instructed Keith to keep his hands at his sides as instructed and he did so without incident for the duration of the test. Keith did a total of (10) steps for his first set. Keith did another total of (10) steps on the second set of steps. To give Keith the benefit of the doubt I demonstrated and explained the examination one more to time. Keith had no questions and was instructed to begin. Keith failed to touch heel to toe on steps 4, 7, and 8. On the second set of steps Keith failed to touch heel to toe on steps 5 and 8.

The last examination was the HGN test conducted by Ptl. Smith #231. At the conclusion of the examination Ptl. Smith advised me Keith had six out of six indicators for impairment.

Due to the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Keith's breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). Keith was transported to HQ by me without incident. Ptl. Bailey remained at the scene and awaited Rt. 88 Auto Body Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Therghesen #249 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Therghesen advised me, Keith provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.09%.

After reading Bovenzi his rights and the standard statement, Bovenzi was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Bovenzi had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Bovenzi provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Bovenzi' s BAC was recorded at 0.09%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

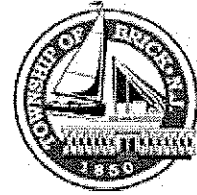

On 05/18/2019 at approximately 0105 hours, I responded to Brick PD HQ, to operate the Alcotest for Ptl. Patrick #296. Ptl. Patrick #296 and I led the suspect, Andrew Koenig, into the Booking room. After reading Koenig his rights and the standard statement, Koenig was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Koenig had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Koenig provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Koenig' s BAC was recorded at 0.19%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

On 05/18/2019 at approximately 0038 hours, Patrolman David Thergesen #249, Patrolman John Rotondo #252, Patrolman Joseph Riccio #289, Patrolman Stephen Bailey #293, and I (Patrolman Kyle Patrick #296), were all dispatched to the area of Route 88 at the intersection of State Highway 70 in reference to an accident with injuries (See NJTR-1 Case #2019-00030832 by Ptl Riccio).

Upon arrival, Ptl. Riccio, Ptl. Rotondo, and I spoke with the at-fault driver, later identified as Andrew Michael Koenig (Koenig). Koenig reported to the other officers and I that he was driving his vehicle (2003 silver Toyota Camry bearing NJ Registration N86KXV) westbound on State Highway 88. Koenig claimed he rear ended the vehicle in front of him that was stopped for a red traffic signal at the intersection of State Highway 70. While speaking with Koenig, I detected the odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from his breath, in addition to observing his slow, slurred, and whispering speech. I also observed Koenig's eyes to be bloodshot and watery with droopy eyelids. When asked where he was coming from, Koenig claimed he was coming from 2600 Lakewood Road, Point Pleasant Borough (Idle Hour Bar & Grill), and admitted to having about ten (10) beers. Based on my observations of Koenig, I advised him I would be conducting a series of field sobriety tests to determine if he was under the influence of alcohol while operating his motor vehicle.

The first test I conducted with Koenig was the One-Legged-Stand test. Koenig was instructed to stand with his feet together and hands at his sides while receiving the instructions for the test. Koenig was continuously swaying while trying to maintain the instructed position. Koenig was then asked if he had any prior medical history that would prevent him from standing on one leg. Koenig advised me he took anti-depressant medication, but it should not affect him from standing on one leg. Koenig was instructed to raise either foot of his choosing six inches off the ground while keeping his hands at his side. Koenig did not wait for this officer to finish explaining his instructions for this test, and attempted to begin it. Koenig was advised not to begin the test until the instructions were fully given to him. I resumed explaining the test to Koenig, and explained he was to keep his eyes on the toes of his lifted foot while counting aloud by "One-Thousands" (I.E. "One One-Thousand," "Two One-Thousand," "Three One-Thousand"), until he was advised to stop. While receiving the instructions, Koenig had to be advised on two separate occasions to stop fumbling his hands and placing them in his pants pockets. After I finished explaining the test to Koenig, he did not have any questions, and was advised to begin. During his first attempt, Koenig raised his left foot and immediately stumbled backwards with his arms raised away from his sides, and Ptl. Rotondo had to reposition himself behind Koenig to prevent him from falling to the ground. Koenig placed his left foot back on the ground without counting anything aloud. Koenig attempted to start the test again, and the results were the same as his first attempt. I advised Koenig the test was concluded for his own safety.

The next field sobriety test I conducted was the Walk and Turn test. I instructed Koenig to stand straight, hands at his sides, and his right foot to be placed in front of his left while receiving instructions. Koenig was unable to maintain this position, and almost fell over every attempt due to a lack of balance. Before I began explaining the instructions of the test, Koenig admitted he was at fault for the accident, he was aware he was driving after having alcoholic beverages, and that he was physically unable to perform the test. I advised Koenig the test would be concluded for his own safety.

Based on my training, experience, and what was observed during and prior to the tests, I believed Koenig was under the influence of alcohol while operating his motor vehicle. This officer placed Koenig under arrest utilizing the double-locking mechanism, following departmental policy, and he was searched incident to arrest. Koenig was then placed in the back of Patrol Vehicle #01.

Ptl. Riccio and I conducted a search of Koenig's vehicle was conducted to look for any intoxicants. During the search, a 12 ounce commercially labeled alcoholic bottle of "Bud Light" was discovered on the front passenger seat. The Bud Light was placed in a department issued evidence bag, and secured in the front seat of Patrol Vehicle #01. No other contraband was found as a result of the search. At Headquarters, a photograph of the recovered Bud Light bottle was placed on a CD-R and was properly secured and placed into evidence located in the departmental intake room. The bottle of Bud Light was then properly disposed. Koenig's vehicle was secured by Ptl. Riccio and towed by Route 88 Autobody as per John's Law.

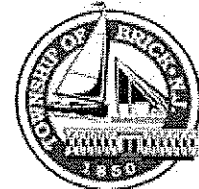
Koenig was transported to Headquarters where he was placed on a bench in the booking room to begin his twenty-minute observation period. At 0107 hours, I witnessed Ptl. Thergesen read Koenig his Miranda Rights. Koenig understood and waived his rights. Ptl. Thergesen then read Koenig the New Jersey Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, and Koenig agreed to submit samples of his breath (See Case Supplemental Report #30832-19 by Ptl. Thergesen).

Results of the chemical breath test showed Koenig had a Blood Alcohol Content of 0.19%. It should be noted, the test results were within acceptable tolerance as per the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

After the Alcotest was conducted, I finished booking and processing Koenig, following departmental policy. While being booked, Ptl. Thergesen [REDACTED] Also during the booking process, [REDACTED] As a result of these statements, Koenig was transported to Ocean Medical Center (OMC), when he was finished being processed. Koenig was turned over to the staff at OMC for a detox [REDACTED] without further incident. I conducted a check of the rear passenger

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On 05/18/2019 at approximately 0800 hours, Ptl. Scelfo #189, Ptl. Valeri #244, and I, Ptl. Caulfield #235, responded to the parking lot of the 7-11 store located at 1151 Burnt Tavern Road in reference to a male subject that was passed out in the driver's seat of the vehicle. According to the anonymous caller, the male subject was seated in the driver's seat of a red vehicle and that the vehicle's driver side door and hood to the vehicle were both open. Furthermore, the anonymous caller reported that there was a puddle of vomit on the ground outside the vehicle's driver side door.

Upon arrival, I observed a red Chevrolet Monte Carlo, bearing NJ registration K81JMP, parked in the parking lot facing the 7-11 store. The vehicle's hood was open, the front driver's side door was open, and there was a male subject, later identified as Derrick M. Jarvis, seated in the driver's seat. Jarvis was asleep/passed out, hunched forward, and had one leg sticking out of the vehicle. I also observed a large puddle of vomit on the ground directly next to where Jarvis was seated. When I approached the vehicle, I tapped Jarvis's arm in an attempt to wake him up. After a few seconds, Jarvis woke up; however, he was clearly disoriented and unsure of where he was. After Jarvis first woke up, I observed dried vomit on his mouth and also on the vehicle's doorframe. I then asked Jarvis what he was doing in the parking lot of 7-11 with the hood open to his vehicle. Jarvis mumbled a response; however, I was unable to understand what he was saying due to his speech being so slow, slurred, and mumbled. In addition, I detected a very strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin of Jarvis's vehicle while initially speaking to him. Jarvis's eyes were also very watery, bloodshot, and his eyelids were very heavy and droopy. I also observed Jarvis's hand movements were slow and fumbling. As I initially made contact and spoke with him I noticed the vehicle's keys were in the ignition, as well.

I then requested Jarvis to exhibit his driving credentials. Jarvis mumbled that he didn't have his driver's license with him and he was unable to locate the vehicle's registration and insurance card. When I asked Jarvis how much alcohol he had consumed, Jarvis stated he had one beer earlier. I asked Jarvis to clarify what time he had in fact drank his last drink; however, Jarvis was unable to provide an answer. When asked where he was consuming the alcoholic beverages, Jarvis again mumbled and the only response from him I could understand him saying was that he was at a friend's house.

A few moments later, a female subject, later identified as Sheena C. Hoey, exited the 7-11 store and entered the vehicle via the passenger side door. Hoey stated she and Jarvis had traveled from her house in Brick, NJ to the 7-11 store at which time a mechanical problem arose with the vehicle. Hoey claimed she was calling AAA inside the store when Brick PD Officers first arrived on scene. Hoey had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath while I spoke to her. Hoey also stated that Jarvis had driven the vehicle from her house to the 7-11 store, even though she knew he was intoxicated. When asked why she allowed Jarvis to drive while he was intoxicated, Hoey stated she didn't realize how intoxicated Jarvis was until they arrived at the 7-11 store parking lot. Hoey further stated that the vehicle belonged to a family member and she was able to produce the vehicle's registration and insurance card from the vehicle's glove box.

At that time, I had Jarvis exit the vehicle to administer standardized field sobriety tests. While Jarvis was exiting the vehicle and walking towards the front of my patrol vehicle, I observed him swaying, staggering, falling, and leaning on the front of my patrol car for balance. Ptl. Scelfo and I had to grab hold of Jarvis as his balance was incredibly unsteady and poor. While Jarvis stood in front of my patrol vehicle, he was unable to keep his balance without grasping onto the front push bumpers mounted on the front of my patrol vehicle. In addition, Jarvis's feet were wide apart for balance, he was swaying, and his stance was very rigid. While Jarvis was outside the vehicle, I detected a very strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. When asked if Jarvis had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Jarvis stated, "No." The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris. Ptl. Scelfo and I had to grab hold of Jarvis as he was standing in front of my patrol vehicle as it appeared he was going to potentially fall to the ground on more than occasion.

The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Jarvis as to how to perform the examination, Jarvis had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes.

The next test administered was the walk and turn test. As I was attempting to explain and demonstrate the examination, Jarvis's balance while standing was so poor that he was unable to stand on his own without grasping onto a nearby patrol vehicle for balance. Based on Jarvis's inability to maintain his balance while walking and/or standing, the test was stopped for safety reasons and no further standardized field sobriety tests were administered. A check of NJ MVC records revealed that Jarvis's NJ driver's license was currently suspended/revoked. Furthermore, Jarvis had two active ATS warrants with a total bail of \$1,650.00 no 10% option. The first warrant, E18-10951, was issued out of Toms River, NJ for \$650.00 no 10% option set by the Hon. James Liguori on 05/10/2019. The second warrant, C 134950, was issued out of Howell, NJ with bail set at \$1000.00 no 10% option set by the Hon. Susan Schroeder on 02/19/2019.

Once the field sobriety tests/examinations were terminated for safety reasons, Jarvis was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol vehicle #44 without incident. Prior to placing Jarvis into my patrol car, I inspected the rear seat of my patrol vehicle which yielded negative results. I also inspected Jarvis's oral cavity which yielded a tongue ring. Jarvis assured me at the scene that he would be able to remove the tongue ring. Ptl. Scelfo #252 remained on scene and

awaited Lepore's Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law. Hoey was transported to her residence from the scene by Ptl. Valeri without incident. The location of where Jarvis had been operating the vehicle and the 7-11 parking lot is within 1,000 feet of the Lanes Mill Elementary School located at 1891 Lanes Mill Road, Brick, NJ 08724.

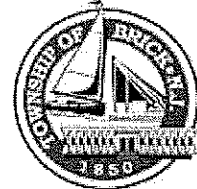
Once at police headquarters, Jarvis was escorted inside police headquarters. A check of my patrol vehicle's rear seat yielded negative result/findings. Upon entering Brick PD headquarters, Jarvis was escorted into the prisoner processing room and my duty weapon was locked and secured inside a designated gun lock box located in the watch commander's room. Shortly after Jarvis was escorted into the prisoner processing room, he vomited into a garbage can inside said room. After vomiting, Jarvis successfully removed the tongue ring from inside his mouth. After the tongue ring was removed, I once again inspected Jarvis's oral cavity inside police headquarters which yielded negative results/findings. By this point, Jarvis was becoming extremely, belligerent and disorderly. He repeatedly kept yelling and cursing at me and demanding he see a Captain at that very instant. Jarvis was read his Miranda Rights and signed off on the waiver portion of the form (Waived his rights). Although Jarvis signed off on the Miranda Form, he repeatedly kept talking over me and yelling while I was reading said form. I then read Jarvis the NJ D.U.I. Standard Statement form (Implied Consent) in which he agreed to submit samples of his breath. While reading said form, Jarvis again kept yelling and talking over me and continued being extremely belligerent and antagonistic.

I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine and also observed Jarvis for twenty minutes (Twenty minutes were managed utilizing my personal wristwatch) prior to administering the test. During said observation time, Jarvis remained under constant and uninterrupted observation until the administering of the Alcotest machine was fully complete. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, etc.). During Jarvis's first breath sample attempt, he had his mouth on the mouthpiece but was not blowing any air into the machine. I advised Jarvis that he wasn't following the instructions I had given him and even demonstrated to him as to how to provide sufficient breath samples. Again, Jarvis put his mouth on the mouthpiece and was making noises from his mouth implying that he was blowing from the machine. As a result, the first breath attempt did not reach the minimum volume of air needed to achieve a sufficient a breath sample. During Jarvis's second and third attempts, he again failed to listen to my instructions and was purposely not providing proper breath samples into the machine. Both, the second and third breath attempts displayed a "Minimum Volume Not Achieved" on the Alcotest machine. At that time, I advised Jarvis that he was not following my instructions, not properly performing the test, and not providing sufficient breath samples. Based on Jarvis not providing sufficient breath samples, I terminated the test and advised Jarvis he was going to be charged with refusal to provide breath samples. Furthermore, a new mouthpiece was used each time Jarvis was given an opportunity to provide a breath sample into the Alcotest machine.

Jarvis was processed, as per department policy, and issued motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50 (1506-E19-2741), 39:4-50.4a (1506-E19-2742), 39:4-50.2 (1506-E19-2743), 39:4-96 (1506-E19-2744), 39:4-97 (1506-E19-2745), 39:3-40 (1506-E19-2746), 39:3-10 (1506-E19-2747), 39:3-29A (1506-E19-2748), and 39:4-50(g)(1) (1506-E19-2749). Jarvis was unable to post the full bail amount and was turned over a short time later to Toms River PD without incident. The Toms River PD Officer who took custody of Jarvis was also given the original copy of the Potential Liability form should he post the aforementioned bail amount. Furthermore, Jarvis was given a copy of the Alcohol Influence Report from the Alcotest machine.

Carter #280 responded to the scene to assist.

Upon arrival the vehicle was determined to have been operated by the owner, Eric Greschak. Ptl. Catalina advised he believed the subject to be intoxicated. When I spoke with Greschak outside of the vehicle on the sidewalk I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. Greschak also advised he was coming from PNC Bank Arts Center after attending a concert. Greschak was swaying in a slight circular motion while we spoke and his eyes were watery and bloodshot. I advised Greschak we would be performing a series of standardized field sobriety tests.

The first test performed was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. Greschak advised he was wearing contacts and has no other conditions regarding his eyes. Greschak refused to follow the instructions and follow the stimulus with his eyes as required. Greschak would stare directly at me despite numerous corrections to follow the stimulus. Greschak eventually followed the stimulus. Greschak's eyes indicated a lack of smooth pursuit, sustained and distinct nystagmus at maximum deviation, and the onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. Greschak indicated a score of 6 out of 6 hits.

The next test performed was the walk and turn test. The instructions and requirements were explained to Greschak. The test was also demonstrated for Greschak. Prior to asking Greschak to assume the starting position he was asked if he had any ailments that affect his balance or ability to walk to which he stated he did not. Greschak assumed the starting position and could not maintain balance for the instructional phase. Greschak acknowledged he understood the instructions and began the test. Greschak did not touch heel to toe as needed and lost his balance, stepping off the line. Greschak also used his arms for balance, raising them, and turned incorrectly nearly falling in the process. Greschak also took an incorrect number of steps and did not count the steps aloud as directed. Greschak failed the walk and turn test.

The final test performed was the one leg stand test. The instructions and requirements were explained to Greschak. Greschak was asked again if he had any ailments that affect his balance or ability to walk to which he stated no. Greschak was asked to assume the starting position. Greschak continued to sway in a circular motion and widened his feet to aid in his balance. The test was also demonstrated for Greschak and it was verified he understood the test and did not have any questions. Greschak began the test and was unable to raise his foot to the required height. Greschak also could not keep his foot raised for any significant amount of time and put his foot down more than 3 times. Greschak failed the test and was unable to complete it.

Based on Greschak failing all the tests administered he was placed under arrest for driving while intoxicated. Search incident to arrest revealed an open bottle of vodka located just behind the center console in the back seat area. Greschak was placed in double locked mechanical restraints and placed in the rear of patrol vehicle 13. The rear of vehicle 13 was checked prior to and after transport of Greschak. Upon arrival at headquarters my duty weapon was secured per department policy and all required booking procedures were completed. Ptl. Catalina also responded to headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110. See his supplemental report for additional details. The Alcotest Calculator was deemed to be within acceptable tolerance and revealed a blood alcohol level of 0.17

[REDACTED] responded to headquarters and completed a potential liability waiver acknowledging responsibility of Greschak. Greschak was released to Kelly and his vehicle was impounded into AEGIS. The open container of vodka located within the vehicle's cab was placed into AEGIS property room.

