to are first rate," Imperatore said. "They're packerjacks, they're the best in the business. I want to thank the machinists who labor so hard under terrible conditions, which we're trying to ameliorate by finally getting control and possession of our own property at Union Dry Dock in Hoboken. I hope to live long enough to accomplish that mission. I'm asking for support because the conditions our men work under are very, very difficult."

It's been a lengthy dispute between the NY Waterway and the city of Hoboken. At the beginning of June, that dispute culminated in NY Waterway suing the city for the right to construct at Union Dry Dock. That case is ongoing.

Hoboken Mayor Ravi Bhalla has spoken extensively about how the proposed facility would prevent Hoboken from securing its last link of land to maintain a contiguous public space on the city's waterfront. Attorneys representing Hoboken claim that there's an alternative site that could be used as a "stopgap" just south of the current facility instead of Union Dry Dock.

The city offered NY Waterway \$11.6 million for Union Dry Dock, but NY Waterway has no intention of selling.

In 2017, there was talk of Hoboken seizing the land through eminent domain, but the city stopped short of that at Gov. Phil Murphy's request. Last month, Bhalla said that eminent domain might be back on the table in the future.

In an interview with Hudson County View after the christening, Oliver expressed confidence that NY Waterway will be able to secure permission to build the facility at Union Dry Dock.

by representatives of several dozen environmental groups said the project would reverse several decades of environmental progress.

Tittel was particularly worried that the weight of the power plant could break the environmental seal and release the dangerous toxins into the water and air.

The environmentalist are asking Murphy to step in and cancel NJ Transit's plan, saying that a gas generated power plant – even one that meets today's strict environmental air quality standards – is the wrong thing to do.

"Gov. Murphy talked about a resilient approach to providing power," Tittel said. "This

is the opposite of resiliency. This is NJ Transit siding with the fossil fuel industry. This has to be stopped by the governor. You can't fix NJ Transit's problems with dirty fuel."

Progress for NJ Transit?

NJ Transit wants the natural gas-fired power plant in Kearny to help support its microgrid system designed to power important rail lines during weather emergencies and power outages.

The power plant would electrify the tracks and operating controls on NJ Transit's Hudson Bergen Light Rail system, as well as portions of the Morris & Essex line and Northeast Corridor.

While NJ Transit admitted at several presen-

tations that the plant would produce carbon dioxide, the project would support a public transportation network that would ultimately reduce the carbon impact on the environment by taking cars off local roads.

While the project is still going through the public comment period as a step towards approval, NJ Transit hopes start construction in 2021 and have it completed by 2025.

DeGise said development of the Kopper's Koke site will generate hundreds of jobs, both during the construction phase and later as the warehouses are developed. The power plant is expected to create 250 construction jobs and 30 permanent jobs.

The polluted site has long been on the HCIA table for redevelopment, but significant problems such as lack of road access and other issues have kept the site from being restored for use.

History of the site

The Kopper's Company used the site from 1917 to 1979 and it contains a former tar bit, a coal processing area. The worst pollution, however, was done by Standard Chlorine, said DeGise.

The HCIA acquired the site in the 1980s when then Gov. Tom Kean proposed that each county have its own incinerator for disposing of trash. When the idea was scrapped later, the county found itself holding a polluted site nobody wanted.

DeGise said his administration began working aggressively early in 2003 to clean up the property.

ethical standard, and anyone in violation of our policies faces discipline, including potential legal and criminal penalties."

What kind of access does law enforcement have?

Chief Dowd said that the department has been active on social media, and that broadening communication between police and residents via Ring and Neighbors is worth pursuing.

"We're always trying to magnify our community policing, and that's all about getting our message out to people," he said.

Law enforcement will not be able to stream footage of people's front porches with their Ring devices the same way that they would be able to view a CCTV camera in a public place.

In most instances, officers can request Ring footage from residents for an investigation. Without a warrant, residents could provide footage to police departments at their own discretion.

If law enforcement personnel deliver a subpoena or search warrant to the company, Ring would have to provide a user's footage. It's unclear if Ring notifies users that their information has been given to police in response to a court order.

The law enforcement guidelines say that "generally, Ring will not release user information to law enforcement except in response to a valid legal process directed and addressed to Ring. Ring will object to legal process it determines is overbroad, inappropriate, and/or that does not provide Ring with sufficient information to locate responsive records."

The guidelines further state, "Ring distinguishes between content and non-content information. We may produce non-content information in response to a valid subpoena, court order, or search warrant. We do not produce content information in response to subpoenas or court orders. Content information will only

19 municipal budget in a 7-2 vote.

What about the schools?

Council President Lavarro said he could not vote to approve the budget because Jersey City public schools are underfunded, noting that "while the school budget is a balanced budget it is not a fully-funded budget." He added that the council can't give money when no one is asking for it.

In opposing the budget, Solomon said the city should share tax abatement revenue with the school district and noted that it is possible for the council to "find monies in many other ways, too. We don't have to simply just find efficiencies and look at retirements. We can use any number of different tools to fund the schools through this budget."

Solomon said he disagrees with the Jersey City Board of Education's decision not to request funding from the city this year, referring to a July 19 letter to the council written by Superintendent of Schools Franklin Walker. The letter stated that the district no longer wanted additional money from the city because it can't rely on "quick fix solutions," because they would only "delay the inevitable."

