Mayor's Report

-Former Mayor Tedesco is present to brief the Council on generators;

Former Mayor James Tedesco – OEM

-Here to give an update on providing alternative or backup power to emergency facilities including Borough Hall. Progress is being made. Work to Borough Hall is presently underway to outfit it with a trailer-mounted generator which is able to be moved to fit different needs. The Board of Education is also looking to outfit their schools with generators. Also looking to create "comfort stations" so people can be warm and power up their technology. The anticipated completion date for Borough Hall is the early part of 2014. The more challenging aspects were getting generators to the firehouses and emergency facilities. Each firehouse will have a backup generator. All work should start in next two weeks; Construction inside the firehouse will be scheduled according to the contractor. The DPW building will be rewired so the entire building will run. The Life Safety building will be fitted with a new transfer switch which will allow building to be powered by the current generator. Work should finish by the end of spring. Discussing next stage of generators, possibly the Senior Center.

Mayor: Is the server at Borough Hall covered?

-Realistically, building will be powered within a half hour; Depends on how the Mayor and Council want Borough Hall to operate. OEM and Police server will have 24 hour alternate supply power.

Mayor: Asks about a Grant.

-Has to check on the status of the grant.

Mayor: Affordable housing and the Wounded Warrior project is on its way. Exploring the possibilities of

having COAH construct offices for Human Services and Veterans Affairs as part of this project. COAH could possibly fund construction and lease back to the Borough. Senior housing is always in need of parking.

9. OFFICE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL:

Mayor LaBarbiera

Good things happening in town. Council members are working hard. This past Sunday was the 35th Paramus Run. Credit to the Roemer family is due for the Paramus Run. Library reopened Oct. 7th. Five year improvement program underway. Attended several grand openings this month. Money being spent on the acquisition of new generators. Quality of Life officers have business licenses and landscaper licenses up. They had a boat in a front yard removed and usually respond in timely manner. Fire Company 4 just received a new fire engine and should be receiving a new truck next year. Already in discussion for a new engine and an addition at Fire Company 2. Wounded Warrior project is on its way. Six homes to be constructed for disabled veterans. Former Mayor Tedesco and Guy Picone to give an update on generators.

Former Mayor Tedesco and Guy Picone for OEM

Guy: Project would have never got off the ground without the help of Former Mayor Tedesco. After Hurricane Irene, found numerous electrical problems without generator back up. Mayor and Council have embraced project. Thanks to Former Mayor Tedesco for staying on top of project.

Former Mayor Tedesco: Here to provide a quick update for where we stand with providing emergency generation for critical facilities within the Borough of Paramus. Thanks to Mayor and Council for giving us the ability to do this. Three firehouses did not have backup generation. Within next two weeks, work

will start to have permanent generation at these three firehouses. Work should be completed right after the 1st of the year. All four firehouses will now have backup generators. Borough Hall also needed a generator. We decided to use a portable trailer-mounted generator for Borough Hall so that if another generator failed, this would be used as a backup. DPW building had a generator but didn't power the entire building. Old generator to be taken out and replaced with a new generator. Looking at using the old generator to power another facility in Paramus. Life Safety building not totally powered by the generator currently there. Installing a new switch that once installed will allow Life Safety to be fully operational. Currently had discussions with schools regarding backup generation. We are hoping to come up with "comfort" stations with schools that in the event of an emergency, will allow people to be warm or cool and to charge their technology.

Mayor: Prioritize taking care of our own. Paramus residents first. Sheltering is a real need. Moving forward, these will be in place.