OfficerID: Mcatalina, Narrative

On 5/18/2019 I was on patrol in the area of Herborn Avenue and Lanes Mill Road. I advised Police dispatch I would be responding to back Ptl. Carter #280, who was on a DUI detail, and on a traffic stop. As I was heading to Ptl. Carter's traffic stop, I observed a 2008 red in color Ford F-250 pick-up truck bearing New Jersey Registration M70GTP parked partially in the roadway of Lanes Mill Road near the intersection of Stephen Road. The Ford truck had the left front and rear tires in the roadway of Lanes Mill Road while the right front and rear tires were on the grass portion between the sidewalk and curb. I activated my emergency lights of my patrol vehicle. I positioned my patrol vehicle behind the Ford pick-up truck, in the far right

lane of travel, of Lanes Mill Road. I exited my patrol vehicle and approached the passenger side of the Ford pick-up truck which was running. As I approached, I was unable to see inside due to the truck having dark window tinting on all the windows except the front windshield. I utilized my flashlight to assist with seeing into the vehicle. I was able to see a male subject who appeared to be sleeping in the driver's seat. The male subject was breathing and I attempted to wake him. I knocked several times on the passenger side window with negative results. I then knocked harder and constantly until I was able to wake the driver. The driver then reached for the vehicle's gear shifter and put the vehicle into drive. I repeatedly knocked on the passenger side window while illuminating the inside of the vehicle and yelling for the driver to put the vehicle back into park. The driver put the vehicle back into park and put the passenger side window down.

I identified myself to the driver and asked him if he was okay. The driver stated he was. I asked the driver for his license, registration and proof of insurance. The driver handed me a New Jersey Driver's License. He was identified as Eric A. Greschak via the New Jersey Driver's License. Greschak was then asked a second time for his vehicle registration and proof of insurance. While Greschak was looking for his vehicle registration and proof of insurance, his hands were slow and fumbling. As he was looking for the requested documents, I observed three Corona Extra bottle caps located near the center console. While Greschak was looking for the requested documents a second time, I asked him where he was coming from. Greschak stated he was coming from Jackson, New Jersey where he was working on a truck. I asked him where he was heading to. Greschak stated he was heading home to his residence in Whiting, New Jersey. I asked him how his vehicle got to the location of where it was. Greschak stated he was driving and he felt tired. He pulled the vehicle over and took a nap. I asked Greschak why he did not pull his vehicle into the parking lot across the street instead of pulling over the curb and parking partially in the roadway. Greschak stated he did not know he was really tired. Greschak's speech was slow and slurred. I was able to detect an odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Greschak's breath as he spoke. Greschak was unable to locate his vehicle registration and proof of insurance. I asked Greschak if he had alcohol to drink. Greschak stated he had two beers approximately five hours prior to our interaction and that he was not drunk. Greschak repeatedly advised me he was tired. I asked Greschak if he was on any medication and he stated no.

Ptl. LaPoint #222 and Ptl. Borden #274 arrived on scene to assist. I also advised Ptl. Carter to respond to my location.

I asked Greschak if he would be willing to exit the vehicle and perform standardized field sobriety tests to see if he was okay to drive. Greschak stated he would. I went around the vehicle and approached the driver's side door with Ptl. LaPoint, while Ptl. Borden observed Greschak from the passenger side. Greschak opened the driver's side door. As Greschak exited the vehicle Greschak fell into the open driver's side door. Greschak utilized the door to regain his balance prior to closing the door and walking to the rear of the vehicle. I advised Greschak to walk up and onto the sidewalk this way we were out of the roadway.

Ptl. Carter arrived on scene and conducted standardized field sobriety tests on Greschak. After conducting the testing Ptl. Carter placed Greschak into custody. See report by Ptl. Carter.

I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C in reference to Eric A. Greschak (Greschak) who was in custody for DUI.

On arrival, Greschak was escorted to the booking room. Greschak was under my direct, uninterrupted observation for twenty minutes. During the observation period, Greschak did not have anything in his mouth. During the observation period Greschak did not belch or vomit and did not consume any food or drinks. All portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room. I advised Greschak of his Miranda Warning Rights at 0033 hours. Greschak agreed to the acknowledgement of his Miranda Rights and also signed off on the Miranda Warnings Form.

The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators was read to Greschak. After completing the nine bullets, Greschak stated, "Yup" when asked if he would submit samples of his breath.

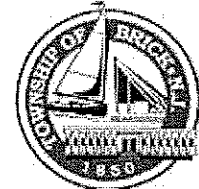
I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Greschak was read the breath sample instructions verbatim, from the posted sign, which he stated he understood. The instructions were read for all four breath samples collections. The breath hose mouth pieces were changed after each breath sample was given.

Greschak's first breath sample returned the error message of minimum volume not achieved. Greschak's second breath sample was accepted. Greschak's third breath sample returned the error message of blowing time too short. Greschak's fourth breath sample was accepted. The reported breath samples recorded was 0.17% BAC. The breath sample results were entered into the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator, and were within acceptable tolerances.

A copy of the Alcohol Influence Report was provided to Greschak upon his release.

On 5/19/2019 at 0332 hours, I was dispatched to Herborn Avenue in the area of the Wawa, 6 Lanes Mill Road, for a motor vehicle crash with injuries. Police Dispatch advised they received a 9-1-1 call for a single car crash into a pole. The caller advised there was a male and a female inside the vehicle who appeared to be unconscious.

Sgt. Bartolucci #183, Ptl. Dinnebeil #268, Ptl. Alexander #216 Ptl. Oliverio #286 also advised Police Dispatch they would be responding.

While responding to the crash, Police dispatch advised the two subjects inside the vehicle regained consciousness. The caller advised Police Dispatch the vehicle was still in drive. The male subject who was in the driver's seat put the car in reverse and attempted to leave. The vehicle did not move and the caller kept telling the male driver to stay where he is. The caller then advised Police Dispatch the male driver exited the vehicle and ran across the roadway into the wooded area.

Sgt. Bartolucci was the first to arrive on scene. Sgt. Bartolucci pointed out the location where the caller advised him he saw the subject run towards. Sgt. Bartolucci ascertained a description of the male subject along with his name. The driver was identified as Brian A. Strassburg, who was described as a white male; approximately 6'00 was wearing jeans with a maroon shirt. Police Dispatch advised me they ran the plate on the vehicle and it returned to Brian A. Strassburg from 46 Adriana Court in our town. I responded to 46 Adriana Court and exited my vehicle. I then proceeded to walk the wooded area from 46 Adriana Court back towards the scene of the crash. As I was behind the residence of 21 Herborn Avenue, I located a white male subject wearing jeans and a dark colored shirt attempting to hide behind a shed in the backyard. I un-holstered my duty firearm and commanded the subject to come out from behind the shed with his hands raised over his head. I then commanded the subject to walk slowly towards me with his hands still raised. I noticed a black in color unknown object on the male subject's right waist. I then commanded the subject to stop walking. I commanded the subject while keeping his hands in the air, to turn around and get on his knees. The subject complied to all my commands. I then had the subject place his hands on his head. I approached the subject, holstered my duty weapon. I detained the subject utilizing handcuffs, which were double locked. I frisked the subject for weapons, and determined the unknown black object was the subject's cell phone. I asked the male subject his name and he stated it was Brian Strassburg. I walked Strassburg from the backyard of 21 Herborn Avenue to the front where I was met by Ptl. Alexander and Ptl. Oliverio. While walking Strassburg to the front of 21 Herborn Avenue I detected an odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath and persons. Strassburg then asked me if we, the Police, were looking for someone. I advised him we were looking for him. Strassburg stated for what my vehicle? I stated "Yes." It should be noted Strassburg's speech was slow and slurred.

Due to detecting the odor of an alcoholic beverage from Strassburg along with his speech, I asked Strassburg if he would take Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFST'S). Strassburg stated he would. I then removed the handcuffs from Strassburg and administered SFST's. The SFST's were conducted on the sidewalk in front of 21 Herborn Avenue. The sidewalk at the time was clear of debris and illuminated by street lights along with Ptl. Alexander's, Ptl. Oliverio's and my flashlights.

Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN) Test:

I instructed Strassburg to stand with his feet together, his arms down at his sides, and to remain in that position for the duration of the test. I asked Strassburg if he understood. Strassburg stated, "Yes." I asked Strassburg if he had any problems with his eyes to which he responded that he did not. I told Strassburg that I was going to check his eyes. Strassburg was instructed to keep his head still and follow the tip of the stimulus with his eyes only. I then asked Strassburg if he understood my instructions. He responded, "Yes."

I used a pen with a silver tip for the stimulus. Prior to beginning the actual HGN Test, I conducted the medical assessment. While holding the stimulus 12 to 15 inches away from Strassburg's face and slightly above eye-level, I verified that his pupil size was the same and there was no resting nystagmus. His eyes were able to follow the stimulus together. (Or, equal tracking was present.)

The results of the test were as follows:

- A lack of smooth pursuit was present in both eyes.
- Distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation was present in both eyes.
- An onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees was present in both eyes.
- Vertical Gaze Nystagmus (VGN) was not present.

It should be noted that for the duration of the test, Strassburg swayed in a circular motion.

Walk and Turn (WAT) Test:

I instructed Strassburg to put his right foot in front of his left foot, touching his right heel to his left toe. I also instructed Strassburg to keep his arms down at his sides and to remain in that position while I instructed and demonstrated the test. I also advised Strassburg not to begin the test until told to do so and asked him if he understood. Strassburg stated he did but advised he wished to take his boots off and do the tests in his socks. I advised Strassburg he could and he removed his boots. I then asked Strassburg if he had any problems with his back, legs or feet that would prevent him from walking. Strassburg stated, "No." I instructed Strassburg to walk nine heel to toe steps forward. When he got to the ninth step, to keep that foot planted, take a series of small steps with his other foot to turn himself around and proceed back the way he came. I advised Strassburg to take nine heel to toe steps back. I advised Strassburg while he was walking to watch his feet, count his steps out loud and keep his arms at his sides. I advised Strassburg once he started the test to not stop until he has completed it. I then asked Strassburg if he understood the instructions and the test. Strassburg stated, "Yes." I instructed Strassburg to begin the test.

The results of the test were as follows:

- Cannot keep balance while listening to instructions.
- Starts test before instructions are finished.

- Stops while walking to steady himself.
- Does not touch heel to toe.
- Loses balance while walking (steps off the line).
- Uses arms for balance (raises arms over six inches).

One Leg Stand (OLS) Test:

I instructed Strassburg to stand with his feet together, his arms down at his sides, and to remain in that position while I explained and demonstrated the test. I also instructed Strassburg not to begin the test until told to do so and asked him if he understood. Strassburg stated, "Yes." I asked Strassburg if he had any problems with his back, legs or feet that would prevent him from balancing on one leg. Strassburg stated, "I have flat feet." I instructed Strassburg to raise the leg of his choice, approximately six inches off of the ground and keeping his foot parallel to the ground. I instructed Strassburg to keep both legs straight and to watch his elevated foot. While holding that position to count out loud; one thousand and one, one thousand and two, one thousand and three, and so forth until told to stop. I asked Strassburg if he understood the test and he stated he did. I instructed Strassburg to begin the test.

The results of the test were as follows:

- Puts foot down.
- Uses arms to balance (raises arms over six inches).
- Sways while balancing.
- Hopping.

Upon conclusion of the Standardize Field Sobriety Tests (SFST's), I advised Strassburg he was being placed under arrest for driving under the influence. I handcuffed Strassburg utilizing the double locking method. I searched Strassburg incident to arrest on scene. I checked the rear seats of Ptl. Oliverio's patrol vehicle before securing Strassburg into the rear of it. Strassburg's vehicle, a gray 2015 Honda Pilot Bearing New Jersey Registration X56KNZ was towed by Lepores Towing as per John's Law. See crash report by Ptl. Alexander.

I advised Strassburg of his rights per Miranda. I then asked Strassburg where he was drinking alcohol and what had happened leading up to the crash along with after. Strassburg stated he was drinking at his house located at 46 Adriana Court. He and his girlfriend got into the vehicle and were going to Wawa to get cigarettes. He remembered driving on Herborn Avenue but then does not remember anything until his girlfriend woke him after the crash. He stated he heard a male subject tell him to stay where he was. Strassburg stated he got nervous, exited the vehicle and ran towards the wooded area across the street. He stated a short time after that was when I located him hiding behind the shed. I then asked him at any point after the crash to the time I located him if he consumed any alcoholic beverages. Strassburg stated, "No."

Ptl. Oliverio transported Strassburg to Police Headquarters without incident. Ptl. Oliverio checked the rear seats of his patrol vehicle after removing Strassburg. I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C.

On arrival to Police headquarters, Ptl. Oliverio and I secured our weapons prior to entering the cell area and processing room. Strassburg was screened for suicidal tendencies with negative results. Ptl. Oliverio and I escorted Strassburg to the booking room for processing and to utilize the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. While in the booking room, Strassburg was under my direct, uninterrupted observation for twenty minutes. During the observation period, Strassburg did not have anything in his mouth. During the observation period Strassburg did not belch or vomit and did not consume any food or drinks. All portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room. I advised Strassburg of his Miranda Warning Rights at 0418 hours. Strassburg agreed to the acknowledgement of his Miranda Rights and also signed off on the Miranda Warnings Form. The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators was read to Strassburg. After completing the nine bullets, Strassburg stated, "Absolutely" when asked if he would submit samples of his breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Strassburg was read the breath sample instructions verbatim, from the posted sign, which he stated he understood. The instructions were read for both breath samples collections. The breath hose mouth pieces were changed after each breath sample was given.

Strassburg's first breath sample was accepted. Strassburg's second breath sample was accepted. While the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C was completing control test two, the machine returned the error message of control test failed, solution change required. The Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine aborted the test and no BAC was recorded.

The reported breath samples recorded was 0.16% BAC. The breath sample results were entered into the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator, and were within acceptable tolerances. It should be noted Strassburg's birthday and age on the Alcohol Influence report is 05/19/2019 and zero. The correct date of birth and age for

Strassburg is 05/30/1991 making him 27 years old.

I then transported Strassburg back to Police Headquarters without incident. The rear seat of my patrol vehicle was checked prior to and after securing and removing Strassburg.

At Police Headquarters, Strassburg advised me to contact his mother to respond and take custody of him. Strassburg was placed into the holding room until his mother, Patricia A. Strassburg, arrived. Prisoner checks were conducted per departmental policy and guidelines.

A copy of the Alcohol Influence Report was provided to Strassburg upon his release. Strassburg was released to his mother as per John's Law.

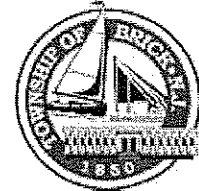

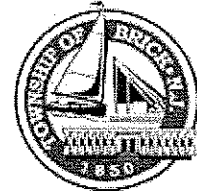

On 05/19/2019 at approximately 1509 hours I, Ptl. Gordon #297, responded to 592 RT 70 (Conoco Gas Station) for a report of a motor vehicle accident.

Upon my arrival I met with one of the drivers involved in the crash, Jessica Smith. Smith began to explain to me how the crash occurred. As Smith spoke, I was able to detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. Smith's speech was slurred, her eyes were watery and she was sweating excessively. Smith explained to me that she was stopped in traffic and accidentally let go of the brake. Smith stated that her car rolled into the car in front of hers. Smith stated multiple times to me that there was no damage to either vehicle and that there was no reason for a report. I observed very minor damage to both vehicles. For crash information see NJTR-1 Report #2019-00031259.

I asked Smith if she was diabetic or had any medical conditions and she stated "no." I asked Smith if she had anything to drink and Smith stated that she had three vodka cranberries at approximately 0030. Smith then stated "I've had a DUI before but I'm not drunk." I asked Smith to step out of the car so I could administer field sobriety tests. The tests are as follows:

Alphabet

I asked Smith if she could read, write and understand the English language and she replied "yes." I asked Smith if she had any problem with her legs that would effect her ability to balance and she stated "no." I instructed Smith to stand with her heels and toes together and her arms down at her side while I explained the test. I then instructed Smith to recite the alphabet from the letter B to the letter O without stopping or singing. Smith stated that she understood the test and began. Smith's speech was slow and slurred. Smith used her arms to balance multiple times throughout the test. Smith paused at the letter N for approximately five seconds before completing the test by saying the letter O.

Walk and Turn

I then explained and demonstrated the Walk and Turn test to Smith. I asked Smith again if she had any issues with her legs that would effect her ability to balance and she stated "no." I instructed Smith to get into the starting position, standing with her right foot in front of her left foot touching heel to toe with her arms down at her side. I then instructed Smith to take nine heel to toe steps in a straight line without using her arms for balance. I instructed Smith to take a series of small steps to turn around and then take nine heel to toe steps back to the starting location. I asked Smith if she had any questions about the test and she stated "no." I then told Smith that she may begin the test when she is ready.

Smith raised her arms for balance on step one and used her arms for balance for the remainder of the test. Smith's upper body was swaying back and forth as she attempted to maintain her balance. Smith then stepped off line on step five. Smith turned around after taking nine steps and took eleven steps in the direction that she began the test.

One Leg Stand

Prior to the test I instructed Smith to get into the staring position, standing with her heels and toes together and her arms down at her side. Once she was in the starting position, I advised her to remain in that position and not to start the test until she was told to do so. I told Smith to lift either foot six inches off of the ground in front of her. I instructed Smith to look at her foot and count out loud one thousand one, one thousand two, one thousand three and so on until I instruct her to stop. Smith stated that she did not have any questions and began the test.

Smith used her arms for balance immediately and raised her right foot approximately three inches off of the ground. Smith put her right foot down for balance on the number six. Smith regained her balance and continued counting at the number seven. Smith used her arms and upper body throughout the test to maintain her balance. I terminated the test when Smith reached the number twenty five.

Ptl. Haugh #217 arrived on scene.

Based on the circumstances of the crash and my observations, I placed Smith under arrest for DUI. Smith was handcuffed, searched incident to arrest with negative results, and placed in the prisoner compartment of vehicle #7. Smith's vehicle was searched for proof of intoxicants. Two small containers of Fireball Whisky were located in the center console of Smith's vehicle. Ptl. Mulcahey #130 remained on scene with Smith's vehicle until it was towed by LePore's Towing per John's Law.

