**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTIVE SESSION IN

This week's episode of the Discover DEP podcast discusses the sinking of the USS Tamaroa. The famed 'Perfect Storm' rescue ship was sunk off the coast of New Jersey to become part of an artificial reef that is enhancing fishing opportunities off the coast of New Jersey and Delaware. Since 1984, the Bureau of Marine Fisheries has been involved in an intensive program of artificial reef construction and biological monitoring. Artificial reefs in ocean waters along the New Jersey coast provide a habitat for fish, shellfish and crustaceans, fishing grounds for anglers, and underwater structures for scuba divers. CHRISTIE ADMINISTRATION RECOGNIZES 27th ANNUAL NEW JERSEY HISTORIC PRESERVATION AWARD WINNERS *PROJECTS HONORED AS PART OF NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION MONTH*

(17/P44) TRENTON – To celebrate May as National Historic Preservation Month in New Jersey, the Department of Environmental Protection's Historic Preservation Office, and the New Jersey Historic Sites Council announced recipients of the 27th Annual Historic Preservation Awards to honor projects, groups or persons dedicated to preserving the state's history.

The 2017 award honorees include restoration of a Greek Revival Italianate residence, 19th century schoolhouse, and 117-year-old fountain; reconstruction of a Dutch Barn; an Eagle Scout project; and establishment of a heritage tourism website.

"This year's award recipients have taken on the worthy cause of preserving the important links to our past, while ensuring that our state's heritage and architectural works are sustained," said DEP Commissioner Bob Martin. "Their efforts help preserve our state's storied history and improve the quality of life for all residents of New Jersey."

The awards were presented on Thursday, May 11 at the Olde Burlington County Courthouse in Mount Holly.

They are made for significant contributions to the advancement of historic preservation; restorations, rehabilitations, and adaptive use plans of historic buildings and cultural landscapes; establishing innovative documentation of our historic resources which contribute to the knowledge of our past; and pioneering inventive efforts to preserve communities, buildings, archaeological sites, and other types of historic resources.

"These awards are our chance to honor the many private individuals, organizations and corporations, as well as state, county and local governments who work hard to preserve New Jersey's historic places," said Kate Marcopul, Administrator and Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer. "It is inspiring to see citizens taking action to preserve New Jersey's historic resources."

BAYADA Headquarters Interior Rehabilitation, Moorestown, Burlington County Historic Building Architects, LLC

A rehabilitation project meticulously restoring and transforming an 1858 Greek Revival Italianate home into the corporate headquarters of BAYADA Home Health Care. This project recognizes the importance of downtown revitalization, and set the highest standards in demonstrating how historic

buildings can work for modern office facilities.

“Journey Through Jersey” Website

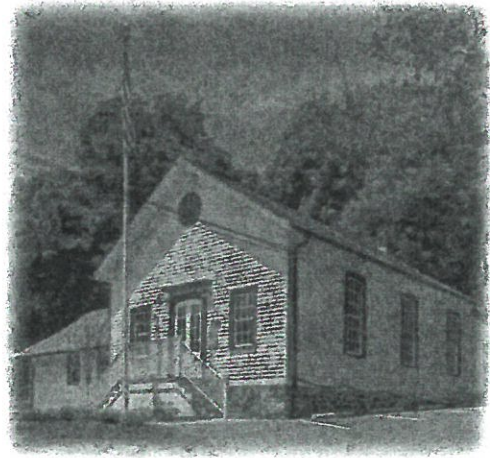
History in the Making & New Jersey Historic Trust

Launched by the New Jersey Historic Trust, the Journey Through Jersey website is the state’s first dedicated solely to promoting heritage tourism activity in New Jersey. This effort raises awareness of the importance and benefits of historic preservation, both economically and socially. To be included on the website, historic sites must meet professional criteria and fall under one or more preset historic themes.

