nance will go towards construction, reconstruction, and improvement of the town's sanitary and storm water sewer system at the aforementioned streets.

Park improvements

Another \$1.2 million in the ordinance will go toward reconstructing, renovating, and improving various township parks.

The ordinance also budgets \$400,000 of that park money for renovation work at 38th Street Park to match a pending application from the town for \$500,000 from the Hudson County Open Space Trust Fund. This is because the township estimates the total cost of work at that park to be \$900,000.

Officials also budgeted \$500,000 in the ordinance's park funds for work at the 64th Street Field. "We have a million dollars in [state] Green Acres funding," Pianese said. "We're applying to CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) for \$400,000."

If the CDBG funds are approved, it would fully fund that project's total \$1.9 million cost.

New township vehicles coming

The bond ordinance also budgets \$170,000 for a new DPW salt spreader. It also budgets money to replace two antiquated township buses: a 24-passenger recreational bus, budgeted for \$60,000; and a 32 passenger senior bus, budgeted for \$125,000.

The town is budgeting another \$130,000 for a new EMS ambulance through the ordinance, which it hopes to acquire by May, Pianese said.

"Based on the type of terrain being hills, we find that we constantly need to improve and upgrade our fleet and keep it as new as we can," Pianese said.

Streamlined policing

The ordinance budgets \$150,000 for a Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system for the North Bergen Police Department.

The CAD system will concentrate police and ambulance calls in town, and keep permanent records of those calls under one computerized system, according to officials.

"Basically, it's a huge database, and it's connected to our phone system," said North Bergen Police Department Deputy Chief Peter Fasillis, after the meeting. "It's the centralized management system for all our records."

The CAD will feature computerized crime mapping. Currently, officers have to manually map out crime locations to pinpoint problem areas. The CAD will map calls automatically.

"So whenever a job comes in at a certain location, it automatically puts it onto the map," Fasillis explained. "Say there's a lot of vandalism going on in one section of town. It'll start populating these little dots, and they'll have different colors and different symbols to indicate what kind of

crimes are occurring in an area."

Red spots indicate more crime and disorder in a given area, so officers can concentrate efforts there.

"In today's day and age, it's a tool that major cities can't do without," Fasillis said.

The company that provides the town's current dispatch system—the Queues Enforth Development (QED)—is based in Massachusetts, but the company that provides the CAD system is based in New Jersey.

"Tech support is really expensive," Fasillis said. "For training, we either have to go out there or bring people here, which costs money. You have to pay for room and board, travel expenses, and whatnot."

Currently, the department has different systems for departments such as fingerprint data and property and evidence. That means if something is logged into one system, it does not communicate directly with other systems. The CAD concentrates all these different systems into one, easily accessible spot, Fasillis said.

Officers will also be able to access the CAD via mobile app in the field. Most police departments that have used the QED in New Jersey are transitioning to the CAD, according to Fasillis.

The department's transition to the CAD should start in April, according to Township Administrator Chris Pianese. The department hopes to have it operational by late August.

Five-alarm fire tears through North Bergen building, displacing 12 families

A five alarm fire displaced 12 families after tearing through a multi-unit residence on 26th Street Friday, March 2, according to North Hudson Regional Fire and Rescue (NHRFR) Battalion Chief Mark Lorenz, speaking at the scene. According to a press release from NHRFR spokesman Dan Knitzer, the fire broke out at 1200 26th Street just before 11:45 a.m. Frigid wind and rain conditions contributed to it becoming a five-alarm blaze, Knitzer said.

Officials safely evacuated everyone in building 1200 and two buildings next door, Knitzer said. However, one firefighter was treated for a minor burn, he said. The two other buildings also sustained structural damage to a lesser degree, Knitzer said.

The visible body of fire was knocked down at 1:23 p.m. NHRFR dispatched 15 pieces of equipment, including engines, ladders, a rescue company and a safety company, and deployed a deputy chief and three battalion chiefs to the site. Hoboken, Jersey City, and Kearny Fire Departments brought in a combined four engines and two ladders to assist.

"We have no idea how it started," Lorenz said around 3 p.m., when the fire had already been fully extinguished.

"Right now, we have one building with serious damage," he said. "We have a minor extension into the building next door.

There was some damage there."