Smith was transported to Brick Police Headquarters without incident. Upon arrival at Brick Police Headquarters, I was able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage while assisting Smith out of my patrol car. The prisoner compartment of vehicle #7 was searched pre and post transport with negative results. Ptl. Haugh advised me that the Alcotest machine was not functioning properly.

Ptl. Haugh and I then transported Smith to Point Pleasant Boro Police Headquarters for processing. The rear seat of vehicle #7 was searched pre and post transport with negative results.

Smith was transported to Point Pleasant Boro Police Department without incident. See Ptl. Haugh's report (Case Supp 2019-00031259) for Alcotest results. Ptl. Haugh advised me that Smith's BAC was a 0.16%. Ptl. Haugh and I then transported Smith to Brick Township Police Department to finish processing. The rear prisoner compartment of vehicle #7 was searched pre and post transport with negative results.

The two Fireball Whisky Bottles recovered from the center console were photographed and copies of the photographs were submitted as evidence.

Smith's mother, [REDACTED], responded to Brick Police Headquarters to take custody of Smith. I explained the Potential Liability Form to [REDACTED] and she signed the form.

I provided Smith with her motor vehicle summons and court date. Smith was issued the following summonses:

Smith was released to her mother without incident.

OfficerID: ehaugh, Narrative

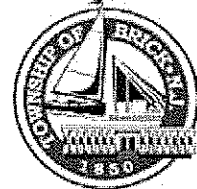
On 05-19-2019 at 1600hrs. I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Upon my arrival I began my twenty minute observation of the arrestee Jessica Smith. During the observation all portable radios and cell phones were removed from the room. Smith didn't have any foreign objects in her mouth during the observation period.

After the twenty minute observation period I advised Smith of her rights and read them to her. I also read Smith the Standard Statement asking if she would submit samples of her breath and she agreed. When I began the process on the Alcotest it advised me that a solution change was necessary. At that time I contacted Point Pleasant Boro Police Department and if their Alcotest was available and it was. Smith was subsequently transported to Point Pleasant Police HQ for the test.

Upon our arrival to Point Pleasant Police I observed Smith again in excess of twenty minutes before beginning the test. All phones and radios were removed from the room prior to beginning the test. Smith provided two samples of breath with a reading of .15% BAC. The results were run through the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator and the readings were within acceptable tolerance. After the test Smith was transported back to Brick Police Headquarters for processing. See Ptl. Gordon's #297 report for further details.

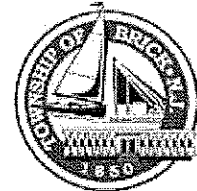

On 05/19/2019, at approximately 2253 hours while on patrol, I observed a dark colored SUV possibly disabled parked on the shoulder just north of Van Zile Rd., on Burnt Tavern Rd., northbound near the Buy Rite Liquors store 989 Burnt Tavern Rd.

At that point, I activated my overhead emergency lights and called out with NJ# W31HCX on a black ford Explorer. I approached the vehicle on the passenger side and observed the driver later identified as Herodes Garcia sleeping with his head resting on the steering wheel. At that point, I knocked on the window several times before Garcia finally woke up. I asked Garcia to open the passenger door. The vehicle was off, with the key still in the ignition at that time. When Garcia opened the door I immediately noticed a six pack of Smirnoff malt beverages on the passenger seat next to Garcia. Two of the six beverages were empty at that time. I also detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from the interior of the vehicle.

I asked Garcia for his credentials and at first Garcia looked at me with his bloodshot eyes and did not respond. I asked again for Garcia's information. At that point, Garcia began rummaging through his glove compartment dropping paperwork while slurring words in Spanish. Due to the language barrier, I contacted Sgt. Vendrell #228, who is fluent in Spanish and asked for his assistance at my location.

Sgt. Vendrell #228 responded to the scene along with Ptl. Gannaio #234 who assisted as well. Upon Sgt. Vendrell's arrival, he translated in Spanish where Garcia was coming from. Garcia responded that he was coming from his residence in Lakewood and was heading to his girlfriend's residence in Brick at 319 Lincoln Ct. Sgt. Vendrell then translated what Garcia had to drink tonight and Garcia replied back numerous beers along with two of the empty Smirnoff beverages that were on his passenger seat.

At that point, Sgt. Vendrell asked him to step out of the vehicle to conduct field sobriety tests. As Garcia exited his vehicle and walked over to the sidewalk he swayed side to side staggering his feet. I also noticed that Garcia urinated all over himself. When Garcia got to the sidewalk where it was well lit and clear from debris, Sgt. Vendrell began conducting field sobriety tests translating in Spanish. (See Sgt. Vendrell's supplemental report for further details on the tests.)

After Garcia was unable to perform any of the field sobriety tests he was placed under arrest for DWI 39:4-50. Joe & Son's Towing responded to the scene to impound the vehicle as per John's Law. Garcia was then transported to Headquarters (HQ).

Upon arrival at HQ the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C was down at that time. Lakewood was contacted and advised HQ that their Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine was up and running. At that point, I transported Garcia to Lakewood Pd for testing. Upon our arrival, the 20 minute face to face observation period was initiated. Garcia was then advised of his Miranda Rights in Spanish by Lakewood Patrolmen Dilone #382. Garcia agreed to provide samples of his breath. At the conclusion of the 20 minute observation, Lieutenant Cunliffe #285 collected two breath samples from Garcia. The result of the breath samples showed Garcia to have a BAC of %0.15.

After the testing was completed, I transported Garcia Back to HQ. Garcia was processed as per department policy and issued motor vehicle summons for: 39:4-50 DWI summons # E19 002793, 39:4-96 Reckless Driving summons # E19 002794, 39:4-97 Careless Driving summon# E19 002795, 39:3-10 Unlicensed Driver summons # E19 002796, 39:4-51B Open container in a MV summons #E19 002797.

Garcia was then released on his summons to his girlfriend [REDACTED] as per NJ's potential liability law.

OfficerID: wvendrell, Narrative

On 5/20/2019 at 2253 hrs I responded to the area of Burnt Tavern Road and Van Zile Road to assist Ptl. Theibault #258 due to a spanish language barrier. Upon arrival Ptl. Theibault advised that he had stopped to check on a vehicle (NJ # W31HCX), that was parked off to the side of the road possibly disabled. Upon approaching the vehicle he observed the driver to be asleep and have open containers of alcohol in plain view. After waking the driver Ptl. Theibault could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage on his breath and observed other signs of impairment. (See Ptl. Theibault's report reference this case #) Due to the driver speaking spanish Ptl. Theibault requested I translate.

Upon arrival I spoke with the driver who I identified as Herodes Garcia. I observed Garcia's eyes to be bloodshot / watery and his face was flushed. I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from Garcia's breath and observed Garcia to have urinated through his pants. I asked Garcia where he was coming from and Garcia replied that he had been driving from Lakewood Township and was in route to his girlfriends house located at 319 Lincoln Court in Brick Township. I asked Garcia if he had consumed any alcoholic beverages that evening and he replied "yes." When asked what he had consumed Garcia stated he had consumed several beers. When asked if he had consumed some of the beer containers which were open in the vehicle Garcia replied that he had. I then

asked Garcia to step over to the sidewalk to conduct several standardized field sobriety tests.

While walking I observed Garcia to be unsteady on his feet. Garcia swayed from side to side and staggered his steps as he walked. When standing Garcia kept his feet wide apart for balance. All tests were conducted on a flat and level surface which was clear of debris. Before conducting the tests I asked Garcia if he had any injuries or disabilities which would prevent him from performing any test and he replied that he did not.

The first test conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN). I explained the test to Garcia and when asked if he understood the test Garcia replied yes. After several attempts Garcia was unable to follow the stimulus properly to be able to make any determinations regarding HGN.

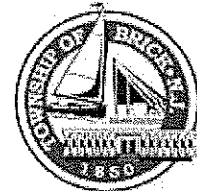
The second test conducted was the One Leg Stand (OLS). I explained the test to Garcia and he stated he understood the test. During the instructional period of the test Garcia was unable to stay in the starting position and had to move his feet to prevent himself from falling over. During the OLS Garcia was unable to raise his foot off the ground for more than 1 second before having to place it back down to prevent himself from falling over. Garcia also kept his arms up and away from his sides in an attempt to balance himself.

The third test conducted was the Walk and Turn (WAT). I explained the test to Garcia and he stated he understood the test. During the WAT Garcia was unable to walk heel to toe, took the incorrect number of steps, stepped off the line and failed to turn.

All information obtained from Garcia was relayed to Ptl. Theibault who was also present to observe all the field sobriety testing. Ptl. Theibault then took Garcia into custody. See Ptl. Theibault's report for additional information.

On 05/22/19 at approx. 1925 hrs. I was flagged down by a white, male subject (later identified as [REDACTED] Brick, NJ [REDACTED]) he was driving a Chevrolet, Cobalt [REDACTED] westbound on Mantoloking Road in the area of Altier Avenue. The subject yelled to me that there was a possible intoxicated driver several vehicles in front of his in a Lincoln, Continental bearing NJ registration H10FKH. The subject was also on the phone with dispatch via cell phone and was advising them of this vehicle driving erratically.

I pulled in front of the caller's vehicle and located the suspect vehicle (Gold, Lincoln, Continental, NJ Reg. H10FKH) on Cedar Bridge Ave. at the traffic signal with Jackson Avenue. I observed the above suspect vehicle swerve in the roadway while coming to a stop at the red traffic signal on Cedar Bridge Avenue and then pull in between two lanes and come to a stop. I observed a white, male driver (later identified as Robert M. Martin) and as the traffic signal turned green I activated my overhead emergency lights and siren in an attempted to stop the above vehicle. The vehicle continued and made a right turn onto Brick Blvd. and then turned into the parking lot of Buffalo Wild Wings located at 2770 Hooper Avenue, Brick, NJ 08723. As the suspect vehicle pulled into the parking lot it ran over the left side entrance curbing and almost struck an unoccupied parked vehicle in the parking lot before coming to a stop.

I exited my patrol vehicle #45 and approached the vehicle on the driver's side. Upon speaking with the driver later identified as (Robert M. Martin) I asked him for his Driver's license, vehicle registration and insurance card. Martin looked at me and then attempted to speak to me in a slow and slurred manner. I observed Martin's eyes to be bloodshot and watery, he had droopy eye lids and as he attempted to speak to me I detected an odor of an alcoholic beverage from his breath. I also observed an unopened case of Coors Light Beer on the floor of the front passenger side of his vehicle. I asked Martin if he had any alcoholic beverages today and he stated "no".

Martin eventually handed me his registration card and then sat in the vehicle looking straight ahead. I advised Martin that I did not yet have his driver license or insurance card that was requested and he began grabbing for his rear pants pocket while seated in the vehicle.

Ptl. Mulcahey #130 and Ptl. Schinder #208 arrived on scene as backup. After several attempts to retrieve his documents while seated in the vehicle I asked Martin if he would like to exit his vehicle to assist in retrieving them. Martin exited his vehicle in a slow manner. As Martin stood to gain access to his rear pants pocket he stood with his feet wide apart, swaying and leaning against the vehicle for support. After producing the requested documents Martin attempted to walk to the driver's side rear of the vehicle so I could perform standard field sobriety tests. As Martin walked he continually leaned against his vehicle for balance and was staggering as he walked to the rear of his vehicle.

I then asked Martin if he had any medical conditions that would preclude him from performing any of the tests. Martin stated that he had surgery on his knees in the past and would not be able to perform any leg tests.

I then attempted to administer the horizontal gaze nystagmus test to Martin. I explained to Martin with Ptl. Schinder present that he need to look at the tip of my pen as I held it in my hand and continue to follow the pen with his eyes only as I administered test. Martin continued to stare at me and did not follow the pen as I moved it in an attempt to administer the HGN test. The test was discontinued after three (3) attempts were made to administer it to Martin. Martin was unable to follow the pen with his eyes and continued to look straight ahead during all three (3) attempts.

I advised Martin that he was being placed under arrest for driving while intoxicated. Martin was handcuffed, double-locked and placed into my patrol vehicle #45. As I walked Martin over to my patrol vehicle he needed assistance with walking and was guided into the rear of my patrol vehicle.

Martin was transported to Brick Township Police Headquarters and Ptl. Mulcahey remained on scene for Legacy towing which was towing Martins vehicle for Route 88 as per John's Law.

At B.T.P.D. Headquarters at 2023 hours I began a constant, uninterrupted observation of Martin in excess of twenty (20) minutes. This observation continued throughout my entire contact with Martin during which time he did not belch, vomit, or place any foreign objects inside his mouth. All portable electronic devices, including portable radios, cell phones and the laptop computer were removed from the booking room prior to testing. I advised Martin of his Miranda rights, which he stated he understood. Martin then signed the Waiver portion of the form. I read Martin the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators and he stated he would provide samples of his breath for chemical testing.

After the 20 minute observation period (during which time Martin did not regurgitate or place any foreign objects in his mouth), I activated the Alcotest 7110. I entered Martin's information into the Alcotest and read him the standard instructions. Martin stated he understood and was able to provide two breath samples after a total of nine (9) attempts. It should be noted that before each breath sample was provided I utilized a new mouthpiece (from a sealed plastic bag) to collect the breath samples from Martin. Upon completion, his B.A.C.% was determined to be 0.24%. The results were provided to dispatch, which used the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator to confirm that the results were in acceptable tolerance.

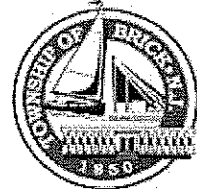
Martin was issued Motor vehicle summonses #E19 002869-E19 002873 for careless driving, reckless driving, failure to maintain lane and D.U.I.

[REDACTED] responded to B.T.P.D. Headquarters and was read the potential liability warning statements, signed same and was provided with a copy prior to Martin being released to his custody.

Prior to being released from custody Martin was also issued/served with an amended T.R.O. #FV 15-001782-19 which was pending being served to him prior to this incident

OfficerID: emancini, Narrative

On 05/24/2019 I was assigned to a roving DWI patrol detail, utilizing marked B.T.P.D. patrol vehicle #37. At approximately 2322 hours, Ptl. Thergesen #249, Ptl. Lardieri #251 and Ptl. Mesmer #292 were dispatched to a report of a motor vehicle crash in the area of 112 Riverside Drive North. Ptl. Mesmer arrived on scene and advised that a silver vehicle struck a parked, unoccupied car and left the area towards Herbertsville Road just prior to his arrival. The crash occurred near the parking lot of The River Rock Bar and Grill and Dispatch provided the suspect vehicle description, which was a small silver sedan bearing NJ registration H65HTD. The suspect vehicle was registered to Thomas Fryer of 40 Breeze Court in Brick, at which time Ptl. Thergesen and Ptl. Lardieri responded to the residence. Ptl. Mesmer remained on scene with the victim's vehicle, NJ registration T73KYL. Ptl. Thergesen located the suspect vehicle parked in front of 40 Breeze Court, which had sustained significant front passenger side damage and contained broken bumper parts in the back seat. Ptl. Thergesen met with Fryer who was inside his residence and he admitted to being involved in the crash and leaving the area. I responded to their location at approximately 2340 hours.

I identified myself to Fryer who was sitting on the front steps and I began speaking with him about the incident. I first asked what had happened and Fryer stated, "I was just coming out of the bar, and I don't know if I hit a car." I immediately detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Fryer's breath and his person, and he was slurring his speech. I also observed that his eyes were watery and bloodshot. I asked him how much he had to drink at the bar and he stated he had a couple of pints, and I asked him what he was drinking, which he replied "Coors Light". I then asked him again what happened, and he replied that he was not sure what he hit, he was scared and drove away. Based on my observations and statements by Fryer, I asked him to perform field sobriety tests to which he consented to. I directed Fryer to an area in the roadway which was flat, free from debris and well lit. While I was escorting Fryer, I observed he was swaying and stumbling. I then conducted the standardized field sobriety tests with Fryer.

Test 1:

Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test

I first directed Fryer into the starting position which was standing with his feet together while holding his arms down at his sides. I asked him if he had any medical defects to his vision which he stated, "No". I first conducted a medical assessment checking for equal tracking and pupil size. During the test, I observed the following clues:

Lack of smooth pursuit in left and right eye.

Distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in left and right eye.

Onset of nystagmus prior to forty five degrees in left and right eye.

Fryer displayed six out of six clues.

Test 2:

Walk and Turn Test:

I first asked Fryer if he had any injuries which would prevent him from walking and balancing. Fryer replied, "No, I have plantar fasciitis." I then directed him into the starting position which I demonstrated was standing with his right foot placed directly in front of his left foot, heel touching toe, while holding his arms down at his sides. Fryer was unable to stand in the starting position and stumbled several times. Fryer also continued walking forward to gain his balance and I advised him if he could not maintain his balance the test would be concluded. Fryer was then able to maintain his bearing after several minutes of stumbling. I then explained and demonstrated the test to Fryer, and while I was doing so, I observed him raising his arms for balance and his feet were separated. After I explained and demonstrated the test, I asked him if he understood the instructions and he stated, "Yes." I observed the following clues during Fryer's demonstration of the test:

Did not keep balance during my instructions.

Began the test before instructed to.

Stopped walking three times throughout the test to steady himself.

Lost balance while walking by stepping off the line.

Used his arms for balance throughout the test.

Lost balance while turning on the ninth step.

Stepped off the line several times.

I observed eight out of nine clues.

Test 3:

One Leg Stand Test

I instructed Fryer to stand in the starting position which I demonstrated was standing with his feet together while holding his arms down at his sides. I advised him to remain in this position while I explained the test. I observed him swaying and using his arms for balance while I explained and demonstrated the test. After explaining the test, I asked Fryer if he understood to which he stated, "Yes" and I instructed him to begin.

I observed the following clues:

Swaying while balancing.

Using arms for balance by raising them out to the side above six inches.

Put his foot down several times for balance.

Fryer was unable to complete the test and I stopped him for safety reasons.

I observed four out of four clues for a decision point.

It should be noted that after the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test, Ptl. Therghesen asked Fryer if he had drank any alcohol when he arrived home after the crash and he stated he did not.

