■ TETERBORO CRASH

THE NTSB on Wednesday released a 900-page report about a plane crash just south of Teterboro Airport on May 15, 2017.

NTSB report offers no conclusion in Learjet crash that killed crew

WASHINGTON — As the Learjet approached Teterboro Airport last May, a crew member kept calling "airspeed, airspeed, airspeed," followed by a scream of "ahhh" as the plane crashed short of the runway.

That's according to the cockpit voice recording released Wednesday by the federal National Transportation Safety Board, part of 900 pages of documents about the crash that killed the pilot and co-pilot, the only two people on board.

The report offers no conclusions on what caused the crash. The safety board found no drugs in either of the two pilots, nor did the voice recording indicate that anything was amiss before the final approach to the airport in

winds that were gusting to as much as 35 mph.

The recording indicates that after the plane was cleared to land, the Teterboro tower asked whether the pilot was making the turn required to line up to the runway.

"You going to start that turn?" the tower said.

"Yes sir, we're doing it right now," the cockpit responded.

After the plane made the turn, witnesses said the plane was in an "uncontrolled descent" before it crashed, the NTSB said.

Jim Silliman, an NTSB investigator, said in May that it appeared "the aircraft, at that last moment, was out of control."

The plane crashed short of the airport in an industrial section of Carlstadt, setting three buildings and more than a dozen cars on fire.

State: Ex-Lyndhurst teacher, coach loses license after guilty porn plea

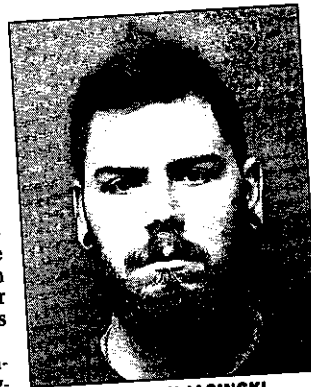

A former Lyndhurst High School substitute teacher who was accused of sharing porn with young girls has had his teaching credentials revoked by the state.

Jonathan Jasinski was previously a full-time substitute teacher, in-school suspension officer, and assistant coach for the hockey and baseball teams at Lyndhurst High School.

Jasinski, who was 26 and unemployed at the time the charges were brought, resigned from his jobs at the high school before he was arrested.

"The investigation revealed that Jasinski utilized the internet and social media applications to communicate with several juvenile females," then-Bergen County Prosecutor Gurbir S. Grewal said at the time. "He also exchanged sexually explicit

videos and photographs with these juveniles."

In September last year, Jasinski pleaded guilty to endangering the welfare of children, according to the State Board of Examiners.

As part of the plea, he is disqualified from public school

employment and the state revoked his substitute credential, which would have expired in two years.

He was also sentenced to five years in prison, but the term was suspended.

"He was sentenced to a term of five years in state prison, but he won't be required to serve that sentence. It will remain suspended, unless or until he does something to violate his condition of release," said Remi Spencer, a criminal defense attorney.

In addition, he is required to register for Megan's Law and have parole supervision for life but he is able to apply for termination of each of these after years.

He was also ordered not to have contact with the victim. Lyndhurst School District declined to comment. Jasinski's attorney did not return multiple requests for comment.

Council makes local labor unions a priority

BAYONNE — The city council voted unanimously Wednesday in favor of an ordinance that will require local labor unions work on private developments in the city.

According to the ordinance, private developers of residential and commercial projects that receive tax abatements and exceed a cost of \$15 million will now be required to enter into project labor agreements (PLAs) with local labor unions seeking jobs on project sites.

"This benefits all of the union trades — close to 15 locals in the county," said Patrick Kelleher, president of the Hudson County Building & Construction Trades Council. "It's an opportunity for residents to be on these projects because the City of Bayonne has the largest contingent of union members in the state."

The agreement mandates that 20 percent of the hired workforce

come from Bayonne or Hudson County labor unions.

Mayor Jimmy Davis, in a statement, called the agreement

"historic" and "one of the most sweeping and effective union labor mandates in the state."

"Bayonne is in the middle of a

complete revitalization that will mean \$10 million in new tax revenue and higher property values for homeowners when it's all said and done, and now we've made sure that local Bayonne workers will also be some of the primary beneficiaries of our city's renaissance," he said.

Dozens of local union workers packed the council chambers Wednesday night to advocate for the ordinance. It passed unanimously to cheers and applause within the council chambers.

Thomas Hurley, a representative for Local 253, a carpenters union associated with the buildings and construction council that represents approximately 150 city residents, said the ordinance provides a sense of security for union workers.

"We're here to support this so we can ensure the opportunity to bring work to the residents who live here so they can afford to live here and keep community dollars circulating within the

community," he said outside City Hall prior to the meeting.

Some laborers, however, questioned why an ordinance such as this took so long to pass.

The agreement drew similar from former Assemblyman James O'Donnell, who is looking to seat Davis in the May 8 municipal election.

He previously called the proposal "completely disingenuous and a 'campaign stunt' that is 'insult to the intelligence of every working man and woman' in Bayonne and to members of organized labor in the state."

In a previous interview, Davis rebuked that criticism, claiming he had been working to create PLAs but was monitoring the status of an ongoing federal law against a similar PLA agreement proposed by Jersey City.

"No one has challenged that's when we said 'OK, we have a format we can follow,'" Davis' campaign manager, Joe Marco, said.

Model from N.J. found dead in Texas apartment

Houston police are investigating the death of a model from New Jersey who was found dead in her home of a gunshot wound.

Danielle Chaney, 20, was found in her apartment by her boyfriend about 5:10 p.m. on Feb. 2, according to a news release from the city's police department. Chaney is from Englewood.

"Ms. Chaney was found by her boyfriend lying on her bed inside her apartment," Houston police said in a statement. "She had sustained a gunshot wound to the head. The boyfriend stated he brought Chaney outside to render aid before paramedics arrived and transported her to the hospital."

Chaney died at the hospital. The boyfriend was not identified by police.

News video taken of the outside of Chaney's apartment after the shooting show a window apparently shattered by gunfire and another window left open.

Chaney lived about 15 miles from downtown Houston and was pursuing a career as a model, according to her Facebook page.

"Success over everything," she wrote on the social media site.

Her grieving mother Betty Harris told ABC13 the family needs to know the details of Danielle's death and asked anyone with information to contact police.

A funeral was held last week in Englewood with burial in Mount Rest Cemetery in Butler, according to an obituary.

Houston police say the matter remains under investigation.
