1 (Transcript of proceedings Monday, February 26, 2 2018, commencing at 5:37 p.m.) 3 (Upon the meeting being duly called 4 to Order and the Open Public Meeting Statement 5 read, the following Business takes place) 6 MR. JOST: I guess we're on Old 7 Business now. Complaint filed by Charles Kratovil 8 against Council President Glenn Fleming. Would 9 the Chair like me to sort of summarize the 10 complaint before the Board? 11 THE CHAIR: Sure. 12 MR. JOST: The complaint filed by 13 Mr. Kratovil is dated January 17, 2018. I think 14 the essential allegations are in counts one 15 through five. 16 Count one says that Mr. Fleming 17 failed to disclose his sources of income and his 18 spouse's income on his June 11, 2014 Financial 19 Disclosure Statement. Count two alleges that Mr. 20 Fleming failed to disclose those sources of income 21 and his spouse's sources of income, on his April 22 28, 2015 Financial Disclosure Statement. Count 23 three says that Mr. Fleming incorrectly stated 24 that his spouse's source of income was Blackrock 25 Industries, on his August 19th, 2015 amended	1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25

5 1 THE CHAIR: Yes. 2 MR. JOST: We can mark it B-1. 3 (Complaint, marked as B-1 in 4 evidence) 5 Just by way of information, the 6 procedure that we follow when there is a 7 Complaint, is that the Board assigns a 8 subcommittee of two members to evaluate the 9 Complaint, and report their recommendation to the 10 full Board at the executive session to be held. 11 And then the Board makes a determination if there 12 is, in essence, probable cause, or at least a 13 reasonable doubt as to whether the violation took 14 place. 15 It also says that under the 16 standard operating procedures--well, the 17 subsections about the preliminary receipt of a 18 Complaint are silent regarding the service of a 19 copy of the Complaint on the accused at the 20 preliminary stage of proceedings. 21 It should be noted that these 22 events are usually accompanied by public notice or 23 knowledge. Therefore, the Board has a policy that 24 a copy of the Complaint be served on the accused 25 by regular mail upon initial receipt, since no	6 1 duty to answer or defend arises until the 2 appropriate finding is made. Pursuant to Section 3 225-10-B, an accused public employee/officer shall 4 not be required to file any response. Although if 5 he or she does, the Board may in its discretion 6 consider such submission in reaching a decision to 7 hold a public hearing as required by the Rules. 8 I past out a copy of the amended 9 Financial Disclosure Statements filed by Mr. 10 Fleming. I'll show you a copy. That looks like 11 what you filed? 12 MR. FLEMING: Yes. 13 MR. JOST: The amended ones. So 14 why don't we mark those into evidence as part of 15 the record? 16 (Amended Financial Disclosure 17 Statements for 2014 through 2017, marked as B-2, 18 in evidence) 19 Again, you are not obligated to 20 say anything, Mr. Fleming. I'm just going through 21 these. There doesn't appear to be much dispute 22 about the facts here. Correct me if anything I 23 say is incorrect. 24 The 2014 amended Financial 25 Disclosure Statements does have the corrected
7 1 information inserted. It has the sources of 2 income for Mr. Fleming and his spouse. I notice 3 that it says Blackrock rather than Blackrock 4 Industries, which I guess was the source of some 5 confusion. Because Blackrock is a large hedge 6 fund or similar type investment organization. 7 Blackrock Industries, apparently, is a company 8 that does some business with the City of New 9 Brunswick. So your wife does not work for 10 Blackrock Industries? 11 MR. FLEMING: No. 12 MR. JOST: Therefore, she's not 13 involved in any way with the City. I notice that 14 on this 2014 you put Hamilton Township. It is 15 actually the Hamilton Board of Education? 16 MR. FLEMING: Board of Ed. 17 MR. JOST: 99 Park Avenue would be 18 understood as the Board of Education. 19 You also did list your residence of 20 21 North Pennington as property owned by yourself 21 and your spouse. So that appears to have been 22 corrected. 23 The 2015 FDS also has the same 24 information. In that one you actually put down 25 Hamilton Township Board of Education. You did	8 1 list your real estate there, and the other 2 information. 