I then placed Fryer into custody at approximately 2352 hours based on my observations and statements by Fryer. I advised him that he was under arrest for driving while intoxicated, and I handcuffed him to the rear utilizing two sets of double locking handcuffs. Fryer was searched and placed into the rear of my patrol vehicle without incident and transported to Police Headquarters for processing. Ptl. Lardieri remained on scene while Point Pleasant Towing Department impounded the vehicle, as per John's Law.

While I was transporting Fryer to Police Headquarters, the odor of alcoholic beverage was emanating throughout the patrol vehicle. During the transport, Fryer spontaneously stated, "I messed up tonight, I drive my family everywhere."

While at headquarters, Ptl. Therghesen conducted a prolonged and direct twenty minute observation, and read Fryer the Miranda Warning. Ptl. Therghesen also completed the NJ Attorney General Standard Statement Form to which Fryer consented to providing samples of his breath. See supplemental report by Ptl. Therghesen.

Fryer provided sufficient samples of his breath which were acceptable, indicating a BAC of 0.11%.

Fryer was charged with the following summonses:

Fryer stated that he was unable to contact anyone to pick him up from Police Headquarters. I contacted Fryer's sister, [REDACTED] who he resides with at 40 Breeze Court. [REDACTED] stated via telephone that she would sign the Potential Liability Form. I then transported Fryer back to his residence and [REDACTED] was advised of the Potential Liability and signed off. Fryer was served with summonses and released to his sister at their residence.

Additionally, my body worn camera was activated throughout the entirety of this incident. The backseat of my patrol vehicle was searched prior to and following the transport of Fryer to police headquarters. My department issued firearm was secured prior to entering the cell area and processing room. Fryer was searched again prior to being placed in the booking room. Fryer was also screened for suicidal tendencies with negative results. Standard 15 minute prisoner checks were conducted per departmental policy and guidelines.

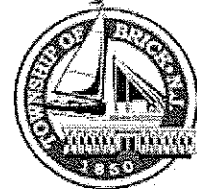

On 05/25/2019 at approximately 0008 hours, I responded to Brick PD HQ, to operate the Alcotest for Ptl. Mancini #282. SLOE Lopez #141 led the suspect, Thomas Fryer, into the Booking room. After reading Fryer his rights and the standard statement, Fryer was continuously observed for at least 20 minutes, during which time there was no indication that Fryer had anything in his mouth or had regurgitated. Fryer provided samples of his breath, as required by law. A new, clean, sealed mouth piece was used for each test. Fryer's BAC was recorded at 0.11%. The test results were confirmed within acceptable tolerance by the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator.

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On 05/24/19 at 2351 hours, while working a driving while intoxicated detail, I was requested by Ptl. Hentges #288 to respond to his motor vehicle stop, at his request.

Upon my arrival, I was met by Ptl. Hentges who informed me the driver of the vehicle, later identified as Michelle Petro, was speeding and was failing to maintain her lane of travel (see case narrative supplemental report, same case number). Ptl. Hentges conducted a motor vehicle stop on Petro's vehicle and discovered that she consumed alcoholic beverages prior to operating her vehicle. Ptl. Hentges advised me he performed the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test on Petro's eyes and scored 4 out of 6 hits. At this time I spoke with Petro.

I spoke with Petro outside of her vehicle. As Petro spoke, I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. Petro informed me she left a winery earlier in the night and because she is on dialysis she could only drink "two drinks." At this time I asked Petro if she would perform a few tests and she stated she would. I asked Petro what her highest level of education was and she informed me she had an associates degree with a certificate. I asked Petro if she was familiar with the English language and she stated she was. I asked Petro if she was familiar with the English alphabet and she said she was. The first test I asked Petro to perform was to recite alphabet. I instructed Petro not to start until I instruct her to and asked her if she understood which she said she did. I instructed Petro, when I tell her to, to recite the alphabet from the letter 'A' to the letter 'Z' saying the letters slowly and individually without singing or grouping the letters together. I demonstrated the test by saying the letters A,B,C,D slowly and individually without singing or grouping them. Petro replied by saying "easy enough." I asked Petro if she understood and she stated she did. I asked Petro if she had any questions and she stated she did not. Petro was instructed to begin the test. Petro correctly recited the alphabet but immediately sang the alphabet and group the letters the entire time from the letter 'A' to the letter 'Z'. I then asked Petro to approximate the time and she said "midnight." She was very close as the time on my watch showed "23:57."

The first test I conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. I put Petro into the starting position by having her feet together and her hands at her sides. I told her I was going to check her eyes. I instructed Petro to keep her head still and to follow my pen with her eyes only and not to move her head. I asked Petro if she understood and she stated he did. Prior to conducting the test I checked Petro's eyes for resting nystagmus which she did not have and I ensured Petro's eyes tracked equally, which they did. After testing Petro's eyes, I observed both eyes to have a lack of smooth pursuit, both eyes have nystagmus at maximum deviation for a period of no less than four seconds along with her right eye having the onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees for a period of no less than four seconds. Due to Petro's performance on the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test, I asked her to perform the Walk and Turn Test I asked Petro if the footwear she was wearing would allow her to perform the tests. Petro was wearing shoes with a 1" wedge heel. The following tests were performed on a clean, debris free, level surface on the ramp from Chambers Bridge Road northbound to the Garden State Parkway southbound.

I attempted to put Petro into the starting position for the Walk and Turn test by having her put her right foot in front of her left while utilizing the yellow line as a guide. I instructed Petro to keep her hands at her sides during the entire test. Petro was instructed to stay in the starting position until I told her to start the test. Petro was unable to stay in the starting position. I told Petro I was going to give her a series of instructions and to not to start the test until I told her to. I asked Petro if she understood and she stated she did. I told Petro when I instructed her to begin, to walk nine steps forward, touching heel to toe counting her steps out loud with her hands at her sides. I told Petro on her ninth step to turn around by pivoting on her left foot while taking several small steps to her left and walk nine steps in the direction she just came from while touching heel to toe and counting her steps out loud. Prior to instructing Petro to begin the test, I reminded her that once she starts the test to look at her feet, count her steps out loud, keep her hands at her sides and once she started the test not to stop it until she had completed it. I asked Petro if she understood the test and she stated she did. Petro was instructed to begin. Petro did not touch heel to toe on all steps, stopped to steady herself, walked off the line. Petro turned incorrectly and had the same performance on the way back. At the end of the test, I asked Petro if she injured herself and she said "no." I asked Petro if she should perform one additional test and she stated she would.

The next test I explained and demonstrated for Petro was the One-Leg Stand test. I put Petro into the starting position by having her put her feet together and keeping her hands at her sides. I advised Petro I was going to give her a series of instructions and to not begin the test until I instructed her to do so. I asked Petro if she understood and she stated she did. I told Petro, when I told her to, I wanted her to raise one leg, either leg, approximately six inches off of the ground, with her foot pointed out. I instructed Petro with her foot raised to keep both legs straight and to keep her eyes on the elevated foot. I told Petro while holding her foot out to count out loud up from one one-thousand until I told her to stop. I asked Petro if she understood and she stated he did. Petro was instructed to begin the test. Petro raised her foot and during the test raised her arms for balance. Petro put her foot down three times during the test.

Due to Petro's operation of her vehicle, her admission to consuming alcoholic beverages prior to operating coupled with her performance on the Standardized Field Sobriety test, I concluded Petro was under the influence of an intoxicating liquor. I advised Ptl. Hentges of my findings and requested that he take Petro into custody and transport her to Headquarters for processing. Petro's vehicle was impounded as per John's Law by Joe and Sons Towing. Once at Headquarters, Petro was processed and Ptl. Thergesen #249 operated the Alcotest machine. Prior to operating the Alcotest

machine, Ptl. Therghesen provided Petro with her Miranda Warnings which she waived and read the Standard Statement which she replied "yes" to. Ptl. Therghesen operated the Alcotest machine and it provided a reading of 0.07% blood alcohol concentration approximately 1.5 hours after being arrested for driving while intoxicated.. With the assistance of dispatch, the results were checked through the Alcotest calculator and the breath samples were within acceptable tolerance. Petro was processed and charged with Careless Driving (1506 E19 2925), Reckless Driving (1506 E19 2926), DWI (1506 E19 2927), Obstructed View (1506 E19 2928), Speeding (1506 E19 2934), Failure to Maintain Lane (1506 E 19 2932). Petro's friend, [REDACTED] responded to Headquarters to take custody of Petro. [REDACTED] signed the potential liability form acknowledging receipt. Petro was released without incident.

On 05/24/19 at 2347 hours I was on patrol (patrol vehicle #11) traveling north on Chambers Bridge Rd in the area of Sprucewood Dr. While approaching the intersection of Chambers Bridge and Sprucewood Dr I observed a White Nissan Murano traveling in the left lane at a high rate of speed. After I got behind the vehicle I paced it going 55mph in a 40mph. I also observed the vehicle travel into the right lane on three separate occasions. On 05/31/19 at 0032 hours I Ptl. Hentges #288 was on patrol (patrol car #11) on Burnt Tavern Rd southbound approaching the intersection of Rt. 70. While approaching the intersection I observed a red Honda Accord with NJ registration A22GUC stopped on Burnt Tavern Rd southbound. While approaching the vehicle I observed the vehicles taillights as well as headlights to be turned off.

While the Traffic signal was still red the vehicle started to slow roll into the intersection and nearly struck a vehicle traveling on Rt. 70 eastbound. After going through the intersection the vehicle was in the left lane and on multiple occasions went off of the road onto the dirt median. As I followed the vehicle it abruptly went into the right lane without using the turn signal. After activating my patrol vehicle's overhead emergency lights, the vehicle slowed down but continued to travel on Burnt Tavern Rd for approximate 300 yards before turning on to Mill Pond road.

Upon initiating the motor vehicle stop, I exited my patrol vehicle, approached the front driver side window, identified myself, and requested the driver/arrestee, identified as Jake Feci, to exhibit his driving credentials. While initially speaking with Feci, I immediately detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin of the vehicle.

As Feci was retrieving his vehicle documents, I observed that his hand movements were very slow and fumbling. After handing me his driving credentials, I asked Feci where he was coming from and if he had consumed any alcoholic beverages. Feci stated he was driving home from a friend's house and that he had a few drinks. After a few minutes speaking with Feci he stated that he was coming from Leggets Sand Bar (217 1st Ave Manasquan NJ,08736). As I continued speaking with Feci, I observed his speech was very slow and slurred. In addition, I observed his eyes were watery, bloodshot, and eyelids were very heavy and droopy. At this time Ptl. Bailey #293 arrived on scene to assist.

At that time, I had Feci exit the vehicle in order to administer field sobriety tests in which he, Feci, had no objection to. As Feci was exiting his vehicle and walking towards the front of his car, I observed he was swaying and sagging while walking. While Feci was standing in front of his car, I also observed that he was swaying while standing and his knees were sagging. In addition, a very strong and overwhelming odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Feci's breath while speaking to him outside his vehicle. When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Feci stated no. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks and/or debris.

The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Feci how to perform the examination, Feci had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. I also observed distinct and sustained nystagmus with Vertical Gaze Nystagmus as well.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Feci continued to sway while standing and had much difficulty maintaining his balance while in the starting position. In addition, Feci once again kept starting the test before being instructed to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Feci had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Feci failed to touch heel to toe on every step, lost his balance while walking (Stepped off the line), used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), lost his balance while turning (Began to stagger), and turned incorrectly (Pivoted on his left foot).

The next examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed that Feci was swaying and sagging while standing in the starting position. In addition, Feci kept starting the test before being instructed to begin. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Feci had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Feci was swaying while his right leg was elevated, used his arms for balance (Raised arms over six inches), and put his foot down three times. In addition, Feci was unable to keep his right leg elevated for no more than approximately 3-4 seconds before losing his balance and/or putting his right foot down.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Feci was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol car #11 without incident. Ptl. Bailey #293 remained at the scene and awaited Sandy's Service Center to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Oliverio #286 responded to HQ, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Ptl. Oliverio's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Oliverio advised me, Feci provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.15%.

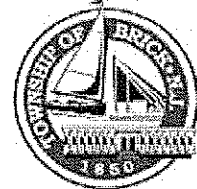
On 05/31/2019, at 0105 hours I operated the Alcotest instrument for Ptl. Hentges #288 who arrested Jake Feci for Driving While Intoxicated.

I removed all electronic devices, and portable radios from the testing area in the booking room prior to breath testing. I read the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples, to which Feci stated, "YES." I then monitored Feci for twenty continuous minutes prior to breath samples to ensure that he did not regurgitate, burp, or place any foreign object in his mouth. I further did not observe any foreign objects or piercing's in Feci's mouth.

At the expiration of the twenty minutes, I turned on the instrument and entered the required information, reviewed the data and proceeded with the breath samples. I then placed a new clean mouthpiece on the breath hose and read to Feci verbatim from the placard on the wall in booking, "I want you to take a deep breath and blow into the mouthpiece with one long continuous breath. Continue to blow until I tell you to stop. Do you understand these instructions?" Feci stated, "Yes." For the second breath sample I again used a new clean mouthpiece and read to Feci the same instructions verbatim off the placard on the wall. Feci again said he understood and provided another breath sample. Both samples were analyzed by the Alcotest instrument which resulted in a .15% B.A.C. These readings were entered into the N.J.S.P. calculator and were found to be within acceptable tolerance.

On 5/31/19 at 1410 hours Ptl. Stephenson #291 and I were dispatched to the parking lot of Lenape Liquors (567 Mantoloking Rd.) to back up Ptl. Reitemeyer #153 who was off duty and was out with a possible intoxicated driver.

When we arrived on scene Ptl. Reitemeyer had blue Chevy Cruze (NJ/N49HXG) stopped on the west side of the building. I exited my vehicle and spoke to Ptl. Reitemeyer. Ptl. Reitemeyer explained to me that he was exiting the parking lot of Lenape Liquors when he observed the suspect vehicle attempting to make a right turn from Mantoloking Rd into the parking lot. The vehicle was taking the turn too wide and appeared it was going to crash into Ptl. Reitemeyer's vehicle. In order to avoid a crash Ptl. Reitemeyer made a quick right turn onto Mantoloking Rd. Ptl. Reitemeyer was concerned about the driver of the vehicle so he turned around quickly and reentered the parking lot. As he entered the parking lot he witnessed the vehicle pulling into a parking spot on the west side of the building. As the vehicle was parking it did not stop in the spot but continued and almost hitting the building Ptl. Reitemeyer stopped his vehicle, exited it, and approached the vehicle and identified himself as a police officer to the driver. The vehicle was still running and he requested she turn off the vehicle. The driver, Ann Cordero turned off the vehicle. As Ptl. Reitemeyer was in Mrs. Cordero's presence he could smell a strong odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from the vehicle. Mrs. Cordero was slurring her words and seemed out of it. At this point he believed that Mrs. Cordero may be under the influence and may attempt to drive away so he requested her keys and she handed them to him.

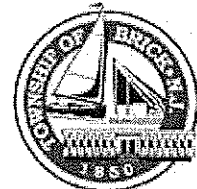
I approached the drivers side of the vehicle and there was an odor of alcoholic beverages coming from the vehicle. I spoke to Mrs. Cordero and could see her eyes were blood shot and watery Her face was flush and she appeared indifferent as to why I was there. While I was talking to her I could smell the odor of alcoholic beverages coming from her breath. I explained to her why I was there and that I believed that she may be under the influence of alcohol. While she was sitting her vehicle I explained to her I was going to perform some tests to see if she was intoxicated.

The first test I performed was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus (HGN). I explained to Mrs. Cordero for her to follow my pen with her eyes only and not to move her head. She stated she understood. When I raised my pen up to her eyes the eyes began to move without me moving my pen. When I moved my pen to the left and the right and to their maximum deviation the eyes were twitching the whole time. At this time I asked her to step out of the vehicle to do some more tests. When she got out she had to use the car for support. She was also swaying and had sagging knees. I was concerned that Mrs. Cordero may not be able to safely perform the tests. I asked her if she could stand on one leg and she attempted to but had to hold onto the car. I asked her if she could stand on one leg and she said no. At this point I discontinued the physical tests. I asked her if she knew the alphabet and she said yes. I asked her to recite it with out singing it. As she was reciting the alphabet she stopped half way through and started again. I then showed her the finger touch test and explained it to her and she stated she understood. She performed the test and after one pass became confused and stopped. At this point I ended all the testing and placed Mrs. Cordero under arrest for driving while intoxicated. I handcuffed her behind her back and double locked the cuffs. Mrs Cordero's vehicle was towed by Glens towing for Brick Performance as per John's Law. I placed her in my vehicle(46) and transported her to Brick PD

While processing Mrs. Cordero for the DWI the breathalyzer returned a control error and the test was aborted. Furthermore the breathalyzer required a solution change. I had dispatch contact Pt .Pleasant Boro so that I could process Mrs. Cordero. Pt Pleasant Boro stated their breathalyzer was available. I then transported Mrs. Cordero to Pt. Pleasant Boro PD. When I arrived at the station I placed Mrs. Cordero on the bench and began my 20 minute observation. My radio, I Phone, I Watch were secured outside of the testing room. During my observation I did not observe any belching, burping or regurgitation. I used the time function on the breathalyzer to monitor my 20 minutes. After twenty minutes I conducted my breath tests. Mrs. Cordero had to blow into the machine 3 times and each time I placed a clean mouthpiece from an unopened package on the tube. During the testing I did not observe any belching, burping or and regurgitation. Mrs. Cordero performed the test and the results were .22 BAC. I then transported her back to Brick PD HQ and released her to her husband - [REDACTED] who signed the Potential Liability Form. Mrs. Cordero was issued summons for DWI (39:4-50), Reckless Driving(39:4-96), and Careless Driving(39:4-97)

On 06/01/2019 at 0241 hours, I (Ptl. Oliverio #286) while in the area of Rt. 70/ and Chambersbridge Rd observed a gray Audi A4 (NJ Reg B76KPN) driving in the right lane of travel. While positioned directly behind the suspect vehicle I observed it fail to maintain its lane (39:4-88B), specifically by, allowing the drivers side tires cross the white dotted line into the other lane of travel. The vehicle passenger side tires remind the right lane of travel. The suspect continued to drive in this manner for approximately 100 feet. The vehicle then made a sharp over correction and returned to it's lane of travel. I conducted a motor vehicle stop on Rt. 70 near the entrance of the Kohl's Plaza.

