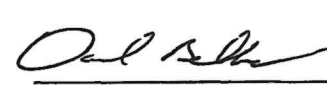

I see marijuana usage severely increasing, I have had many conversations with parents who think marijuana usage and vaping is no big deal. Unfortunately, it's very much "accepted" as the lesser of the evils.

Are youth vaping marijuana? Where are they accessing marijuana? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

Yes, youth are vaping THC – I am unsure where the access is coming from, I can only assume the internet and vape shops. I believe minimizing/normalizing marijuana usage is one of the main problems. We as a society are becoming "OK" with marijuana usage, its normalization is becoming as much accepted as alcohol usage and nicotine usage become. I reiterate above that many parents I have personally spoken to do not believe marijuana is a problem substance and do not believe it's addictive. Many adults are also unaware of the impact on the youth's brain and on those with mental health disorders.

4. What problems related to tobacco use do you see in your community?

Driving while under the influence is one of the main issues I have witnessed.

Yes, youth are vaping tobacco products it visible everywhere, walking down the street, in school. The factors I see are the falsehood that vaping is safe, its accepted as a safe alternative to cigarettes and it "cool" to teens. IE: are youth accessing from the home? Are there common places where drinking takes place? Are accidents related to drinking and driving? ETC? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

I have seen youth using at home, I feel one of our problems is parents would prefer that youth drink at home so they can ensure they are safe, not realizing that hosting underage drinking is not only putting youth at risk but also parents at risk of issues relating to parental responsibility. I have also witnessed adults purchasing alcohol for youth at local retail stores that sell alcohol.

2. What problems related to prescription medication misuse do you see in your community?

Are people sharing prescriptions? Where are they accessing prescription medications? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

Problems are with lack of education medication safety; proper storage within the home. Also, what prescription medication have high abuse rates. We also have a senior center and I don't see our seniors being educated as a risk factor with their medication. Seniors are many times vulnerable to family members dipping into their prescription medication.

Are youth vaping marijuana? Where are they accessing marijuana? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

The youth is vaping marijuana through pens and through juul pods that are refilled with the oils used to vape marijuana. Marijuana is VERY accessible with our community. If I wanted to buy a pod filled with oil or even as much as an ounce, it would be accessible in town through very public advertisement on kids' social media and work of mouth. I think that the factors that are causing these problems are the lack of education and how much marijuana has been normalized with society on a wide scale. It scares me because I know of a few people in town that have died from laced marijuana. A good tell of which houses sell marijuana are that the houses that sell tie a pair of shoes together and hang them from the telephone wire in front of their houses.

4. What problems related to tobacco use do you see in your community?

Are youth vaping tobacco products? Are there common places where vaping or smoking take place? Etc.? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

The issue is that tobacco products are accessible to the community. When my friends were 13, they were able to buy cigarettes from the Exxon gas station on the way to school because the vendor would sell the cigarettes for an inflated price to them. Behind the firehouse was very commonplace to smoke but honestly kids smoke all over. I feel that cigarette use has been declining greatly but the amount of kids that vape though the juul has skyrocketed. I think that's what is causing these problems are accessibility and normalization with the community.

IE: are youth accessing from the home? Are there common places where drinking takes place? Are accidents related to drinking and driving? ETC? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

There is a wide range of underage drinking in town. In high school this took place near the railroad track right underneath Red Bridge. This has been a tradition in the town for a very long time and that tradition has been passed down generation to generation. This is one of the spots that I feel are dangerous for our youth because the mix of alcohol and being right next to a train (that is active) can only result in issues. I think what is causing this problem is the normalization of the activities from past generations. When things are seen as a tradition, they are seen as bad judgement because its been happening for so long. There are also stores in town that have a reputation to sell tobacco products and occasionally alcohol (not as often as tobacco products) to minors. This can most likely be the source of their supply.

2. What problems related to prescription medication misuse do you see in your community?

Are people sharing prescriptions? Where are they accessing prescription medications? What factors do you believe are causing these problems?

I think that the prescription medication misuse in town is the result of our low-income housing dealing. Also, I know that some deals happen at the Amboy Hotel right near the highway. I think the train station is a main spot where prescription drugs are cycled into the town and some people use right in the bathroom of Dunkin' Doughnuts.

Again, the ease and access to get alcohol is evident along with normalization of underage drinking. Parents provide a safe haven for underage drinking to occur.

	Brief Description: What is the main purpose of this activity? What will participants/target population learn? How will they benefit?	Girls on the Run/Heart & Sole – A physical activity-based, social and emotional wellness afterschool program for girls in 3rd-5th and 6th-8th grades. The program teaches girls to develop self-respect, a healthy lifestyle and a connectedness to others and community while creatively integrating running. The evidence-based curriculum has been proven to develop positive habits in critical thinking, problem solving and emotional control. Girls on the Run reaches girls at a critical stage, strengthening their confidence at a time when society begins to tell them they can't and underscoring the important connection between physical and emotional health. The program addresses the whole girl when she needs it most. DARE – Education and interaction will be provided by the South Amboy Police Department through the classroom interaction of the South Amboy DARE Officer. Information will be provided to 5th grade students about the dangers of prescription drug misuse and the connection to heroin use and addiction. The awareness and attitudes of the participants are positively affected by the information and interaction of the DARE program. The South Amboy DARE program is constantly evolving and places highly trained police officers in our schools to provide our children with life-saving information while teaching them good decision-making skills Botvin Life Skills Training program (Level 3) is a comprehensive, dynamic, and developmentally appropriate substance abuse and violence prevention program designed for 6th grade school students. This highly effective curriculum has been proven to help increase self-esteem, develop healthy attitudes, and improve their knowledge of essential life skills – all of which promote healthy and positive personal development in a culturally competent manner. According to a study, published in the Journal of Drug Education, more elementary schools in the US chose to use the LST program over all other evidence-based prevention programs. The following skills are taught and reinforced throughout the program: (1) Personal self-management skills, (2) general social skills, and (3) drug resistance skills. Students develop skills that enhance self-esteem, develop problem-solving skills, help them reduce stress and anxiety, and manage anger. Students gain skills to meet personal challenges such as overcoming shyness, communicating clearly, building relationships, and avoiding violence. Students build effective defenses against pressures to use tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, and other drugs. This program may be provided on a virtual platform if needed.

Girls on the Run/Heart & Sole -This ten-week program meets two times weekly for 75 minutes after school, culminating with a community service project and a non-competitive 5K celebratory run. Trained leaders coach small teams through research-based curricula, which includes discussions, activities and running games. The lessons explore team building, dealing with gossip and bullying, resilience, self-confidence and standing up for self and others. DARE – Classroom sessions are provided to the 5th grade students at the South Amboy Elementary School. The duration of the program is a school semester. The final class consists of an education component for all parents of the children participating in the DARE Program, including dramatization by the students of various 'scenarios' and 'encounters' related to prescription drug misuse and heroin use and addiction. Botvin Life Skills Training Program consisting of a 30-45 minute class for 8 sessions. It was initially coordinated by the Manchester Township Police Department, who have researched, developed, vetted and successfully implemented this interactive high school program, Not Even Once. Hackensack Meridian Health has provided this highly interactive course as a collaborative effort between Emergency Medical Services, law enforcement and educators. This program is taught to students during the school day and the ultimate goal is to educate the students about drugs abuse including opiate and marijuana abuse and give them the tools they need to make better decisions.