Millington Schoolhouse/Old Town Hall, Long Hill Township, Morris County

Clarke Caton Hintz

A rehabilitation project of this 200-plus year-old building, adapted through the years to serve its community as a one-room schoolhouse, library, and town hall. Despite numerous additions, the original school room is retained and will now serve as open meeting space and exhibits. The ongoing project for this National Register-listed site includes a preservation plan including oral histories of the schoolhouse, development of construction documents, and three phases of rehabilitation work.



Rockingham Dutch Barn, Kingston, Middlesex County

HMR Architects

This circa 1800 Dutch barn was relocated from a nearby property to the Rockingham Historic Site – General George Washington’s final wartime headquarters. Its restoration and reconstruction replaces the property’s original barn, which was most likely of the Dutch variety. This building aides the site’s historic interpretation functions, as well as meeting the modern need for visitation growth through events and programming.

Sarah B. Jordan Boarding House Commemoration, Edison, Middlesex County

The transformation of a vacant lot into an interpretive historic destination is the creative result of an Eagle Scout project. Bringing history to life, the interpretive signage commemorates the Sarah B. Jordan Boarding House – which once stood across the street from Thomas Edison's Menlo Park laboratory – and the social and community roles it played in the close-knit company village.

**Woodwild Park Horse Trough Restoration,
Metuchen, Middlesex County**

Metuchen Historic Preservation Committee

The restoration of Metuchen's "horse trough" fountain is a collaborative story of historic preservation, community involvement and professional craftsmanship. Dating from 1900, the cast iron fountain has been meticulously restored. Its components included the horse trough basin, a dog bowl, and water spigot. The monument is a prominent element within the newly designated Middlesex Avenue-Woodwild Park Historic District.

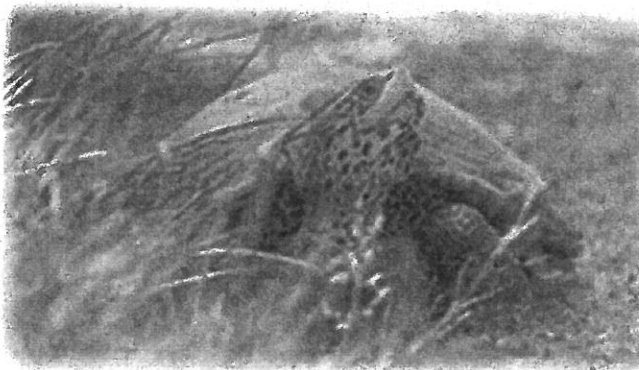

**ISLAND BEACH STATE PARK TO HOST ANNUAL OCEAN FUN DAY ON
SATURDAY, MAY 20***DIAMONDBACK TERRAPINS TO BE RELEASED AS PART OF FAMILY-FRIENDLY EVENT
THAT PAIRS ACTIVITIES WITH EDUCATION ABOUT FRAGILE COASTAL ECOSYSTEM*

(17/P45) TRENTON – Island Beach State Park, the jewel of New Jersey’s State Park System, will give visitors an opportunity to watch the release of young diamondback turtles into their natural habitat, as well as other youth-oriented environmental activities during Ocean Fun Day on Saturday, May 20.

This year’s 14th annual Ocean Fun Days are scheduled from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. May 20 at Island Beach State Park in Ocean County, and on Sunday, May 21 at the New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium’s headquarters in the historic Fort Hancock section of Sandy Hook in Monmouth County. Admission and parking are free. A free shuttle bus will be available at both parks to take visitors to tour sites.



Ocean Fun Day events encourage visitors to enjoy a day outdoors while learning about New Jersey’s coastal ecosystem through educational displays, nature tours and interactive programs that include seining, crafts, a scavenger hunt, touch tanks, youth fishing clinics and more.

The diamondback terrapin release is new this year at Island Beach State Park.

“Ocean Fun Day is a great way to teach visitors about the critical, yet fragile coastal ecosystems along the unspoiled barrier island that is Island Beach State Park,” said Director of Parks and Forestry Mark Texel. “The planned activities will show why Island Beach is a unique classroom to learn how ocean dynamics create barrier islands, and how the plants and animals here have adapted and thrived.”