First responders from Union City, West New York, and the Hudson County Sheriff's Office also offered help at the scene.

"The Township of North Bergen is working closely with the American Red Cross and NB CARES to get any families affected into hotels and get them the supplies needed as soon as possible," said North Bergen Mayor Nicholas Sacco, in a statement.

The town also ordered lunch for the residents while the North Bergen Police Department secured the area and North Hudson Regional Fire and Rescue battled the fire, Sacco said.

Local community assistance program NB CARES is also offering assistance to the affected families, according to NB CARES coordinator Aimee Focaraccio.

"I just saw a lot of smoke coming from the next building," said Alex Garcia, who resides in the 1210 26th St. building next door, after his safe evacuation. He said he left the building at 12:30 p.m., but was not sure whether or not his apartment was safe.

"Not to my knowledge," he said.

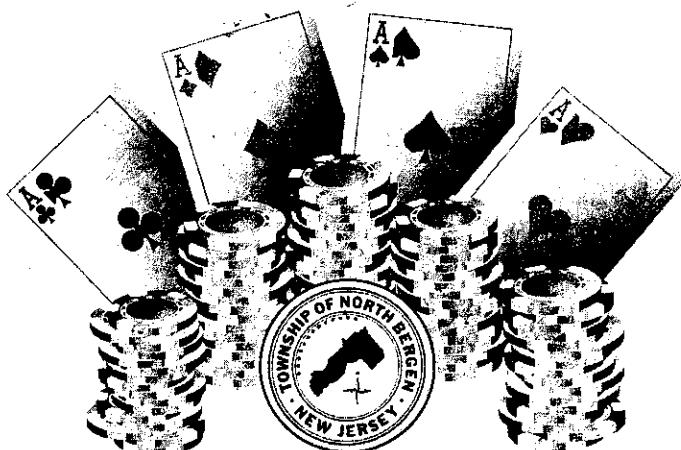

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To legalize or not?

First hearing on recreational marijuana held in area

Proponents and opponents came together in Jersey City on Feb. 21 for the first of a planned series of hearings across the state to discuss the possible legalization of marijuana in New Jersey.

Led by State Sen. Ronald Rice, chair of the N.J. Legislative Black Caucus, the hearing included State Senators Sandra Cunningham and Nina Gill, Assemblywoman Angela McKnight, and others.

The hearing was to collect information and hear differing points of view.

"I'm familiar with the issue, because Montclair, which I represent, was one of the first communities in the state to provide medical marijuana," Gill said.

Last year, Democratic candidate Phil Murphy said he supported legalization, something that has been done in a number of other states including Colorado, Washington, Alaska, and recently, California.

But a number of municipalities and counties have announced that they will not allow legalized marijuana, posing serious legal hurdles and complicating the social justice aspect of a proposed bill currently working its way through the state legislature.

While the majority of those who attended the hearing in Jersey City at the Cityline Church appeared to support legalization (many handing out lit-

erature or holding informal information sessions on the sidewalk outside), the hearing had a number of opponents, including a former Ocean County prosecutor, a mother whose son had died as direct impact of marijuana use, and a nationally recognized author on the impact of marijuana.

This about social justice, not tax revenues

One of the elements that make legalization of marijuana attractive to legislators is the tax benefit the state might expect. One group estimates it could be as much as \$300 million.

Sen. Rice said these hearings were not about finance, but about social justice, and how to address the fact that many people of color are charged and imprisoned for use or possession of marijuana.

He said three times as many people of color are incarcerated for crimes related to marijuana as whites. And these people often face harsh sentences.

According to a fact sheet issued by the New Jersey United for Marijuana Reform (NJUMR), a pro-legalization lobby, 25,000 arrests are made in New Jersey each year.

Rice said the hearings are an attempt to gather information about whether or not legalizing marijuana will help remedy the situation.

Opponents and proponents — some from as far away as California — offered

testimony to the panel on the downside or benefit of legalizing marijuana. At times, one side disputed what the other claimed as fact.

New Jersey has a number of options. It could legalize marijuana, decriminalize it, or do nothing at all and leave the current system in place.

Clashing views

The majority of the audience appeared to support legalization. However, members of Smart Approach to Marijuana (SAM) testified in opposition, citing a number of unresolved issues in what is still largely an unknown landscape, and presented their case as to

why the state should delay legalizing marijuana until more is known.