I made a driver's side approach and was met by the operator, Luis Martinez. I requested Martinez driving credentials (I.E. license, registration and insurance) to which he handed over without incident. While doing so I observed his hand movements to be slow and he fumbled with other documents inside his vehicle. When I explained to Martinez the reason for the stop, he stated he understood. I inquired where he was coming from to which he informed me "Jenks". I asked if he had drank any alcoholic beverages while he was there to which he stated "2 beers". While speaking with him I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the passenger compartment of his vehicle. At this time Ptl. Hentges #288 arrived on scene to assist.

I requested Martinez to step out of the vehicle in order for Ptl. Hentges #288 to perform a Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test , to which he did without incident. Ptl. Hentges advised me while performing the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test on Martinez's eyes, he scored 6 out of 6 hits .Ptl. Hentges also advised me that Martinez stated to him he had three (3) beers while at Jenks. I advised Martinez that I would like to perform further testing, to which he agreed.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, Martinez stated no. The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Martinez what was his highest level of education, to which he stated College. I asked if he was well versed in the English language he stated yes.

The first examination conducted was to recite the alphabet. While explaining, and demonstrating the test I observed Martinez in the starting position he began to sway back and forth. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Martinez had no questions and was instructed to begin. Martinez performed the test without incident.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Martinez in the starting position, he swayed back and forth and separated his feet (coming out of the starting position). After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Martinez had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Martinez raised his arms for balance, put his foot down more than three (3) time without being told to do so, and was not able to complete the test (due to him not being able to raise his foot for more than approximately 7 seconds).

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Martinez in the starting position, he came out of the starting position multiple time and failed to touch heel to toe. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Martinez had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test he took five (5) steps, came off the line to balance himself and asked to start over. When he restarted the test, he took nine (9) steps forward and nine (9) back but only touched heel to toe four (4) times.

Due to the traffic violations I observed, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Martinez breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). Martinez was transported to H.Q. by me without incident. Ptl. Hentges #288 remained at the scene and awaited Andrew's Auto Body Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law. While transporting Martinez to H.Q. the interior of my patrol vehicle was filled with the odor of an alcoholic beverage. Also Martinez spontaneously uttered he was not drunk he just had three (3) beers and one (1) green tea shot.

Once at H.Q. I removed all electronic devices, and portable radios from the testing area in the booking room prior to breath testing. I read the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples, Martinez stated, "YES." SLEO. Lopez #141 and I then monitored Martinez for twenty continuous minutes prior to breath samples to ensure that he did not regurgitate, burp, or place any foreign object in his mouth. I further did not observe any foreign objects or piercing's in Martinez's mouth. While in the processing room, I again detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Martinez breath when he spoke.

At the expiration of the twenty minutes, I turned on the instrument and entered the required information, reviewed the data and proceeded with the breath samples. I then placed a new clean mouthpiece on the breath hose and read to Martinez verbatim from the placard on the wall in booking, "I want you to take a deep breath and blow into the mouthpiece with one long continuous breath. Continue to blow until I tell you to stop. Do you understand these instructions?" Martinez stated, "Yes." For the second breath sample I again used a new clean mouthpiece and read to Martinez the same instructions verbatim off the placard on the wall. Martinez again said he understood and provided another breath sample. Both samples were analyzed by the Alcotest instrument

which resulted in a .11% B.A.C. These readings were entered into the N.J.S.P. calculator and were found to be within acceptable tolerance.

Martinez was issued the following summonses:

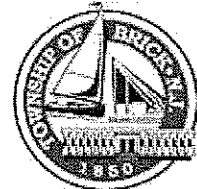

I then gave Martinez approximately twenty minutes, where he made several phone calls in an attempt to get a ride home. He was unable to, and I informed him he could either sit in the cell until he was deemed sober or go to Ocean Medical Center for a detox. He became irate and began arguing with myself and Sgt. Turner #178. Martinez then yelled fine take me to the fucking hospital. Ptl. Rotondo #252 arrived at H.Q. and assisted me. While transporting Martinez to OMC, he threatened officers multiple times, specifically by stating he would fuck us up on the street. Once at OMC he was turned over to their staff.

The back of my patrol vehicle was searched before and after Martinez was placed inside, yielding negative results. Also my service weapon was placed inside locker #01 at the front desk before bringing Martinez back to the processing area.

On 06/02/2019 at approximately 0054 hours, I (Patrolman Patrick #296) was on patrol in marked patrol vehicle #01 in the parking lot of 2001 Lanes Mill Road (Brick Memorial High School). During this time, I observed a 2009 Gold Chevrolet Malibu (NJ Registration: W20FWT) parked in the shoulder on westbound side of Lanes Mill Road with its hazards on. The Chevrolet appeared to be disabled, so I approached it. As I neared the Chevrolet, it re-entered the roadway, without properly utilizing its turn signal, and continued traveling westbound on Lanes Mill Road toward Sally Ike Road. When it was safe to do so, I conducted a u-turn to follow the Chevrolet to observe whether it was having mechanical issues. While the Chevrolet was traveling through the intersection at Sally Ike Road, I observed it fail to maintain its lane. Specifically, the Chevrolet crossed over the double yellow centerline and all four wheels were fully traveling in the oncoming lane of travel. After I observed these motor vehicle violations, I safely closed the distance to the suspect vehicle and initiated my emergency lights to conduct a motor vehicle stop in front of 1891 Lanes Mill Road (Lanes Mill Elementary School).

I approached the Chevrolet on the passenger's side and identified myself as a Brick Township Police Officer to the operator, identified as Andrew W. Busch (Busch). I requested Busch to hand me his driver's license, vehicle registration, and vehicle insurance. Busch was slow to provide me with all of his vehicle's credentials, and his eyes were bloodshot and watery. When I advised Busch the reasons for the stop, he admitted he was parked in the shoulder to text his girlfriend and was also texting his girlfriend when he failed to maintain his lane of travel. While speaking with Busch, I observed his speech to be slurred and slow, and an odor of alcoholic beverages was emanating from inside the passenger compartment. Through my training and experience, these observations indicated Busch was driving under the influence of alcohol, so I asked where he was coming from. Busch claimed he was coming from 1600 State Highway 70 (River Rock Restaurant & Marina Bar), and that he drank "a couple beers." Based on my observations of Busch and what he reported to me, I advised him I would be conducting a series of field sobriety tests to determine if he was under the influence of alcohol while operating his motor vehicle. I requested Busch to step outside to the rear of his vehicle, while I waited for backup to arrive on scene. Outside his vehicle, I confirmed the odor of alcoholic beverages was emanating from Busch's breath.

At this time, Patrolman Docherty #275 and Patrolman Shevchuk #294 arrived on scene to assist me while conducting the field sobriety tests. I walked Busch off the roadway and onto the sidewalk to conduct the tests on a flat, level ground, free of debris. Before beginning the first test, I asked Busch what time it was without looking at a watch. Busch stated it was ten 2200 or 2300 hours, but the actual time was 0100 hours.

The first test I conducted with Busch was the Alphabet test. Busch was instructed to stand with his feet together and hands at his sides at all times, unless instructed to do otherwise. Busch was continuously swaying while trying to maintain the instructed position. I began by asking Busch what his highest level of education was. Busch advised me he graduated high school, and confirmed he had a basic understanding of the English alphabet. Busch started to recite the alphabet before I could finish instructing him on the test, and he would not listen to my requests to stop. When Busch finished reciting the alphabet, I explained to him not to begin until instructed to do so. Busch was then instructed to recite the entire alphabet, without grouping or singing the letters. Busch was advised twice to remove his hands from his pockets while receiving the instructions. I confirmed that Busch understood my instructions, and advised him to begin. When Busch started reciting the alphabet, I observed him grouping the letters. I also observed Busch swaying throughout the entire test. After completing his recitation, I concluded the test.

The second test I conducted with Busch was the One-Legged-Stand test. Before conducting the test, I asked Busch if he had any prior medical history that would prevent him from standing on one leg. Busch stated he had no medical history that would prevent him from standing on one leg. I had to remind Busch to stand with his feet together and hands at his sides because he was fumbling his fingers and was still continuously swaying. Busch was instructed to raise either foot of his choosing six inches off the ground with his hands at his side, and start counting aloud by "One-Thousands" (I.E. "One One-Thousand," "Two One-Thousand," "Three One-Thousand"), until he was advised to stop, all while keeping his eyes on the toes of his lifted foot. While receiving the instructions, Busch had to be advised on two separate occasions to stop fumbling his hands and placing them in his pants pockets. After I finished explaining the test to Busch, he did not have any questions, and was advised to begin. During his first attempt, Busch raised his right foot and counted to "Three One-Thousand" when he stumbled backwards with his arms raised away from his sides. Busch placed his right foot back on the ground to prevent himself from falling and started swearing. Busch attempted to start the test again, and the results were the same as his first attempt. Busch shouted, "I can't fucking do it." I advised Busch the test was concluded for his own safety.

The next field sobriety test I conducted was the Walk and Turn test. I instructed Busch to stand straight, hands at his sides, and his right foot to be placed in front of his left while receiving instructions. Busch was unable to maintain this position, and almost fell over every attempt due to a lack of balance. Busch became frustrated and yelled, "this is fucking stupid." Busch refused to listen to any of my instructions, and started arguing with me. Eventually, I instructed Busch to walk nine (9) heel-to-toe steps, counting each step aloud; then take a series of short choppy steps to turn around; and then walk nine (9) heel-to-toe steps back, counting each step aloud. After I finished explaining the test to Busch, he did not have any questions, and was advised to begin. Busch completed the test as instructed, but he swayed as he walked, spun around instead of taking short, choppy steps, and he did not walk heel-to-toe.

Based on my training, experience, and what was observed during and prior to the tests, I believed Busch was under the influence of alcohol while operating his motor vehicle. I placed Busch under arrest utilizing the double-locking mechanism, following departmental policy, and he was searched incident to arrest. Busch was then placed into the back of Patrol Vehicle #01.

Ptl. Shevchuk and I conducted a search of Busch's vehicle to look for any intoxicants. No other contraband was found as a result of the search. Busch's vehicle was secured by Ptl. Shevchuk and towed by Sandy's Service Center for impound as per John's Law.

Busch was transported to Headquarters where he was placed on a bench in the booking room to begin the twenty-minute observation period. At 0134 hours, Ptl. Oliverio #286 read Busch his Miranda Rights. Busch refused to sign anything and invoked his rights. Ptl. Oliverio then read Busch the New Jersey Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators and Busch refused to submit samples of his breath (See Case Supplemental Report #34786-19 by Ptl. Oliverio).

After Busch refused to submit samples of his breath, Special Officer Capper finished booking and processing Busch, following departmental policy. Busch was released to his mother, [REDACTED], who signed the potential liability warning at 0456 hours.

Additionally, I conducted a check of the rear passenger compartment of Patrol Vehicle #01 prior to and after Busch was placed inside, and my body worn camera was utilized to record the entire incident.

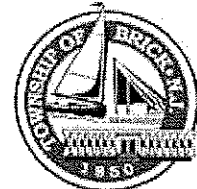

I removed all electronic devices, and portable radios from the testing area in the booking room prior to breath testing. I read the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples Busch requested I read the statement again to which I did. Once I concluded reading the statement, Busch stated "nope" I then read the second part of the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, (N.J.S .A 39:4-50.2e). At the conclusion and when asked to submit to breath samples Busch refused to answer. I then operated the Alcotest machine indicating, Busch had refused to provide breath samples.

On 06/08/2019 at 1516 hours I was dispatched to 6 Lanes Mill Rd.(Wawa) in reference to a motor vehicle crash in the parking lot. Upon arrival I observed a white Toyota Sequoia bearing NJ registration S11HML and a black Chevy Suburban bearing NJ registration B26KKC and was flagged down by the involved parties(See my crash report under the same case number for additional information).

As I approached the parties, the driver of the Suburban, later identified as Jose Lago, stated "when I pulled in I must have bumped into her and scratched her" while pointing at the Toyota. I noticed that his speech was stuttered. As I spoke with him further, I observed that he would continuously lean on one of the vehicles for support while standing. I also found his answers to be slow and his speech to be slightly mumbled. Additionally, his eyes were very bloodshot and watery. I requested that he supply me with his license, registration, and insurance for the vehicle. He provided me with his driver's license and advised the vehicle was a rental. He stated he would check the glove compartment of the vehicle for the additional documents. As he walked to the passenger side of the vehicle I observed him to be staggering as he held on the vehicle for support. At this time I requested an additional unit respond to the scene.

At this time Sgt. Shepherd #167 and Ptl. Haugh #217 arrived on scene to assist. While again speaking with Lago, Ptl. Haugh detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. At this time I advised Lago that I would be having him complete field sobriety tests based upon our observations. Lago was escorted to an area of the parking lot that was dry, level, and free of debris. As he was walking to the area, Lago was swaying and having trouble keeping his balance.

The first test I had Lago perform was the walk and turn. I directed Lago into the starting position. He was told to keep his arms at his side and place his right foot heel to toe in front of his left. Lago fell out of the starting position multiple times while the test was being explained to him. I advised him to take nine heel to toe steps while counting each step out loud. Once he had completed the first nine steps he was advised to take a series of small steps to turn around and then take another nine steps back towards the starting position. On several occasions Lago did not step heel to toe. He also stepped off the line for balance multiple times. There were also multiple times where officers reached in for assistance believing Lago may fall.

The second test that I instructed Lago to perform was the one leg stand. I instructed Lago to keep both arms at his side and his feet together while I explained the test to him. Lago was instructed to raise one foot, of his choosing, six inches off the ground with his toe pointed upwards. He was also instructed to count 1000-1, 1000-2, 1000-3, etc. while looking at his toe until he was told to stop. Lago attempted the test and placed his foot down multiple times for balance. He was also unable to keep his foot six inches off the ground and was swaying badly. At one time Ptl. Haugh had to catch Lago to keep him from falling. The test was terminated at 1000-11 for Lago's safety.

Based off of the above circumstances, Lago was placed under arrest for driving under the influence at this time. He was handcuffed utilizing the double locking method and placed into the rear of patrol vehicle 14. Both Lago and my patrol vehicle were checked and found to be negative for any contraband prior to Lago being placed into the vehicle. He was subsequently transported to headquarters without incident.

Once at headquarters I secured my weapon and brought Lago to the cell block. He was searched again, then brought for booking and processing. Ptl. Haugh operated the Alcotest machine(See his supplemental report for further information). Lago submitted to the breath testing and the results came back at 0.20%.

Lago was charged with 39:4-50(driving under the influence) on summons E19003345, 39:4-96(reckless driving) on summons E19003346, and 39:4-97A(careless driving) on summons E19003347.

[REDACTED] arrived at headquarters and was explained the potentially liability warning. She signed the warning and Lago was released to her custody. The Suburban Lago was driving was impounded for John's Law by D&L Towing. It is a rental and attempted to contact Enterprise Rent-A-Car to advise them but was unable to reach anyone.

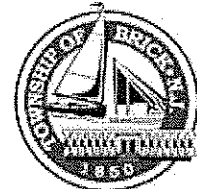
On 06-08-2019 I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Upon my arrival I began my observation of the arrestee Jose Lago. During the observation period Lago was read his Miranda rights signing the form stating he understood his rights. Lago was also read the Standard Statement form and his response was "yes" to taking breath samples.

Lago was observed in excess of twenty minutes. No foreign objects were observed in Lago's mouth and he did not belch or regurgitate during the observation period. Prior to the start of the test all radios and cell phones were removed from the room. Lago provided two breath samples with the results of .20%. He was provided new mouth pieces for each sample. Those results were ran in

the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator and were within acceptable tolerance. See Ptl. Barlowski #284's report for further details.

On 6/8/19 at approximately 1945 hours, Ptl. Boronkas #165, Ptl. Stephenson #278, and I (Ptl. Taylor #302) responded to the area of Drum Point Rd. and Hooper Ave in reference to an over turned vehicle accident that occurred on the eastbound lane of Drum Point Rd. in front of the Exxon (181 Drum Point Rd).

Upon arrival I observed a single motor vehicle, a 2013 silver Volkswagon Passat bearing NJ registration G60 JTR, over turned in the roadway. Several bystanders were around the vehicle attempting to help the driver get out. Upon approach to the vehicle I saw a female driver, later identified as Maria Gubitosa who was trapped by her seatbelt in her vehicle. While kneeling down next to the vehicle to check on Gubitosa I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. I observed Gubitosa who was alert and conscious and asked her if she was okay. Gubitosa advised me that she was okay and was not hurt. Bystanders were able to assist in getting Gubitosa out of the Vehicle. Fire Department and Brick EMS arrived to assist. Once Gubitosa was out of the vehicle Brick EMS put her on a stretcher and escorted her to the ambulance.

While walking around the vehicle I observed a bottle of wine inside the passenger compartment of the vehicle. I went over to the ambulance and spoke with Gubitosa asking her if I could retrieve documents from her vehicle, to which she replied yes. While standing behind the stretcher in the ambulance I could detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage. I checked with Gubitosa to see if she had any injuries, to which she stated she was fine and was not in pain, just shaken up. I could hear a slur to her speech and I asked Gubitosa if she had been drinking alcohol today. Gubitosa advised she had drank a few drinks around 1600 hours but it was not enough to worry about. Gubitosa explained she was on her way back from a families residence in Toms River, NJ.

I returned to the vehicle and was unable to locate the documents. Surf Side Collision Towing arrived and righted the vehicle. I then located the registration and insurance inside of the glove box. I collected Gubitosa's purse, her medications and cash that spilt out as a result of the accident. Another motorist approached saying he had witnessed the accident. A witness statement form was completed by him.

Ptl. Boronkas and I responded to the ambulance to speak with Gubitosa. EMS advised that Gubitosa refused medical treatment and did not wish to be transported to the hospital. Ptl. Boronkas spoke with Gubitosa who advised him that she was not hurt and was not in any pain. Ptl. Boronkas asked Gubitosa how the accident occurred. Gubitosa advised she made a right onto Drum Point Rd. and another vehicle side swiped her. When Ptl. Boronkas advised her a witness stated no other vehicle struck her, she told him "I don't know what to tell you, somebody hit me". Gubitosa was led out of the ambulance by EMS. Gubitosa appeared to be unsteady on her feet and lost her footing getting out of the ambulance. I heard Gubitosa stating "I missed a step". I checked with Gubitosa to see if she was injured from the fall out of the ambulance, to which she responded "No I'm okay".