Events at Island Beach State Park will be at Ocean Bathing Area 1, which is about four miles past the park's gatehouse.

The turtle release will be done by students and faculty from Project Terrapin and the Marine Academy of Technology and Environmental Science (MATES). The Sandy Hook event will include guided tours of Sandy Hook sites and an open house at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration/James J. Howard Marine Sciences Laboratory. Both sites will also offer a program on how to build a better sand castle by understanding the science behind cohesion, adhesion and surface tension.



“Ocean Fun Days have become a wonderful tradition for New Jersey’s families and visitors, and that is due to strong partnerships,” said Claire Antonucci, Executive Director of the New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium. “This year, we are delighted to partner with the Marine Academy of Technology and Environmental Science (MATES) to add a new activity to Ocean Fun Days with students and faculty from MATES Project Terrapin inviting the public to join them to release young diamondback turtles back into their natural habitat.”

Island Beach State Park is one of the few remaining undeveloped barrier beaches on the north Atlantic coast. With approximately 3,000 acres of beaches, dunes, maritime forests, freshwater wetlands and tidal marshes, the park is home to the state’s largest osprey colony, as well as peregrine falcons, wading birds, shorebirds, waterfowl and songbirds.

Ocean Fun Days is presented by founding sponsor New Jersey Natural Gas, in partnership with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium, Asbury Park Press, New Jersey Division of Parks and Forestry, National Park Service and NOAA.

The New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium is an affiliation of colleges, universities and other groups dedicated to advancing knowledge and stewardship of New Jersey’s marine and coastal environment through innovative research, education and outreach programs. 26TH ANNUAL GOVERNOR'S SURF FISHING TOURNAMENT SET FOR SUNDAY, MAY 21 AT ISLAND BEACH STATE PARK *NEW CATEGORY FOR HIGH-SCHOOL-AGED ANGLERS ADDED FOR CONTEST*

(17/P47) TRENTON – The competition for the 26th Annual Governor's Surf Fishing Tournament on Sunday, May 21 at Island Beach State Park will be a bit stronger this year with the addition of a new participation category for high-school-aged students, Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Bob Martin announced today.

The popular springtime event draws participants of all ages from across New Jersey and surrounding states, and heralds the start of the summer tourism season at the Jersey shore. Commissioner Martin will present awards to the winners on behalf of DEP's Division of Fish and Wildlife at Sunday's event.



"The Governor's Surf Fishing Tournament is a great way to enjoy New Jersey's beautiful beaches while appreciating the abundant surf fishing available along the coast," Commissioner Martin said. "The tournament has become a recent rite of spring and a tremendous family tradition for years. I encourage anglers of all ages to come out and experience one of New Jersey's great recreational pastimes."

The individual who catches the overall largest – or longest - fish wins the "Governor's Award" and will have his or her name engraved on the

Governor's Cup, which is permanently displayed at Island Beach State Park in Ocean County. Fishing equipment is also awarded to winners in a variety of categories for species of fish and age groups.

High School teams may consist of two to five students who are part of a formal fishing club, members of a Hooked on Fishing – Not on Drugs group, or a non-formal group. Schools can enter more than one team in the competition.

The team catching the longest fish will have their name engraved on the Governor's High School Team Cup, which will be permanently displayed at Island Beach State Park, and will receive a plaque for 1st place. Plaques also will be awarded for 2nd and 3rd place teams.



"The Governor's Surf Fishing Tournament is a terrific event, and we anticipate excellent surf fishing opportunities and hundreds of anglers," said Division of Fish and Wildlife Acting Director Larry Herrighty. "The addition of the High School Team Category this year will make for an even better tournament, and add to the fishing excitement on the beach as we welcome anglers of all ages and experience to enjoy the day with family and friends."