As Rice and others noted, the legal landscape is precarious as best.

Marijuana, for instance, is considered illegal by the federal government, in the same class as heroin, cocaine, and LSD. So if New Jersey was to legalize marijuana, no one living in a federally-subsidized building could legally use the drug in their home.

Marijuana could follow the legal guidelines that govern alcohol use. Public consumption will likely be

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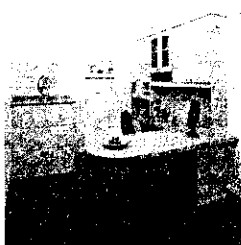

During that meeting, according to one student present, a student asked Tennaro a question, but the principal "accused that student of being insubordinate. And then they were yelling at each other back forth," Sihombing said.

Video sent to the Reporter, which a student said was taken at the meeting, includes audio of Tennaro cutting a student off and saying, "No, it's my school, and you're going to be subordinate to me." The camera briefly shows Tennaro's face.

"I don't recall saying that," Tennaro said last week. "But I could've said that." Senior Class President Arianna Diaz said that the sitdown students had sat in on walkout planning meetings, but never spoke up about their plans.

Despite the back and forth between the students and administrators, Sihombing said she doesn't want this framed as a "students vs. the principal thing."

"I don't mean to seem like we were undermining Tennaro," she said. "We wanted to have the protest our way to make a stand for gun control."

High-Tech students also walk out

Nearby, High-Tech High School students were staging their own civil disobedience. According to an e-mail from a student who requested his name not be used, the administration threatened suspensions for anyone who did anything beyond the initial walkout.

The students had planned to march to Jersey City's Brennan Courthouse, but changed plans after the alleged threats.

Instead, they held a sitdown inside the school faculty parking lot, beginning after the walkout to until 1:30, sans administrative approval.

"That comment is totally false," responded High Tech High School Principal Joseph Giammarella, regarding any suspension threats. "We never considered suspensions. We followed school policy and rules."

Giammarella added that the school security worked to protect the students during their sitdown.