3 The 2016, you likewise corrected 4 the information. You have your sources of income, 5 your spouse's source of income. There was a fee 6 or honorarium from a church, from a single source, 7 for a personal appearance, feature or writing 8 listed. There is your residence listed as real 9 estate owned by yourself and your spouse. 10 Then finally the 2017, which was 11 amended. By the way, these were amended, it looks 12 like, all on the same date, which was January 13 23rd, 2018. With the exception of the 2014 14 Financial Disclosure Statement, which I guess 15 was--I'm not sure. That says 2-26-18. That was 16 actually done today? 17 MR. FLEMING: Right. 18 MR. JOST: Better late than never. 19 Going back to 2017, it looks like that is now-- 20 apparently the mistakes have been corrected. 21 So I don't want to put words in 22 your mouth. Are you indicating that essentially 23 the information that you had previously inserted 24 was-- 25 MR. FLEMING: No. I think we were

9 1 here in 2015. Like I said, I had previously stated 2 before and I'm going to state it right now just 3 for the record, that there was no information 4 before we dealt with--when we changed over the 5 systems. 6 I have no financial gain to gain 7 from this. I mean, my wife works for Blackrock. 8 As far as I know, she went from Merrill Lynch to 9 Blackrock. Maybe I'm at fault for not asking her, 10 is it Blackrock Corporation, Blackrock Industries. 11 I ask you to look at this, what did 12 I actually have to gain from this? What do I have 13 to gain from saying she works for Blackrock or 14 Blackrock Industries? Just like I said, she works 15 for Blackrock. I go there, I pull up and the sign 16 says Blackrock there. We're not as detailed--you 17 know, we're not detailed as we should be 18 sometimes. 19 So I had no financial gain from 20 that. There was nothing from that. I had no 21 financial gain to say that the only property that 22 I own right now is my house. As if I'm 23 hiding--where I'm neighbors with some people, as 24 if I'm hiding my house. 25 Previously I said there was no	10 1 reason for me to hide the fact, which is my 2 biography and everything else, I've been in the 3 public eye for a long time, that I'm a teacher. 4 I've been a teacher for a very long time. And 5 everybody knows that I'm a councilman. 6 Yeah, I've made mistakes before. 7 But right now this Board is being used as a 8 political bludgeon. You know, it's, like, what 9 happens is, I get accused of something. Then we 10 have to call the Board together. It goes out into 11 the public. 12 You know, even though it gets 13 cleared or whatever happens, it will always be 14 that thing now where I have kids now who can read, 15 and and go look at what you've been charged with. 16 It's, like, not even the point of 17 if it is true or not. It's the point that you 18 have to come in and defend it. 19 I'm stating right now for the 20 record, I've been in public office for a very 21 long. I've been coaching and I've been in this 22 community for almost fifty years. 23 Never ever have I been accused of 24 something like that until I got into the political 25 eye. Why? Because we might have a political
11 1 disagreement with people, so now all of a sudden 2 it becomes I'm unethical or I'm breaking some type 3 of law. I haven't done that. You can lookup my 4 record and stuff like that. 5 But the point is, that you even 6 have to come and defend it. It's like, people ask 7 the question, a public question you go into a 8 debate, okay, when did you stop beating up your 9 girlfriend? It is not the point that it is true. 10 It's the point that you have to defend that. 11 When that goes out into the 12 public sphere, it goes out into the atmosphere, 13 and people will hear it and may even believe a 14 little bit of it. 15 I'm stating right now for the 16 record that there was nothing here that was 17 untoward, that said, okay, you know what, I'm 18 going to hide the fact that I'm a teacher. Even 19 though everybody knows I'm a teacher for the last 20 twenty-three years. It's been in the public eye. 21 I'm going to hide where my wife 22 works at for one word, Blackrock or Blackrock 23 Industries? For all I know it could be Blackrock 24 Incorporated. I was just, like, she works for 25 Blackrock. So we put it on the statement and	12 1 that's what it was. 2 Okay, we dropped the word now. 3 Does that change the thing? It is not like she's 4 trying to do business with the City or anything 5 like that. I didn't even want to bring her into 6 it. Now it brings her into the public sphere now. 7 Because now it's like I'm trying to hide my 8 family. That's when it definitely brings my family 9 into it. So that's how I feel. 10 That's all I'm going to say right 11 now. I ask you to look at it. And see if you 12 really think I'm trying to make any type of 13 financial gain, try to do anything untoward or try 14 to cover-up anything. 