The tournament, now in its fourth year as a springtime event, has always been geared to people to enjoy a day of fishing at the beach while raising funds for worthy causes that include improving beach access, constructing access ramps for disabled saltwater anglers, surf fishing instruction programs and equipment, and marine education and restoration projects.

Registration on the day of the tournament begins at 5 a.m., with fishing from 6:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Registration that day is \$20 for ages 18 and older, and \$5 for anglers ages 13-17. There is no fee for children 12 and younger.

The Governor's Surf Fishing Tournament is sponsored by the DEP's Division of Fish and Wildlife, Division of Parks and Forestry, the New Jersey State Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, Jersey Coast Anglers Association and the New Jersey Beach Buggy Association.

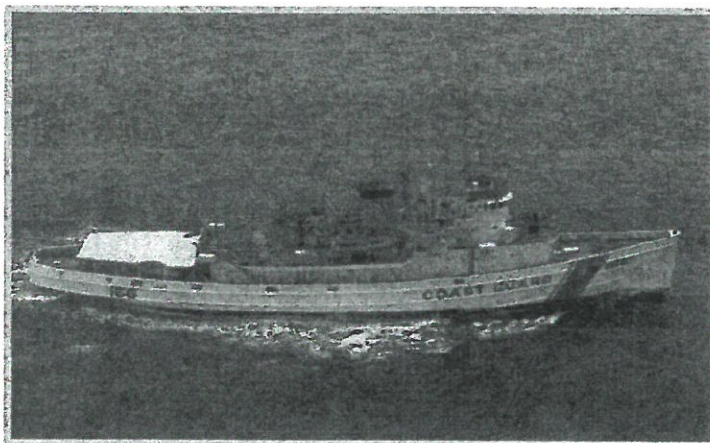

NEW JERSEY, DELAWARE TEAM UP TO DEPLOY FAMED *ZUNI/TAMAROA* AS PART OF ARTIFICIAL REEF SITE COMPRISED OF FORMER MILITARY SHIPS 205-FOOT VESSEL OF "PERFECT STORM" RENOWN SUNK SOUTHEAST OF CAPE MAY

(17/P42) TRENTON – A 205-foot vessel immortalized for its service as a Coast Guard cutter that conducted daring rescues during a brutal 1991 East Coast storm was deployed today off Cape May to become part of an artificial reef comprised of old military ships that is enhancing fishing opportunities off New Jersey and Delaware.



The sinking of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter *Tamaroa*, formerly the Navy fleet tug *Zuni*, at the Del-Jersey-Land Inshore Reef, located 26 nautical miles southeast of Cape May, was carried out by Coleen Marine Inc., a contractor for the Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC), in partnership with the Department of Environmental Protection.

The vessel was featured in the bestselling book *The Perfect Storm* and the movie of the same name. As the *Zuni*, the vessel supported landings by the U.S. Marine Corps in the pivotal 1945 Battle of Iwo Jima. It is believed to be the last surviving vessel that directly supported those operations.

"We are proud to partner with Delaware in making this deployment a reality and giving this venerable vessel a chance at continued service, this time of a different nature," DEP Commissioner Bob Martin said. "Anglers of all ages will now be able to visit this spot for many years to come to enjoy the varied marine life this ship will attract. Sport divers will also have a unique opportunity to explore the *Tamaroa's* decks, bulwarks and passageways, perhaps soaking in the ship's storied history in the process."

"The *Zuni/Tamaroa* has a renowned history of service at sea that now extends to Delaware's artificial reef system – which has earned its own renown by contributing to both the state's

environment and economy,” Delaware Governor John Carey said. “Projects such as the Del-Jersey-Land Reef are a direct link to our environmental health and to what Delaware is doing economically in creating new habitat where there was none, and the *Zuni/Tamaroa* strengthens that link.”