Councilman Amato

Congratulations to Girl Scout Gold Star recipients. Paramus EMS in the month of September responded to 289 calls for service, 195 patients were transported to area hospitals. The busiest day was on a Monday with an average of 45 patient contacts. Sixty-three percent of the persons assisted were medical and sick people while over 30% were assisted for injuries. The average response time was 6.1 minutes compared to the national average of 8 minutes. PEMS vehicles travelled 5,743 miles in the month of September. On Oct. 7, an F-1 tornado passed through Paramus. Several areas suffered significant tree damage. Shade Tree crews responded as early as that afternoon to help open roadways. The next day, Shade Tree removed over 40 trees that were either uprooted or snapped. Approximately 113 hours of overtime used to accomplish this. Shade Tree crews will be planting approximately 180 street trees this fall. Thanks to Shade Tree, DPW and Emergency response teams for getting us through hazardous weather.

Councilwoman Bellinger

Total police calls for the month of September were 4,680 calls, 49 total criminal arrests, 620 motor vehicle summonses issued, total 911 calls were 6,945. Officer Teehan is back in schools. Police will deploy Tazers beginning on Oct. 20th. Equipment and training paid for with seized funds. Kudos to Police dept. and all the work they do. Recreation has a Facebook page. Registration for winter programs ongoing, at this time it is online registration only. Mail-in registration has ended. In-person registration is next Monday and Tuesday. Pumpkin hunt is this Sunday. Each age group will have a costume parade. Environmental Commission thanks Donna Perkowski and the Library staff for attending the Paramus Farmer's Market. Environmental Commission is currently pursuing different grants. Earth Day being planned, artwork for bags being distributed through schools. Substance Awareness Committee met, supported several events such as Pool days for Eastbrook and Westbrook, Relay for Life and weight loss challenge. Continuing support for Red Ribbon week, safe Halloween programs and partial sponsorship of middle school agendas in order to get out their message. Committee agreed to provide funding for Stigma-Free zone signs. Possibly hosting a summer outdoor movie event. Thanks to Senior Center for helping when Library and Life Safety building were closed.

Councilman Lagana

An EF-1 tornado came through Paramus on Oct. 7th causing significant damage, especially on the Golf Course. Thanks you to Shade Tree and DPW for their cleanup efforts. Golf Course revenue is now over two million dollars for the year. Golf course sent a diver into the pond and recovered 13,200 golf balls in two days.

Flu shots are ongoing for Paramus residents 65 and older. Free stroke screening available at Valley Hospital. Free diabetes screening also available at Valley Hospital on Nov. 2nd. Free diabetes and blood

pressure screening will be available at Borough Hall on Nov. 13th and Dec. 12th.

Planning Board and Board of Adjustment meeting scheduled for Oct. 17th was cancelled. Paramus Chamber of Commerce had their Dream Gala Awards which has donated and raised over \$300,000 towards grammar schools and high schools. 4th of July committee had their first meeting on Oct. 16th. First meeting for Cultural Arts committee sometime in December.

Councilwoman Warburton

Rescue Squad will be hosting its third annual Safe Halloween on Thursday, October 31st. Rescue Squad reported a total of 35 calls and 393 man hours logged for the month of September. Paramus Pool Commission is discussing various capital improvements for the 2014 pool season. The main Library reopened on Monday, October 7th and programs resumed on October 21st. New Library roof completed. New children's bathrooms will be completed by Friday, October 25th and the remodel of the adult bathrooms will begin soon. The Paramus DPW is currently distributing new garbage containers for the automated sanitation collection for all houses west of Route 17. The new program for those households will begin on Monday, October 28th. Road resurfacing is scheduled to begin on Oct. 28th and is expected to be completed by Nov. 7th. Members of the Historical Preservation Commission met with representatives of the Alpine Learning Center who own the historical house on the corner of Linwood Ave. and Paramus Rd. House is scheduled to be demolished. Another historical house was also demolished at 337 Spring Valley Rd. On Monday Nov. 4th, Westbrook Middle School invites all veterans to attend their Veterans' Day Remembrance. On Monday Nov. 11th, the Paramus Veterans' Council will have their annual Veterans' Day tribute. All Paramus residents who have returned home from active duty will be presented with their blue star banner at the tribute.