15 MR. JOST: Okay. Thank you. Does 16 the Board have any questions, specific questions, 17 that they want to ask Mr. Fleming? He doesn't 18 have to say anything at this point. He's pretty 19 much laid his cards on the table at this point. 20 In the interest of expediting the 21 matter, I guess I will ask him if he would answer 22 any questions if they had any? 23 MR. FLEMING: Or I can remain 24 silent. Sure, no problem. 25 MR. JOST: By the way, just raise

13 1 your hand. Do you swear to tell the truth? 2 MR. FLEMING: The whole truth and 3 nothing but the truth. 4 MR. JOST: Does anybody have any 5 questions they want to ask? 6 THE CHAIR: I think it's pretty 7 clear. 8 MR. JOST: It doesn't look like it. 9 I don't see anybody raising their hands, all 10 right. Yeah, I mean, it is a pretty straight 11 forward matter. 12 I guess according to the 13 procedure of the Board we should probably adjourn 14 to executive session and discuss briefly what you 15 feel should be appropriate in this matter. 16 REVEREND RELLA: Does it have to be 17 read in what we talked about as far as-- 18 MR. JOST: We can talk about it in 19 executive session. 20 REVEREND RELLA: Executive session, 21 okay. 22 MR. JOST: Can we have a motion to 23 go into executive session? 24 REVEREND RELLA: Motion to go into 25 executive session at this point.	14 1 MR. JOST: Motion by Frank. Who's 2 going to second that? 3 BROTHER JUDE LASOTA: Second. 4 MR. JOST: Brother Jude. All right, 5 roll call. Donna? 6 MS. PINCAVAGE: Yes. 7 MR. JOST: Anthony is not here. 8 Claribel? 9 MS. ASCONA-BARBER: Yes. 10 MR. JOST: Reverend Lauren? 11 THE CHAIR: Yes. 12 MR. JOST: Brother Jude? 13 BROTHER LASOTA: Yes. 14 MR. JOST: Reverend Frank? 15 REVEREND RELLA: Yes. 16 MR. JOST: We will go into executive 17 session. 18 Now we will adjourn to the 19 executive session. 20 (Recess takes place) 21 All right. I think we are going 22 back on the record. Do we have a motion to go 23 back into public session? 24 MS. AZCONA-BARBER: I make a motion 25 to come back into public session.
15 1 MR. JOST: Clari. Is there a second? 2 BROTHER LASOTA: I'll second it. 3 MR. JOST: Seconded by Brother 4 Jude. Donna-- 5 THE CHAIR: Mr. Fleming-- 6 MR. JOST: Sorry, roll call. Donna? 7 THE CHAIR: Here. 8 MR. JOST: Reverend Lauren? 9 REVEREND CARRINGTON: Here. 10 MR. JOST: Clari? 11 MS. AZCONA: Here. 12 MR. JOST: Brother Jude? 13 BROTHER LASOTA: Here. 14 MR. JOST: Reverend Frank? 15 REVEREND RELLA: Yes. 16 MR. JOST: Now, Donna. 17 MS. PINCAVAGE: Mr. Fleming, the 18 Board has looked at all of your Financial 19 Disclosure Statements, and the fact that, you 20 know, you have made changes to the Financial 21 Disclosure Statements. 22 We don't feel that you 23 intentionally did anything wrong here, that it was 24 just errors. And we want to warn you not to do 25 that again. That in the future all of your	16 1 statements should be completed. And at this time 2 we feel that you made all corrections that you 3 needed to make and we're satisfied with that. 4 Anyone else want to comment? 5 THE CHAIR: I just concur. I know 6 I'm not a detailed person either, so I understand. 7 You've got to pay attention to the details. We 8 know that you were not trying to do anything to 9 hide anything or have some excessive gains from 10 what you did. We appreciate your service to the 11 community. 12 MR. FLEMING: Thank you. 13 MR. JOST: Any other comments? 14 REVEREND RELLA: I concur. 15 MR. JOST: Okay. I'll read 16 something and then we can have the Board vote on 17 it. 18 This matter comes before the 19 Board on the Complaint of Mr. Kratovil, Charles 20 Kratovil. It basically charges that Mr. Fleming 21 failed to include required information on his CFRs 22 for the years 2014 through 2017. 23 We have already discussed the 24 details of those omissions earlier in the meeting. 25 Mr. Fleming voluntarily came before the Board.