The cutter was deployed in water more than 120 feet deep after patches were removed from holes that were pre-cut into its hull. The *Zuni/Tamaroa* joined the former Army freighter and Navy support ship *Shearwater*, the minesweeper *Gregory Poole*, and the 563-foot destroyer U.S.S. *Arthur W. Radford*, the largest vessel ever deployed off the East Coast. The reef, established 10 years ago specifically for former military vessels, is jointly managed by New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland.

For much of its Coast Guard career, the *Tamaroa* served out of New York City, and toward the end of its service it was based in New Castle, N.H. Its Coast Guard roles included fisheries enforcement, drug interdiction, immigration enforcement and ice patrols in locations as far-afield as the Caribbean, the Straits of Florida and the vast North Atlantic fishing ground of Georges Bank.



Over its nearly five-decade Coast Guard career, the *Tamaroa*, also known as the Tam, responded to numerous sinking and disabled fishing and pleasure boats, took part in the rescue of passengers from a sinking ocean liner, recovered bodies from an airliner that crashed off the coast of New Jersey, rescued hundreds of Haitian migrants from overloaded boats, saved the crew of a storm-battered Soviet freighter, and intercepted drug runners and smugglers.

But the *Tamaroa* gained fame for its rescue efforts during the 1991 Halloween Storm – a rare convergence of a hurricane and a massive low pressure system from Canada – that battered the East Coast and was chronicled in Sebastian Junger’s bestselling book, *The Perfect Storm*, made into a hit movie starring George Clooney and Mark Wahlberg.

The *Tamaroa* first assisted in the rescue of three people from a sailboat caught in the storm. Then, battling massive swells and making eight separate approaches, the vessel rescued four of five crew members from an Air National Guard rescue helicopter that ran out of fuel and had to ditch 90 nautical miles south of Montauk, Long Island. The fifth member was lost at sea. The *Tamaroa* and its crew received Coast Guard commendations for the missions.

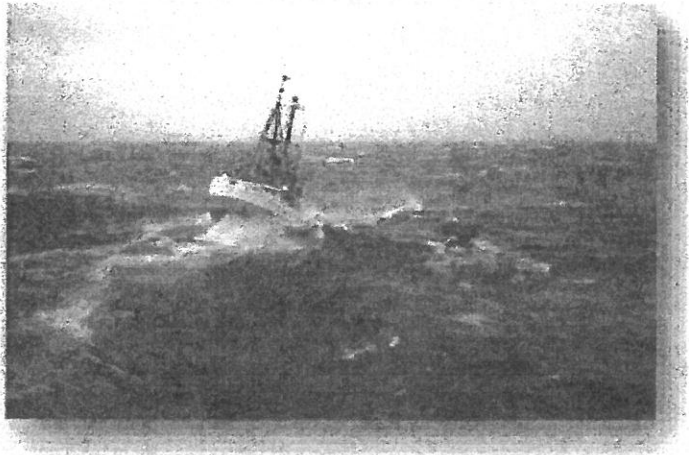
Plans to restore the *Tamaroa* as a museum were scuttled due to its advanced age that made work very costly and unfeasible. The *Zuni/Tamaroa* was prepared for reef deployment in Norfolk, Va., where the vessel underwent extensive environmental preparation. Interior paneling and insulation were removed and the ship was thoroughly cleaned of fuel and hydraulic fluids. The ship’s environmental tests were approved by the federal Environmental Protection Agency. The vessel also met Coast Guard standards for sinking as an artificial reef.

The New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife currently holds permits for 15 artificial reef sites – 13 in federal waters – including the Del-Jersey-Land Reef – and two in state waters. The reefs, encompassing a total of 25 square miles of ocean floor, are made up of a variety of materials such as concrete and steel, fishing boats and barges, even subway cars and Army tanks.

These materials provide surfaces for a wide diversity of marine organisms to grow on the otherwise flat and featureless continental shelf, ultimately providing habitat for many species of fish and shellfish. DEP studies have shown that these materials are colonized quickly with organisms such as algae, barnacles, mussels and blue crabs that attract smaller fish which, in turn, attract species that are popular with recreational anglers.