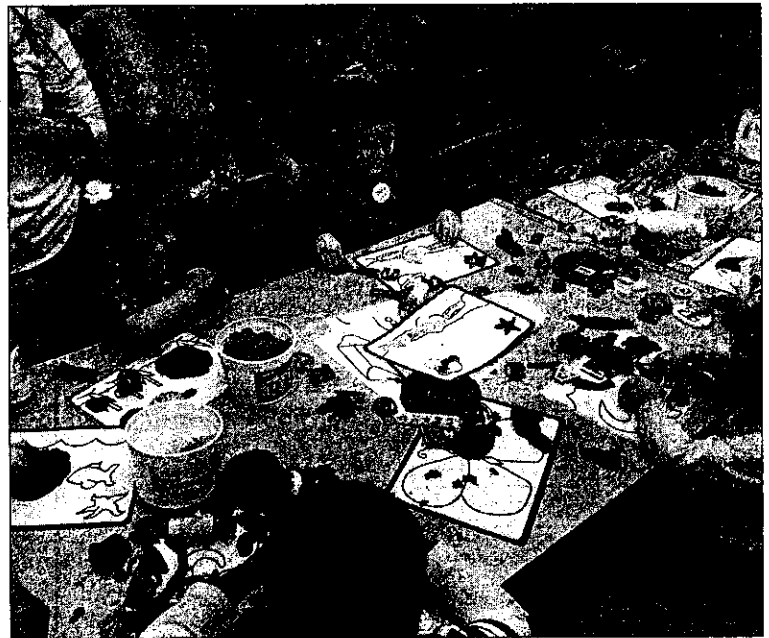

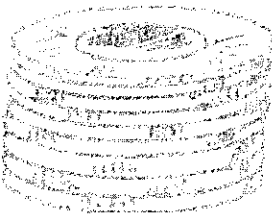

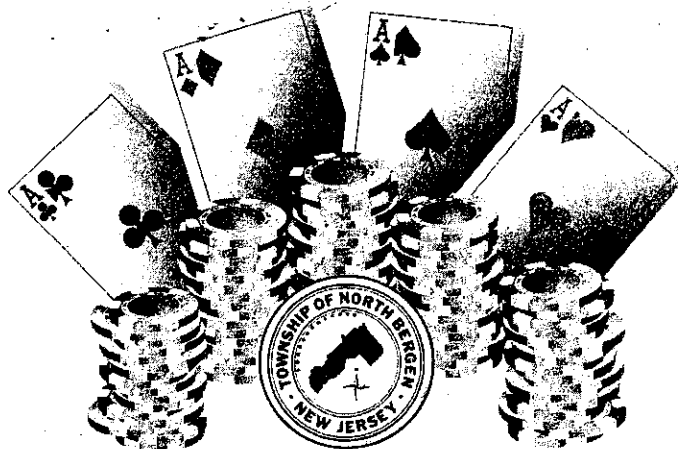

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Statewide honors for reporting, advertising, art

Reporter chain wins 22 journalism awards

The Hudson Reporter newspapers recently won 22 awards in the New Jersey Press Association's annual statewide contest.

Members of the art and sales staffs won 11 awards for work that appeared in the seven editions of the Reporter and the Bayonne Community News. The reporters won 10 awards for their stories, and a freelancer won a first-place photography honor.

investigative news, or local meeting stories. Even the little things, like highlighting student achievements, matter."

Writing and reporting

In the editorial contest, Senior Staff Writer Al Sullivan amassed five awards for stories in the Jersey City Reporter. In the Responsible Journalism-Public Service Category, he earned first place for a story headlined "Sanctuary, No Ban, County Conflicted, Fearing the Knock" about the impact of the Trump Administration's restrictive immigration policies on Hudson County's émigré population.

He received another first place in the First Amendment category for "Loose lips sink bids," detailing an alleged attempt by staffers in Jersey City's City Hall to influence a bid.

Sullivan was also given three awards in the Reporting-Writing & Illustration category. He won second place for coverage of crime and police news for "This is ugly," about a botched drug robbery that resulted in three murders. For interpretive writing, he was given third place for "What happened on Tonelle Avenue," covering the alleged brutality, caught on video, to an innocent bystander of a police chase. For education writing, he was awarded third place for "A living lab," describing how students are using a

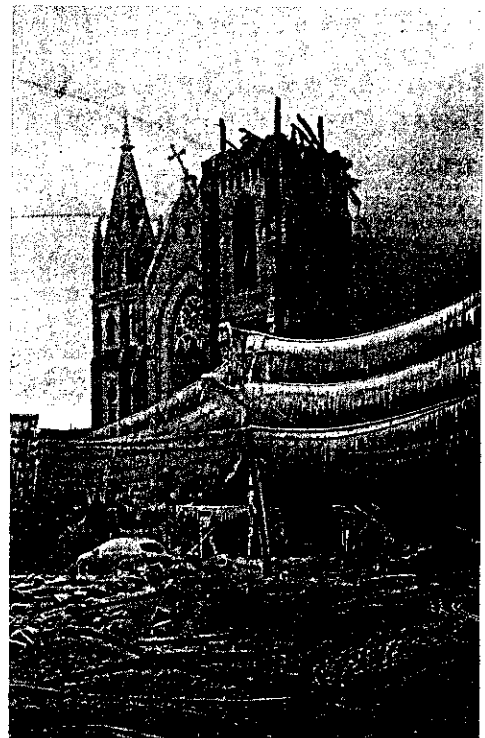
former city reservoir, now a nature preserve, to learn ecology.

"Meaningful stories often come from being in the right place at the right time," Sullivan said. "Since Jersey City is the epicenter of the immigration conflict, opportunities to cover it in a number of aspects are abundant. This is also true for the crime stories. Gun violence in Jersey City mirrors the national issue. Other stories such as 'Loose Lips Sink Bids,' result from having good sources willing to leak important information. Our news organization is doing everything possible to live up to the concept of responsible journalism."

Staff Writer Rory Pasquariello was awarded first place for Business and Economic Writing for "Bitcoin is here," which examines how merchants in Hudson County are using digital currency.

In the Spot News Photography category, Victor M. Rodriguez won first place for a picture of a fire, which appeared in The North Bergen Reporter, titled "Fire and Ice." Kate Rounds, editor of the Hudson Reporter magazines, said, "Victor has shot many beautiful pictures for our three magazines. This haunting image is typical of his fine work."