17 1 He, quite candidly admitted to the Board that he 2 had omitted certain information, apparently 3 inadvertently. 4 The Board has looked at this matter 5 and does not see any possible attempt to conceal 6 any damaging or inculpatory information that might 7 disclose any conflict on the part of Mr. Fleming 8 or his family. He's been cooperative with the 9 Board, thus saving time and money for all 10 concerned. 11 It appears to the Board that he is 12 perhaps more aware of the importance of getting 13 this information correct the first time on his 14 Financial Disclosure Statement. 15 The Board recognizes that it is a 16 little bit vexatious sometimes in filling out 17 these forms, but they are there for a purpose and 18 they are important. Therefore, the Board 19 admonishes Mr. Fleming to try to be more accurate 20 in his future statements and not inadvertently 21 omit this information. 22 The Board feels that issuing a 23 warning or admonishment to Mr. Fleming is 24 sufficient in this matter. In that it does not 25 detect any intent to deceive or any deliberate	18 1 malfeasance, at worse only carelessness or a 2 little bit of negligence. 3 So that would be the essence of 4 the finding of the Board. And, in essence, you 5 are issuing a warning to--an admonishment to Mr. 6 Fleming to be more careful in the future. 7 You are satisfied that the 8 Disclosure Statements as they are now filed, 9 appear to be adequate for the purposes intended. 10 So the next thing, I guess, would 11 be for somebody to make a motion to adopt the 12 findings as I have read them. 13 REVEREND RELLA: I'll make a motion 14 to adopt the findings as read. 15 THE CHAIR: I second it. 16 MR. JOST: Okay. Motion by 17 Reverend Frank and second by Donna. All right. 18 Donna? 19 THE CHAIR: Yes. 20 MR. JOST: Anthony is not here. 21 Claribel? 22 MS. AZCONA-BARBER: Yes. 23 MR. JOST: Reverend Lauren? 24 REVEREND CARRINGTON: Yes. 25 MR. JOST: Brother Jude?
19 1 BROTHER LASOTA: Yes. 2 MR. JOST: Reverend Frank? 3 REVEREND RELLA: Yes. 4 MR. JOST: So that is unanimously 5 adopted. I guess that concludes the matter. Thank 6 you for coming and helping us to resolve this 7 matter expeditiously. 8 MR. FLEMING: Thank you, take 9 care. 10 MR. JOST: Hopefully we won't have 11 to see you again. 12 MR. FLEMING: No, in a different 13 light. 14 MR. JOST: If the chair please, is 15 there any new business? 16 THE CHAIR: Does anyone have any 17 new business we need to address? 18 MR. JOST: Apparently not. Is 19 there anything that needs to be discussed? We 20 don't at the present time, I guess, have any 21 additional complaints before us. Although that 22 could change any time. But if that is the case, 23 then there would not appear to be the necessity of 24 scheduling a meeting at this time. 25 THE CHAIR: No.	20 1 MR. JOST: Is there anything else 2 that the Board feels it wants to discuss, any 3 unfinished--I don't know whether any further 4 discussion has been made about the website or 5 anything of that type. 6 REVEREND RELLA: It has not. I 7 will look into it this month, in March. I'll send 8 a report to the Board. 9 MR. JOST: As I mentioned at the 10 last meeting, apparently there are budgetary 11 issues with having a secretary. So I think I've 12 become the de facto secretary. I'll do the best I 13 can with the help of Karen and the legal 14 department, who has been extremely helpful. 15 And the next item. 16 THE CHAIR: We will open the floor 17 for public comment. Yes, Mr. Kratovil. 18 MR. KRATOVIL: Good evening, members 19 of the Board. Charles Kratovil, New Brunswick, 20 complainant in this matter. 21 I want to say thank you for 22 evaluating it. I respect your decision, even 23 though I disagree with it. And I also disagree 24 with the process that was used. 25 So my first question is with regard