Ptl. Boronkas then conducted a series of field sobriety tests, see his supplemental report for details.

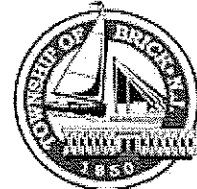
Based on the results of the sobriety test, Gubitosa was placed under arrest, (handcuffed double locked) for Driving Under the Influence. Gubitosa was searched incident to arrest and placed in the rear of Vehicle 44. Gubitosa was transported to headquarters and placed in the Juvenile Holding Room. Gubitosa was processed and Ptl. Boronkas conducted the Alcotest 7110 testing, see his supplemental report for details.

Gubitosa was released to [REDACTED] who signed a Potential Liability Warning Form. On 06/09/19 at 0201 hours I was traveling on Burnt Tavern road in the area of Vans Zile Rd in patrol vehicle #11. As I was approaching the intersection I observed a vehicle to be off of the roadway and in the grass near the parking lot for Rite Aid (Burnt Tavern Rd). The vehicle was approximately 20 feet off of the road and on the property of Rite Aid.

Once I stopped my vehicle I was able to see that the vehicle was occupied by four individuals. I activated my vehicles emergency lights and immediately the driver of the vehicle exited the vehicle and started to walk towards the entrance to Rite Aid. While the subject was walking away I asked him to come back towards the vehicle. After asking the subject started to run towards the rear of the business. The subject hid behind a dumpster and when he saw my flashlight started running from the rear of the building towards Van Zile Rd. The subject fell in the roadway and laid on the ground and complied with all of my commands. The suspect was placed under arrest and I started to walk the suspect back to his vehicle.

At this time Ptl. Docherty #275 arrived on scene and stayed with the vehicle. After I placed handcuffs on the subject he stated that there was a gun in the vehicle. I advised Ptl. Docherty that the subject ,later identified as Malique Medler, advised there was a gun in the vehicle because there was still three other passengers in the vehicle. While walking back to the suspects vehicle Medler was extremely unsteady on his feet and I was able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage. At this point Sgt. Dierking #204, Ptl. Therghesen #249, and Ptl. Oliverio #286 arrived on scene. Ptl. Oliverio spoke to the female ,Faith Holmes, who stated the vehicle a gray Chrysler 300 NJ registration C30JMR belonged to her and asked her if we had consent to search the vehicle. Holmes stated that it was okay and signed a Consent to Search Form. A search of the vehicle yielded negative results on a weapon but we did locate multiple open containers of alcohol in the cabin of the vehicle. I asked Holmes where they were coming from and she stated that they had just left Riverrock (1600 Rt 70).

While trying to speak with Medler he became argumentative and boisterous. Medler was slurring his words and rambling. Medler's eyes were also bloodshot and he was having a difficult time keeping his eyes open. Approximately five minutes after placing Medler in the rear of my patrol vehicle he fell asleep and became difficult to waken. I was also able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage after opening the rear door of my vehicle after the subject had been inside for approximately five minutes.

While on scene dispatch advised that the suspect vehicle had been involved in a hit and run in the area of River rock see Ptl. Therghesen's NJTR-1 report case #36521-19. Based on the vehicles two accidents, odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Medler's breath, his loud boisterous attitude, and his unsteadiness on his feet I believed that Medler was under the influence of an alcoholic beverage. Medler was transported to HQ by me without incident. Ptl. Oliverio remained at the scene and awaited Glens Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

When we arrived at HQ Ptl. Therghesen and I had difficulty trying to get Medler to wake up. While walking up the ramp Medler was unable to stand or walk on his own and we had to physically hold Medler upright. While inside HQ Medler became aggressive and would not comply with commands.

Ptl. Therghesen operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Therghesen advised me, Medler refused to provided sufficient breath samples.

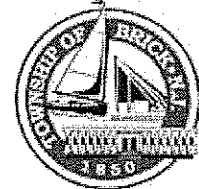
I contacted South Toms River Police Department and they advised that they needed to pick Medler up for fingerprints. Medler was processed and released from Brick PD to Officer Dugan #303 from the South Toms River Police Department on summons#2019-000590 for 2C:29-1.

After reading Medler his rights and the standard statement, Medler stated "YES" and was willing to give breath samples for the Alcotest. While conducting the 20 minute observation, Medler became very uncooperative and stated multiple times that he would not blow into the machine (Alcotest) and to charge him with the refusal so he can go to county jail. I operated the Alcotest and entered Medler as a refusal.

On 6-14-19 at 2021hrs, Ptl. Ulman #215 and I responded to the area of Burnt Tavern Rd. and Burrsville Rd. in reference to a minor motor vehicle crash involving a black Dodge Durango and a red Acura. Upon arrival we located both vehicles in the parking lot of 1139 Burnt Tavern Rd.

We met with the drivers of both vehicles, Robert Spanvill and Hishaam Al-Sendeidi, who both explained their versions of the crash. While speaking with Al-Sendeidi I noted his speech was slow and slurred, his eyes were blood shot and glassed over. Ptl. Ulman who was standing closest to Al-Sendeidi, detected an odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath as he spoke. Ptl. Ulman conducted a Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test where he observed indications of alcohol influence.

While speaking with him I asked him if he had consumed any alcoholic beverages and he stated that he had 2 shots of "Captain." I directed Al-Sendeidi to the area to the rear of my patrol vehicle while Ptl. Ulman spoke with Spanvill regarding the crash. The area I directed him to was flat, level and free from debris. I asked Al-Sendeidi if he had any medical conditions that would affect his balance and he stated he had none. The first test administered was the one leg stand. I instructed him to stand with his feet together and arms at his side and not to start the test until instructed. As I began to explain and demonstrate the test, he attempted to start the test until I stopped him and again advised not to start until instructed. Once instructed to start, he lifted his left foot off the ground approx. six inches off the ground but failed to look at his foot, point his toe toward the sky and did not count out loud as instructed. I asked him to repeat the test with his right leg and he again failed to look at his foot, point it toward the sky as instructed. He did count out loud in a quiet voice until prompted to speak up. The second test I explained and demonstrated was the walk and turn test. Prior to demonstrating and explaining, I placed him in the test's starting position, hands at his sides and left foot in front of his right, heel to toe. Al-Sendeidi placed his right foot in front of his left foot, heel to toe but was unable to stay in that position during the rest of the demonstration as instructed. Once instructed to begin, he failed to perform the test as instructed as he took 12 steps forward and 10 back while failing to walk heel toe and losing his balance several times. I confirmed that Al-Sendeidi had no problems with his eye sight and then conducted a Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test (HGN). During the test I observed a lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, onset of Nystagmus at maximum deviation and onset of Nystagmus prior to 45 degrees. He also moved his head to follow the stimulus and failed to follow the stimulus with his eyes as instructed. Believing Al-Sendeidi to be operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and or CDS, I placed him into custody.

After securing Al-Sendeidi in my patrol vehicle (#33), Ptl. Ulman conducted a search of his vehicle for any evidence related to operating the vehicle while intoxicated. No open containers or contraband were located but there was a strong odor of burnt marijuana inside the vehicle. Due to the BTPD Alco test machine being out of service, Al-Sendeidi was transported to the Pt. Pleasant Boro Police Department for breath testing. I was met at PBPB by BTPD Ptl. Mulchahey #130 who is a certified Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C operator. At the completion of breath testing, Al-Sendeidi's BAC was found to be .17, see Ptl. Mulchahey's supplemental report regarding the administration of the breath testing. Subsequently Al-Sendeidi was transported to BTPD headquarters where he was processed and issued the following summons: E19003502 for DUI 39:4-50, E19003503 for Reckless Driving 39:4-96, and E19003505 for Driving with an expired Drivers License 39:3-10A. He was also issued a summons (T161371) by Ptl. Ulman for Careless Driving 39:4-97. See Ptl. Ulman's crash report under the same case number for crash details. The vehicle was towed and impounded as per John's law by Legacy Towing.

Because Al-Sendeidi was unable to arrange for someone to respond to headquarters, take custody of him and sign the Potential Liability form, he was transported to Brick Hospital for detox. It should be noted that Al-Sendeidi was cooperative but indifferent during the entire contact.

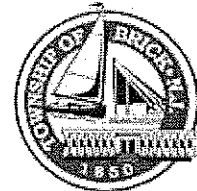

I read the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement form to Al-Sendeidi and he stated, "Yes Sir". At 2140 hrs I started the Alcotest and Al-Sendeidi gave two breath samples that was 0.17% BAC. I ensured a new mouth piece was used for each test. The breath sample results were entered into the NJ State Police Alcotest Calculator and were within acceptable tolerance. Officer Lapoint transported Al-Sendeidi to the Brick Township Police Department to be processed.

I observed the driver's (Randol Valenzuela-Mendez) speech to be rambling, slurred and slowed. He appeared to have droopy eyelids and his clothing was dirty. While walking Mendez staggered and swayed. At this time it was determined Mendez would conduct field sobriety test to which he agreed to participate in.

I began by giving Mendez verbal instructions for the One Leg Stand test while demonstrating my instructions to him. Upon instructing Mendez on how to do the test he interrupted with numerous questions which were answered by both myself and Ptl. Newlund. Prior to having Mendez begin the test I made sure to ask if he had any medical or physical disabilities preventing him from completing physical test. Mendez stated he was not physically or mentally handicapped in any way, but did have an issue with his neck that wouldn't prevent him from performing any physical test. Mendez also confirmed his highest level of education was a high school diploma. Prior to beginning the test I asked Mendez if he had any further questions to which he responded he did not.

Mendez made three separate attempts at the One Leg Stand. On his first attempt Mendez began the One Leg Stand by raising his right foot approximately 6 inches off of the ground with his hands at his sides. He stepped down after approximately 4 seconds. He then asked Ptl. Newlund to explain the test again, he appeared to be confused by me instructing him to look down at his foot. Mendez then made two more attempts both times he stepped down or leaned over after approximately 7 seconds. On his third attempt he skipped 5 while counting.

I then gave Mendez instructions for the Walk and Turn test while demonstrating my instructions to him. After giving Mendez both a demonstration and instructions, he stated he understood the test and was ready to conduct the test. Mendez took approximately 15 steps forward heel to toe and after turning around he stumbled on his 3rd step. During the duration of this test Mendez used his arms to help him balance as well as stumbled at the conclusion of the test.

At the completion of the field sobriety tests Ptl. LaPoint conducted a (HGN) test. Due to Ptl. Lardieri's observations as well as Mendez's performance on the field sobriety tests conducted he was placed under arrest for driving under the influence. Mendez was handcuffed using the double lock method, searched incident to arrest, and placed in the rear of patrol vehicle 37. The patrol vehicle was searched for contraband prior to placing Mendez in the rear, yielding negative results. Mendez's vehicle was turned over on scene to the care of Yineli Perez-Agosto who was in the vehicle at the time of Mendez's arrest. Mendez granted Perez-Agosto custody over his vehicle for the time being and signed potential liability warning form for possession of the vehicle.

Mendez was transported to Mantoloking Police head quarters where Ptl. Smith #231 conducted the Alco-Test (see supplemental report). Mendez at this time told officers he had consumed two Corona's earlier in the day. Mendez's Alco-Test results showed a BAC of 0.00% which were confirmed by the state of NJ Alcotest calculator. Mendez was then transported back to Brick Township Police headquarters where he was booked and processed. Ptl. Caulfield #235, a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) spoke with Mendez in regards to further testing. Mendez stated he did not wish to complete the tests and requested his right to an attorney. Mendez was released with motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50 (E19-003530) and 39:4-96 (E19-003531) with a court date of 06/24/2019 at 0900 hours. [REDACTED] arrived at police headquarters and signed potential liability warning form for the release of Mendez.

My body worn camera was activated throughout the duration of the stop and testing.

OfficerID: jlardieri, Narrative

On 6/15/19 at 1842 hours while on routine patrol in the area of RT 35 northbound I observed a gray in color Audi (NJ/F66KCN), through my side view mirror, driving behind me on the left shoulder of the road. The vehicle appeared to quickly correct itself and re-entered the left lane of travel. As I continued with the flow of traffic I began noticing the vehicle was now traveling at a high rate of speed due to how fast it was closing the distance between us. Within seconds the vehicle was approximately a few feet away from me and appeared to show no signs of slowing down. At the very last possible moment the vehicle swerved hard into the right lane of travel to avoid crashing into the rear of my patrol vehicle. While doing this the vehicle nearly crashed into two other vehicles traveling in

that lane. Both of the other vehicles drove off the road and onto the shoulder to avoid the suspect vehicle as it continued driving at a high rate of speed. The vehicle then, without warning, turned left back into my lane travel causing me to have to use my breaks to avoid another potential collision with it.

I immediately activated my over heads lights and attempted to stop the vehicle. The driver recognized he was being stopped and pulled off onto the far right shoulder of the road. Prior to him stopping, he struck the curb with both of his passenger side tires and came to a stop with the rear passenger side tire on top of the curb. I approached the vehicle and the driver, Randol Valenzuela-Mendez, immediately told me he was in a rush to get back home to Dover and asked if I could give him a break. I asked him to provide me with his drivers license which caused him to grab his wallet and open it. He briefly fumbled through it, informed me he may not have it with him and asked if I could write it down to pull it up with my computer. He continued slowly fumbling through his wallet as I asked him where he was coming from. He advised he was leaving Seaside and was just hanging out there while waiting for a friend. In speaking with him I observed Randol's speech was slurred and his movements were slow. Also his eyes appeared to be red in color and glazed over. At this time I was informed by dispatch that they had just received a call from a concerned motorist reporting the vehicle I had on the stop was driving all over the road.

I continued to ask Randol if he had the registration and insurance for the vehicle. He placed his wallet down and began going into his phone informing me he had proof online. While Randol was slowly searching for the document on his phone his front seat passenger put the car in park for him. Randol was ultimately able to provide me with his current insurance card. After obtaining his information I returned to my vehicle. Ptl. LaPoint #222 and Ptl. Pagnotta #301 arrived on scene to assist. At this time I asked Randol to exit his and speak with me at the rear of his vehicle.

While at the rear of his vehicle I spoke with Randol about the reason for the traffic stop. He denied driving fast claiming something in his vehicle would not allow for it. He also denied having consumed any alcoholic beverages today and was just in a rush to get home. At this time I advised him Ptl. Pagnotta #301 would be performing Field Sobriety Tests to ensure he was not intoxicated. See Ptl. Pagnotta's #301 report. I issued Randol a summons for 39:4-96 on E19-003531.

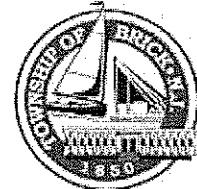
OfficerID: ssmith, Narrative

On 06/15/2019 at approximately 1912 hours I responded to Mantoloking PD to assist Ptl. Newlund #285 and Ptl. Pagnotta #301 with Alcotest operations for the arrest of a subject for 39:4-50. See the case report for additional details regarding the incident. The Brick Township PD Alcotest machine was sent out for updates/repairs, requiring the use of outside agency's machines. My department worn camera was removed prior to entering the building, as I was unfamiliar with the buildings layout and knew the BWC could not be worn during operation of the Alcotest machine. Ptl. Newlund and Ptl. Pagnotta had both of their department issued camera's on and activated upon my arrival.

Once at Mantoloking PD, I joined Ptl. Newlund and Ptl. Pagnotta in their DUI processing room. With them was their arrestee, Randol Valenzuela-Mendez. Once in the processing room, I initiated the 20 minute face-to-face observation period. During that time, Randol was read his Miranda Right's, to which he stated he understood and agreed to answer questions without a lawyer present. He was then read the implied consent form, to which he stated he understood and agreed to provide breath samples. During the 20 minute face-to-face observation period, I observed no abnormalities that would prohibit use of the Alcotest machine. At the conclusion of the observation period, all cell phones, radios, body worn cameras, and all other electronic communication devices were removed from the room. There was a ventilation system installed in Mantoloking PD processing room that needed to be activated prior to operation of the Alcotest machine, in order to accurately obtain ambient air readings. The ventilation system was then activated. I was then able to acquire breath samples from Randol, new and unopened mouth pieces. I allowed Randol to inspect each mouth piece packaging, and he agreed they appeared new and unopened. A new mouth piece was used for each collection, and upon two successful collections, Randol was shown to have a BAC of 0.00%. Randol was then transported back to Brick PD for completion of processing.

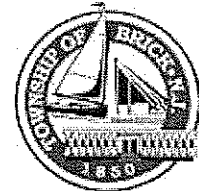

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On 06/16/2019 at approximately 2248 hours, I, Ptl. Caulfield #235, was working a DUI grant detail in Brick, NJ in patrol vehicle #36.

At that time, I was dispatched to the parking lot of 189 Chambers Bridge Road to assist Ptl. Smith #231 on a motor vehicle stop involving a possible intoxicated driver (See Ptl. Smith's Supplemental Report). Upon arrival, the female suspect, identified as Leanne E. Braly, was standing outside the vehicle speaking with Ptl. Riccio #289. I then approached Braly, identified myself to her, and began speaking to her. While initially speaking with Braly, I observed that her speech was slow and slurred. In addition, I observed that both of her eyes were watery, bloodshot, and both eyelids were heavy and droopy. I also detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. When asked if she had consumed any alcoholic beverages, Braly stated she drank one Jameson and ginger-ale mixed drink earlier this afternoon while on a tourist yacht in New York City, NY.

At that time, I explained to Braly that I was going to administer field sobriety tests at the scene in which she, Braly, had no objection to. As Braly was walking towards another section of the parking lot, I observed her slightly swaying while walking. While Braly was standing in the parking lot, I also observed that she was swaying while standing and her stance was rigid. When asked if she had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Braly stated no. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris. The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Braly as to how to perform the examination, Braly had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. Furthermore, I observed that Braly was swaying in both in a front to back and side to side motion during parts of the test.

