Dear Mr. Radwan,

The Carteret Police Department received your OPRA Records Act (**N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1** (OPRA) dated, February 20, 2021. The Carteret Police Department's Official Records Custodian, Captain Jeffrey VanWoeart received your OPRA Records Act (**N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1**) dated, February 20, 2021. Items 1 and 2 were supplied by Captain Michael Dammann . An extension was required for item 3 until April 7, 2021 by Captain Michael Dammann.

The following specific records have been requested:

1. Email logs for police officer LT John Kelly from 1/1/2014 to 3/31/2016.
2. Email logs for police officer Joseph Reiman from 4/1/2015 to 8/31/2017.
3. ALL Body camera footage for police officer Joseph Reiman from 11/21/2015 to 4/1/2016.

Records responsive to this request.

3. Your request for all body camera footage for Officer Joseph Reiman from 11/21/2015 to 4/1/2016 is being reviewed for legal compliance.

Enacted on March 20, 2020, P.L. 2020, c. 10 amended **N.J.S.A 47:1A-5(i)** as follows: during a period declared pursuant to the laws of this State as a state of emergency, public health emergency, or state of local disaster emergency, the deadlines by which to respond to a request for, or grant or deny access to, a government record under paragraph (1) of this subsection or subsection e. of this section shall not apply, however, that the custodian of a government record

shall make a reasonable effort, as the circumstances permit, to respond to a request for access to a government record within seven business days or as soon as possible thereafter.

(ID. AT (2).)

P.L. 2020, c. 10 provides that OPRA's statutory deadlines do not apply for the duration of a Governor-declared state of emergency pursuant to the Disaster Control Act (N.S.S. A. App.A.9-33 et seq.) or a public health emergency under the Emergency Health Powers Act (N.J.S.A. 26:13-1 et seq.), or when a state of local disaster emergency is declared by a county or by a municipality. Further, the new amendment requires custodians to make a "reasonable effort" to respond to an OPRA request during that time. However, the amendment also adds that any custodian with the ability to follow the deadlines as set forth in N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5(e) and 5(i) should do so.

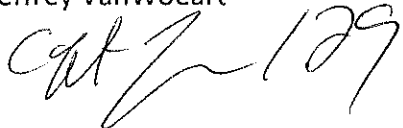
In furtherance of a custodian's "reasonable effort," the GRC notes that an available response option is to take extensions of time as needed. **Due to COVID-19**, the staff of our department is limited. The size of your request is voluminous and therefore requires additional time beyond the seven (7) business days to fulfill. OPRA allows custodians to seek extension of time pursuant to N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5.I. Specifically, OPRA states that, "the requestor shall be advised by the custodian when the record can be made available. If the record is not made available by that time, access shall be deemed denied."

Because the volume and workload regarding fulfilling item 3 your request requires an extension of time until June 19, 2021.

If your request for access to a government record has been denied or unfilled within seven (7) business days by law, you have the right to challenge the decision by the Carteret Police Department to deny access. At your option, you may either institute a proceeding in the Superior Court of New Jersey or file a complaint with the Government Records Council (GRC) by completing the Denial of Access Complaint form.