21 1 to what was said at the last meeting, that there 2 was going to be a subcommittee that was going to 3 evaluate my complaint. Mr. Jones, who is not 4 here, he was one of the two members. Reverend 5 Rella being the other. What happened to that plan 6 to evaluate it by subcommittee? 7 MR. JOST: There was a conference 8 by phone with the subcommittee. It was discussed 9 in a fair amount of detail. And basically, I 10 think the decision of the Board was consistent 11 with the recommendation of the subcommittee. 12 MR. KRATOVIL: I wanted that for the 13 record. I appreciate that. So just so you all 14 know, the reason I care so much about this and I 15 do-- you know, I did file this Complaint, is 16 because as a journalist these disclosure forms are 17 of critical importance to me to be able to do my 18 job. 19 I go to almost every City Council 20 meeting. I look at almost every resolution that's 21 adopted by that body. And as a watchdog, I have 22 to be able to know when there are conflicts of 23 interest that our elected officials may have. 24 So though the City may not do 25 business with Blackrock at the present moment,	22 1 that could change at any moment. 2 The Council also does deal with 3 matters that may affect real state owned by the 4 elected officials. So Mr. Fleming's property that 5 he failed to disclose, 21 North Pennington Road, 6 is something that on any given day the City 7 Council could be adopting legislation that could 8 impact the value of that property or the quality 9 of life for people who live there. 10 And I think it is important for 11 that information to be disclosed in the proper 12 way, in the proper venue, which is through these 13 disclosure forms. 14 So it is important. This is not 15 something that's unimportant, as I think Mr. 16 Fleming was kind of trying to gloss it over. 17 Further, he stated that he was not 18 enriching himself or getting any benefit from 19 this. And I will point to my Complaint which 20 notes that in 2016 he did vote to increase his 21 salary on the City Council. So he actually has 22 used his position to enrich himself. That's one 23 of the reasons that I found it important to hold 24 him accountable. 25 The other being, of course, that he
23 1 had previously sat in that same chair and been 2 warned by this same Board to take more caution in 3 the future just as he was tonight. 4 Respectfully, I disagree with the 5 decision only to give a warning. I think this was 6 a chance to hold one of the most powerful 7 officials in the City accountable for this very 8 important law that was violated. 9 I think we're not in dispute that 10 the law was violated. But this was a chance 11 to--you know, for the City to get some of that 12 money back that Mr. Fleming got from the 13 taxpayers, because he didn't follow the law. I 14 think that it would have been a good example to 15 others that the law needs to be followed. 16 I also just want to point out 17 that Mr. Fleming mentioned he had never been 18 accused of anything like this until he got into 19 elected office. That really confused me, because 20 he never was required to file disclosure forms 21 until he got into office. And he has screwed them 22 up almost every year since he's been in office. 23 So I think that, you know, a lot 24 of the arguments that Mr. Fleming made were not 25 the type of arguments for someone who would be--I	24 1 didn't hear the word "I'm sorry". You know, I 2 didn't hear the type of, you know, throwing 3 himself on the mercy of the Board, that deserved 4 the type of graciousness that the Board gave him. 5 I think, again, I respect your 6 decision, but disagree with it. I think that he 7 was not exactly apologetic or didn't really take 8 full responsibility for his own errors. He kind 9 of made excuses. 10 And I think in the future when you 11 have somebody powerful who has a complaint against 12 them, you should go through the whole process, 13 have a full hearing, don't have them come up and 14 sit at the table with you. 15 And don't necessarily give them so 16 much leeway, so much of the benefits of the doubt. 17 Because he's paid and this is the law that he has 18 to follow. If he's not going to take ownership of 19 the mistakes he made fully, then you should use 20 your power to implement a punishment which is, in 21 the grand scheme of things, not tremendously 22 significant. 23 I believe the maximum penalty is 24 \$500 per violation. Compared to his City salary, 25 that's a fraction of what he's made from the