The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Braly continued to sway while standing and had some difficulty maintaining her balance while in the starting position. Braly also started the test prior to being instructed by me to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Braly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Braly failed to touch heel to toe on several steps, lost her balance while walking (Stepped off the line on more than one occasion), lost her balance while turning (Braly pivoted causing her to slightly stagger), and turned incorrectly (Failed to keep her lead foot on the ground).

The final examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed that Braly was swaying while standing in the starting position.. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Braly had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Braly was swaying while her left foot was elevated and also put her right foot down on more than one occasion. Furthermore, Braly only had her left foot elevated approximately 3-4 inches off the ground while performing the test.

Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, Braly was taken into custody (Handcuffs were double locked) and transported by me to Point Pleasant Borough PD headquarters in patrol vehicle #36 without incident. Prior to placing Braly into my patrol car, I inspected Braly's oral cavity. Braly stated she had invisalign strips on her teeth and that she would be able to remove said strips. The rear of my patrol vehicle where Braly was seated was checked prior to her being transported, as well as, when I arrived at Point Pleasant Boro PD. Both checks yielded negative results. A search of Braly incident to her arrest also yielded negative results. Ptl. Smith #231 remained on scene and awaited Route 88 Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law. Once at police headquarters, Braly was read her Miranda Rights and signed off on the waiver portion of the form (Waived her rights). In addition, I also inspected Braly's oral cavity once again inside Point Pleasant Borough PD headquarters. At that time, Braly removed the invisalign strips from her teeth and an inspection of her oral cavity after said removal yielded negative results/findings. I then read Braly the NJ D.U.I. Standard Statement form (Implied Consent) in which she agreed to submit samples of her breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine and also observed Braly for twenty minutes (Twenty minutes were managed utilizing my personal wristwatch) prior to administering the test. During said observation time, Braly remained under constant and uninterrupted observation until the administering of the Alcotest machine was fully complete. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, etc.). Braly provided sufficient breath samples and her BAC was 0.09%. I then entered the Alcotest breath sample results into the NJSP Alcotest Calculator in which the breath sample results were within acceptable tolerance. Furthermore, a new mouthpiece was used each time Braly provided a breath sample into the Alcotest machine.

After the Alcotest was administered, Braly was transported to Brick PD headquarters by me without incident. Once again, the rear seat of my patrol vehicle was checked prior to the transport, as well as, after arriving at Brick PD headquarters. Both checks yielded negative results/findings. Upon entering Brick PD headquarters, I secured my duty weapon inside a designated gun lock box located in the watch commander's room. Braly was then processed, as per policy, and issued motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50 (1506-E19-3535), 39:4-96 (1506-E19-3536), 39:4-97 (1506-E19-3537), 39:4-88B (1506-E19-3538), and 39:4-49.1 (1506-E19-3539). Braly was also charged with several CDS related offenses by Ptl. Smith as a result of the motor vehicle stop. Braly was released a short time later to a family member, Tricia Vandyk, who signed and was given the original copy of the Potential Liability form. Furthermore, Braly was given a copy of the Alcohol Influence Report from the Alcotest machine. My body worn camera was activated during this incident.

OfficerID: ssmith, Narrative

On 06/16/2019 at 0152 hours I observed a Jeep Grand Cherokee, NJ-F80KNG, traveling North on Chambers Bridge Rd in the area of Salmon St. The vehicle had made several abrupt swerves between the left and right lane, with its front and rear passenger side tires crossing between the two lanes of travel. I activated my overhead lights and sirens to initiate a motor vehicle stop and activated my department issued body worn camera.

The vehicle pulled into the parking lot of the Singin Gas Station located at 189 Chambers Bridge Rd. I approached the vehicle on the driver side and spoke with the operator, Leanne Braly. I advised Braly for the reason for the motor vehicle stop and requested her license, registration and insurance information. Braly stated she was coming home from a "yacht party" she attended in NYC where she stated she had consumed alcoholic beverages early in the evening. As I spoke with Braly, I detected the scent of an alcoholic beverage on her breath as well as the smell of both burnt and raw marijuana coming from within the vehicle. Braly appeared nervous and could be seen swallowing, nervously licking her lips, and her heart rate appeared to be elevated, visible by her carotid artery pulsing on her neck as she spoke. Braly's words were slow and slurred, and her hand motions were slow as she handed me her documentation. Ptl. Caulfield #235 and Ptl. Riccio #289 arrived on scene to assist. Ptl. Caulfield was working a DUI enforcement detail and took over the investigation into a possible violation of DUI-39:4-50. See his case report for further details. As Ptl. Caulfield spoke with Braly, I deployed my partner, K9 Echo #917, to conduct an external sniff of the vehicle for narcotics. See my K9 report for details on that sniff.

Based upon the smell of burnt marijuana in the vehicle, and K9 Echo's positive indication to the presence of a narcotic odor, a search of the vehicle was conducted. Inside of the vehicle, I located the following contraband:

- One green and glass vaporizer pen cartridge with a brown resin fluid inside, suspected of being marijuana resin extract, AKA Hashish oil. The cartridge was labeled "Smart Cart Organic" with a marijuana leaf emblem as a part of the logo.
- One E-Z Wider brand double wide cigarette rolling papers, commonly used to roll marijuana cigarettes.
- Two "Zootz" brand "Gold Label Indica" vaporizer cartridge boxes. The boxes were empty and did not contain the cartridges. The boxes were clearly marked as "100% natural cannabis" with a labeled cartridge content of 90.3% THC.

While conducting a search of the vehicle and its contents, a large amount of money was located in Braly's purse. Due to high winds and the unsecured nature of the bills, they were not initially removed from the purse out of fear of losing the bills as they were itemized and counted on the side of the roadway.

Based upon Ptl. Caulfield's observations, and the items discovered during the search of her vehicle, Braly was placed under arrest. See Ptl. Caulfield's report for details relating to her charges for the DUI. Braly was advised of her charges and upon hearing of the discovery of the empty cartridge boxes and the single cartridge, Braly specified that the boxes should have been empty (admitting knowledge of their existence) and that the single cartridge was loose and not contained in a box (admitting knowledge of its existence). This statement was a spontaneous response to her charges, and was not in response to any questioning from either myself or Ptl. Caulfield.

Braly was transported to headquarters where she was processed as per departmental policy and procedure. During processing, the large amount of bills was removed from her purse to be counted and immediately returned to her. Upon removing the money from the purse to be counted, a small plastic bag of green vegetative matter, suspected of being marijuana, fell from within the folds of the bills. The marijuana was seized as evidence and the money was counted (\$1,103.00) and was returned to Braly. When the money was returned to Braly she acknowledged the money belonging to her.

Based upon the items located inside of her vehicle and the marijuana located during processing, Braly was charged with the following offenses:

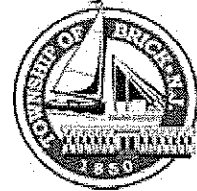
- 2C:35-10A(4) - DP offense - for possession of less than 50 grams of suspected marijuana that was found falling from within money she acknowledged as being her own.
- 2C:35-10A(4) - DP offense - for possession of less than 5 grams of hash, for having a vaporizing pen cartridge containing hash oil that she acknowledged possessing in her vehicle.
- 2C:36-2 - DP offense - for possession the empty boxes that had previously been used to store and contain hash oil vaporizing pen

cartridges, for the plastic bag used to contain the suspected marijuana, and for the cigarette rolling papers suspected of being used to roll marijuana cigarettes.

After DUI processing, Braly was released on multiple motor vehicle summons' from Ptl. Caulfield. She was released with the above charges on summons number 1506-S-2019-000613.

OfficerID: JOSEPH.RICCIO, Narrative

On 06/16/2019 at 0056 hours I (Ptl. Riccio #289) responded to 834 Lynwood Ave. in reference to a suspicious vehicle. A concerned citizen caller advised there was a white van in the area that had been revving its engine for approximately 20 minutes.

Upon arrival I observed a white van (Ford Econoline NJ Reg. X74HCX) in the driveway of 834 Lynwood Ave., and a white male, John Eadicicco, standing next to it. John approached my patrol vehicle, slightly staggering while walking. While speaking with John I observed his eyes to be watery, and bloodshot. I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from John's breathe. I looked over to the white van he was standing by, and observed the rear driver side wheel bent inwards. Ptl. Zolezi #269 and Ptl. Shevchuk #294 arrived on scene to assist.

As I approached the vehicle I observed the rear of the van had struck the house, and the rear passenger side wheel was buried to the axle (See Ptl. Shevchuk's accident report for further information). I asked John what happened. John stated he was moving the van and it got stuck in the soft sand. He then tried to get the van out of the sand by going back and forth.

Due to the motor vehicle crash along with the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from John's breath, I advised John I would be conducting field sobriety testing. John was reluctant to do the tests at first but eventually complied.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, John stated "Diabetes, trouble balancing, and on multiple medications". The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in front of John's house on the street in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked John what was his highest level of education, he stated "12th Grade". I asked John if he was well versed in the English language he stated "Yea".

The first examination conducted was to recite the alphabet. While explaining, and demonstrating the test John started the test twice without being told to do so. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, John had no questions and was instructed to begin. John conducted the alphabet without incident until he made it to the letter "Q" at which time he recited the following: Q, R, S, E, U, V, W, X, Y, Z

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, John had no questions and was instructed to begin. John raised his right foot making it to "7", and neglected to end each number with one-thousand before dropping his foot to the ground. I explained the test one more time to John. John had no questions, and was instructed to begin. John lifted his right foot making it to "1" before dropping his foot. John raised his right foot again making it to "3" before dropping his foot. John raised his left his making it to "2" before dropping his foot. The test was terminated.

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed John step out of the starting position three times widening his legs for balance. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, John stated he had a question but then started talking about his medical conditions. John stated he also had emphysema, COPD, back problems, and knee problems which he did not state before. At the conclusion of John's admission to further medical problems he had no question and was instructed to begin. While performing the test John neglected to count each step out loud, and also did a total of 10 steps. John also neglected to touch heel to toe on the following step: 4, 5, 7, and 8. At the conclusion of the first set of steps, John turned around and stared at me. I asked John if the test was completed at which time he stated "I don't know am I you tell me". The test was terminated.

Due to the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from John's breath, his admission to operating the vehicle, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). A check in the interior of the van for intoxicants or impairing substances yielded negative results. John was transported to Lakewood P.D. to use their Alcotest machine. Ptl. Shevchuk remained at the scene and awaited Joe & Son's Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Therghesen #249 responded to Lakewood P.D. to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Therghesen's supplemental report for further information). John refused to provide breath samples.

John was then transported to H.Q. where he was booked, and processed without incident.

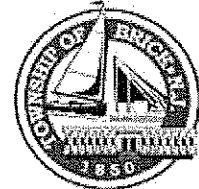
John was released a short time later to a family member who signed and was given a copy of the potential liability form.

On June 18, 2019 at approximately 2340 Hours I (Ptl. Bryan Murphy #243) was on Patrol for "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" grant detail. I was requested to respond to 570 Rt 70 (Target) by Sgt Shepherd #167 in reference to a motor vehicle stop.

On scene, I located a motor vehicle stop initiated by Patrolman Hentges #288 and Sgt. Shepherd #167 to the rear of Target (570 Rt. 70) with the suspect vehicle NJ-G83GTN. As I approached the suspect vehicle, Sgt. Shepherd advised they were flagged down by staff members from Quaker Steak and Lube bar whom indicated the driver of NJ-G83GTN was an intoxicated driver (see Ptl. Hentges supplement report for further details of the initial call to police and motor vehicle stop). I approached the driver, later identified as James Souto, who was already removed from his vehicle. I asked James if he had anything to drink to which he responded "two beers". I advised James I would like to have him perform a few tests to determine if he was ok to drive. This statement was referring to Standardized Field Sobriety Tests to determine if his able to operate his motor vehicle safely after consuming alcohol.

I escorted James to a solid yellow line in the parking lot that was clear of debris. Before I could begin to explain the tests, James immediately attempted to balance on the yellow line and stated "I already know the protocol". It should be noted I was standing a few feet away from James and I was able to detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath when he was speaking. James speech was also slurred showing an additional indication that his Blood Alcohol Content maybe over the legal limit to operate a motor vehicle.

The first test I began to explain to James was the walk and turn test. This test required James to start by standing heel to toe left foot in front of right on the yellow line and with his hands at his side. While explaining this portion of the test I was also standing in this manor as an example for James to see what was required. I request James to remain in this position (as did I) while I continued with the rest of the test instruction. James responded by stating "alright" and began this portion of the test. James was unable to stand in the position even as he raised his arms for balance and stated "I can't do it". James further advised he was unable to perform the test due to a metal rod in his leg. James stated "if you want to arrest me go ahead".

As James continued to converse with me it was even more apparent his speech was slurred and his eyes were droopy. James emotions began to change and appeared to be getting upset after he stated he had a rod in his hip and pointed to his right calf.

The second test I began to explain to James was the one leg stand test. This test required James to start by standing with his heels touching and his hands at his side. Noting James had a medical issue with his right leg I ask James if he could perform the test using his left leg for balancing. As I was explaining the test to James he spontaneously stated "I don't have anything in my pockets". During this test instruction James continuously interrupted me and attempted to begin the test before it was fully explained. James again attempted the test without full instruction and lost his balance and appeared agitated.

James appeared upset he was unable to perform the tests and stated he was just coming to Target. James presented a USA passport and verbally identified himself as James Souto.

With the basis of the original call from Quaker Steak and Lube Bar staff, the operation of a motor vehicle, the odor of alcoholic beverage emanating from James breath, his slurred speech, and inability to listen and follow instructions as I attempted to explain the test, I placed James under arrest for Driving While Intoxicated. James was placed into handcuffs, which were double locked as per department policy.

James vehicle was impounded under John's Law by Rt 88 Auto as per department policy.

James was transported to Point Pleasant Police Department for use of their Alcotest due to Brick Townships Alco-test being down for repair. Ptl. Hentges #288 transported James to Point Pleasant Police Department where he began the twenty minute observation of James at 2357 hours until my arrival at approximately 0015 hours. The observation of James was continuous and uninterrupted. During this time James did not vomit or have anything inside his mouth.

I explained the process of the test as posted on the wall. For the first breath test, James intentionally blew outside the mouth piece and took the mouth piece out with his teeth. This caused the test to fail "Min. vol not achieved". I then received two adequate breath samples to determine his Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) from the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. The two breath samples were entered into the State Of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator indicating his BAC was .20%.

James was transported to police headquarters, processed and turned over to hospital staff at Ocean Medical Center for detox. The summons issued to James are as follows:

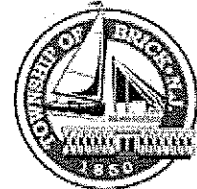

I contacted Ptl. Murphy #243 who was on DWI patrol. Ptl. Murphy responded to the scene and attempted to conduct SFST's.

On 06/22/2019 at approximately 0155 hours, I was on patrol in the area of Route 70 and Chambers Bridge Road when I observed a black SUV traveling East on Chambers Bridge Road towards Route 70. I observed the said vehicle's front windows and windshield to be tinted, in violation of NJSA 39:3-74. I then safely turned around, behind the vehicle, which was a black Infiniti FX35, bearing NJ registration K56KPL. A full plate inquiry on the mobile data terminal (MDT) revealed the registered owner's drivers license was suspended. Based on the motor vehicle violations, I followed behind the vehicle in order to conduct a motor vehicle stop in a safe location. While following behind, I observed the vehicle turn right without signaling onto the entrance ramp for Brick Boulevard from Chambers Bridge Road. I then conducted a motor vehicle stop in the parking lot of Exxon Gas Station, located at the corner of Brick Boulevard and Cedarbridge Avenue. Ptl. Catalina #263 responded to my location.

During the stop, I approached the passenger side window and observed one male driver and no other occupants inside the vehicle. I asked the driver, identified as the registered owner Jacobia Hayes Jr., to provide his license, vehicle registration and proof of insurance. While he was reaching for documents, Hayes Jr. asked why he was being stopped and I advised him of the reason. During initial observation, Hayes Jr. was slurring his speech, was speaking loudly, and I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. I asked him where he going to and where he was coming from, which he replied that he was going home to Toms River and was coming from the bar in Lakewood. I asked him if had consumed alcohol and he stated he was drinking Hennessy. I inquired how much and he stated, "One shot." I advised Hayes Jr. to remain inside his vehicle while I returned to the patrol vehicle.

I advised Dispatch to check Hayes Jr. for warrants which was negative. I returned to the vehicle and asked Hayes to step out of his vehicle in order to perform field sobriety tests. I observed Hayes Jr. exit the vehicle and I directed him to the front of his vehicle where he leaned on the hood of his vehicle. I then implemented the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests in an area of the parking lot that was level and free from debris.

Test 1: Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test

I asked Hayes Jr. to stand in the testing position, which was standing with his feet together while holding his arms down at his sides. I asked him if had any medical ailments or injuries to his eyes, which he stated he did not. I first checked Hayes Jr's eyes for equal tracking, resting nystagmus and equal pupil size which were all normal. I observed Hayes Jr's eyes to be bloodshot and watery.

During testing, Hayes Jr. displayed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation and onset of nystagmus prior to forty five degrees in both eyes. Hayes Jr. was also tested for vertical nystagmus which was negative.

Hayes Jr. displayed six out of six clues, and was swaying side to side and front to back during testing. Also it should be noted while Hayes Jr. was outside of the vehicle, I detected the odor of alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath and his person.

Test 2: Walk and Turn Test

I first instructed Hayes Jr. to stand in the starting position which was placing his right foot directly in front of his left foot, heel touching toe while holding his arms down at his sides. I advised him to remain in this position while I explained and demonstrated the test and not to start until instructed to. I then explained to take nine heel to toe steps in a straight line while holding his arms down at his sides and counting each step out loud. I advised him to take a series of small steps to turn around on the last step and take nine steps in the direction he came from in the same fashion. I then demonstrated the test and asked Hayes Jr. if he understood the instructions. Hayes Jr. then began the test before I instructed to and I advised him to stop, and stand in the starting position again. Hayes Jr. then verbally confirmed that he understood the instructions and I instructed him to begin the test.

During the test I observed the following clues. Hayes Jr. started the test before instructed to, did not keep his balance during my instructions. He did not touch heel to toe while performing the test, he raised both of arms out to his sides, perpendicular to the ground for balance. Hayes Jr. stepped off the line for balance, stopped walking for balance, and turned incorrectly.