Older vessels such as the *Tamaroa* are ideally suited for artificial reefs “because of all the voids and cavities in them below deck – they’re really the perfect sanctuary for fish,” said Delaware reef coordinator Jeff Tinsman.

“Not long after the sinking, the fish will start to come outside her hull and decks to feed,” Tinsman said. “Within a few weeks, blue mussels, sponges, barnacles and soft corals will attach themselves to the structure, and in about a year the reef will be fully productive – for fish and anglers alike.”



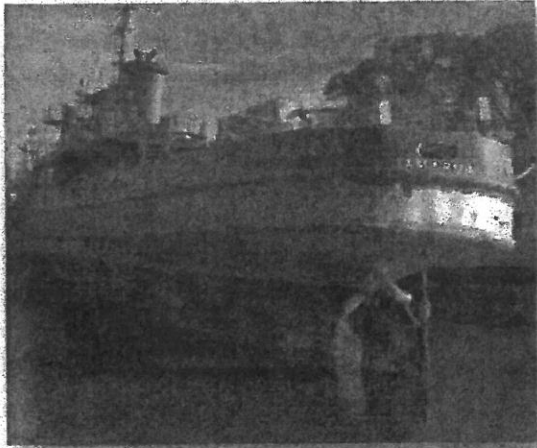
The U.S. Navy commissioned the vessel on Oct. 9, 1943, as the fleet tug *Zuni*. In February 1945, the *Zuni* arrived three days after the initial amphibious assault of Japanese-held Iwo Jima by the U.S. Marine Corps, assisting follow-up landing craft in funneling more troops and equipment into the attack on the barren volcanic island southeast of Japan.

The *Zuni*, nicknamed the Mighty Z, towed damaged ships to safety and rescued hundreds of crew members from torpedoed ships during its war service. The *Zuni* was decorated with four battle stars, among many other honors. Upon its transfer to the Coast Guard after the war, the *Zuni* was refitted for service as a cutter and renamed the *Tamaroa*, after a Native-American tribe that once inhabited the central Mississippi River Valley.

Among its many exploits during 48 years of Coast Guard service, the *Tamaroa* rescued passengers from the *Andrea Doria*, an Italian luxury liner that sank off Nantucket on July 26, 1956, after colliding with a Swedish liner. Five weeks earlier, the *Tamaroa* had assisted in recovering bodies from a Venezuelan airliner that crashed 32 miles off Asbury Park.

In March 1984, the *Tamaroa* assisted in the rescue of the crew of a Soviet freighter that foundered in bad weather off New Hampshire. The Russian crew went on to enjoy a circuit tour of New York and Washington, D.C. that included a warm welcome at a Gloucester County diner.

Five years later the *Tamaroa* saved hundreds of Haitian migrants while on patrol in the Caribbean. The ship also made a special mission to save a Cuban man who had paddled 40 miles out to sea on tire inner-tubes.



The Coast Guard retired the *Tamaroa* in 1994, and donated the vessel to the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum on the Hudson River in New York City. A former crewman started a group to restore the vessel. Work was under way in Virginia when a 2011 storm flooded the *Tamaroa*'s engine room. Its hull also showed numerous signs of failure, making restoration impossible.

Delaware paid for the bulk of the acquisition of the cutter, preparation and sinking, assisted by the DEP, which received funding from the Ann E. Clarke Foundation and the Sportfishing Fund.

In addition to the fishing derby, the day will offer several interactive demonstrations and displays to educate participants about recreational fishing, water quality, aquatic plants and animals. Educational stations will be provided by several local organizations and agencies.

DEP's educational activities will be provided by the Division of Fish and Wildlife's

Hackettstown Hatchery and Hooked On Fishing - Not On Drugs Program, the Urban Fishing Program, the Bureau of Freshwater and Biological Monitoring, Delaware and Raritan Canal State Park, and the New Jersey AmeriCorps Watershed Ambassadors Program.