25 1 taxpayers already. I think it would have been the 2 right thing to do to hold him accountable for his 3 violations, instead of letting him off with a 4 warning or kind of an admonishment. 5 But nevertheless, I want to thank 6 you for evaluating the complaint, and, you know, 7 look forward to the Ethics Board, you know, 8 getting better and better. 9 I do think that the Board's come 10 a long way in the time I've been coming to 11 meetings. So I want to thank you for allowing me 12 to speak and for hearing me out. 13 MR. JOST: Just one point, Mr. 14 Kratovil. You're not implying that Mr. Fleming 15 voting for his salary increase was in any way 16 illegal, are you? 17 MR. KRATOVIL: I don't know that it 18 violated the law. But I do know that it violates 19 the best practice that a government body should 20 never increase its own pay, certainly not 21 retroactively as was done. And typically, like, 22 there is actually a constitutional amendment that 23 prevents congress from doing such a thing. 24 It requires them to adopt any 25 raise to take effect after the next election, so	26 1 that you are not giving yourself a raise. It 2 certainly looks bad and rubbed me the wrong way as 3 a taxpayer citizen. 4 MR. JOST: I understand your 5 personal feelings. But in reality, numerous times 6 governing bodies, including the state legislature, 7 vote themselves increases. And, you know, it is 8 a tricky, touchy subject, admittedly, because you 9 are voting yourself a raise out of the public 10 treasury. But ultimately, I guess the gist of the 11 law is that that's a matter for the voters to 12 decide when they cast their next ballot. 13 REVEREND RELLA: Do you mind if I 14 just say something, just to answer one thing that 15 you stated. I don't think we took it lightly. 16 An admonishment for a politician is a big thing. 17 Whether it is one cent or ten thousand dollars, 18 the Board is saying that he did something wrong. 19 I think that's something that the 20 public is going to see and hear about. Certainly 21 through your journalism, they are going to hear 22 about it. It is not something that we take 23 lightly. \$500 is a drop in the bucket for most 24 people, especially people who are professionals. 25 However, what comes with that is not a drop in the
27 1 bucket. I think that, you know, whether we fine 2 him one cent, zero or \$500, it is a big deal. 3 MR. KRATOVIL: I appreciate you 4 finding that the law was violated and you 5 admonishing him for it. Hopefully, I hope it 6 never happens again. 7 REVEREND RELLA: Me too. 8 THE CHAIR: Any other public 9 comment? 10 MS. MC KOY: I just don't think--my 11 name is Juanita Mc Koy, M-c K-o-y. I just don't 12 feel like the Board--the Ethical Board did state 13 that he was-- that you can't agree with what he 14 did. I came here because there are some issues 15 with the way he has handled a lot of things. I'm 16 a person that was going to speak to some of the 17 things that I've experienced. But it looks like 18 you are not going to hold him accountable for 19 anything, any wrongs that he's done and my issues 20 go pretty deep. And him being a politician-- 21 MR. JOST: Well, this Board only 22 deals with specific complaints filed regarding 23 specific matters. If there are other issues that 24 you have with this gentleman, you always have the 25 right to file your own complaint.	28 1 MS. MC KOY: And I certainly will do 2 that. But you set a tone, you set a tone today. 3 What you told me was that, you know, okay, 4 whatever he did, you kind of, like, patted in on 5 his hand and you had him walk away. You clearly 6 found that he did wrong, but you didn't do nothing 7 about it. 8 REVEREND RELLA: Well, we did do 9 something about it. If your Complaint is more 10 serious, then we'll consider that. We're not 11 going to-- 12 MS. MC KOY: I have no faith in that 13 now. 14 REVEREND RELLA: It's not one 15 judgment fits all. If there's something else going 16 on, we certainly want to hear about that, and 17 we'll address it. 18 MS. MC KOY: Thank you, but I have 19 little faith in that, from what I witnessed today. 20 REVEREND RELLA: Okay. 21 MR. JOST: I think, ma'am--I don't 22 know if it's my place to articulate your thoughts, 23 but I think the Board took into consideration the 24 fact that the gentleman voluntarily came before 25 you. He had corrected the documents that were

29 1 incorrect, and I thought candidly admitted they 2 were incorrect previously. I got the impression 3 that you took that under consideration. But, you 4 know, that's the conclusion of the matter, so it 5 is really surplus at this point. 6 THE CHAIR: If there are issues 7 that you want to file a Complaint about, I would 8 ask that you would do so. I hear that you don't 9 want to do anything because of what you've seen 10 today. But I wouldn't let that stop you if you 11 feel that it is something that serious that you 12 wanted to file a complaint for.