Test 3: One Leg Stand Test

During the last test, I initially asked if Hayes Jr. had any problems with walking or balancing which he stated he did not. I instructed Hayes Jr. to stand in the starting position which was standing with his feet together while holding his arms down at his sides and to remain while I explained the test. I explained and demonstrated to hold a foot of choice six inches from the ground, straight in front of him while counting "one thousand-one, one thousand-two, one thousand-three" until I advised him to stop the test. I instructed Hayes Jr. to look down at his raised foot and not to stop the test until instructed to do so. Hayes Jr. began the test before instructed to, and I advised him to position himself in the starting point again. I asked him if he understood the test which he stated, "Yes." While Hayes Jr. was in the starting position I observed him swaying side to side and was using his arms for balance. I then instructed him to begin.

During Hayes Jr's performance of the test, I observed him put his foot down, 4 seconds into the test, which I was monitoring on my wristwatch. Hayes Jr. was slurring his speech, and counted correctly up to "one thousand-three" and placed his foot on the ground for balance. Hayes then raised his foot and continued counting while holding his arms out to the sides. Hayes Jr. counted up to one thousand-fourteen and stated, "one thousand-fourteen, one thousand-fourteen." Hayes Jr. then put his foot down a third time at which time I concluded the test.

Based on my observations, at approximately 0215 hours, I advised Hayes Jr. that he was under arrest for driving while intoxicated in violation of NJSA 39:4-50. I placed Hayes Jr. into custody and he was handcuffed to the rear utilizing double locking handcuffs. Hayes Jr. was searched and placed in the rear of my patrol vehicle. Ptl. Catalina #263 remained on location awaiting Point Pleasant Towing as per John's Law. I transported Hayes Jr. to Point Pleasant Borough Police Department for the Alcotest. Point Pleasant Towing arrived on scene at approximately 0235 hours and impounded the vehicle, at which time, Ptl. Catalina responded to Point Pleasant Borough PD for Alcotest operation.

Hayes Jr. was transported without incident. While Hayes Jr. was in the rear of my patrol vehicle, I detected the strong odor of alcoholic beverage emanating inside the patrol vehicle. While at Point Pleasant Borough PD, I advised Hayes Jr. of the Miranda Warning and he signed off, indicating he understood and waived his rights. I conducted a prolonged twenty minute observation, which I monitored utilizing my wristwatch. I also read the NJ Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators, to which Hayes Jr. agreed to providing samples of his breath. During a direct and prolonged twenty minute observation, Hayes Jr. did not belch, place his hands near his mouth nor have any foreign objects inside his mouth. At this time, Ptl. Catalina operated the Alcotest machine, see supplemental report.

Hayes Jr. provided sufficient breath samples indicating a BAC of .12%. I transported Hayes Jr. to Brick Township Police Headquarters for processing without incident. Hayes Jr. was issued the following summonses:

Additionally, Hayes Jr's sister, [REDACTED], responded to Police Headquarters and was advised of the potential liability warning. Williams stated she understood and signed off on the Potential Liability Form and was also given a copy. Hayes Jr. was served with summonses and released from Police custody.

My body worn camera was activated throughout the entirety of this incident. The backseat of my patrol vehicle was searched prior to and following the transport of Hayes Jr. to headquarters. My department issued firearm was secured prior to entering the cell area and processing room. Hayes Jr. was searched again prior to being placed in a holding cell. Hayes Jr. was screened for suicidal tendencies with negative results. Standard 15 minute prisoner checks were conducted per departmental policy and guidelines.

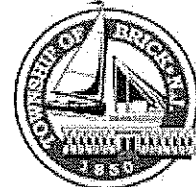

I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Hayes was read the breath sample instructions verbatim, from the posted sign, which he stated he understood. The instructions were read for both breath samples collections. The breath hose mouth pieces were changed after each breath sample was given.

Hayes's first breath sample at Point Pleasant Borough Police Department was accepted. Hayes's second breath sample at Point Pleasant Borough Police Department was accepted. The reported breath samples recorded was 0.12% BAC. The breath sample results were entered into the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator, and were within acceptable tolerances.

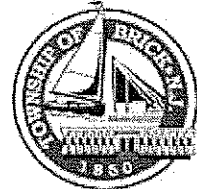

On 06/22/2019 at 2357 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on stationary patrol in the parking lot of the Gulf Gas Station located at 1150 Burnt Tavern Road. During this time, I observed a white colored Cadillac sedan bearing NJ registration N54JRW traveling north on Burnt Tavern Road. As the vehicle passed my location, I observed the driver accelerate at a high rate of speed. Specifically, I could hear the engine revving as the vehicle continued north on Burnt Tavern Road. The driver was also driving erratically as they switched from the left lane to the right lane without activating their right turn signal. The driver also failed to maintain their lane of travel multiple times. Specifically, the driver crossed both the center traffic line and the fog line with their driver side and passenger side tires on Burnt Tavern Rd. and then again on Lanes Mill Road.

While traveling directly behind the vehicle I observed the driver tail gating a black Chevrolet SUV (sports utility vehicle) in the area of the Wawa Convenience Store located at 6 Lanes Mill Road. The suspect driver had to quickly activate their brakes and switch from the left lane to the right lane as they came within a short distance of colliding into the rear end of the Chevrolet SUV (unknown registration). After observing the above motor vehicle violations, I activated my emergency overhead lights / sirens to initiate a motor vehicle stop. The vehicle came to a complete stop in the area of Lanes Mill Rd. / Stephen Road. There I exited my patrol vehicle and made a passenger side approach. Ptl. Mancini #282 arrived on location to assist. We made contact with two occupants who were identified as Leonidas Solorzano-Villega (driver) and Marybeth Rodriguez (front passenger).

During our initial encounter, Rodriguez opened the front passenger side door and began throwing up stomach content onto the ground. It also appeared that she had urinated herself as the front and back of her pants were wet. We asked Rodriguez if she needed first aid attention and she was unable to communicate as her upper body and head were slouched out her door. As a result, Brick Medical Unit #534 arrived on location and transported Rodriguez to the Brick Hospital. While speaking with Solorzano-Villega he was incoherent and was unable to effectively answer our questions. Specifically, his speech was very slow as he stuttered and slobbered when he spoke. I further observed that his eyes were bloodshot and watery. I also detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his breath. I asked Solorzano-Villega where he was coming from and he stated he was coming from the River Rock. The River Rock is a bar located at 1600 NJ 70, Brick, New Jersey.

Solorzano-Villega was then advised to exit his vehicle to which he complied. There I advised him I was going to test him on a series of field sobriety tests. The below listed tests were explained and demonstrated by me and were performed on a flat level surface, in a well lit area free of debris. Prior to Solorzano-Villega performing the tests, I asked him if he had any type of injuries or disabilities that would affect him from performing any type of mental or physical tests to which he stated "No".

Walk and Turn: Solorzano-Villega was instructed to stand with his hands at his sides and place his right foot in front of his left foot and stand in a heel to toe fashion, prior to him being given any further directions. Solorzano-Villega was instructed to take nine steps heel to toe counting aloud for each step, while keeping his hands at his sides. After his ninth step, he was instructed to plant his front foot and take a small series of steps to turn around in the other direction and take another nine steps heel to toe counting them aloud.

Solorzano-Villega was unable to stand with his hands at his sides in a heel to toe fashion as I explained the test. He continuously lifted his arms out past his sides and fell out of position. None of Solorzano-Villega first set of steps and second set of steps were in a straight heel to toe line. His feet crossed each other and faced different directions as he took each of his steps. He raised his arms out past his sides to support his balance during the entirety of the test. I had to remind Solorzano-Villega to place his hands at his sides and count aloud during the test. During his first set of steps he tripped on his feet, stumbled and fell out of position. I had to stand within close proximity of Solorzano-Villega during the test in order to prevent him from falling to the ground at one point. Upon completion, I asked Solorzano-Villega if he injured himself during the test and he stated, "No". Solorzano-Villega was unable to complete the test as instructed.

One legged stand: Solorzano-Villega was instructed to place his feet together and keep his arms by his sides. He was to raise his right leg six inches off the ground in front of him without raising his arms for balance. Once in position, he was to count to thirty out loud by one thousands.

Solorzano-Villega started the test by lifting his left foot off of the ground. I advised Solorzano-Villega he had lifted the wrong foot off of the ground to which he then lifted his right foot off of the ground. Solorzano-Villega swayed back and fourth and raised his arms out past his sides. Solorzano-Villega dropped his foot to the ground within the first eight seconds. Solorzano-Villega then picked his foot back up and attempted the test again. This time his foot fell to the ground within sixteen seconds. Solorzano-Villega also stuttered and skipped numbers as he counted. Solorzano-Villega was unable to complete the test as instructed.

After totaling my observations, it was in my opinion that Solorzano-Villega was operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and was subsequently placed under arrest for DWI. He was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. Solorzano-Villega was seat belted in the rear of patrol car #24. A search of the interior of the vehicle for open containers of alcohol

and intoxicants revealed the following evidence:

1. One (1) glass bottle of an alcoholic beverage labeled "Hennessy". The beverage was located in a gym bag on the rear left passenger seat.

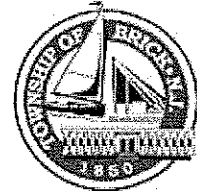
As a result, Solorzano-Villega was transported to police headquarters, where he was booked and processed as per departmental policy. Ptl. Mancini remained on scene for Brick Performance Towing to respond and impound the suspect vehicle as per Johns Law. At headquarters I was advised that our departmental Alcotest Instrument was inoperable. As a result, Ptl Gordon #297 and I transported Solorzano-Villega to the Lakewood Township Police Department (231 3rd Street) for further testing. At the Lakewood Township Police Department I read / explained Solorzano-Villega his Miranda rights and the N.J. Attorney General's standard statement for motor vehicle operators in reference to taking breath samples. After Solorzano-Villega was read implied consent and when asked if he would provide samples of his breath to determine the content of alcohol in his blood he stated "Not without my lawyer" multiple times. Solorzano-Villega was so impaired during questioning that he repeatedly closed his eyes, fell asleep, ignored my questions and further refused to answer the majority of my questions. I had to use my hand to apply a sternum rub in order to get a response from Solorzano-Villega as he was in a comatose state for the majority of the incident. I asked Solorzano-Villega if he needed first aid during the incident and he stated "yes". Lakewood Medical Unit #528 then arrived on location to assist. There Solorzano-Villega refused medical attention and stated "I have to pee". Solorzano-Villega was uncooperative as he did not answer their questions and repeatedly stated "I have to pee". Solorzano-Villega refused to provide samples of his breath to determine the content of alcohol in his blood.

Upon completion, Solorzano-Villega was transported back to Brick Police Headquarters. There the "Hennessy" bottle was entered into property. Solorzano-Villega's friend Robert E. Wilson (03-27-1980) then arrived at headquarters in order to take responsibility of Solorzano-Villega. Wilson was explained the Potential Liability Form. Wilson then signed off on the form stating he understood the Potential Liability Form and took custody of Solorzano-Villega. Solorzano-Villega was released from police custody. Upon release, Solorzano-Villega was issued motor vehicle summonses for the following:

1. Driving while intoxicated: 39:4-50, E19-003688.
2. Refusal to submit breath samples: 39:4-50.4a, E19-003689.
3. Failure to maintain lane: 39:4-88B, E19-003690.
4. Careless driving: 39:4-97, E19-003693
5. Reckless driving: 39:4-96, E19-003694.
6. Open container of alcoholic beverage: 39:4-51B, E19-003692.
7. Speeding: 39:4-98, E19-003687.
8. Driving while suspended: 39-340, E19-003691.

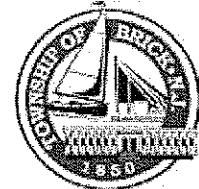

OfficerID: CGESKEY, Narrative

On 06-23-2019 at 0906 hours, the Brick Police Department received at least two telephone calls about a possible intoxicated driver on State Highway 70 near Riviera Drive.

The callers, who wished to not have their names included in this report, stated that they observed a black, older-model Chevrolet Impala on Riviera Drive at the intersection of Highway 70 where several other people had gotten out of their cars to check on the driver after he appeared either unconscious or asleep. All the traffic at the intersection had stopped due to the situation. As the caller observed other drivers knocking on the windows of the Impala, it appeared the driver suddenly awoke, and quickly drove away on Highway 70 westbound. The callers followed the vehicle, and watched as the driver weaved in and out of the traffic lanes. Believing the driver to be impaired or having a medical emergency, they called the Brick Police and gave updated locations and direction of travel, as well as the license plate of the car (NJ registration-Z77HYB), motor vehicle violations and near-collisions with runners and bicyclists.

The callers were able to follow the vehicle down Highway 70, onto Brick Boulevard southbound, then ultimately onto Mantoloking Road eastbound past Adamston Road. As the suspect vehicle was passing Trader's Cove Marina near the base of the Mantoloking Bridge, Sergeant J. Matthews #210, who was monitoring the transmissions during a separate detail and was in his personal vehicle, observed the vehicle pass him as he waited for it to approach. Sergeant Matthews observed the vehicle weave into the oncoming traffic lane nearing the crest of the bridge, and it was traveling over the 35mph bridge speed limit. He was able to point out the vehicle to me as I was traveling northbound through Mantoloking Borough on Highway 35 to intercept it.

I was able to safely execute a U-turn on Highway 35 near Downer Avenue and conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle, which pulled its front right tire onto the curb. Sergeant Matthews remained with me momentarily until Sergeant Jenssen and Officer Giambona arrived as back-up. My body-worn camera was activated immediately after executing the U-turn.

I approached the driver, and identified him as Daniel Joseph Intile (arrestee) from his photo on his New Jersey driver's license. I asked him to step out of his vehicle onto the sidewalk, where I asked questions pertinent to the situation, such as departure and destination points, and consumption of intoxicants. Intile's clothing was disheveled. He was wearing only a tank top and bathing suit. He was not wearing shoes. He appeared fatigued, spoke slowly and calmly, and his eyes were watery. I detected a faint smell of alcoholic beverages coming from his person.

While on the sidewalk, (which was newer, level, and free from debris) I told him why he was stopped and requested that he perform some Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFST).

I first explained and demonstrated the one-leg stand. Intile was unable to keep his foot raised more than three inches, or longer than 5 or 6 seconds. He kept putting his foot down, starting over, and used his arms for balance. Although he was barefoot, he stated he had no medical conditions which would affect his balance, and the sidewalk concrete surface was still nice and cool. He was unable to count while attempting the test.

I then had Officer Giambona position my patrol car so I could safely ask Intile to perform the walk-and-turn test on the fog line of Highway 35. After it was made safe to do so, I explained and demonstrated the walk-and-turn test and asked Intile to perform it. Intile was unable to walk heel to toe on the line, stepped off the line, used his hands for balance, and took ten steps forward instead of the nine he was directed to and was losing count of his steps. When he turned around to come back the other direction, again he could not walk heel to toe, stepped off the line, took eight steps instead of the seven he was directed to perform.

I then performed the horizontal gaze-Nystagmus test back on the sidewalk. Movement was jerky and erratic along the horizontal plane. There was no smooth pursuit of his eyes from left to right, and exhibited Nystagmus (bouncing of the eyes) at the point of maximum deviation (just past 45 degrees). Tracking of the eyes along the vertical plane was smooth and did not exhibit Nystagmus.

Based on his failure to adequately perform the SFST and based on witness observations and evidence, I suspected Intile was operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated. I placed him under arrest at 0929 hours. I then took a quick look around the interior of his vehicle to search for any obvious evidence. In the center console I found an empty 50ml airplane bottle of El Jimador tequila.

He was then transported to the Mantoloking Borough Police Department to obtain samples of his breath for the purpose of chemical analysis. The Mantoloking Police Department was literally right around the corner.

Upon arrival at Mantoloking PD, I then noticed a stronger smell of alcoholic beverages coming from his person, and the interior of my patrol vehicle where he was seated. I was unable to detect an odor inside his own car because his windows were down, and it was further masked with the musty smell of the car's interior. Once inside their processing room, I commenced a 20-minute observation period. During that time he did not burp or vomit, but sat quietly and patiently. Intile was quiet and respectful when answering questions during the observation period, as we waited for Patrolman DeFluri #270 to operate the Draeger Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C

machine and perform the breath analysis tests. Upon the conclusion of the breath testing, it was determined that Intile was intoxicated, with a BAC of .21 (See Patrolman DeFluri's Supplement Report).

Following the breath testing, Intile was transported to the Brick Police Department for processing. At the Brick Police Department he was issued the following Motor Vehicle Summonses:

- 1506-T-162362 for DWI (39:4-50)
- 1506-T-162363 for Careless Driving (39:4-97)
- 1506-T-162364 for Reckless Driving (39:4-96)
- 1506-T-162365 for Open Container (39:4-51b)
- 1506-T-162366 for Failure to Maintain Lane (39:4-88)

After processing, he was released into the custody of his Aunt, [REDACTED], who signed the Potential Liability Warning (John's Law) Form at 1300 hours. He was informed that his vehicle was impounded as a result of the DWI charge, and was towed to Joe's Service Center on Mantoloking Road. He was given his court appearance date for his arraignment (06-26-2019 at 0900 hours), and how to get a release for his impounded vehicle.

OfficerID: mdefluri, Narrative

On June 23, 2019 at approximately 0940 hours I was dispatched to Mantoloking Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C in reference to a DUI arrest. Upon my arrival Ptl. Geskey #184 advised me that he already conducted the twenty minute observation period. See report by Ptl. Geskey under the same case number.

I read the suspect, Daniel Intile, his Miranda rights which he signed, indicating he understood. I also read the standard statement form to Daniel to which he responded "sure" to providing samples of his breath. I then operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Daniel made three attempts to give adequate breaths, each time utilizing a new mouthpiece. The first test resulted in minimum volume not achieved (2 liters for 4.5 seconds), the second and third attempts were adequate samples. Daniel's breath samples recorded 0.21% BAC, which were within acceptable tolerance. During the administration of the test all electronic devices, e.g. portable radios, cell phones, etc. were removed from the booking room.