All registered children will receive a certificate recognizing their participation in the fishing derby. The “catch and release” approach will be utilized, although ice and plastic bags will be available if a child prefers to take home a legal-sized catch. Bass and bluegill are among species of fish in the lake where the derby will be held. Free snacks and drinks also will be available for participating children.

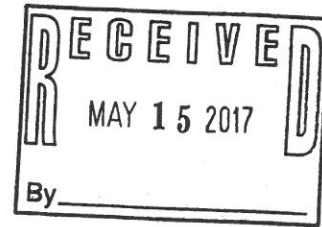
The DEP's Water Resource Management's Bureau of Marine Water Monitoring will use Research Vessel Robert C. Shinn Jr. to monitor the quality and ecological health of marine waters and marine organisms. The boat is able to deploy real-time telemetry monitoring-buoys that can measure various water quality parameters 24 hours a day.

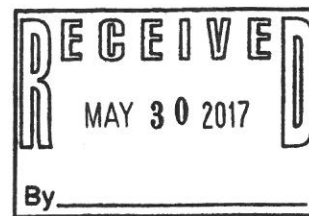

"Clean Communities money is a vital resource for New Jersey's municipalities and counties every year because these grants help fund cleanups that will further enhance our communities, natural resources and roadways," said Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Bob Martin. "By taking care of the environment around us, we encourage others to do the same in their own communities and build pride across the state."

"Simple programs such as litter control do a lot for improving New Jersey's communities, in terms of public health and quality of life," said Mark Pedersen,

Assistant Commissioner for Site Remediation and Waste Management. "This year's Clean Communities grants will allow us to continue fostering environmental stewardship at the local level and help our communities to be more sustainable."

As required by law, the nonprofit New Jersey Clean Communities Council oversees the reporting requirements for the program. Grants are funded by a legislated user-fee on manufacturers, wholesalers and distributors that produce litter-generating products. Disbursements to

municipalities are based on the number of housing units and miles of municipally owned roadways within each municipality.

“We are hopeful that municipalities and counties will use Clean Communities funding wisely to pay for volunteer and paid cleanups, badly needed equipment purchases, enforcement activities, and education,” said Sandy Huber, Executive Director of New Jersey Clean Communities Council. “We are grateful for funding that helps keep New Jersey clean.”

Newark, (Essex County) \$419,929; Jersey City, (Hudson County) \$387,918; Toms River (Ocean County) \$218,712; Paterson (Passaic County) \$187,966; Hamilton Township (Mercer County) \$184,817; Edison Township (Middlesex County) \$173,899; Elizabeth City (Union) \$172,361; Woodbridge Township (Middlesex County) \$170,727; Brick Township (Ocean County) \$165,826; Middletown (Monmouth County) \$149,431; Cherry Hill (Camden County) \$147,341; Trenton (Mercer County) \$138,428; Clifton (Passaic County) \$134,719; Vineland (Cumberland County) \$129,290; Franklin Township (Somerset County) \$128,063; Berkeley Township (Ocean County) \$126,853; Camden (Camden County) \$123,316; and Gloucester Township (Camden County) \$121,778.

The counties receiving the largest grant awards are: Ocean, \$208,244, Cumberland, \$181,596, Burlington, \$169,866, Bergen, \$147,997 and Gloucester, \$136,881.

Litter comes from a variety of sources, such as pedestrians, motorists, overflowing household garbage, construction sites and uncovered trucks. Litter is often blown by the wind until it is trapped somewhere, such as along a fence, or in a ditch or gully. People tend to litter when an area is already littered, and when they lack a sense of ownership or pride in their community. In addition to being unsightly, litter is unhealthy and may create a negative public image.

Activities funded by Clean Communities grants include cleanups of stormwater systems that can disperse trash into streams, rivers and bays; volunteer cleanups of public properties; adoption and enforcement of local anti-littering ordinances; beach cleanups; public information and education programs; and purchases of litter collection equipment such as receptacles, recycling bins, anti-litter signs and graffiti removal supplies.