"Thank you very much for the offer and opportunity to seek additional funding," Walker wrote. "It is the responsibility of the district, moving forward, to develop a process and structure for fiscal responsibility that is sustainable over time."

This came after a May resolution, passed by the Jersey City Board of Education, asking the city to help fund the district by increasing the city's cost-sharing contributions.

Solomon said he disagrees with the board's decision not to request additional funds because it doesn't "represent the best interests of the city at all."

The city says the new budget includes \$38 million in new funding sources for the Jersey City Public Schools, \$27 million of which

come from the city's new payroll tax.

State Sen. Sandra Cunningham introduced legislation last year, which was signed into law by Gov. Phil Murphy, allowing Jersey City to implement a payroll tax to help offset the cost of cuts in school funding.

The payroll tax ordinance, which was approved by the council in November 2018 and went into effect in January 2019, imposes a 1 percent payroll tax on an employer's gross payroll to benefit Jersey City public schools. Employers are required to file and pay the new tax on a quarterly basis.

The budget also includes \$8 million from the municipal budget for the school district, and \$3 million in shared services such as trash

pickup, which the city does for the district free of charge.

Mayor Fulop said the city and the Municipal Utilities Authority are also working to provide more shared services, including possibly helping to replace some of the districts school building's water pipes, which currently contain lead resulting in undrinkable water.

Living tradition

Hoboken Italian Festival begins Sept. 5

Balancing religious tradition with a fun-filled festival, the Hoboken Italian Festival returns Thursday, Sept. 5 celebrating the Madonna Dei Martiri.

The annual festival, organized by the Hoboken Society of the Madonna Dei Martiri, has honored the Madonna of Martyrs for the past 93 years.

The festival will be held from Thursday, Sept. 5 through Sunday, Sept. 8 on Pier A Park and the waterfront walkway along Sinatra Drive.

La Festa di Madonna Dei Martiri will include a host of activities, including live musical performances, fireworks, rides, a grape stomping contest, and a citywide procession of the 800-pound statue of the Madonna.

Keeping the tradition alive

The tradition began in 1188 when crusaders returning to the port of Molfetta on Italy's Adriatic coast found an icon of the Virgin Mary floating in the water.

The Madonna became the town's patron saint in 1840 and was venerated by fishermen who asked for her protection.

In Hoboken, the festival began in the 1920s after a group of men who had recently emigrated from Molfetta formed an organization devoted to the patron saint of their homeland, the Society of the Madonna Dei Martiri.

The festival is rooted in religion and includes nine days of novena prayers and a solemn procession in honor of the Madonna Dei Martiri.

After the mass is held on Saturday, Sept. 7 at St. Francis Church at 308 Jefferson St, an all-day procession with the statue will wend its way through the streets of Hoboken, much like it does in Italy.

The statue is life-size and weighs roughly 1,000 pounds. Men of the Hoboken Society of the Madonna Dei Martiri carry the statue in teams of four through Hoboken stopping at the Lackawanna station.

There it boards a NY Waterway ferry where it travels to bless the fleet and lay a wreath in the river near the World Trade Center before returning to the Feast.

Old and new

"This festival is a piece of Hoboken," said Nick Latino, one of the festival's organizers. "When you look at Hoboken you know the first baseball game was played here but you don't see the field anymore. You come face to face with a piece of Hoboken's history at the festival. This is an ongoing tradition, and you can never take that away."

Part of what keeps the tradition going is the guidance of some of the society's longest-serving members like Tony Albanese, Jerry Caprelluti, Frank Altamura, and Frank DeTrizio who assist the younger and new members in the festival's planning such as Danny Altilio,

in the greater New York City metropolitan area, including Hudson County. RNN owns nine news channels, including Fios1. Several Fios1 reporters frequently cover breaking stories and events in Hudson County.

Fios1 provided local news coverage to millions of cable subscribers in New Jersey. The station's exclusive broadcast coverage included hosting electoral debates for New Jersey Senate and Congress offices, along with local news, high school sports, college sports, traffic, weather, and breaking stories.

Fios1's only competitor for statewide New Jersey coverage is Altice's News12 New Jersey. Many regions of New Jersey are largely considered news deserts in the landscape of broadcast TV.

Other than News12, the vast majority of TV stations broadcasting to New Jersey audiences are based out of New York City and Philadelphia, and provide sparse, if any, coverage of local issues in the Garden State.

According to the Pew Research Center, U.S. newsroom employment has dropped at least 25 percent since 2008. Most of the those losses were employees working for newspapers.

While digital-native, radio, and cable tele-

vision newsrooms had much more stable employment rates over the past decade than did newspapers, TV newsroom jobs saw a steep cut of 25 percent from 2017 to 2018.

Local news loss

Shutdowns and mergers of outlets working in non-digital formats often entail a major loss for in-depth local news coverage.

New Jersey and New York officials expressed concern that Fios1 would be defunct by Nov. 16, decriing the lack of public information that will come with the shutdown.

Very little is known about Verizon's plans to reintroduce any kind of local news to more than 7 million New York and New Jersey customers following the company's decision to
